Or perhaps we should go to a track meet. As the gun starts the big race we see Dick Duer, Frank Farrel, and Joe Conrad slip into the lead.

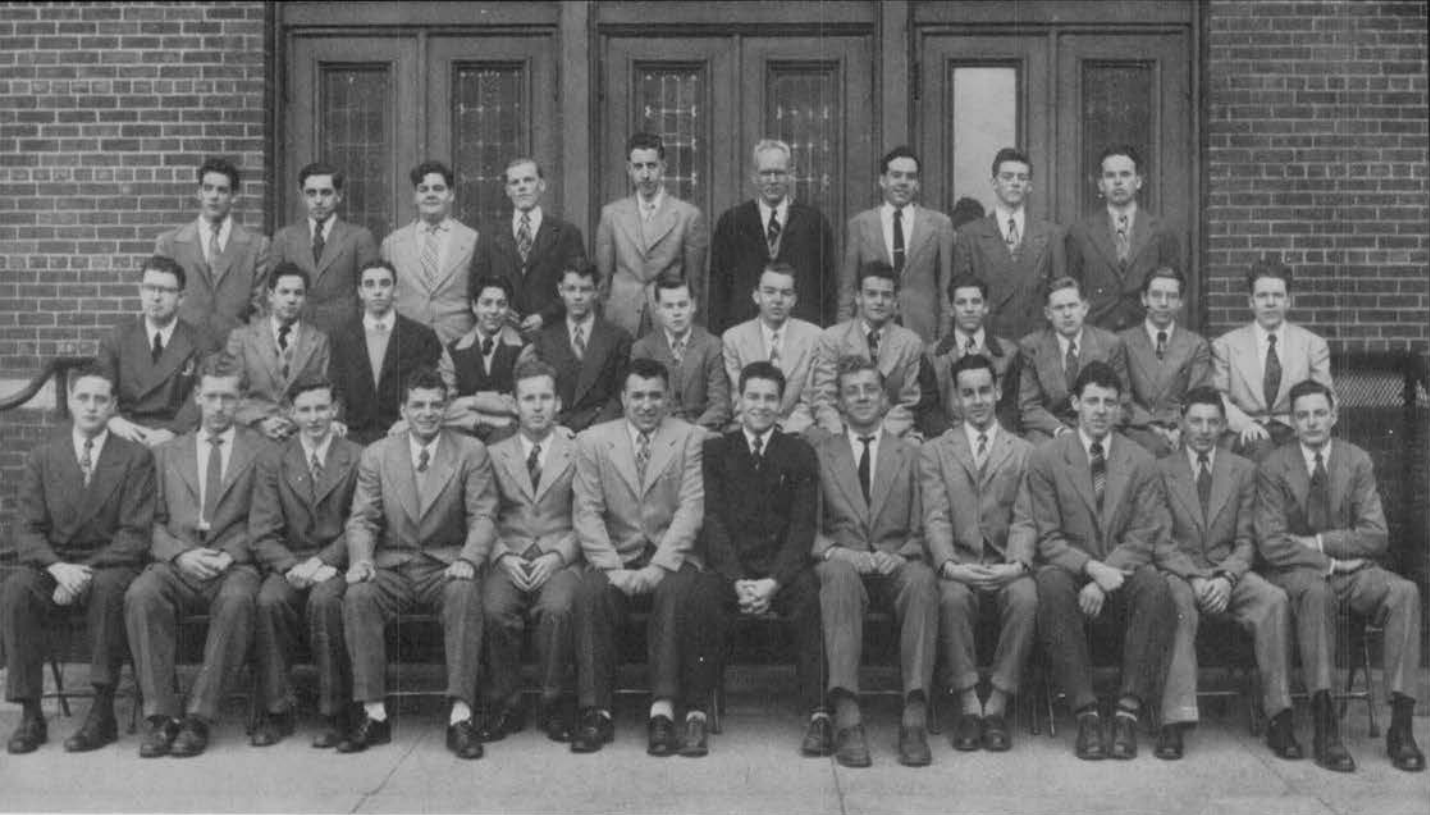

Among the new faces we found Jim Sweeney, John McGuire, George Murphy and Bill Morgan, a recent import from Canada.

