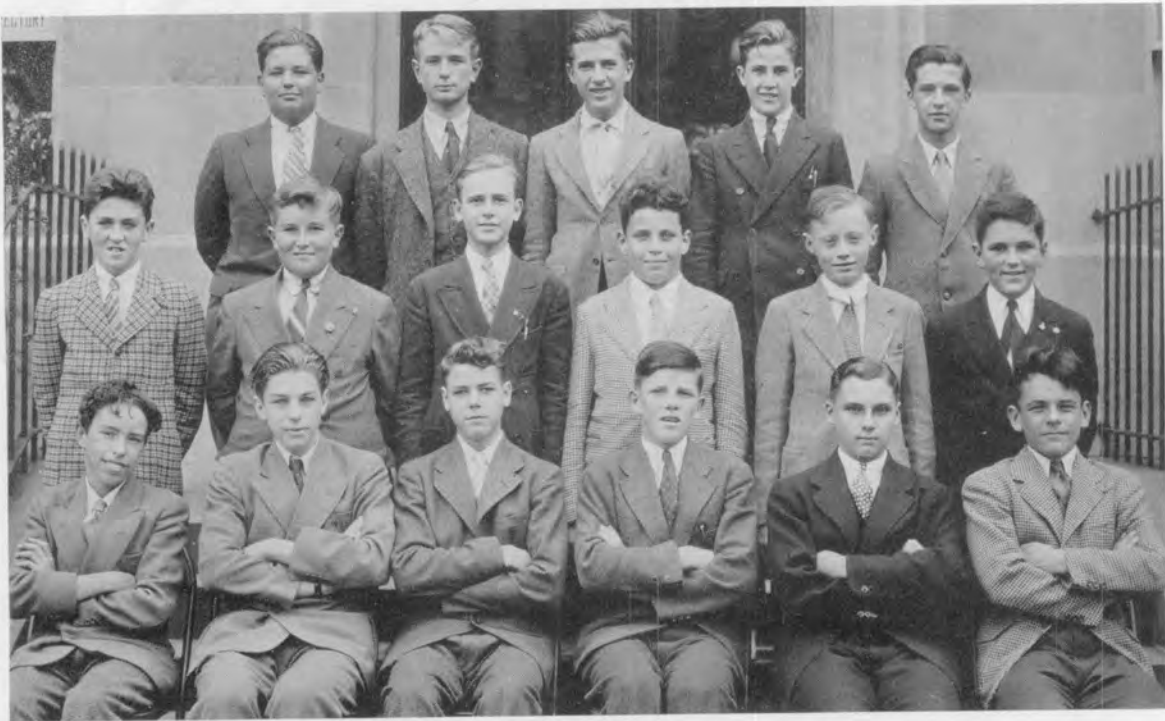
# ESSENTIAL PARTS

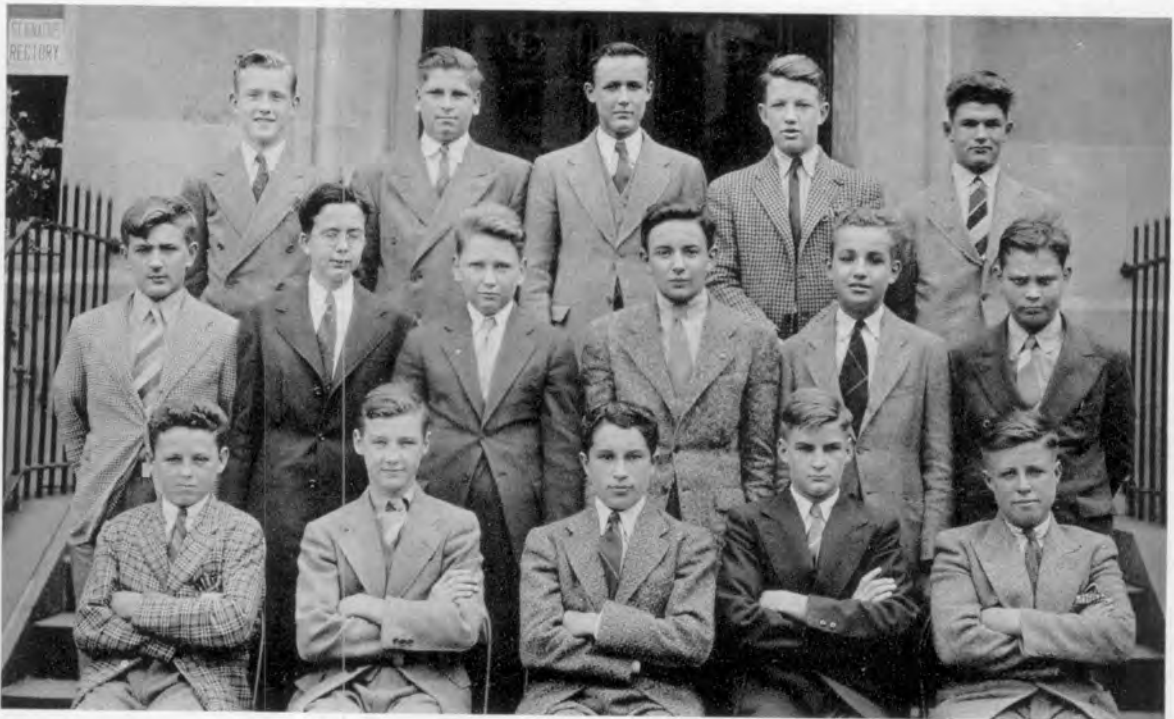
orator . . . Lawless, the thespian . . . Giery, the "aquastar."

