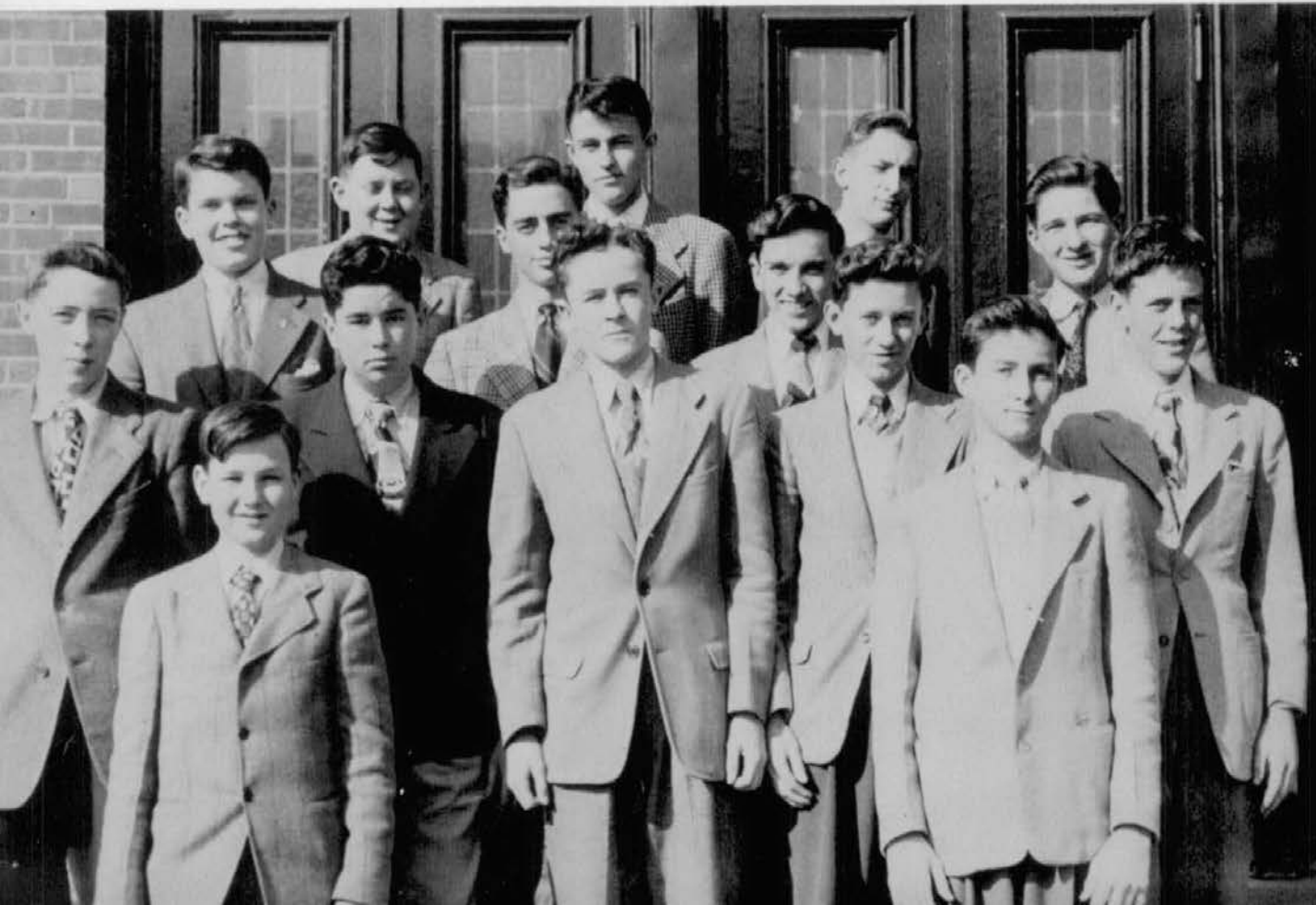


Freshman A Sodality

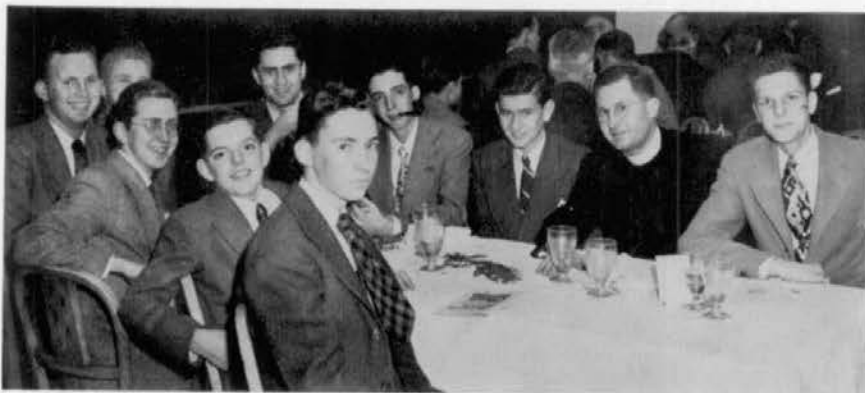


BLUE

ON Friday evening, March 28th, the Champion and Bellarmine debating societies presented their annual Mock Trial. This year's trial was: The State of New York vs. Harry Strauss and Martin Goldstein. The defendants were charged with brutally garroting and burning the body of one, Irving Feinstein, a Brooklyn gangster, on Labor Day in 1939.

With Judge William T. Powers presiding and before a jury made up of members of the Fathers' Guild, William Canapary and Edward Goerner argued in defense of Strauss and Goldstein, while Dale Sauve and John Buser did their utmost to obtain a conviction for the State. After over three hours of cross examinations and other varied oratory of the courtroom, the jury was able to declare the defendants guilty of murder in the first degree.

The defense based their arguments on the testimony of John Sinnot, Albert Bader, William Dooling, and Charles McAllister. Also assisting in the trial were John Maher, as court clerk, and Frank Free, officer of the court.

Ed Goerner received the Gold Medal for the best performance of the lawyers, while Dale Sauve received a Silver Medal in the same category. Charles McAllister received a medal for being the best witness.

Mention must also be made of the two moderators who worked so hard to make the trial the success that it was. Mr. Paret, S.J., advised the defense, and Mr. Balduf, S.J., aided the successful prosecution.