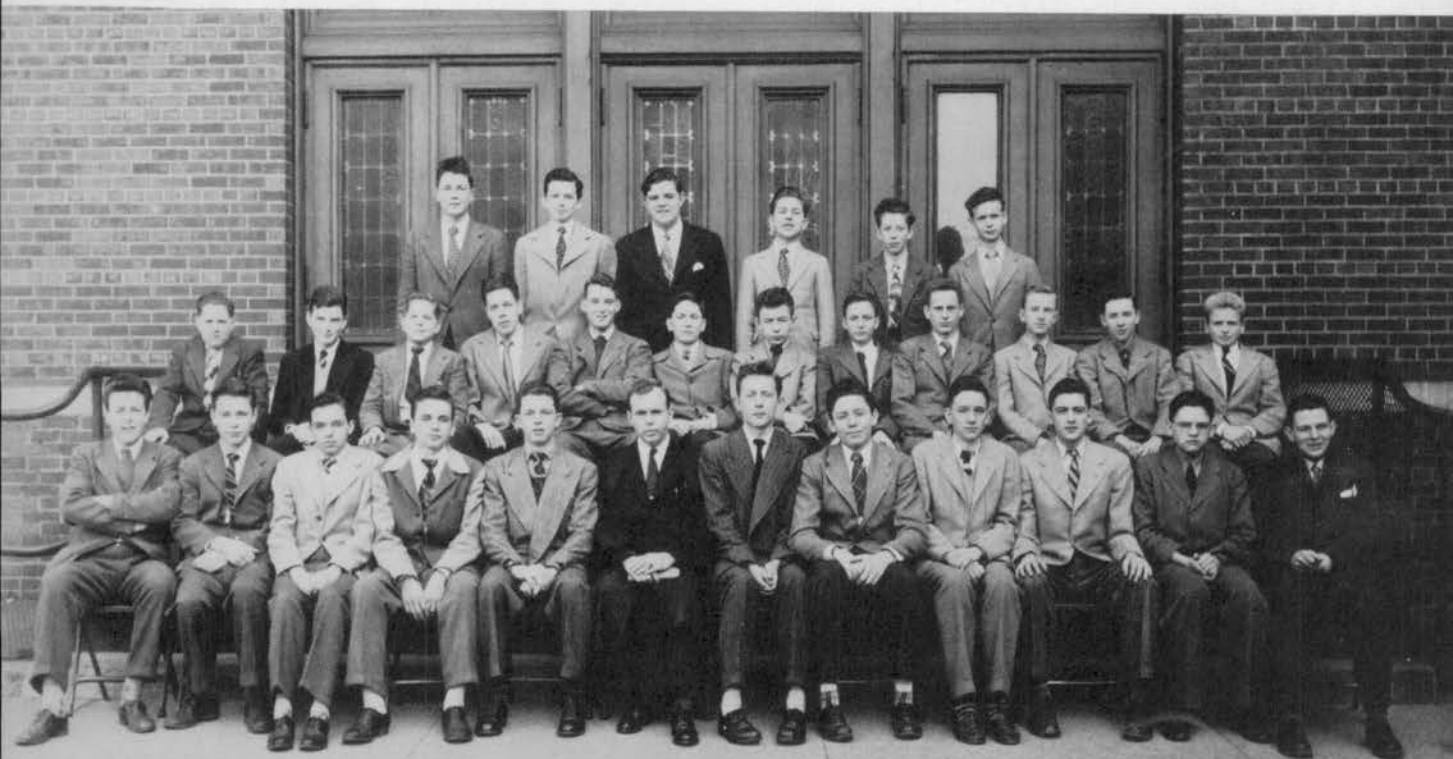

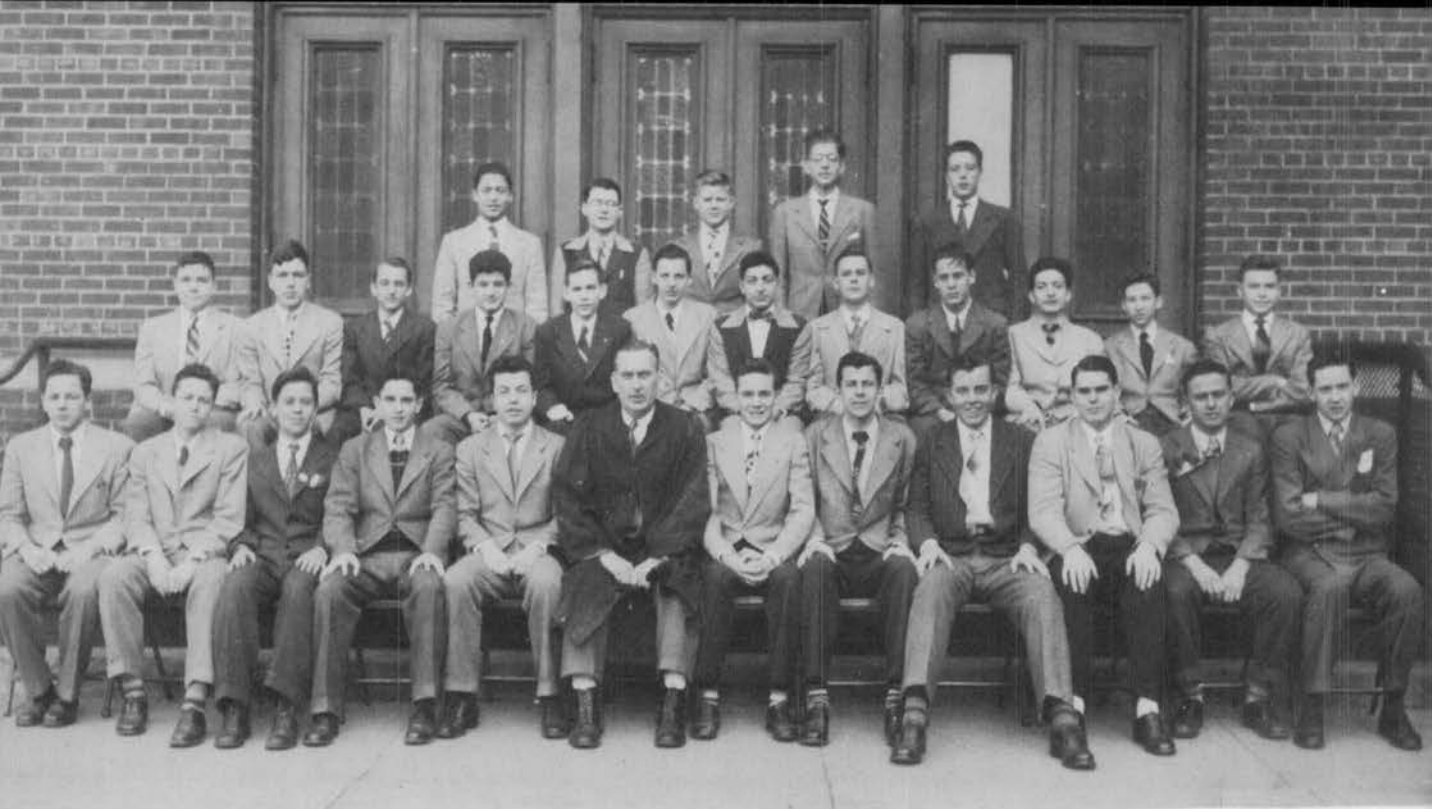

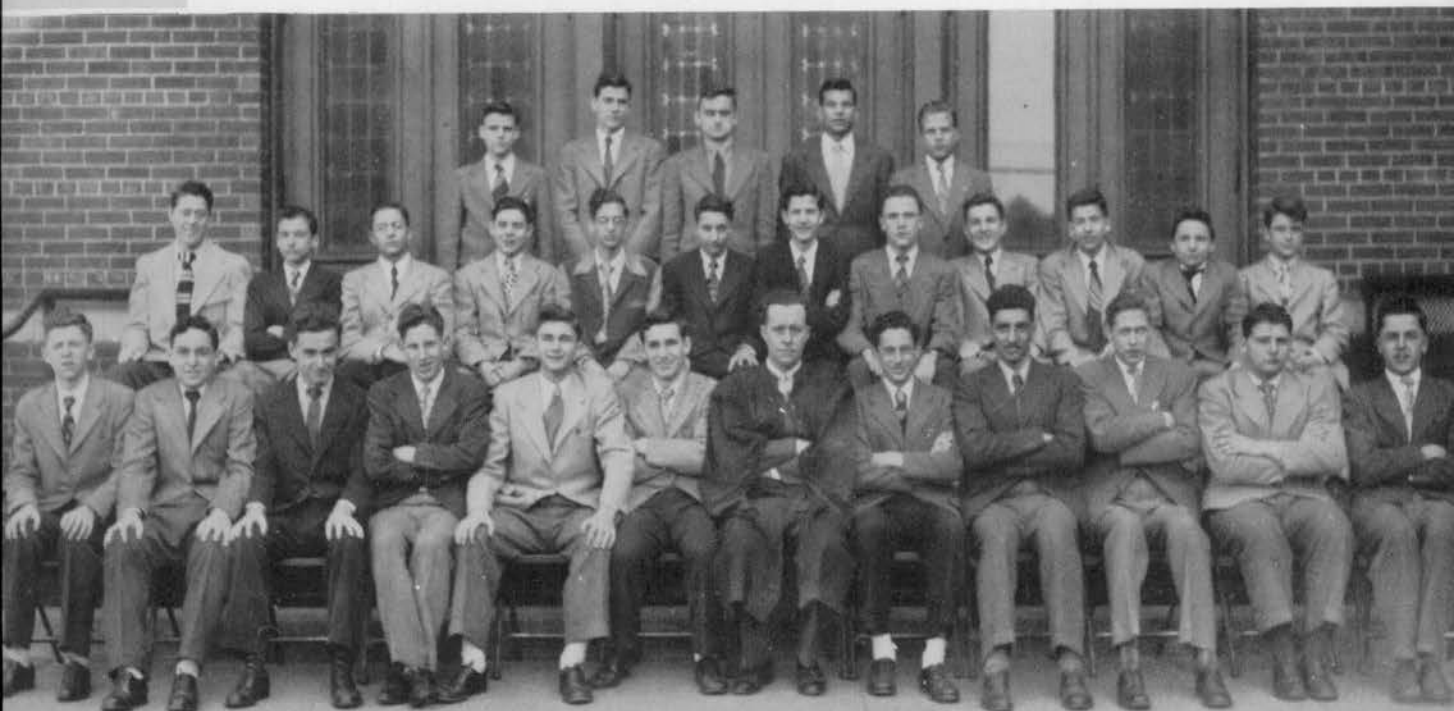

The half-pint of our class, Calantuno, still amazes Mr. Flynn by his questions in Economics.

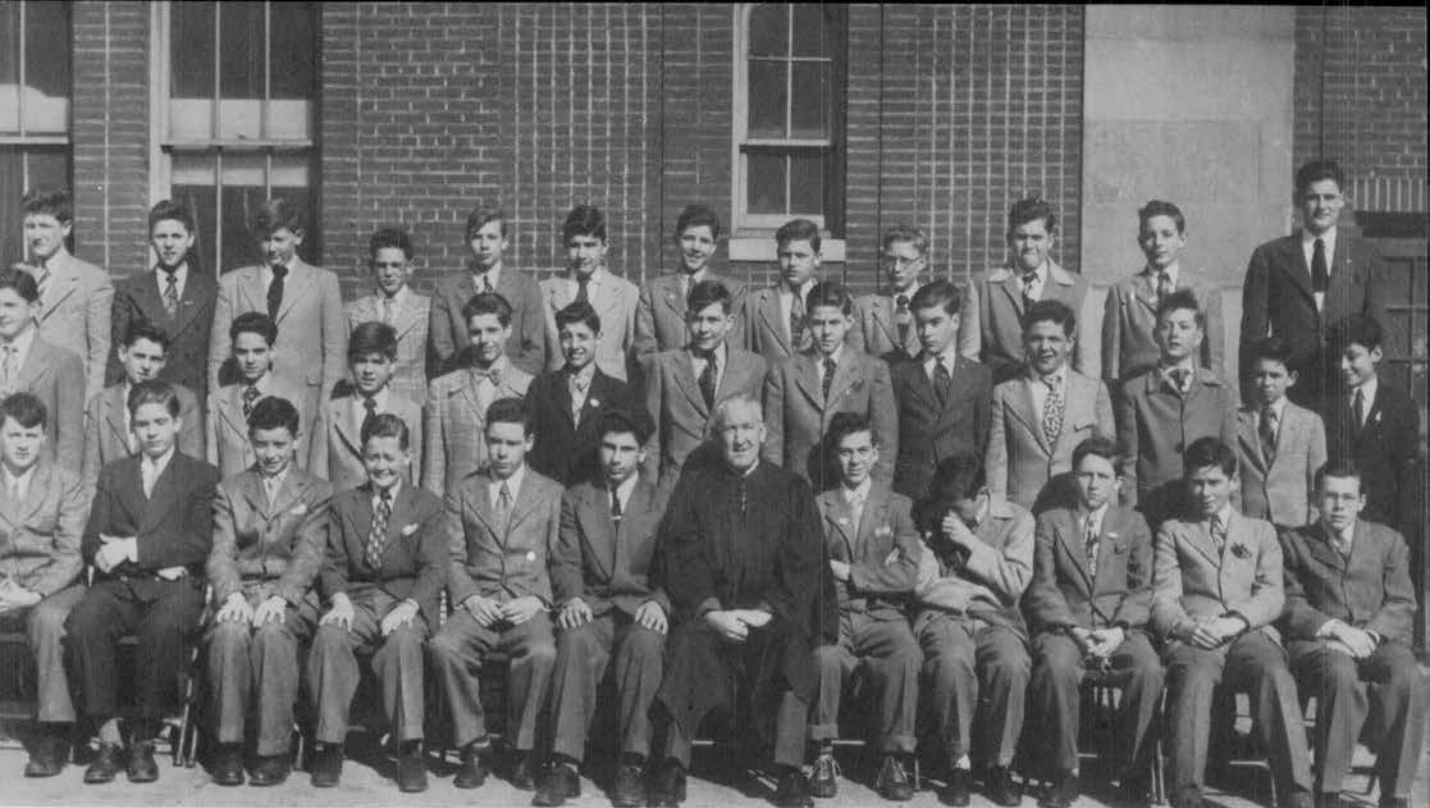
Our class has not been too successful in the basketball intramurals, but we are looking forward to a more successful softball season.