In the literary field, also, we have



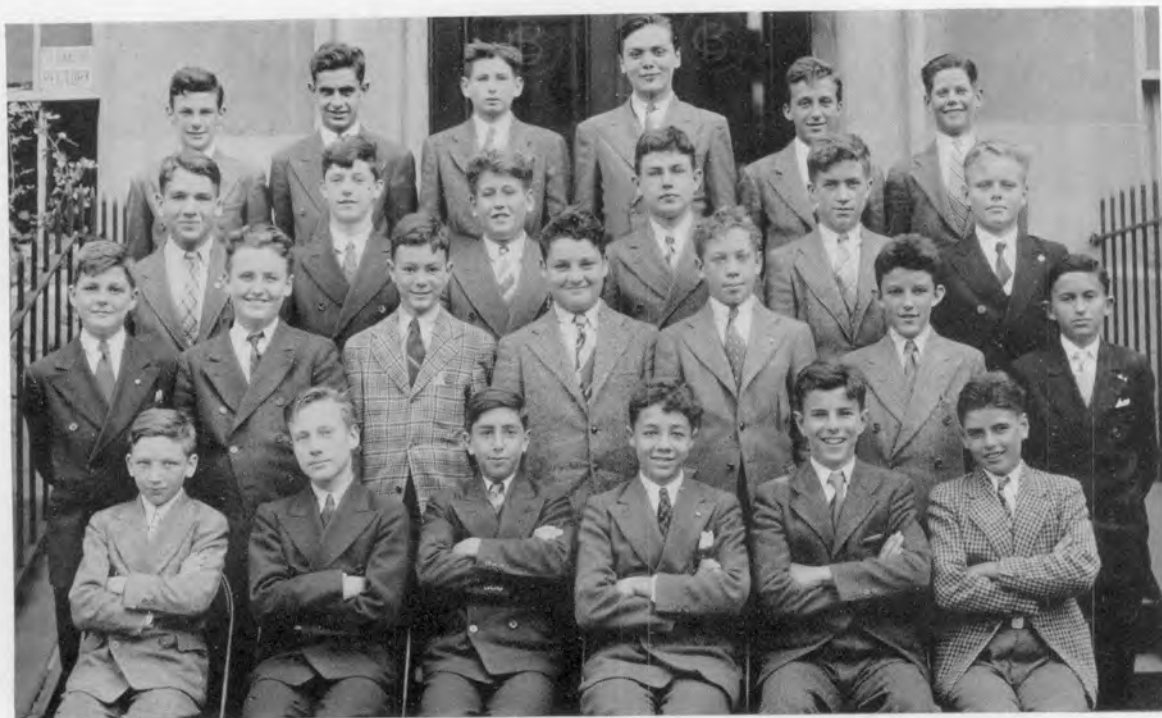

to accept defeat as well as victory in this life, and arise to persevere until we reach the ultimate goal; and we are therefore glad that that rivalry has existed.

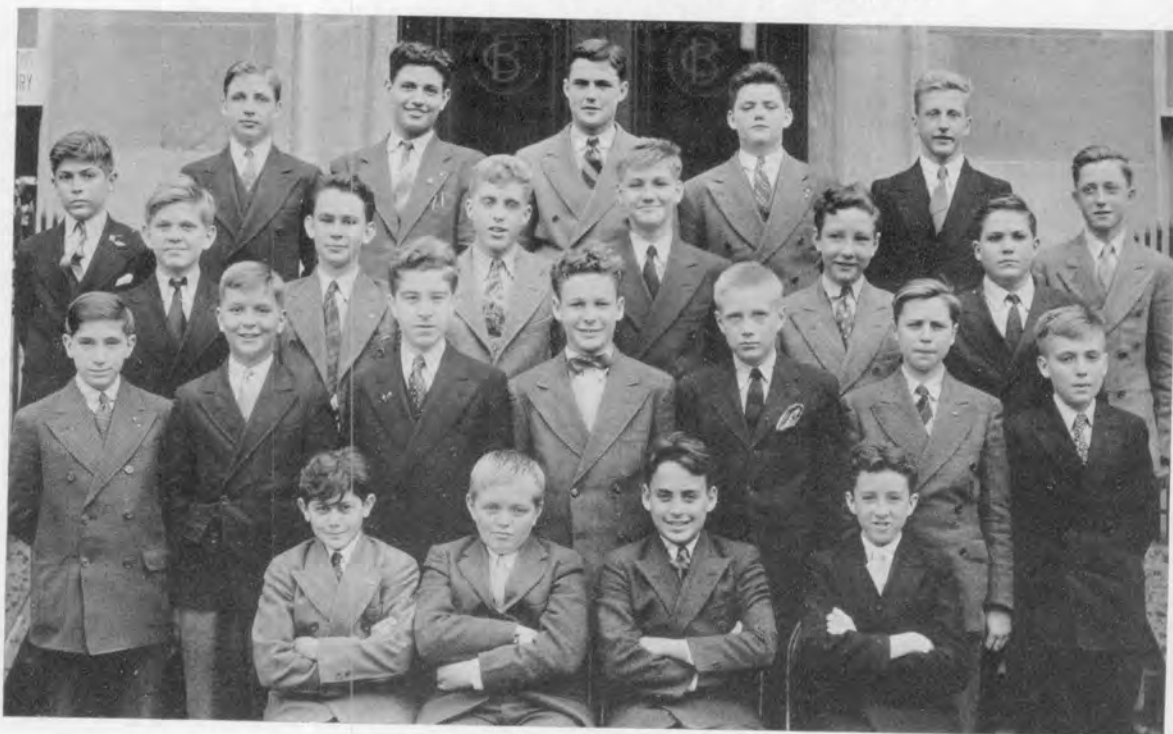

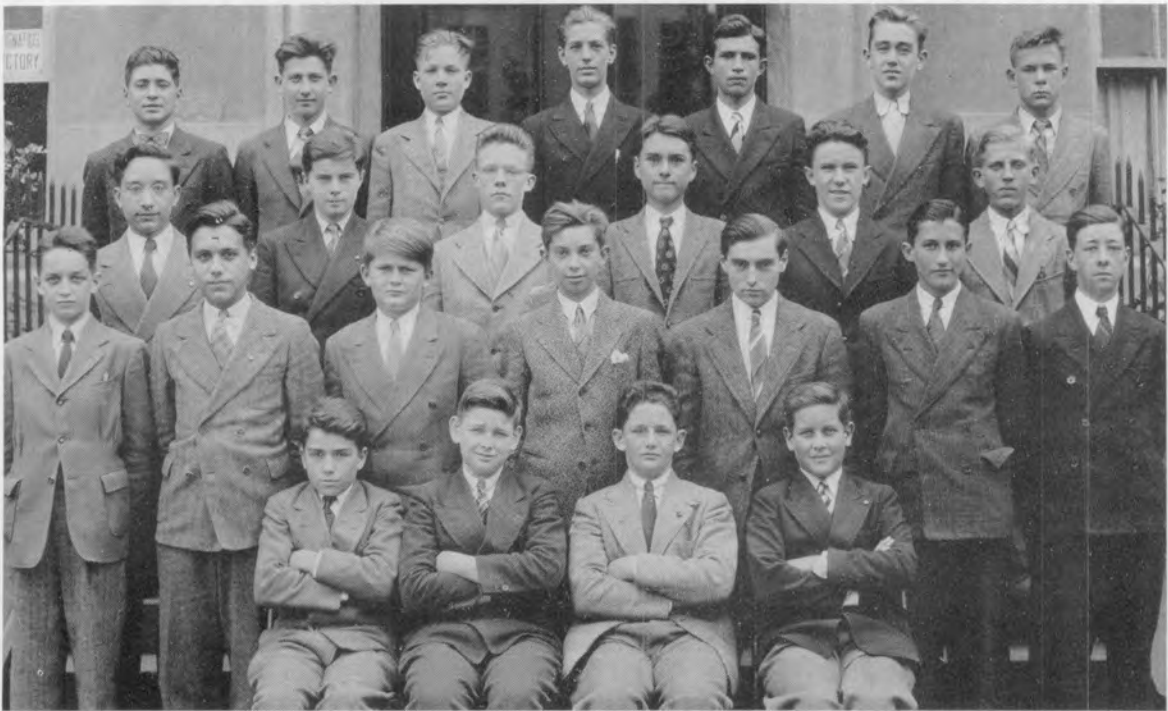
our very selves, which our faculty, both religious and lay, has taught us both by example and by word.

