FOREWORD

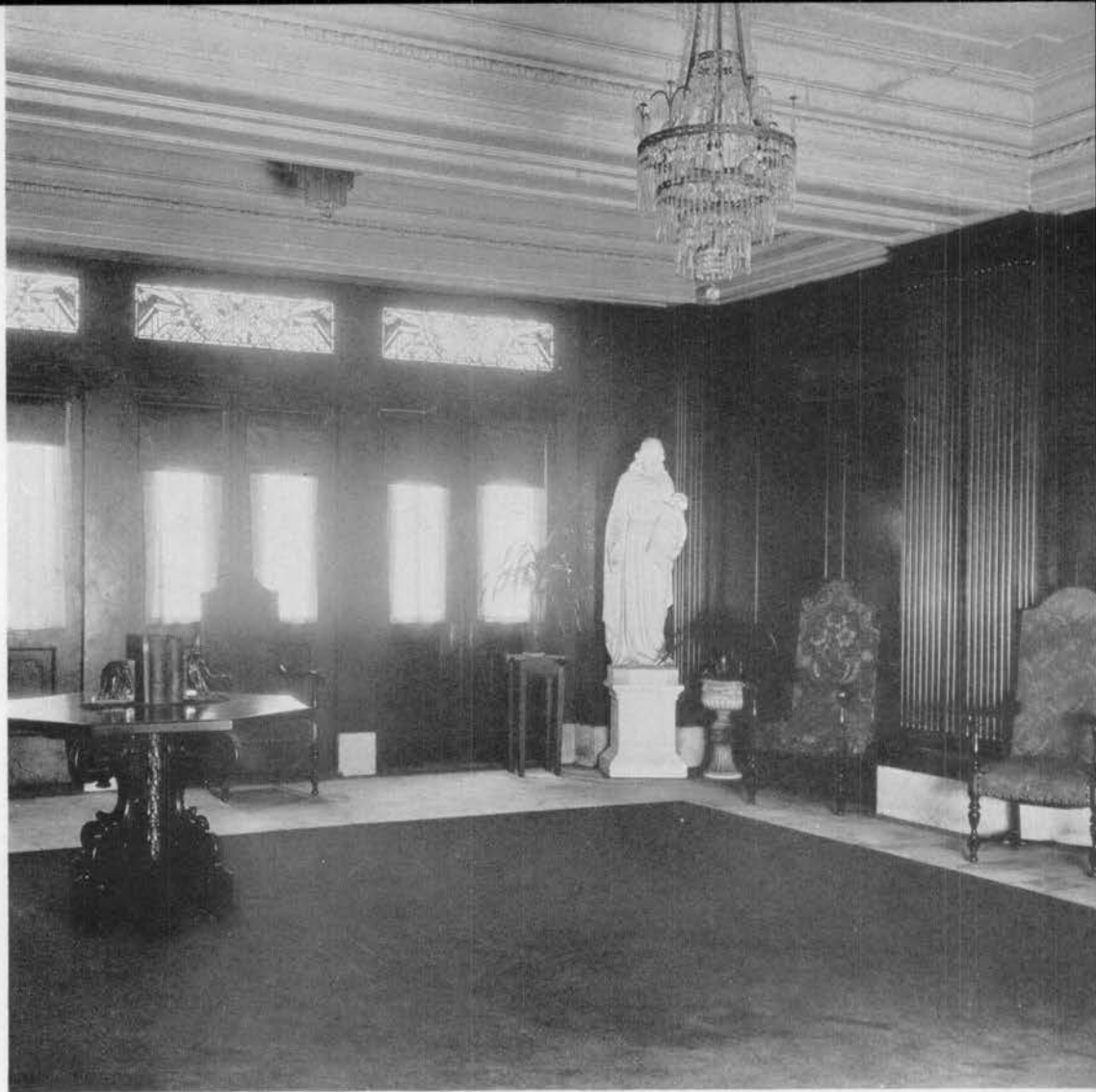

ANDREW C. ISAACSON

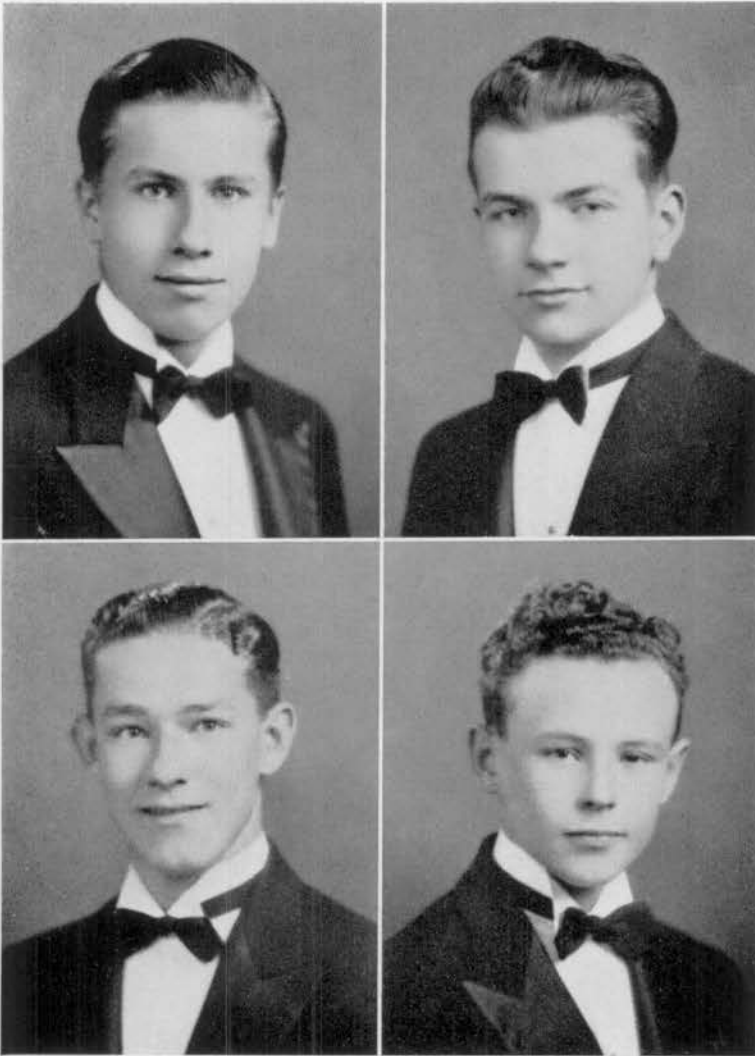

MAGAZINES—Which are sent to Kings County Hospital and which have caused numerous conversions—and stamps—which are sent to the Mission Stamp Exchange at Woodstock for conversion into money—are voluntarily contributed by the members.

FRESHMAN SODALITY

The guard of honor consists of a group of students, who volunteer to watch one day a week for ten minutes of their noon day recess before the Blessed Sacrament. The students of certain classes are assigned to a special day on which they must report to the Officer of the Day, who checks them present and later reports to Father Higgins in order that the points toward the Duces rating may be determined. The primary purpose of the organization is to maintain as far as possible in a High School a continuous watch before the Blessed Sacrament. This, also, is a voluntary organization and left entirely up to the initiative of the students. The aim of the Knights is to make boys and youths rejoice in their Faith, to be proud of it, to practice it and all its duties because they personally want to. A great majority of the students avail themselves of this opportunity to receive their Lord and Master every Friday morning at school.