So until next term, we remain, sincerely yours, 1A1.

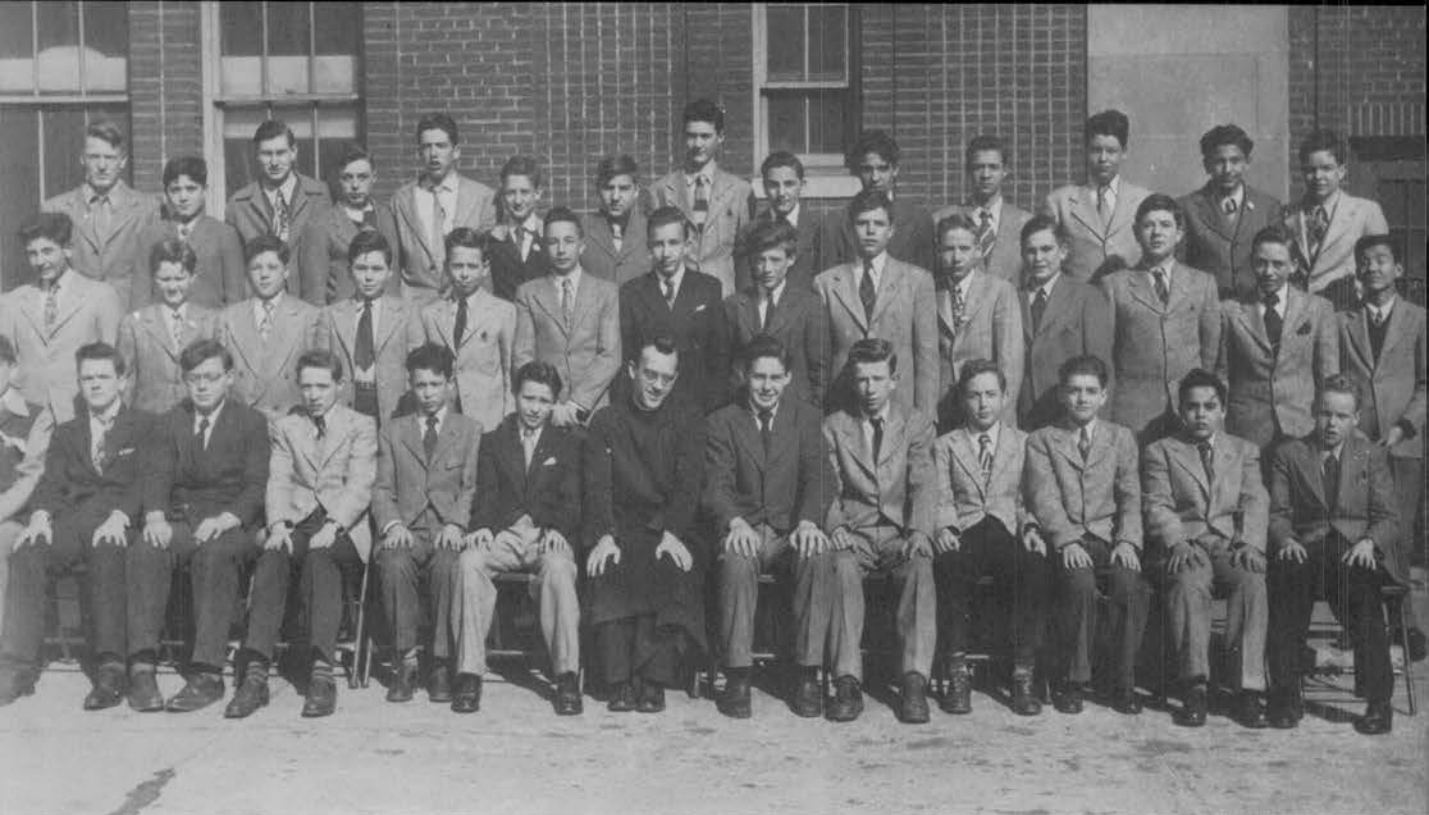

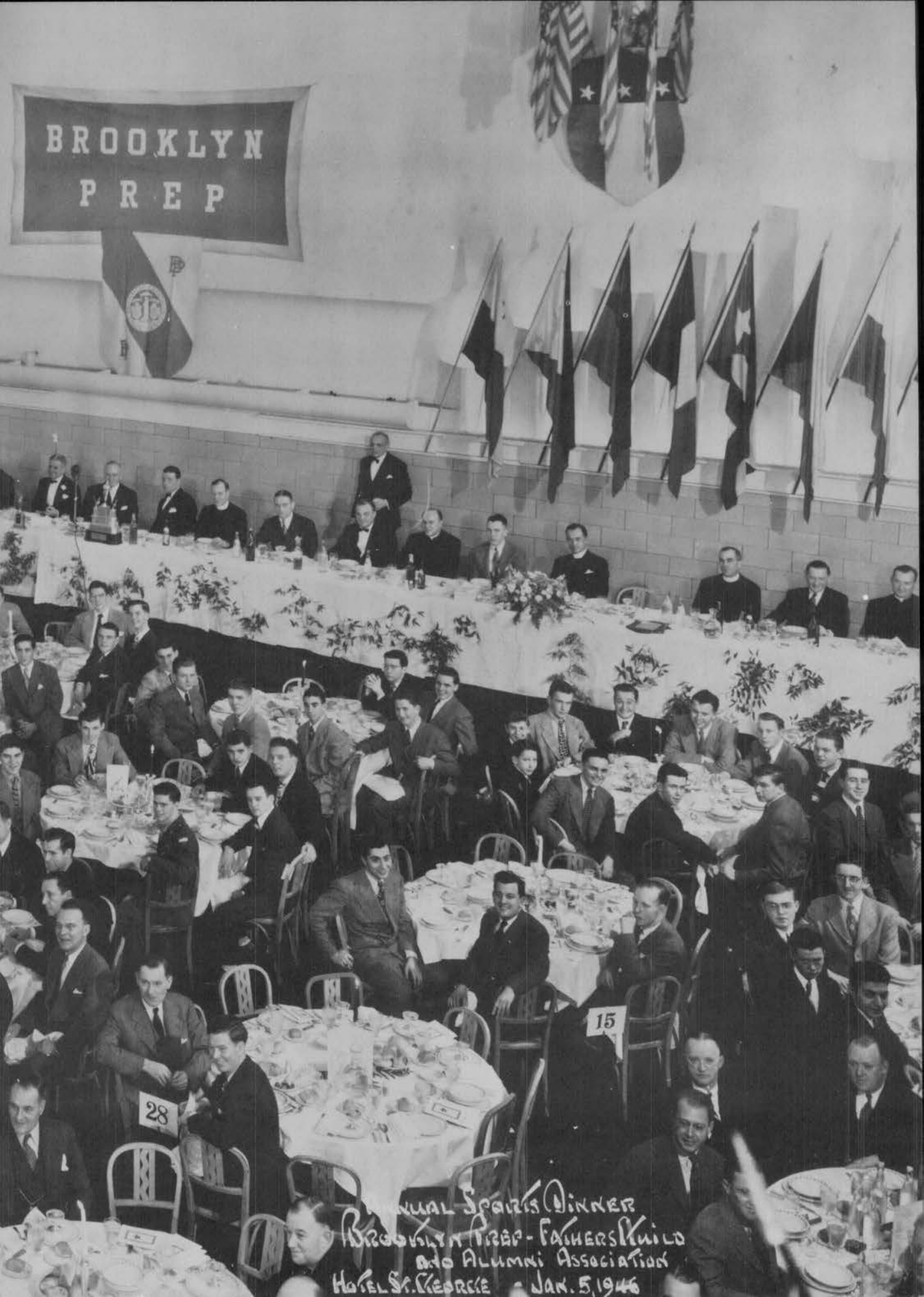

The Social Committee, under Gene Souther and Tom Tripputti, arranged several days and evenings of fun. Most memorable are the outings that followed the Mass and Communion in honor of Our Lady of Fatima each First Saturday. The outings were to parks and ball fields in spring and fall, to places of interest in the winter. The highlight of the year was the trip to St. Andrews-on-Hudson, Jesuit Seminary, awarded to those sodalists adjudged most deserving of the name "sodalist."