A classroom on the third floor contains a group of studious (?) Prep men known to the faculty as "That 2A-1 gang—you know." Let's take a look at them.

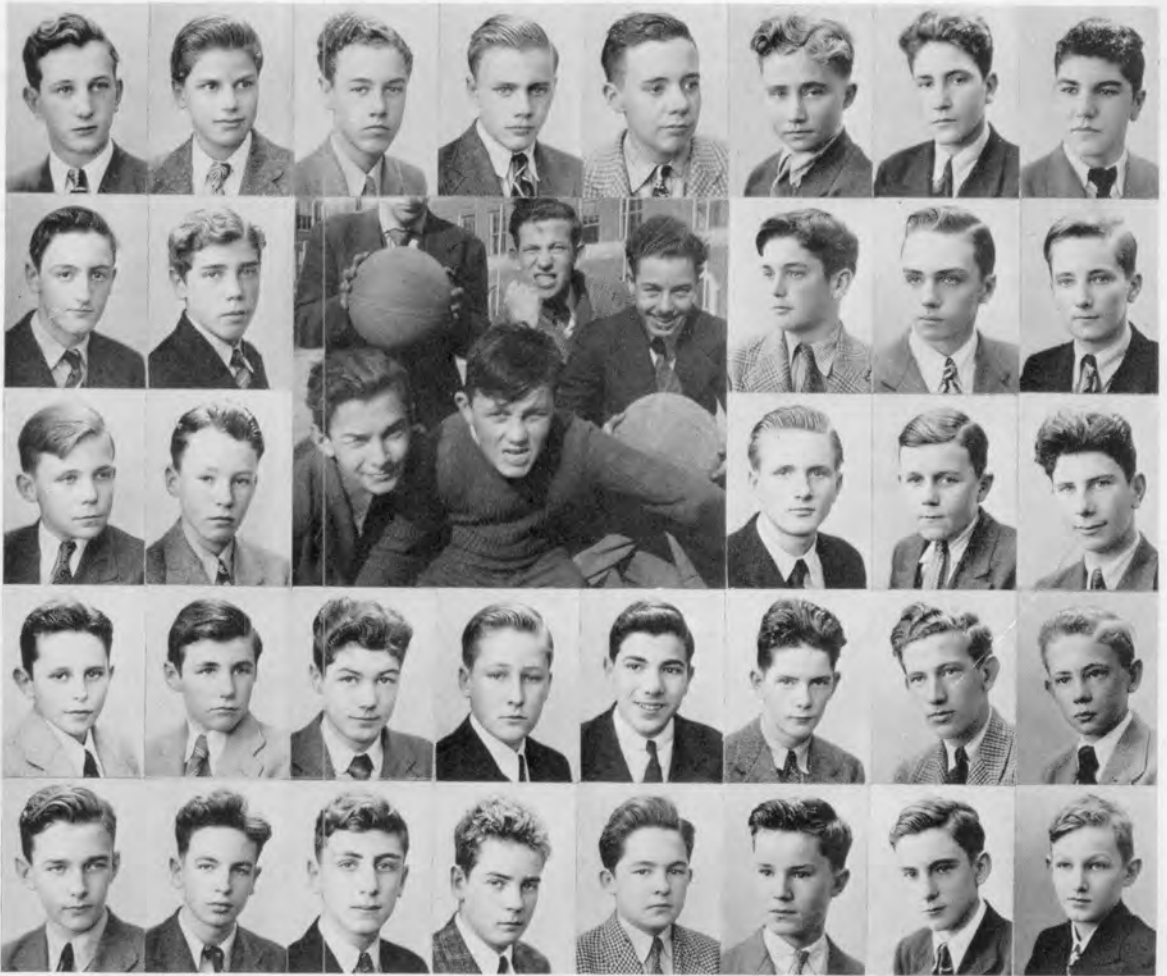

## SPRING TERM

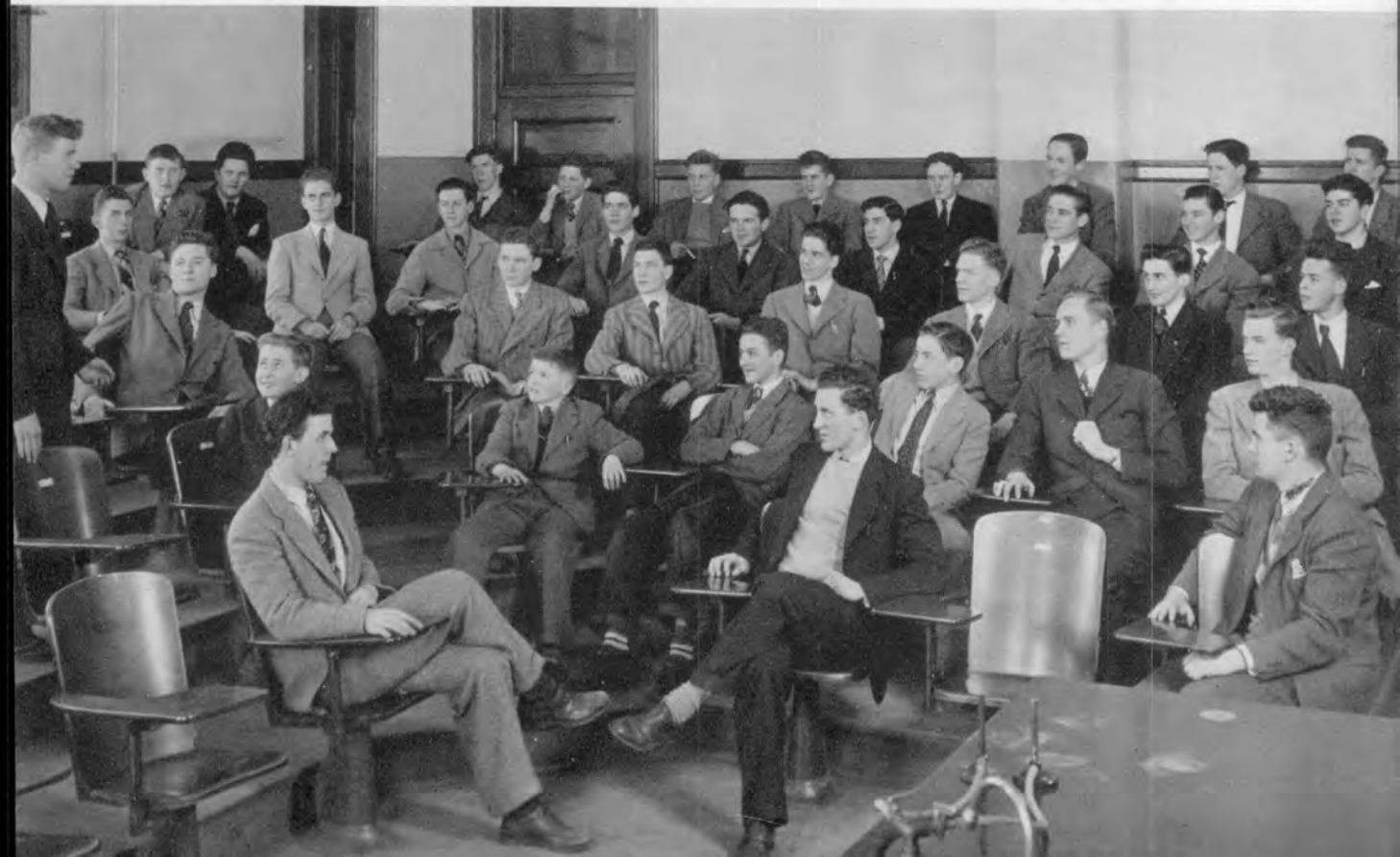