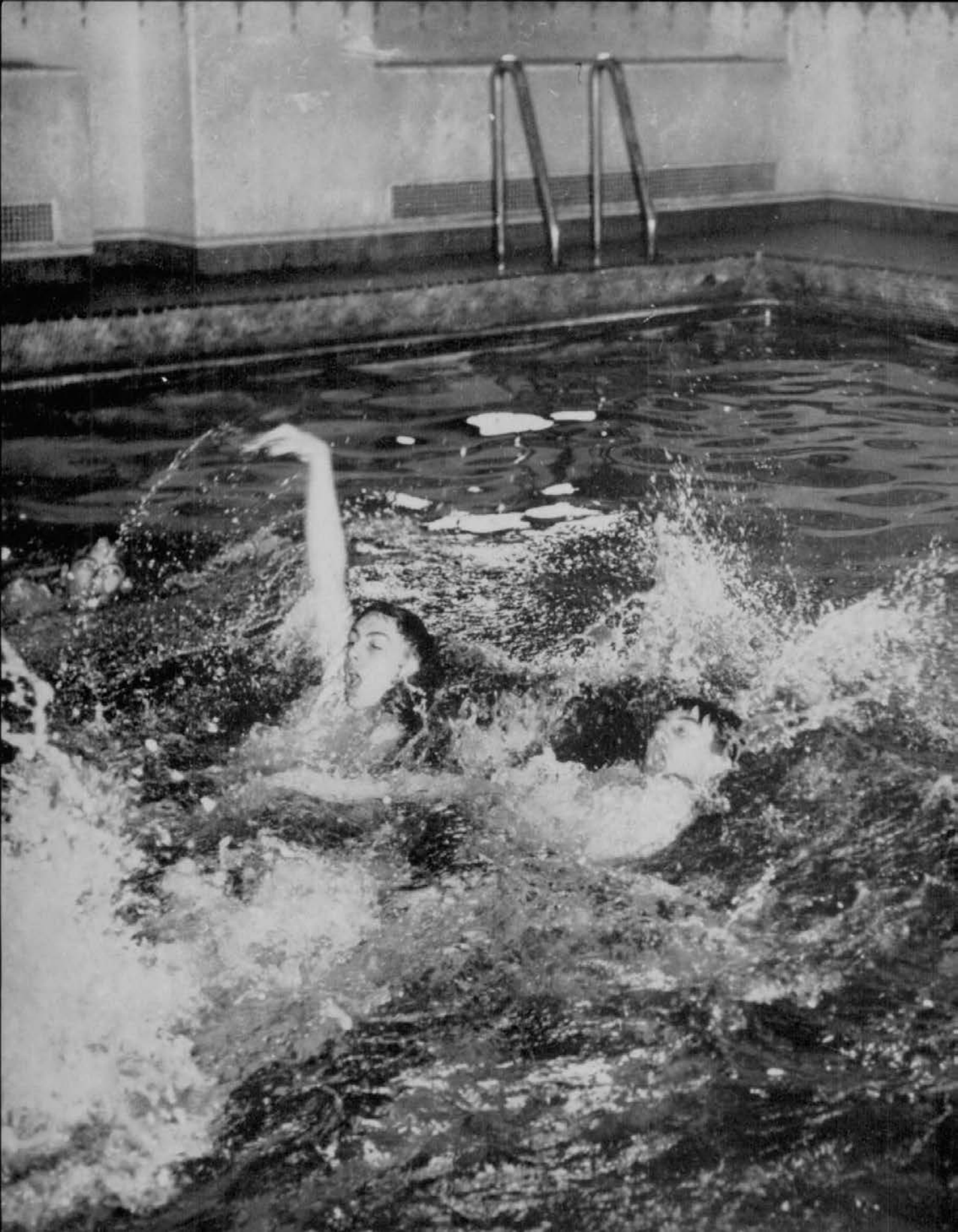

Xavier drew first blood when they scored after five minutes of play to lead 7 to 0. Both teams then played nip and tuck without any additional scoring up to the end of the half.