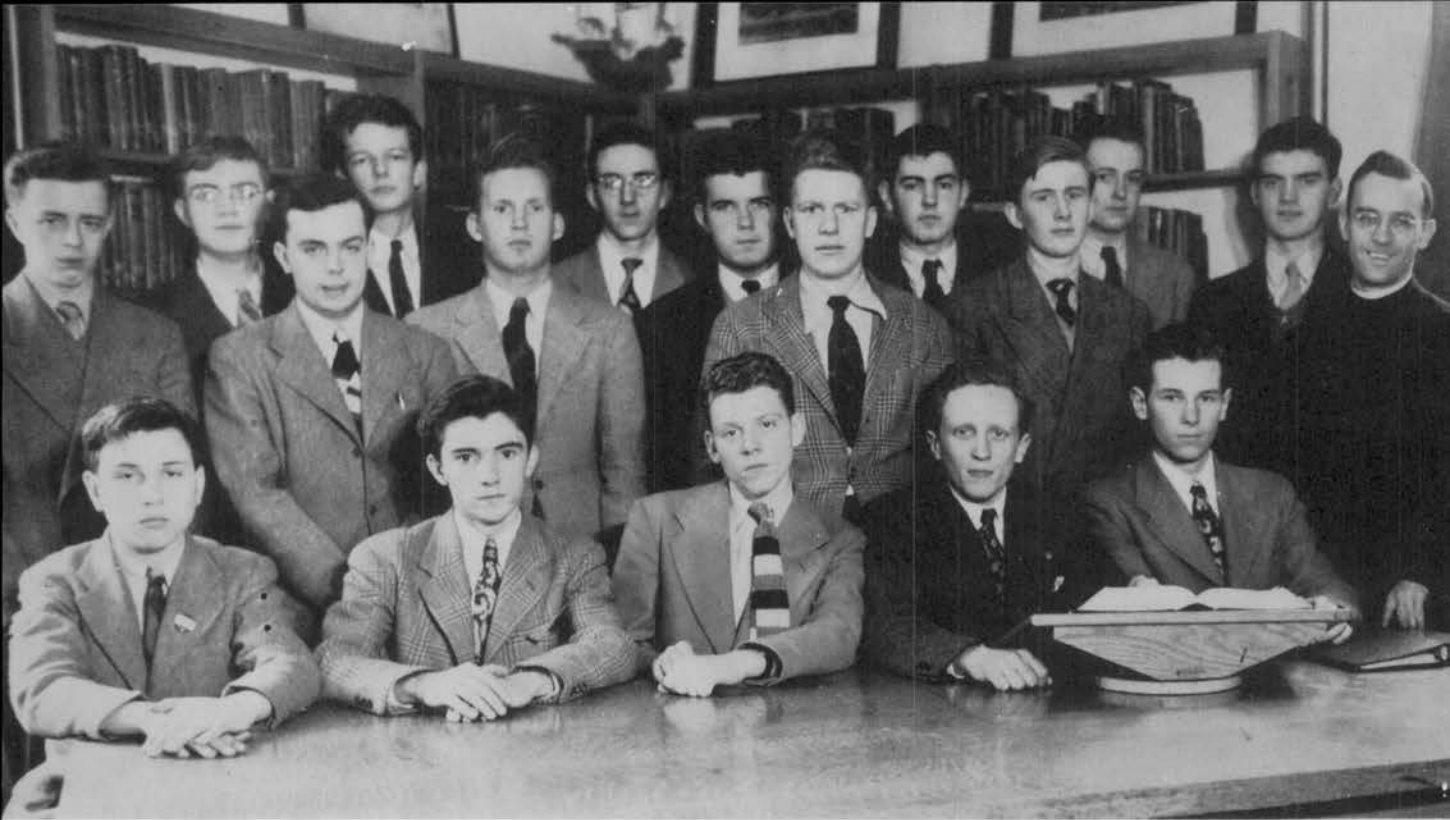
Student Council

WITH the election of Joe Mannix to the Presidency of the Student Council, we had the dawning of a new era. First there came the responsibility of raising funds for the War Memorial Building, the obtaining of a lunch pass for the seniors, and also the restoration of the Smoking Room.

Perhaps the most important work of the Council this term has been the promotion of the War Memorial Fund. From the outset of this drive it was evident that the students themselves wished to take an active part in it. The Student Council sponsored a raffle as its principle means of aiding in the Drive. From the returns made so far it is apparent that this endeavor will be a complete success.

In the first term of this year the Council adopted a resolution inaugurating a 'Student Patrol' to take care of the discipline in the corridors and about the school. Due to the numerous difficulties which have not been settled in this matter, the plan has not been put into action as yet. In this term also a measure was brought up to increase the support of our athletic teams, and this met with some success. These measures were passed under the guidance of Frank Mahoney, Council president during the first term of this year.





Champion Debating

With almost fifty interscholastic debates on their schedule, the Champion debaters enjoyed a busy and profitable season. After an inauspicious beginning at Xavier, the debaters were hosts to St. James Catholic High School of Philadelphia, and then visited Chaminade, in Mineola. Then followed many debates, both at home and away, with De LaSalle, St. Augustine's, Fordham Prep, St. Peter's Prep, Bishop Loughlin, Blessed Sacrament School for Girls, Regis, and St. Barnabas Academy. Usually three or four teams debated simultaneously in our meetings with these schools.

The debaters found the contests against St. Barnabas and Blessed Sacrament most interesting, but the best debating performance was probably that turned in against Chaminade by George McGrath and Dick Nolan. In a debate held at Mineola, they defeated Chaminade's best speakers, who later were judged the debating champions of Long Island. McGrath and Nolan were Prep's most consistent winners, but they were hard pressed by Charlie Ahearn and Dale Sauve, who won four straight debates toward the end of the season.