# RETREAT

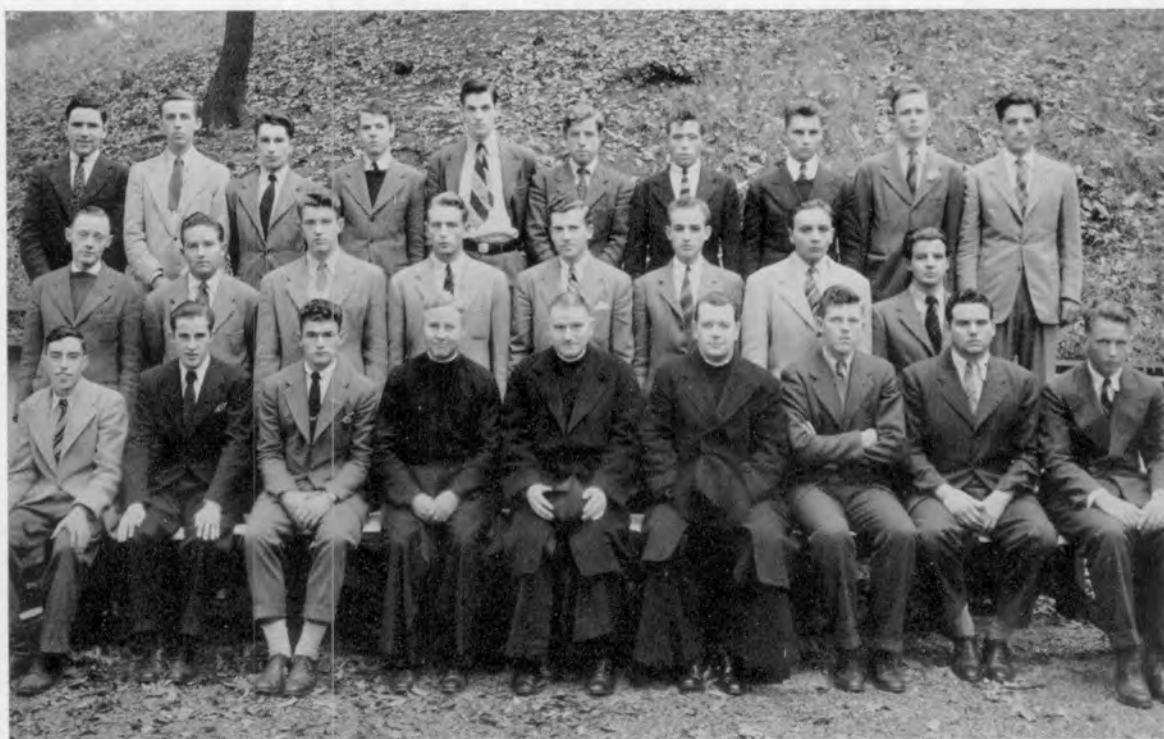

Below: Seniors always make a closed retreat, shortly before graduation, at a House of Retreats. Here the February graduates are pictured at Mount Manresa, S. I.