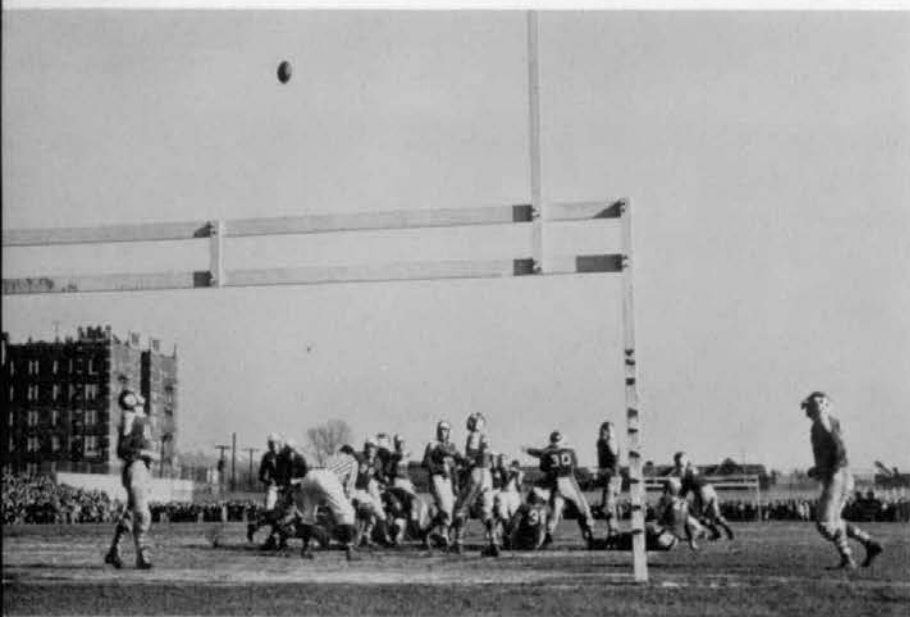

PREP 37—ST. BASIL 6

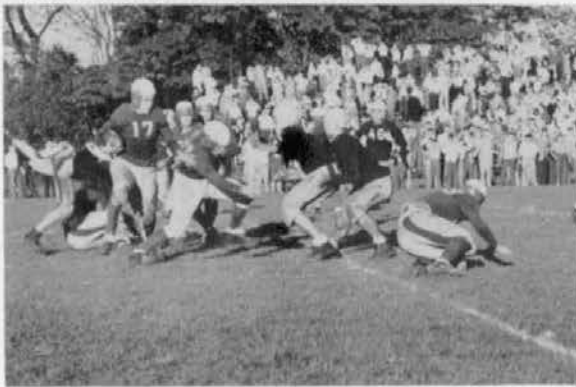

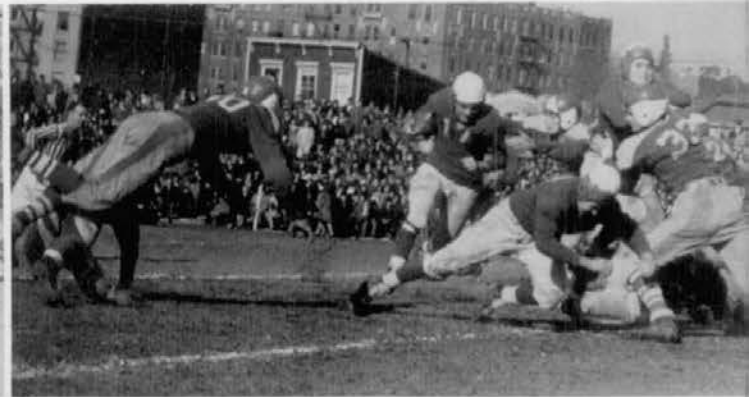


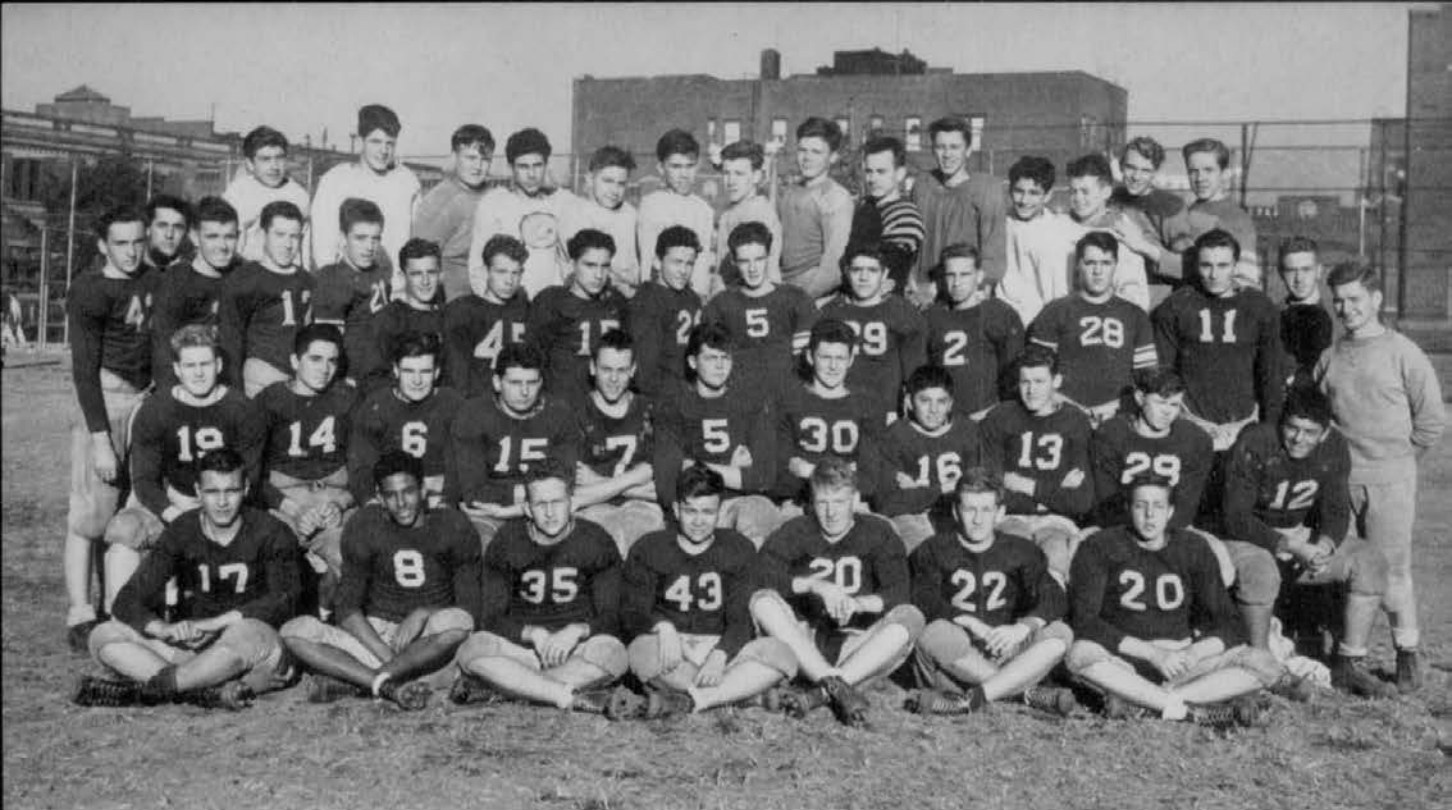


ST. JOHN'S 20—PREP 19