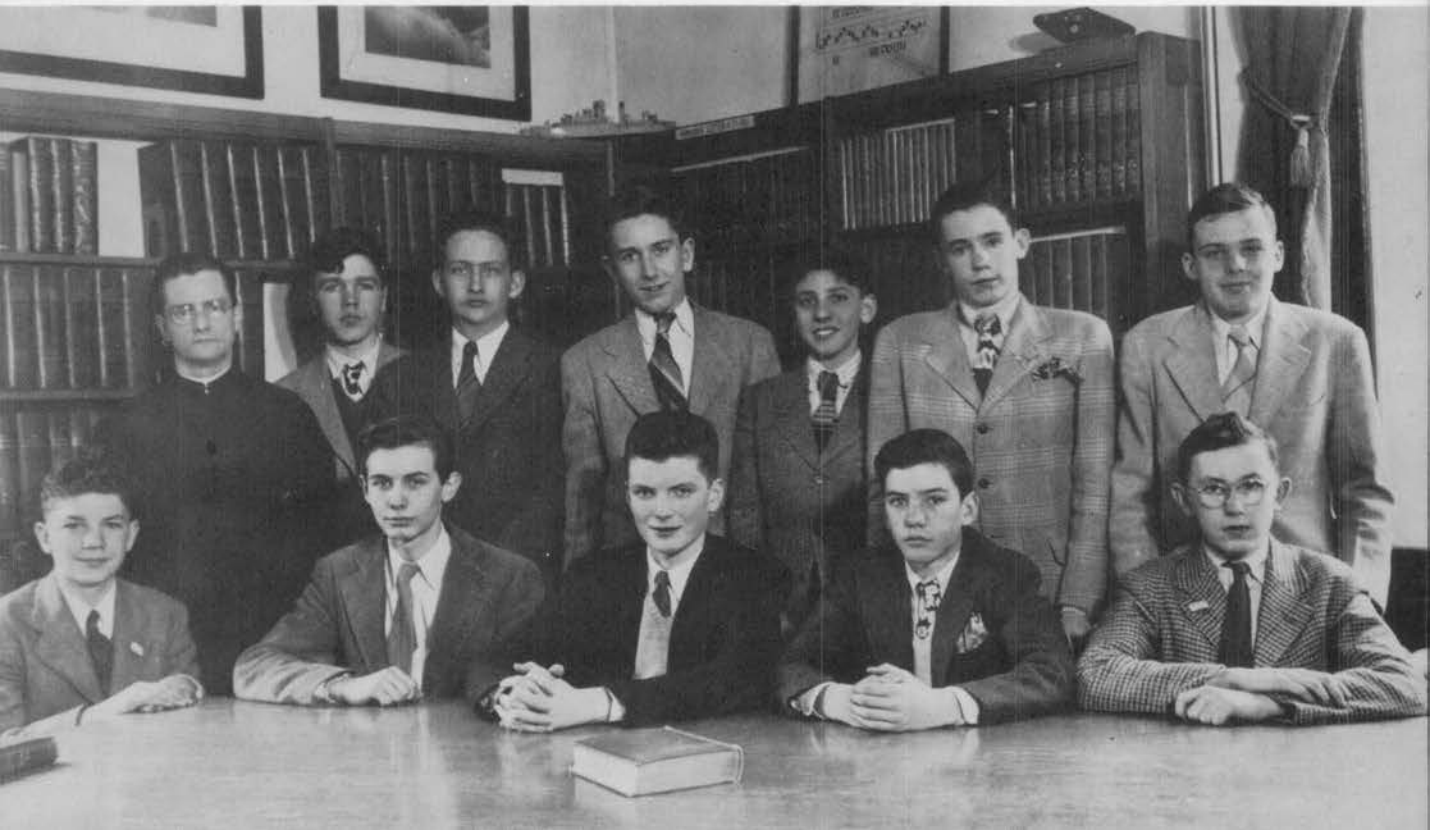

William Blatty's performance as Savonarola was flawless. He was ideally cast as the Friar whose story has created one of the greatest controversies in the History of the Church. For his brilliant interpretation of this difficult role, he won the Gold Medal for the most outstanding actor. This is the third time he has won this award. Performances in "Career Angel" and "Cyrano de Bergerac" won the honor for him in past years. In his freshman year Blatty's work in "Murder in the Cathedral" won the Silver Medal for him. The different "types" required for these parts prove his versatility.

Joseph Lowell's superlative acting as Fra Ricarao, the wise old Friar of San Marco, won for him the Silver Medal as the second outstanding actor of the play. This was perhaps the second most difficult part in the play and Lowell played it as few would have been able to interpret the part.

Mr. Dennis Gurney, our director for three years, deserves great credit for his hard work with the players and for giving us a "hit" for the third time. BROOKLYN PREP'S sixth annual Mock Trial took place this year on April twelfth in the Prep Auditorium before a capacity crowd. The interest and excitement manifested by the audience showed that the trial chosen for representation, the case of Gati and Sberna, who during a holdup murdered a policeman, was sufficiently entertaining. Hon. Webster J. Oliver was the presiding magistrate, and Hon. Joseph McNamara, Hon. Frank Bellucci and Mr. J. Wilbur Lowell were the judges of the medal awards.

The prosecuting attorneys were George McGrath, '46, and Timothy McMahon, '46. Witness for the prosecution were Herbert Rissier, '49, who played the part of Rudisich, in whose shop the murder took place, Wm. Canapary, '47, who played the part of an eye-witness of the crime, Charles Lindquist, '47 and Dale Sauve, '48, both of whom saw the defendants

running from the scene of the crime, and David McCann, '47, Edward Harrigan, '49, and William Dagher, '47, all of whom played the part of police experts.

John Buser, '47, played the defendant Gati, and John Mitchell, '47, the defendant Sberna. They were ably defended by Richard Nolan, '46, and Edward Goerner, '48. James Finnerty, '47, and Anthony Bruno, '47 were witnesses for the defense.

The Gold Medal, awarded to the best lawyer of the trial, was won by Richard Nolan, while Timothy McMahon won the silver medal. For the second year in succession, John Buser won the silver medal for the best witness of the trial. Although in the actual trial these men were both sent to the electric chair, the jury at the Mock Trial found them guilty, but with a recommendation for clemency.





Band

THE musical department of the Prep took great strides this past season towards bettering itself. Its Moderator, Mr. Cyrle O. Schommer, S.J., started things rolling at the very beginning of the school year by organizing the Prep Band into a musical group which added color and zest to all the football games. 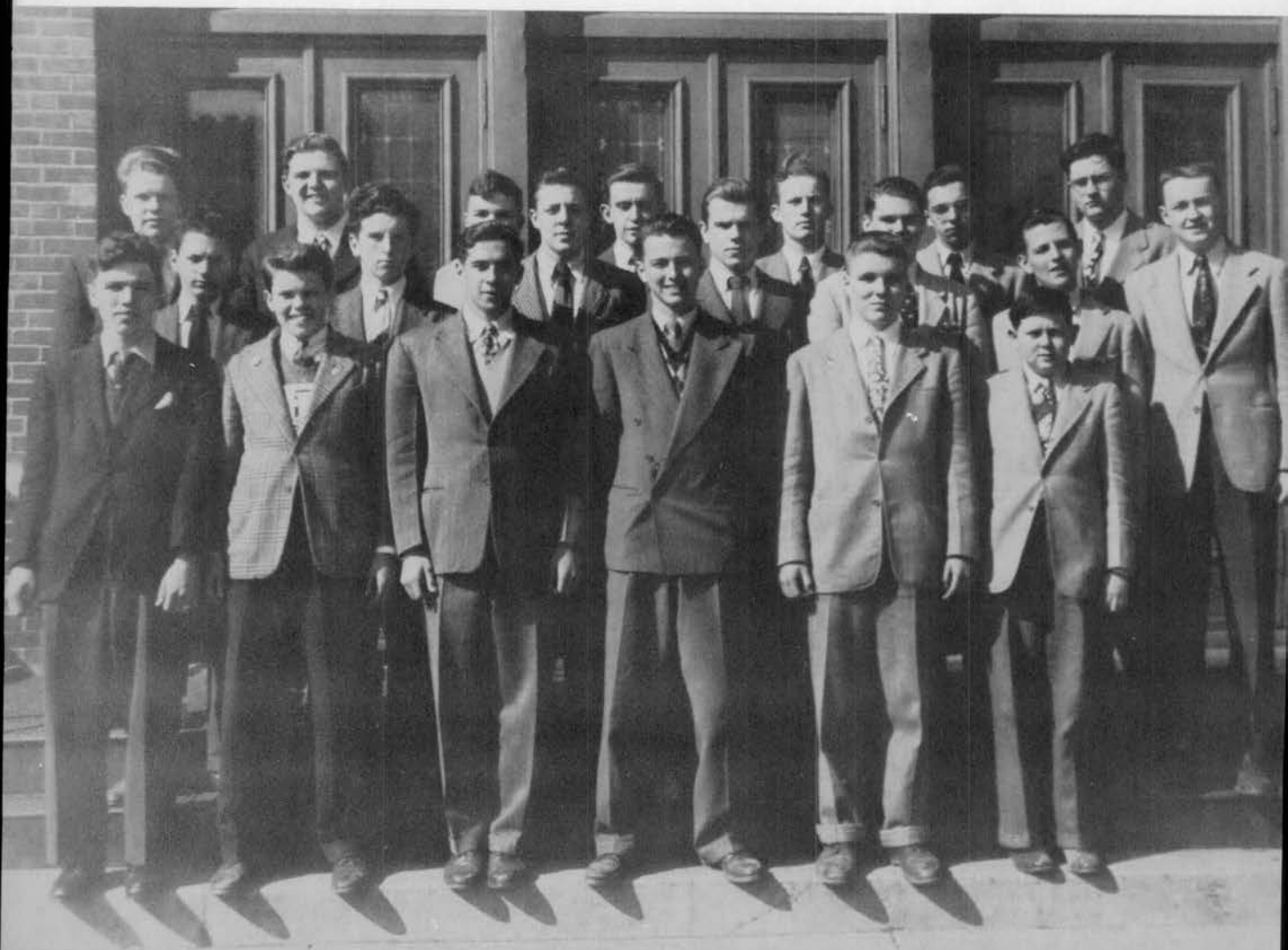