LIBRARY

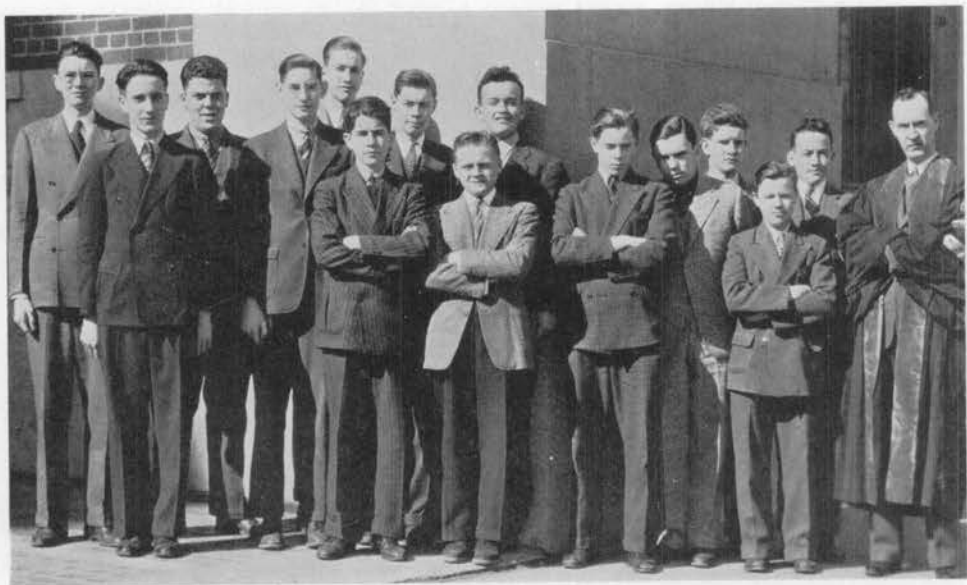

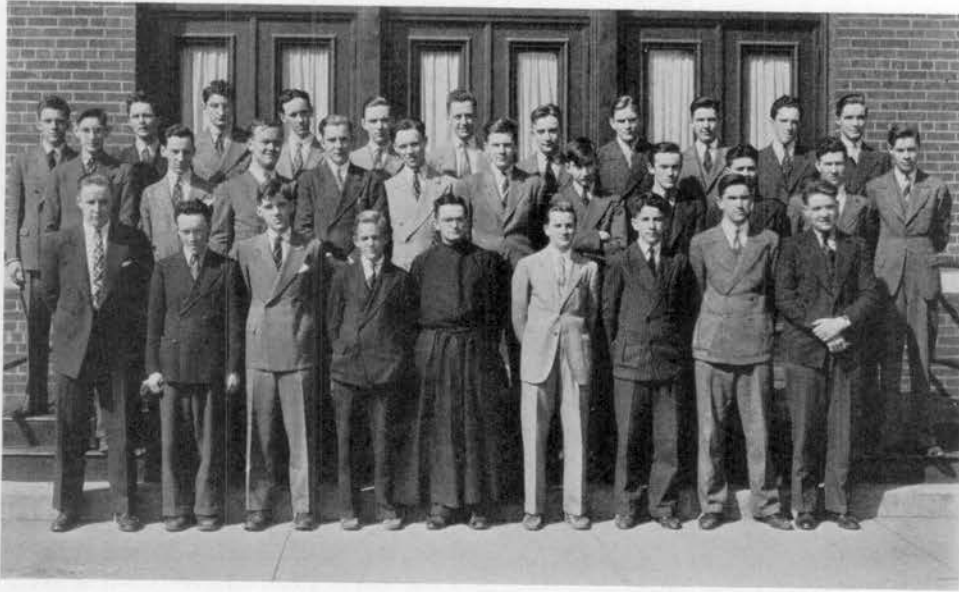

On September seventeenth, fifteen candidates reported for the first meeting of the orchestra held in its new headquarters located on the fourth floor. The group was composed mostly of lower classmen, who had never played together before in any musical group. The only hopeful sign was the wide number of brass instruments, which were so sorely lacking in the orchestra of the previous year. Many weeks of hard labor ensued, during which a unit was formulated, which won praise at its every appearance.