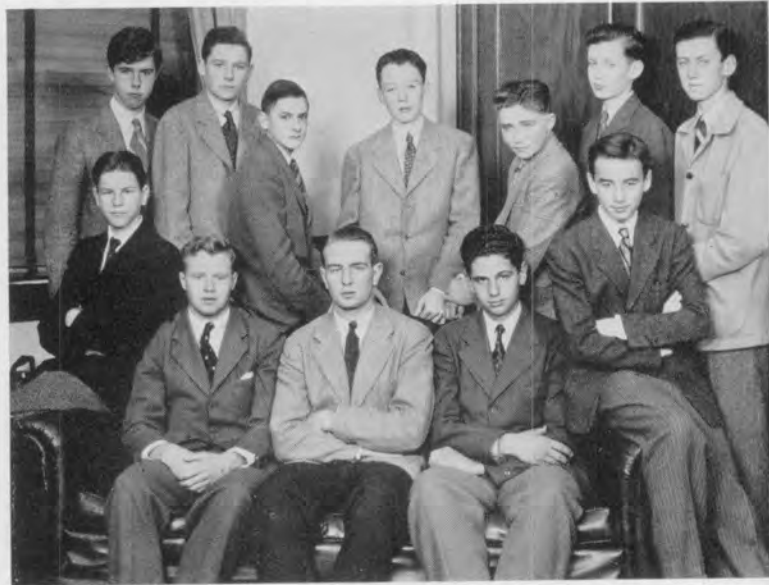


# SODALITY

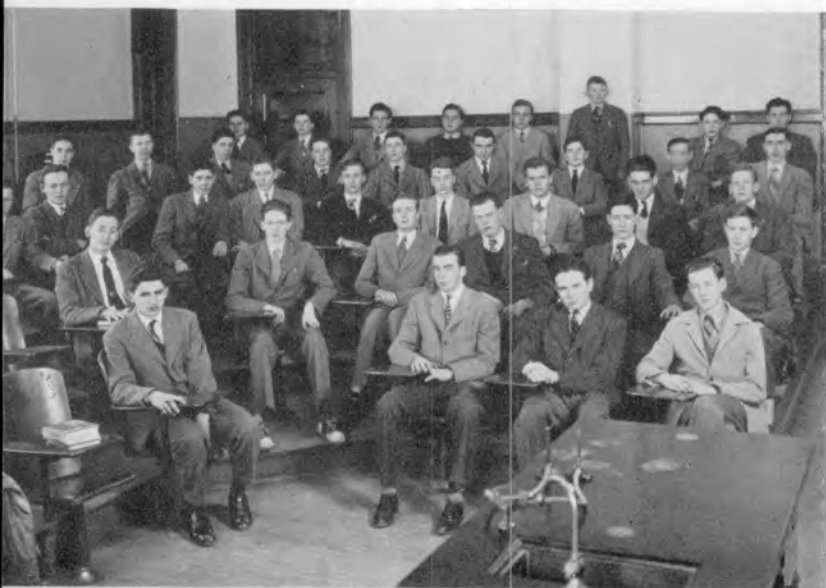

Each week selected members gave talks to the whole group on an assigned section of our Holy Father's Letter. At the conclusion of the speeches, discussions begin that last at times over an hour and a half. By this procedure, the debate members not only exercised themselves in speech delivery and in pitting their arguments against one another on debatable points, but they also gained a knowledge of the fundamentals requisite for a Catholic reconstruction program after the war.

Eight of the best speakers were chosen, once the year got underway, to form a Lecture Guild.

These speakers—Joseph Reilly, James McMahon, Hugo Masini, James Walsh, Richard Murray, Eugene Tully and John Brennan—were sent from

It was a banner year, for our numbers doubled or tripled other years. Analysis of the speech pattern, proper breathing, and stance were stressed the first term. The five-team system of debating enabled more to participate in interscholastic debating than previously, replacing the conventional idea of two or three handling all debates.

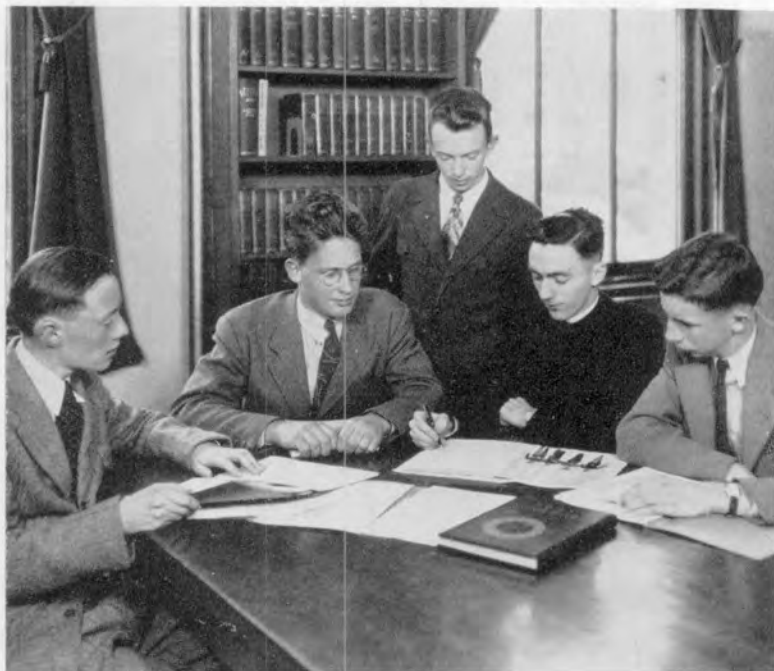

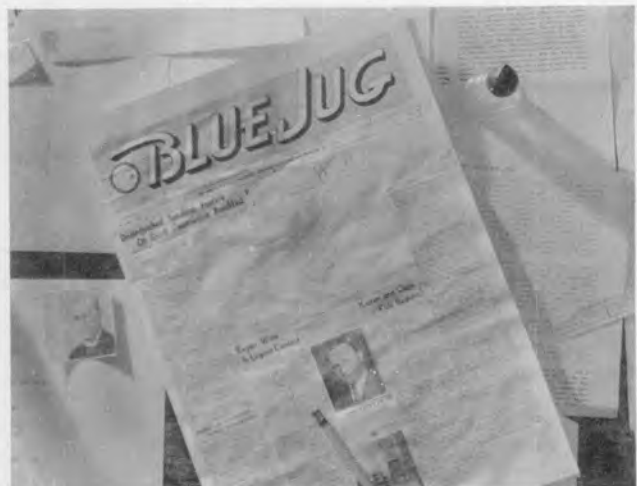

T. S. Eliot has broken away from the received standards of drama in these our times, and he returned to the Greek theater for inspiration. In his 'Murder in the Cathedral' we have the Archbishop and four Tempter-Knights as Protagonists. Less clearly delineated, but still individuals, are the Three Priests. Then finally we have the Chorus, the people of Canterbury, who in all their words and deeds act as a unit. The whole play, therefore, is purely Greek in style, until the Knights cease to be figures in a tapestry and speak plainly to the audience, to us in our own language. Only then do we find a link with the theater of today.