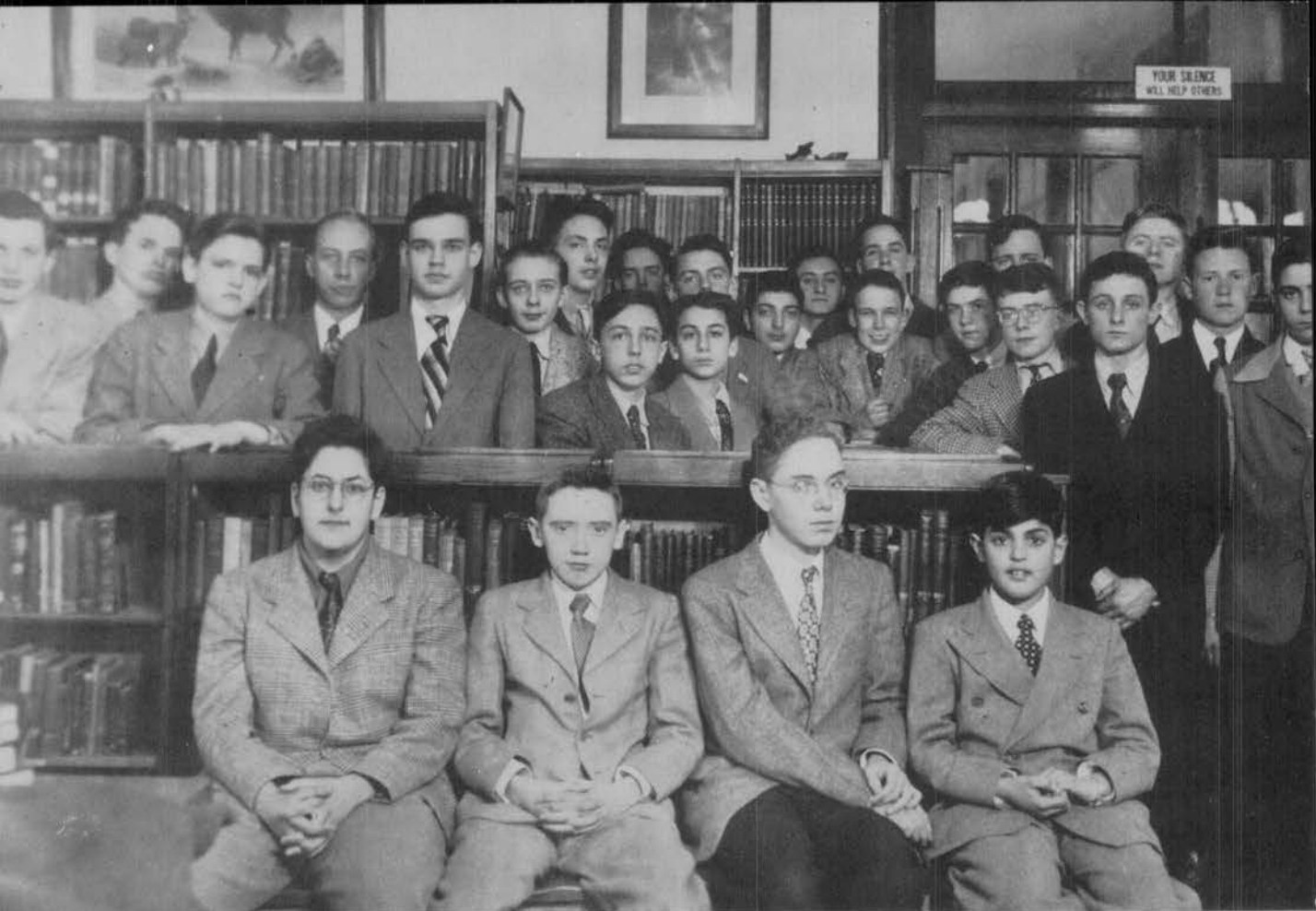


The Sanctuary Society

Perhaps that title attracted more attention than anything the club did all year—but then, as you will see, maybe not. Mr. Joseph B. Schuyler, S.J., agreed to act as moderator of the club. At the first meeting officers were elected: Don Hunter as President, Bill Grafe as Secretary. Likewise at this meeting the club's program was drawn up, as were plans for a constitution. The latter was soon completed—but Bev Ennis and Bill Rini never did succeed in adorning the Prep's halls with a masterful reproduction of the historic documents articles. It was decided to hold meetings on alternate Fridays.

Missals printed in Latin and French were procured through the good will of the late Msgr. Joseph F. Stedman, a Prep alumnus. Reading of the Mass in French, and discussion usually not in French, became the usual post-business activity. During the Thanksgiving holidays a dinner-theatre party was held at "La Petite Georgette" (restaurant) and the 55th St. Playhouse. The pictures were horrible—but at least the French was good. Bill Canapary managed to be late once more—but paid for it this time, for his dinner consisted only of a hasty dessert. Just before Christmas, the club was the guest of the Mary Louise Academy French Club at a show presented by the latter. If Prepsters are charmed next semester by French versions of "White Christmas" and other Yuletide favorites, they can thank that show for it.

After the holidays the moderator announced the acquisition of a set of French Linguaphone records—a fine educational tool, but which must be used to be effective. They weren't used!—except for a while by some of the few faithfuls. Next on the program was the collective reading of Molière's "L'Avare." In this activity, however, as in most undertaken by the French Club, conflicting activities of other school organizations caused untimely curtailment.

NO STUDY club can hope to achieve results when attendance at its meetings is not constant. This year's German Club was no exception to that rule. Mr. Schuyler, S.J., agreed to serve as moderator, but assured the members who asked his help that the club would live or die by their own energy, or lack of it, alone. The latter, despite the interest of a few, prevailed.

The club began to function with the election of officers, all of whom by the first term's end had slipped away from club membership. Jim Curtin and Bob Hoffman assumed the leadership at the year's half-way mark. Meetings occurred on alternate Fridays. The name of the club, as formidable a title as the one owned by the French club, was: "Der Deutsche Verein der Unbefleckten Empfangnis bei Brooklyn Prep."

The club members procured copies of Msgr. Joseph Stedman's "Ein Soldaten Messbuch," and at the several meetings went through the Mass in German. That provided the more serious side of the meetings. A more funful part was that in which the members tried their hands, or rather their voices, at German songs. As the Christmas and Lenten periods approached, appropriate liturgical hymns were learned and sung—or almost! We had quite a bit of fun singing "Stille Nacht," and "Der Tannenbaum" in December, "Christi Mutter Stand mit Schmerzen" in March, and such favorites as "Die Lorelei" and Brahms' "Wiegenlied" periodically.

The club sponsored two dinner engagements at German restaurants, followed by visits to German movies. On the first visit to a German movie, it proved rather humiliating to find no English subtitles used in that particular picture. Imagination plus following the actions saved part of the day.