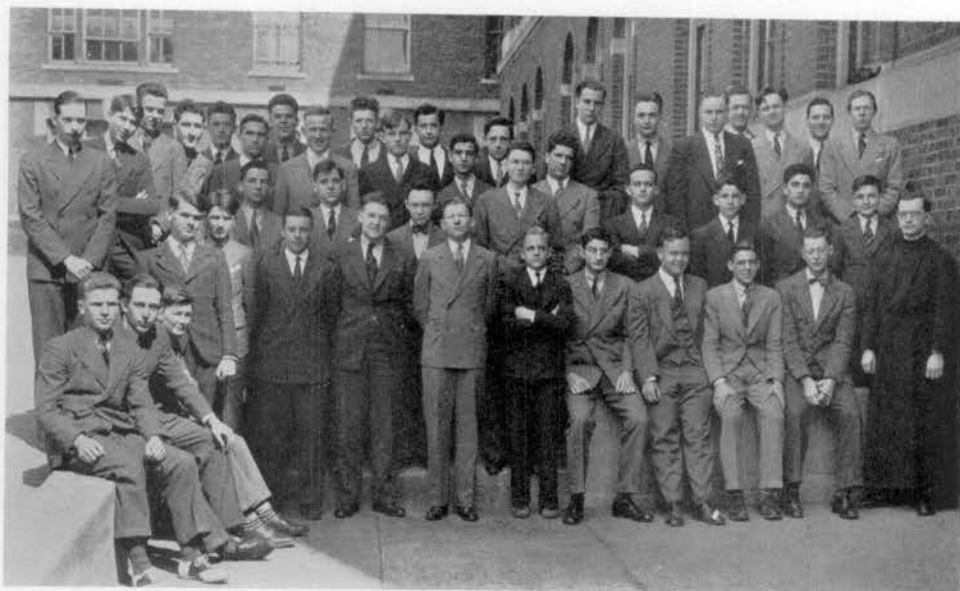

An innovation this year will be the award of major letters to the outstanding equestrians of the club. A further possible innovation will be the establishment of a polo team in the near future.

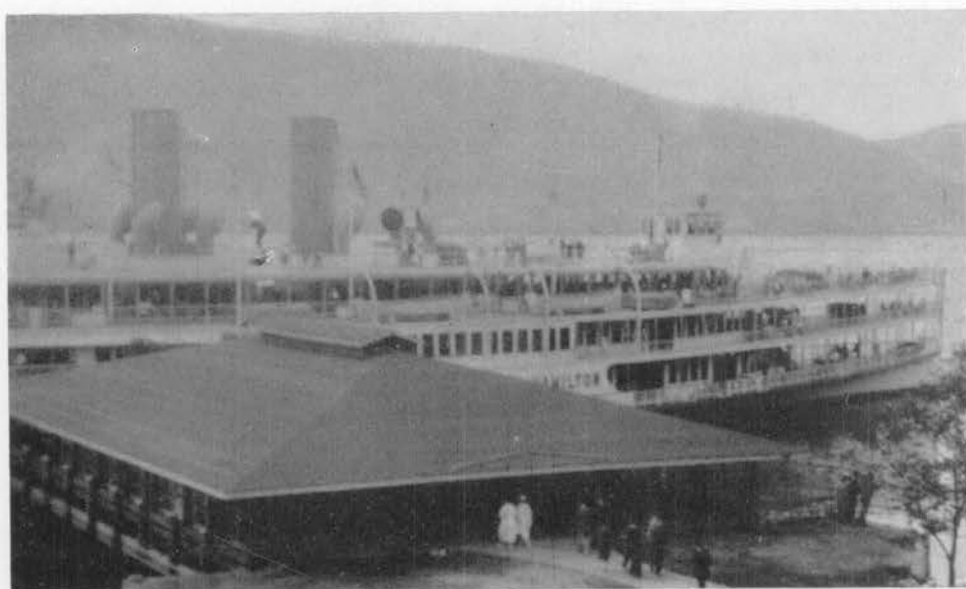

VARSITY FOOTBALL

The record of the Brooklyn Prep football team of 1937 was disappointing. In seven contests they won one, and lost six, scored 25 points to their opponents 111, and had several men land in the hospital. From the first whistle to the last, the three legendary fates were against the team,—Clotho, Lachesis and Atropos: they huddled together in the musty recesses of their gloomy domicile and plotted the course of the Prep gridders. Their course was a hard and disappointing one, and especially relentless.