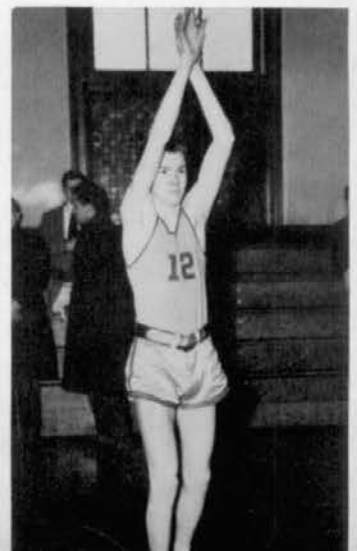

Swimming

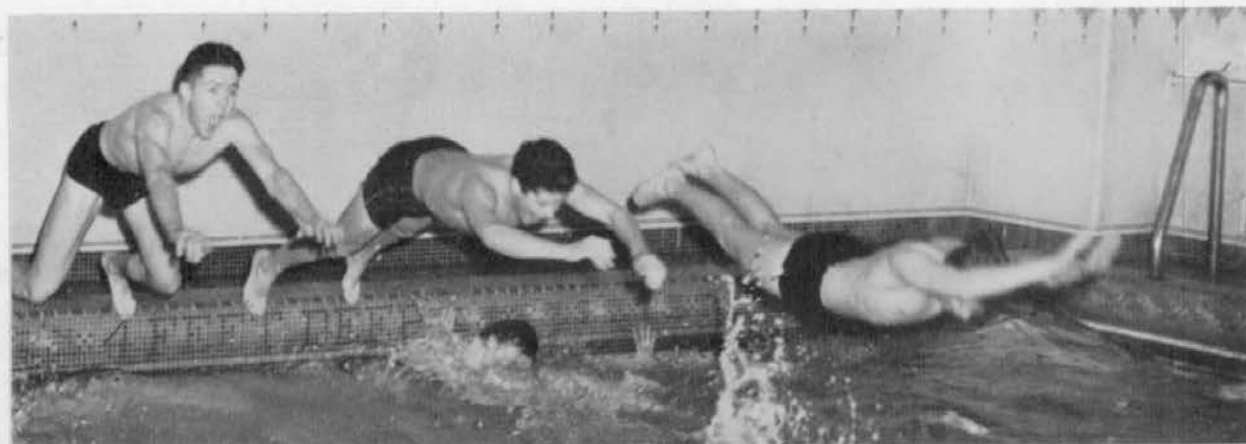
OUT of the confused welter of the city's swimming leagues, the Prep mermen have emerged with a record of five wins and ten losses.