Such was the drama staged last December by the Prep players. Obviously, it demanded more practice than the ordinary play, which in itself is a grueling task. The players gave their time and labor, and were

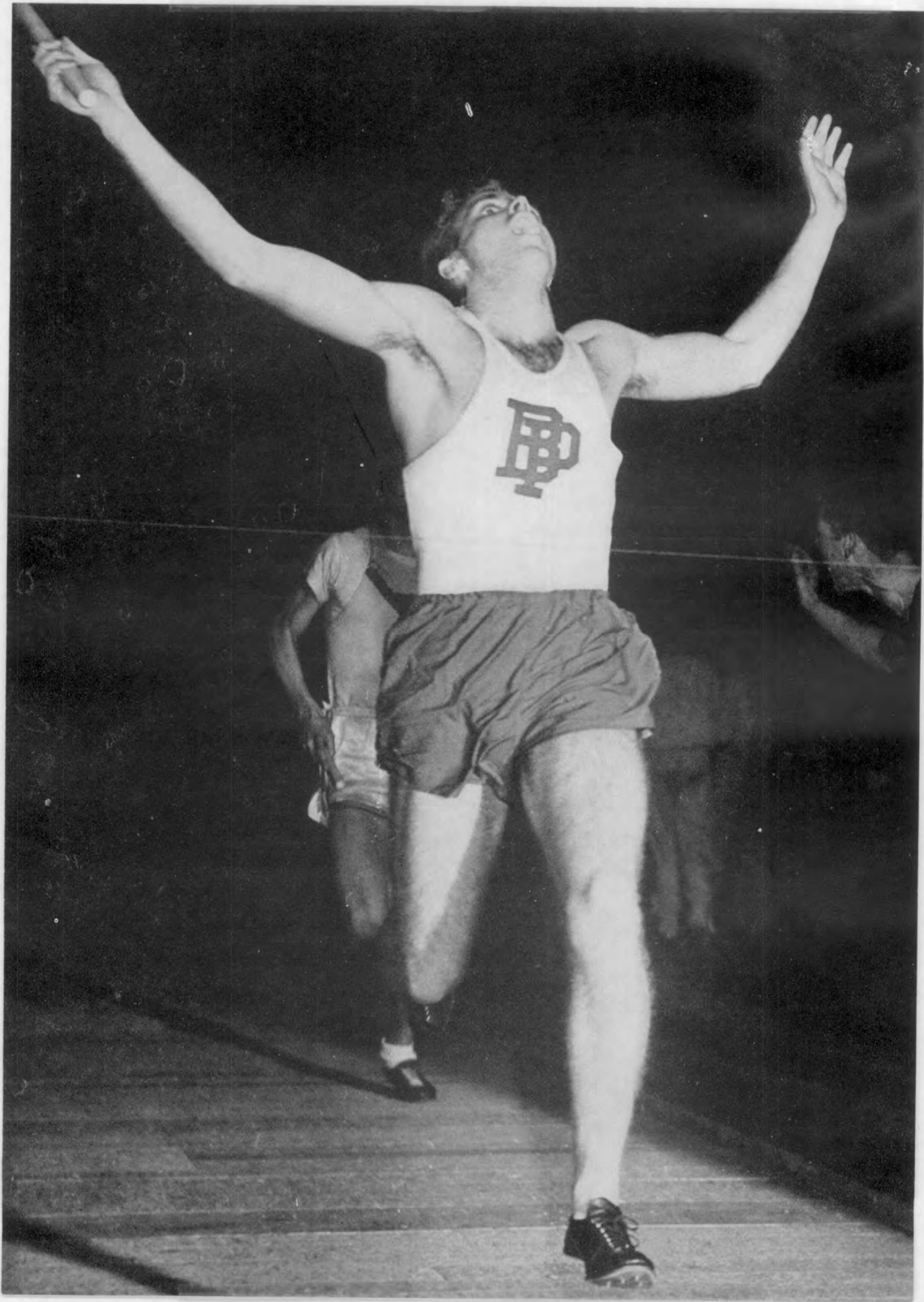


# SUPERSTRUCTURE

Let's go briefly through the season.

On a muddy field the squad met their first opponents, and quickly took the lead. 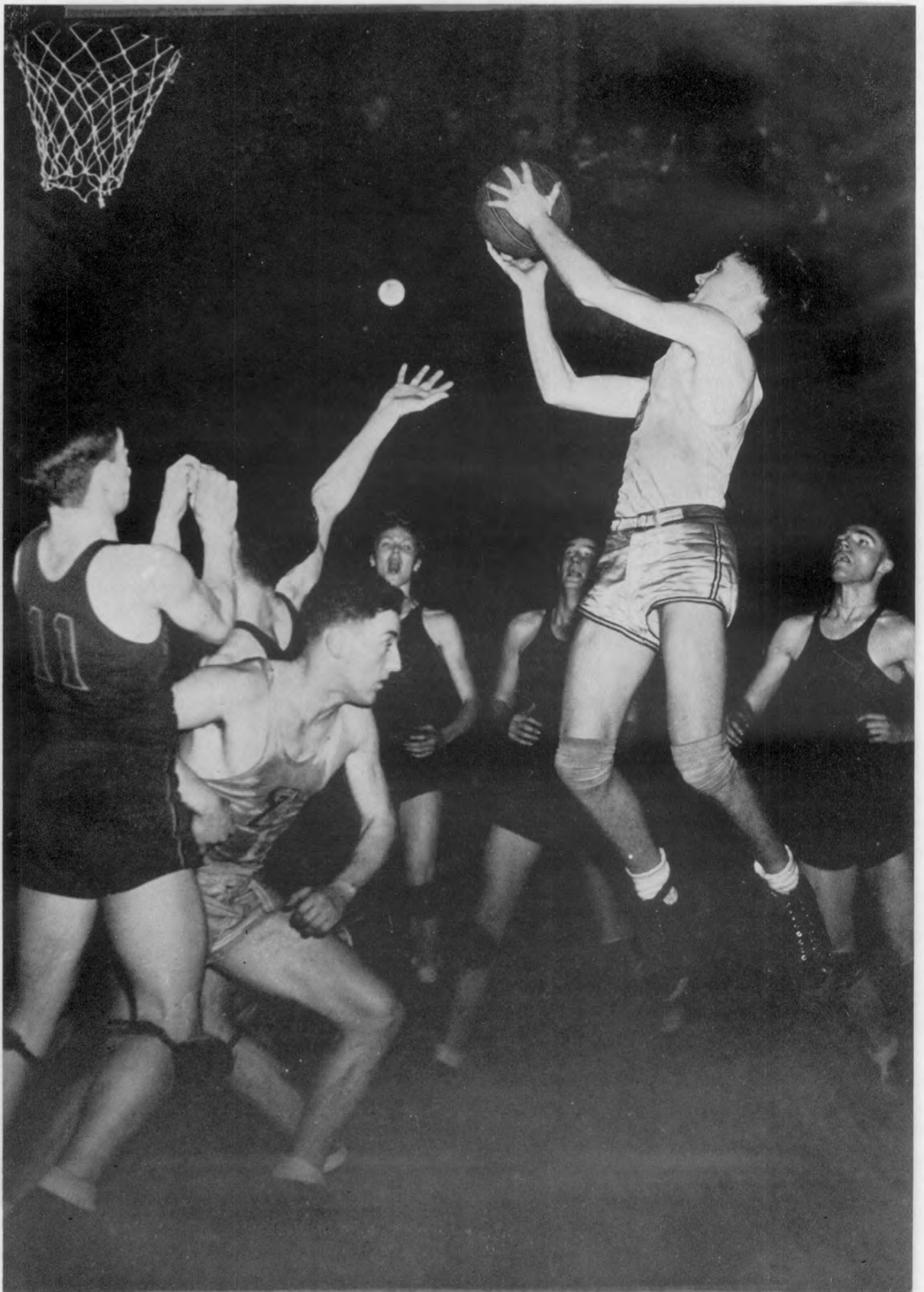