Before the first game, Clotho had spun the material for an eleven that appeared to have the "stuff" to carry them through a mediocre season at least. Lachesis lent her helping hand and moulded a few outstanding players from the crop. These were: first, the fiery Nick Cavagnaro, followed by Tom Braunworth, Louie Ludeman and Vic Mathews. There were other potential stars, but Atropos did her best to prevent them from forming.

The season's opener against Xavier was a setback and a disappointment. Prep had a team in there fighting every moment on a par with their rivals, but when they weakened for only a moment, the alert Cadet eleven managed to score the only touchdown of the day on Chimento's two yard, second quarter plunge. The Prep team in the second, severely threatened to overtake the leaders. But,—Atropos struck! She craftily drew her fateful shears and cut the threads guiding four first stringers, and with these regulars disabled, the Prepmen were forced to finish that game with a badly battered team.

It was that team, now consisting of a large number of reserves, that lined up on the field at Dexter Park, to start against the highly touted John Adams aggregation. It was here that the Blue and White suffered its worst setback. It was here that the fates again ruled, and it was here that Atropos once more dominated

on the field. The final score was 25-0. It was said that Brooklyn Prep was shut out; that Brooklyn Prep was trampled; that Brooklyn Prep's prestige was knifed. The team was, of course, shut out and trampled upon. But did Brooklyn Prep's prestige suffer? Certainly not! The men from Crown Heights opposed a group of players that later proved to be the undefeated champs of their borough; and they met them with a team that had not yet fully recovered from its initial defeat, either physically or psychologically. Prusmak, Carbone, Bertucci and Cerulli ran wild and scored all the points for the powerful foe. Every one of these four were chosen as All-Scholastic selections, and is it not reasonable that Prep should lose as well as all the others who faced this team? Lachesis flashed by and formed her stars from Prep; the superb passing and running combination of Larkin and Hogan; the excellent place kicking of Louie Ludeman, and the outstanding defensive play of Buckley and Grogan. But Atropos had her evil eye on Grogan.

Then came victory! It was the only victory, but Brooklyn Prep had its one day of glory. Clotho and Lachesis reigned and Atropos lurked in the misty background and descended but once. A changed team! A changed spirit! A changed aggressiveness! That was what fought that day when the underdog, Prep, bit its Master, Fordham. Thrice they lashed out and scored against a stunned Fordham team,—18-7! Fordham crossed Prep's last white line but once, though they fought desperately to conquer the team which they had been favored to massacre. A notch in Prep's win column. A notch in Prep's prestige. Prep, the underdog, had conquered! Lachesis' charges were magnificent. Cavagnaro and Hogan were the offense; Grogan and Braunworth cut down many enemy ball carriers and bolstered up Prep's defense forces. Late in the opening quarter it was Hogan who scored Prep's first touchdown of the season on an off tackle slice. Brooklyn Prep was in the lead! Hogan had scored! The first quarter was over. Clotho and Lachesis had had their stay for Atropos charged from her misty recess and did not retreat until Grogan was lying on the sidelines with a broken ankle. Fordham rallied and after a 60 yard drive, scored. The fates were fighting. Fordham converted! Fordham was leading! In the next period, Cavagnaro was inspired and darted in enemy territory like a jack rabbit. Nick scored once from the four yard line, followed by a drive from the two yard stripe, to sew up the first Brooklyn Prep Victory. Clotho and Lachesis had won!

St. Paul's was the next team to subdue the struggling Prep team. Fresh from their rout of Fordham, the Blue and Whifers looked forward to this contest with the team that had battered them so badly the year before. But their optimistic hopes were never realized. The Garden City boys, led by the elusive Bob Shorey, netted 20 points and held the Crown Heighters scoreless. Clotho and Lachesis were still angry with Atropos, but the last had her way. The first tally came early in the first quarter when Bob Shorey plunged two yards to score after a sustained 70 yard drive. It was Shorey again who accounted for the second goal in the third period after he had received a ten yard pass and then dashed twelve yards to the pay stripe. Eddie Van Cott intercepted a Prep pass and then sprinted 25 yards for the third goal.