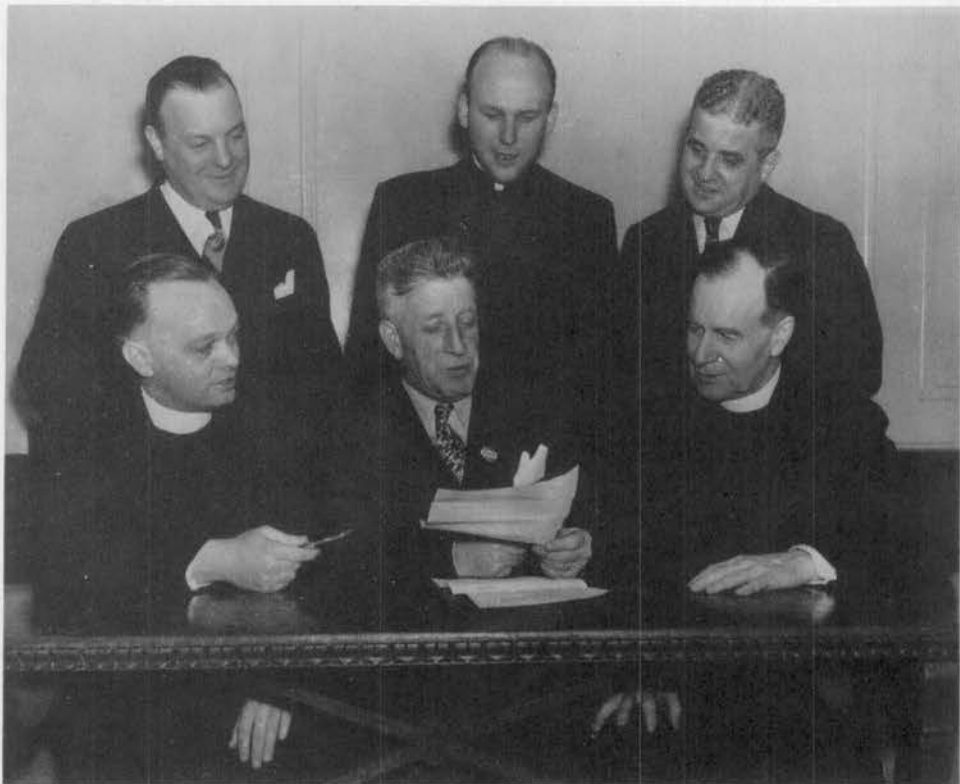

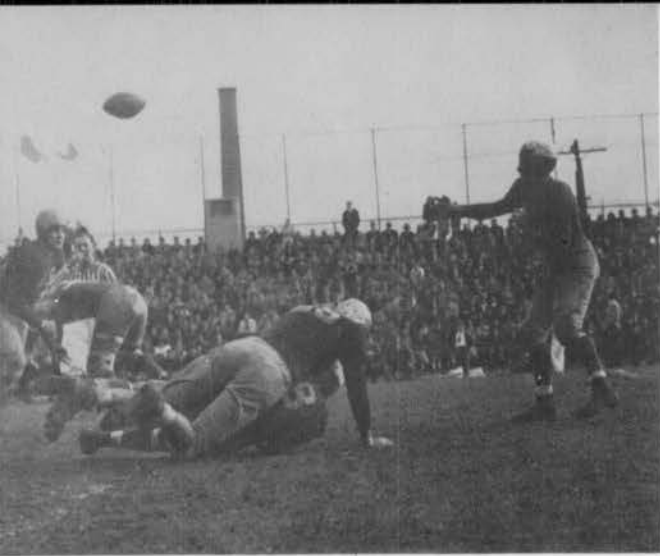
BROOKLYN PREP - CARDINAL HAYES

FORDHAM PREP - BROOKLYN PREP

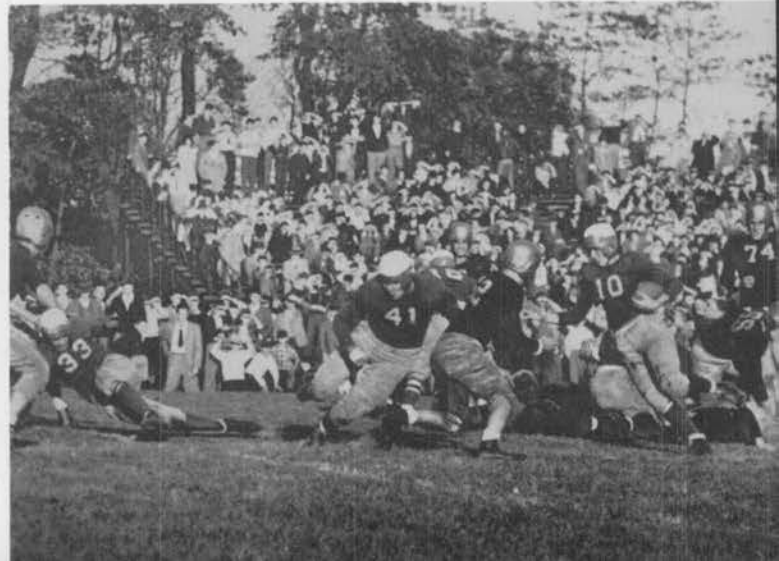

The Blue and White's next score came in the second quarter on another Paterno to Mahoney pass. Again in the second period, Herb Imbornoni went over from the 12-yard marker to make the score 20-6 at halftime. Early in the fourth Period Herb Imbornoni scored from the 4. Dick Spinner got Prep's last goal of the afternoon with DiChagas completing the placement. The final score was 33-6.

MT. ST. MICHAEL - BROOKLYN PREP

With two victories under its belt and the promise of better things to come, a strong but still inexperienced eleven met the powerful Mt. St. Michael squad. The Mounties took advantage of our inexperience and took the lead early in the first quarter on a long pass from Bigby to Turney. Prep's Blue and White came back with a 54-yard drive which featured the running of Conway and Paterno. When the 1-yard line was reached by this pair, Joe Mannix took over and scored. Imbornoni converted and Prep led, 7-6. This lead was quickly overtaken when Bigby ran 59 yards for another Mount goal. The Mount in the final period scored twice more, making the score as the gun sounded Mt. St. Michael 25, Brooklyn 7.

ST. BASIL - BROOKLYN PREP

The Prep eleven gained its first victory of the season, defeating St. Basil's of Stamford, Conn., 20-0, at Boys High field on October 14. John McKenna sparked the Blue and White to its first touchdown. He also went on for the score with Herb Imbornoni booting the extra point. Prep's second score came on a 27-yard pass from Paterno to Mahoney after a pass interception by Bud Brennan. Late in the game George Paterno climaxed a 85-yard drive by going over from the 15-yard strip.

Meeting Poly Prep in our traditional game, the Prep eleven returned victorious with a 34-14 score. Sparked by Joe Mannix who scored three touchdowns and by Captain George Paterno, Prep lost little time scoring in the first period. Two long, running drives gave us two more scores before the half whistle. Prep's final two scores came as a result of the fine running of Paterno and Mannix, and of a pass from Paterno to Mahoney.

POWER MEMORIAL BROOKLYN PREP

Prep in its pre-St. John's game showed the greatest strength it had to date by crushing Power, 46-7.

Scoring once in the first quarter Prep began to move with three scores in the second. The first came after a 60-yard down-field drive when Paterno crashed over from the 2-yard strip. Mannix scored the second of the period on a 50-yard interception of a Power pass. The third touchdown was achieved by Paterno on a 3-yard lunge after intercepting another of the enemy's passes. In the third quarter the boys from Crown Heights scored twice more, once on a 12-yard pass from Paterno to Mahoney, and again on a 3-yard plunge by Captain George. Prep made its last tally in the fourth quarter with Frank Smith scoring from the 1-yard marker.