# BASKETBALL

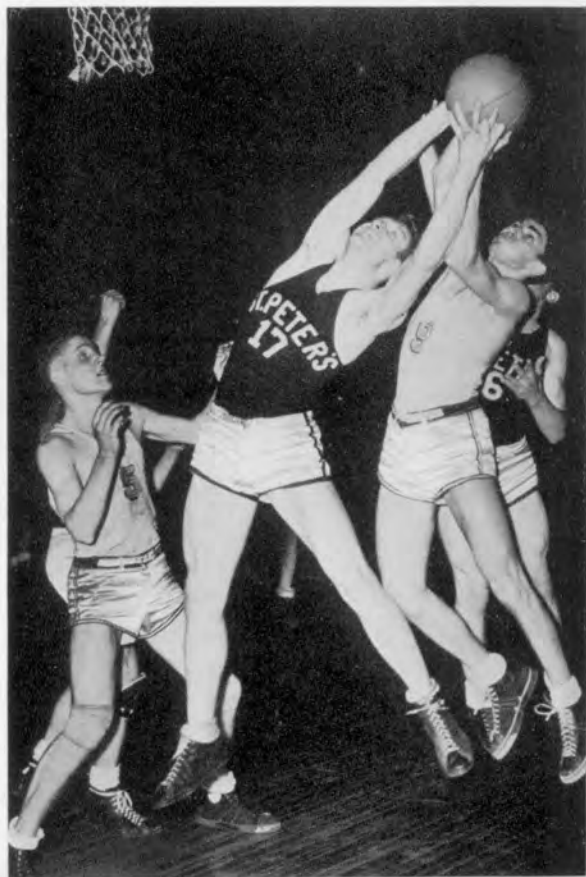

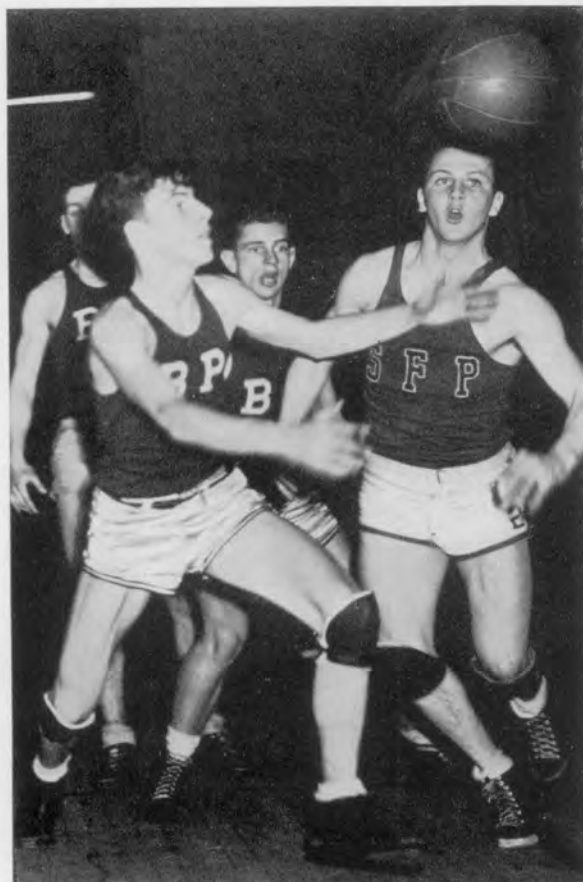
Cronin both received honorable mention.

The team really showed the ball they were capable of playing in the two tournaments they took part in. In both the Lt. Haggerty and the Knights of Columbus tournaments, against strong opposition, they placed third. In the preliminary round of the former, the Blue and White defeated St. Dominic's,

40-24. Prep then edged out a victory over a favored Rice High School in the quarter-finals, 31-29. St. Francis finally stopped us, in the semi-final round. In the consolation game for second place the Blue and White turned back a highly favored St. John's five, 42-40. Si Geoghan, big scorer for the Prep attack with 19 points, deserves more praise than our photographer snapped for him, since he was the runner-up for high-scoring title, amassing a total of 42 points.

In the opening round of the K. of C. tournament the Prep met Power Memorial, champs for the last two years. The team came through in a thrilling game, by a score of 40-33. In the



quarter-finals they ran up their highest score of the season, beating All Hallows 64-40. They then dropped a heart-breaker to Xavier, losing 37-33 after leading all through the game. Paced by Dick Cronin in the consolation match, the quintet again led from the outset, and this time kept their lead to beat Holy Trinity 47-34.