The team tasted bitter defeat again when they met Poly Prep in that annual feudal clash. It was Poly's game by the wide margin of 18-0. The Prep faced two great runners,—George Neurohr and Jack Ferris, in this game, and it was these two who inflicted the heavy damages on the Prep squad. Scarcely five minutes after the opening whistle, Neurohr scored on a spectacular 65 yard end run and minutes later the same, fast stepping ace, carried the ball over from Prep's 13 yard line on a center plunge. Then the Prep team tightened and revealed a snappy, well organized team for almost two quarters. Near the end of the third period, the eleven buckled and Ferris intercepted a Prep pass and ran 55 yards behind rapidly forming interference to finish the scoring.

The fates disregarded the significance celebrated on Armistice Day and marched on the field to help an Adelphi team hand Brooklyn Prep not only its fifth

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setback, but also a telling injury. In this conflict, Louie Ludeman suffered a light injury, but one that benched him for the remainder of the season. It was mainly due to this injury that a Prep victory was turned into a defeat. In the middle of the first period, Prep recovered an Adelphi fumble on their opponents 28 yard stripe. On the first play Nick Cavagnaro, behind perfect blocking, skirted his own right end and scored. Ludeman booted the extra point and Prep led 7-0. In the next period, on a trick play, Ludeman cut down an Adelphi ball carrier and was himself injured. This was a serious blow to the already injury ridden Prep squad, and from there on, Atropos ruled again, for Adelphi not only tied up the score in the second quarter, but won the ball game in the next canto, on a two yard plunge by Max Alt. The surprise of this game was rendered by Tom Braunworth who, having converted from his position at center, turned in an excellent performance in his new backfield berth.

In their final contest, the Blue and White warriors clashed with their ancient borough rivals, St. John's, and fell before the onslaught of the formidable Redmen. This defeat was the last. The fates had done their work. Brooklyn Prep had lost and these were personally present to see that the Prep did lose. For, as they had formerly gifted the team with good material, only to have them snatched away by Greedy Atropos, they this time brought along the added hazard called "breaks"—and they gave all the "breaks" to the Vincentian eleven. Thereby hangs the story of this defeat. By a bad break, the Redmen recovered a kicked ball, barely touched by a Prep halfback, on the Prep 20 yard stripe. From there, Dunham toted the pigskin for the first tally. Frame, on a sensational 87 yard run, and English on a 2 yard plunge, scored the other touchdowns in the final stanza. The scoring was completed a few moments later when St. John's scored a safety. And so a "hard luck" season was closed with a "hard luck" play.

On looking ahead to next year's team, we see a team that will dominate. We see a team consisting of experienced men. The fates will be more kindly; they've had their stay at Brooklyn Prep. Clotho, Lachesis and Atropos won't be back, we hope, for a long, long time!

Surprised in the first half by three quick scores, the Blue and White came back in the second half to score a well earned touchdown against a very stubborn opposition, but lost 20-6.

Next came Poly Prep. George Titus returned to quarter but a strong Poly team scored twice in an evenly matched game. Though the breaks were against us, we made a creditable showing. We lost 12-0.

The field at the Prep was a sea of mud, but nevertheless the game was played. Slipping on a muddy field but yet always moving ahead, the Prep struck hard, scoring three times and blanking a fast St. Finbar's team. In this game Titus scored our touchdowns and McCormack kicked two extra points.

Next year, the Varsity will undoubtedly include George Titus, George McCormack, Douglas Cagney and Tommy Gill.

The team consisting of Ambraz, Barbu, Brolley, Campbell, Cassidy, Cody, Connolly, Conroy, Cooke, Cosgrove, Cuff, Flanagan, Gallagher, Galvin, Kopke, Lawson, Lawler, Leonard, Mackin, McGrain, Moran, Mulvey, Newbatt, Nicholl, Pisani, Ready, Rock, Sweeney, Tynion and Sullivan opened the season successfully with a 6-0 victory over St. Mary's Gaels. INDOOR TRACK

Coach Giegengack issued the call for indoor track this year with a heavy heart. We had a choice group of veterans reporting in Ed Maher, Frank Timmes, Pete Callery, Tom Courtney, Ed McElduff and Joe Ingham. The first three mentioned were members of last year's victorious Penn Relay team and the others, varsity hold overs from last year. However, the absence of men from the lower classes bespeaks a serious situation for the future.