J. V. Football

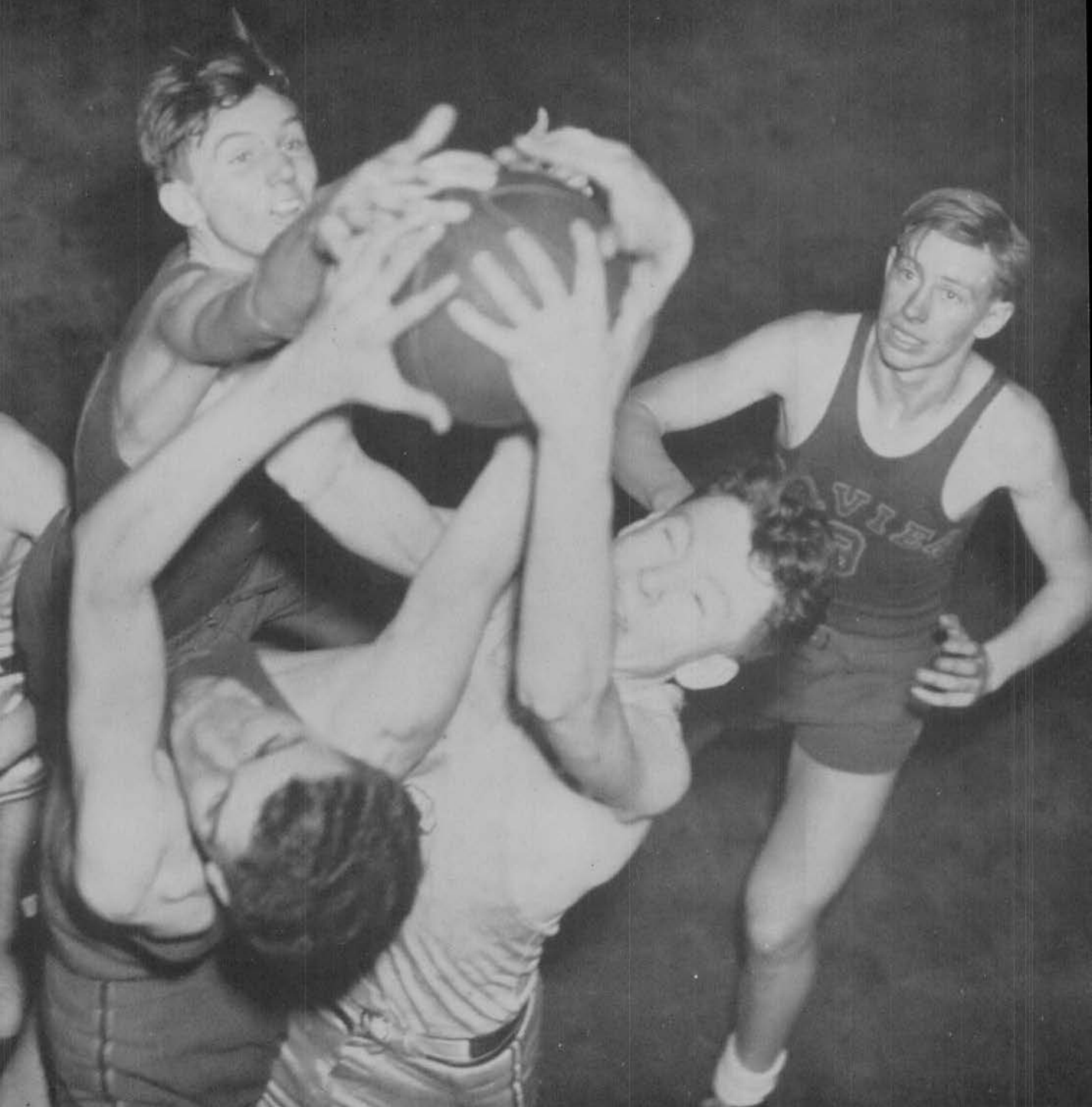

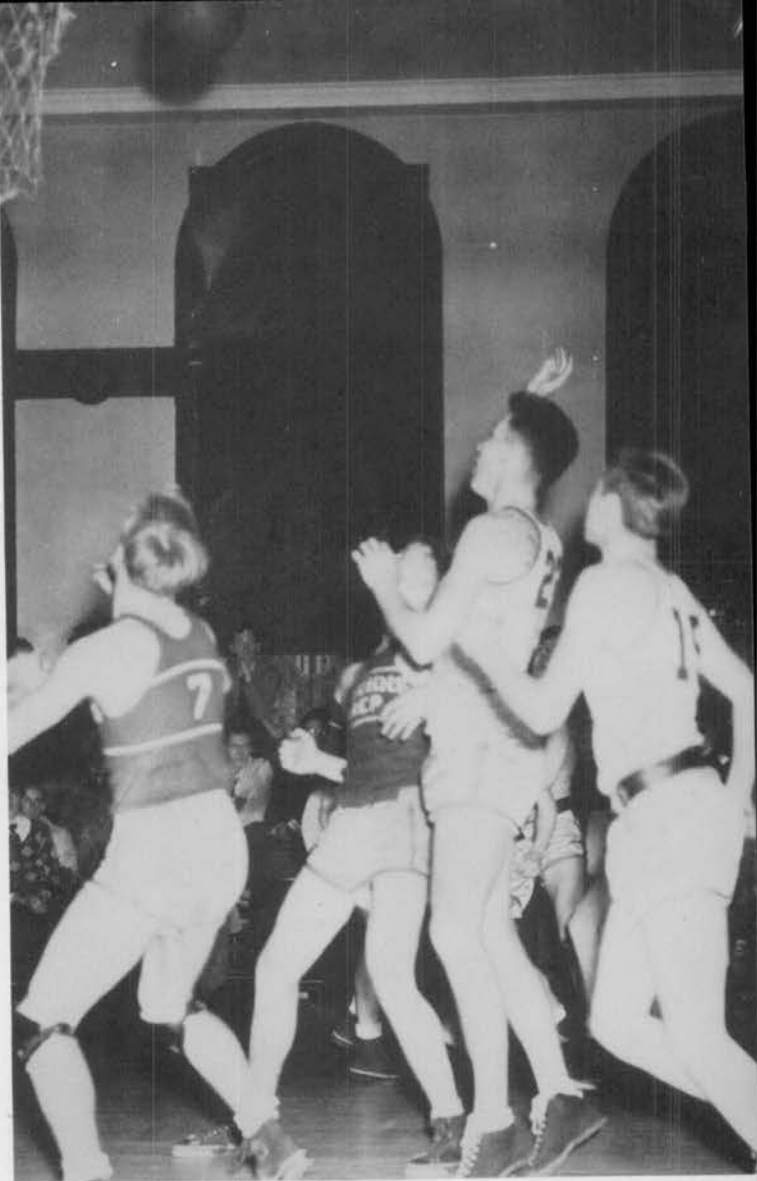

Swimming



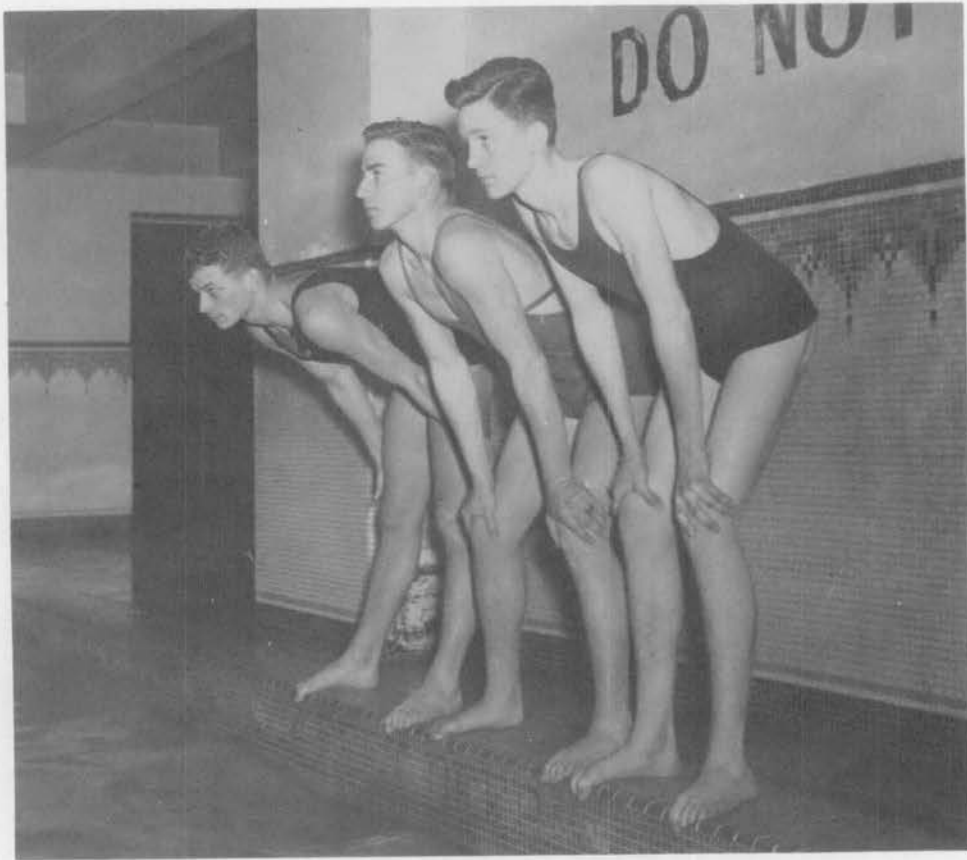

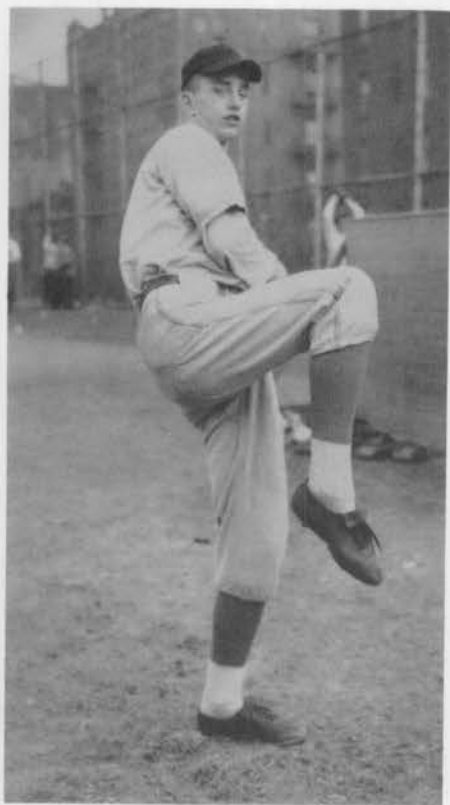

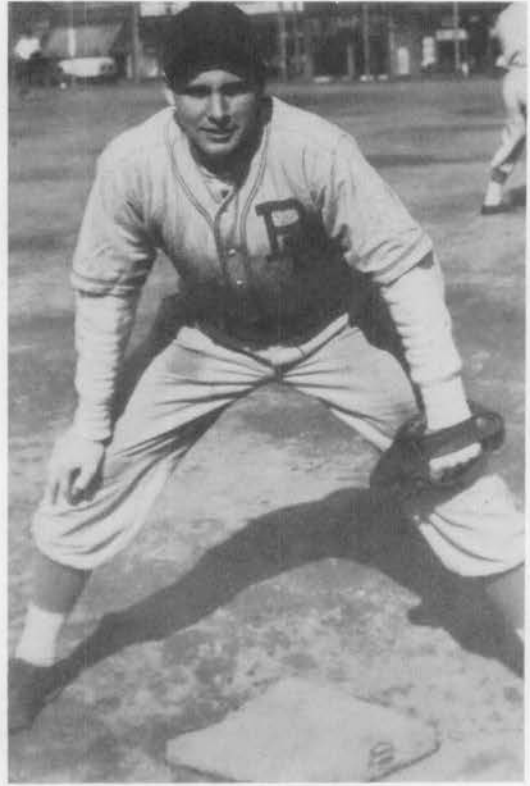