Si Geoghan was the big gun in the scoring column all season, with 217 points to his credit. Dick Cronin ran him a good race, however, hounding his heels with an even 200, while Captain Gerry Golden was third with 174. Gerry, however, made up for the lack of points by being the play-maker for them.

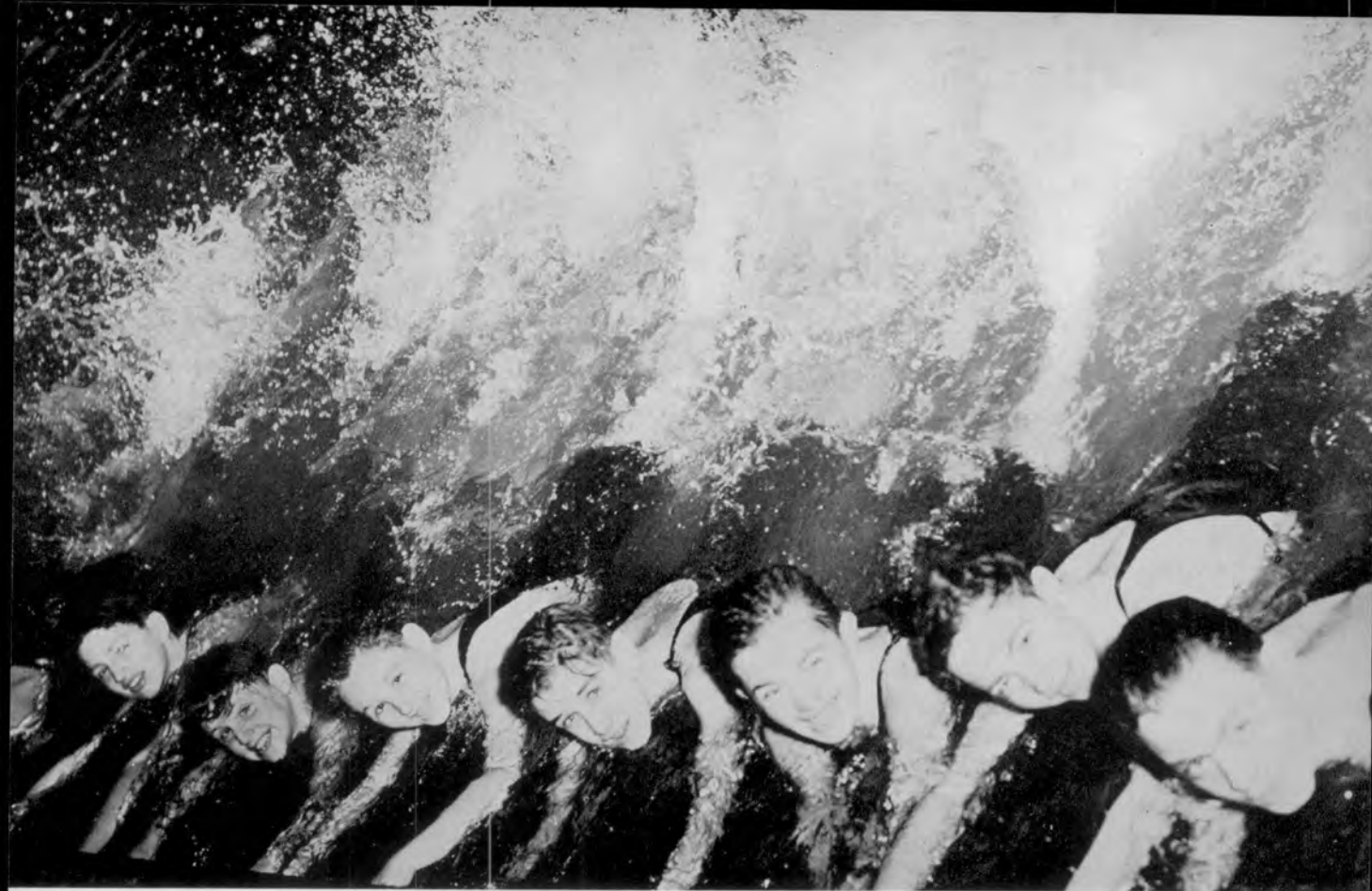

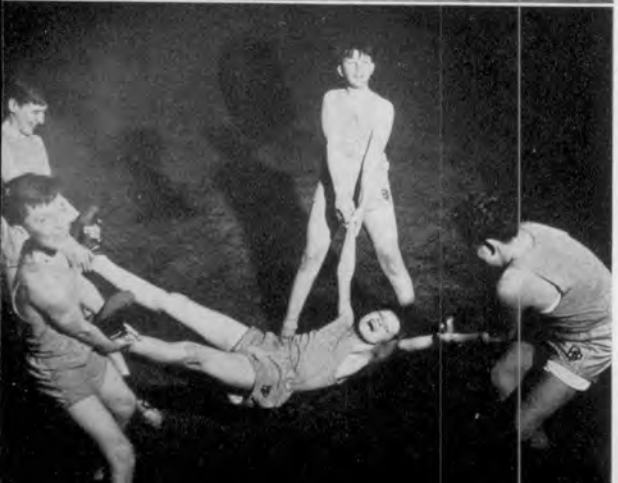
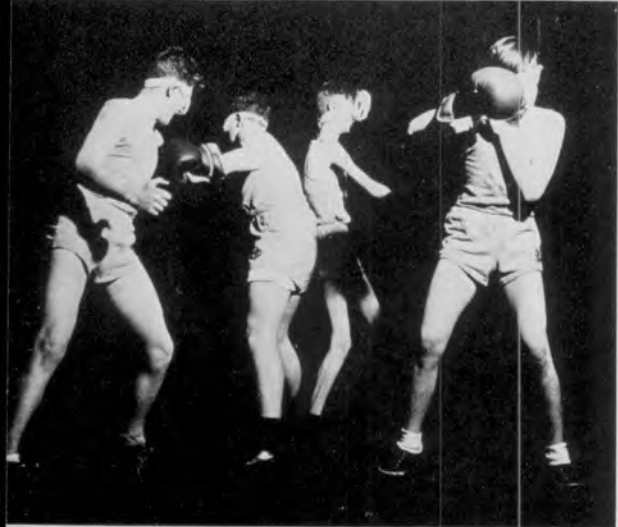


## The Blue Book Goes To a Class Social