After a month of practice and time trials the relay was finally chosen. The team of Maher, Galvin (a newcomer), Timmes and Callery gathered numerous medals during the year, and in garnering a second in the K. of C. meet at the Garden they ran the fastest time of any Prep relay. In winning the O.L.P.H. relay, this team broke by 3 seconds the existing record established last year by an undefeated Bishop Loughlin relay which was later National Champion!

In the championship meets where the team was broken up, Callery established himself as an outstanding half miler, while Maher and Galvin and Timmes proved to be cracker-jack quarter milers.

CROSS- COUNTRY

Continuing the precedence and tradition set by the former Prep cross-country teams, the squad this year was undefeated in their six dual meets. Captain Jim Finley and his mates literally ran all opponents into the ground. This marks the fifth consecutive year Coach Giegengack's team has been unbeaten in dual meet competition.

The first school to fall before the Prep was Alexander Hamilton in which meet Captain James Finley, Andrew Lawrence and Peter Callery crossed the finish line, tied for first place. Next on the schedule was St. Augustine's and then Erasmus, both of which met crushing defeats at the hands of the Prepsters. Two traditional rivals, Poly Prep and Horace Mann, were then conquered by the blue clad runners, both of them by perfect scores. This concluded the dual meet season.

Now the squad began to concentrate on the championship meets. The Catholics were first on the list and a courageous team suffering from illness managed to place third in the scoring. A valiantly fighting Finley was leading his teammates on the hills when, due to his fast early pace, he was unable to finish. Four days later the team returned to displace St. Augustine's as the runner-up in the "Privates." Finley, not in the best of condition, finished tenth. In both of these meets, Andrew Lawrence, sophomore sensation, led the Prep scorers, capturing fourth in the Catholics and second in the Privates.

Winding up the season, the squad journeyed to Seton Hall to defend its National Catholic Championship. Here they finished fourth against very tough competition, with Peter Callery and Andrew Lawrence leading the team.

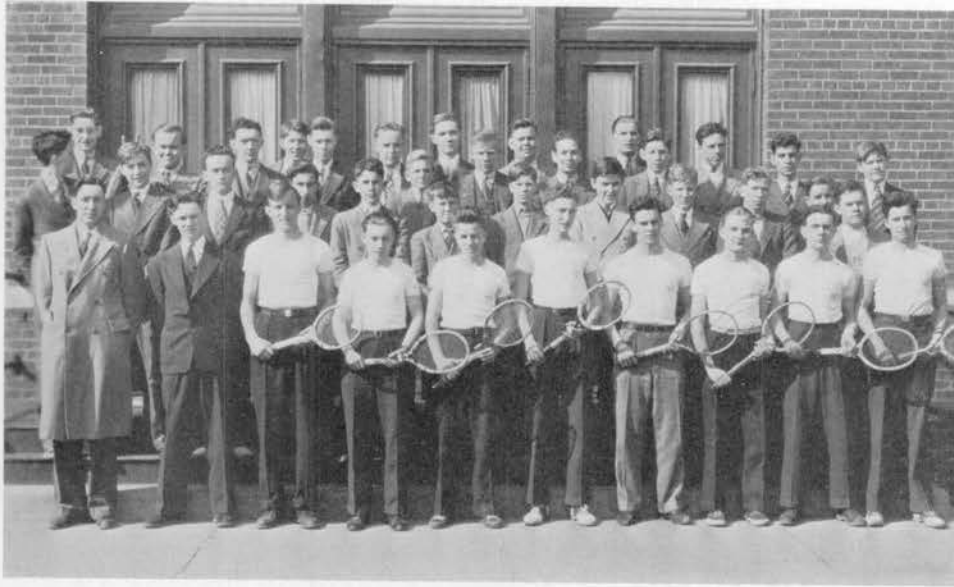