With this potential team on the make, and the illustrious record of former teams preceding them, forthcoming Prep natators can well seek to emulate and match the performance of this tank squad.

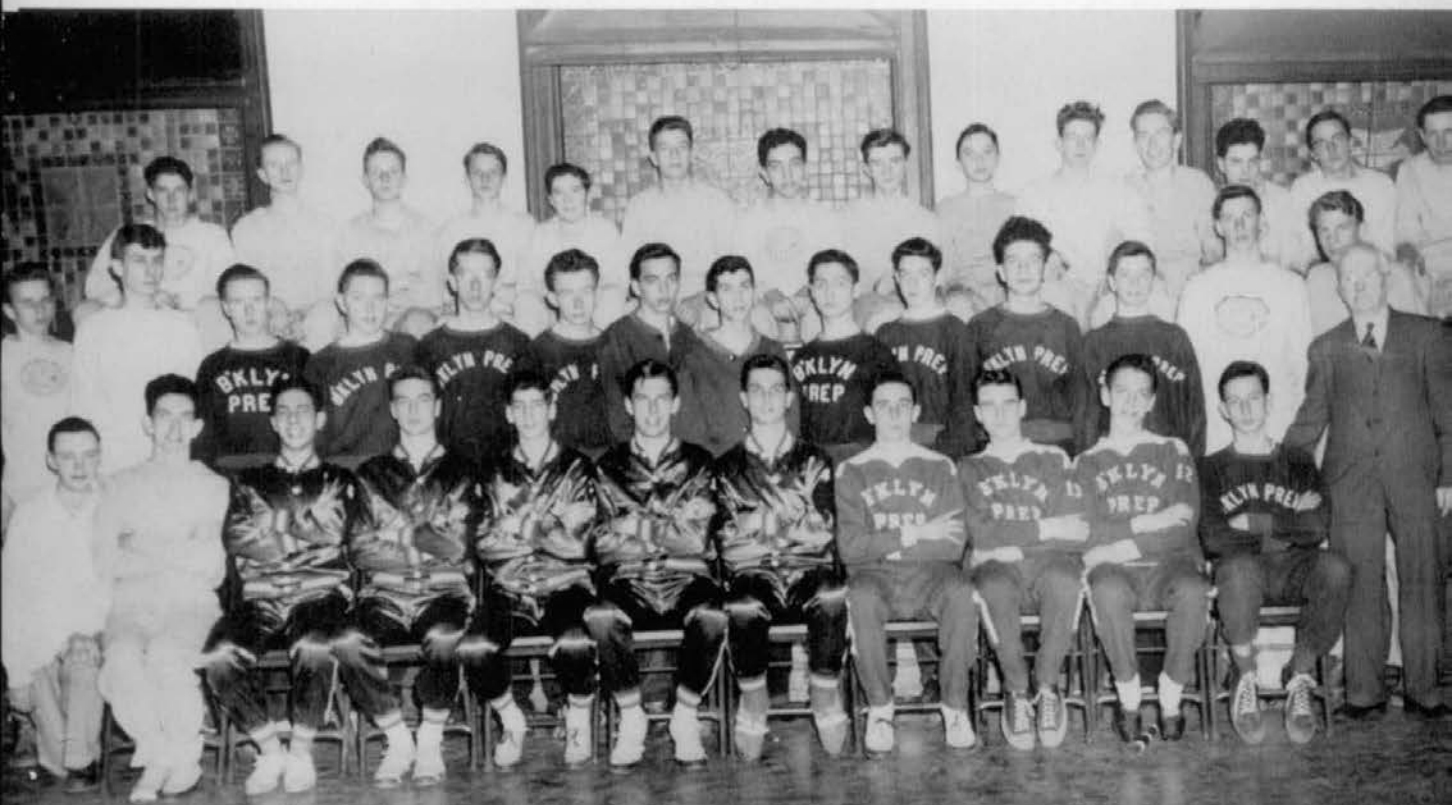


Track

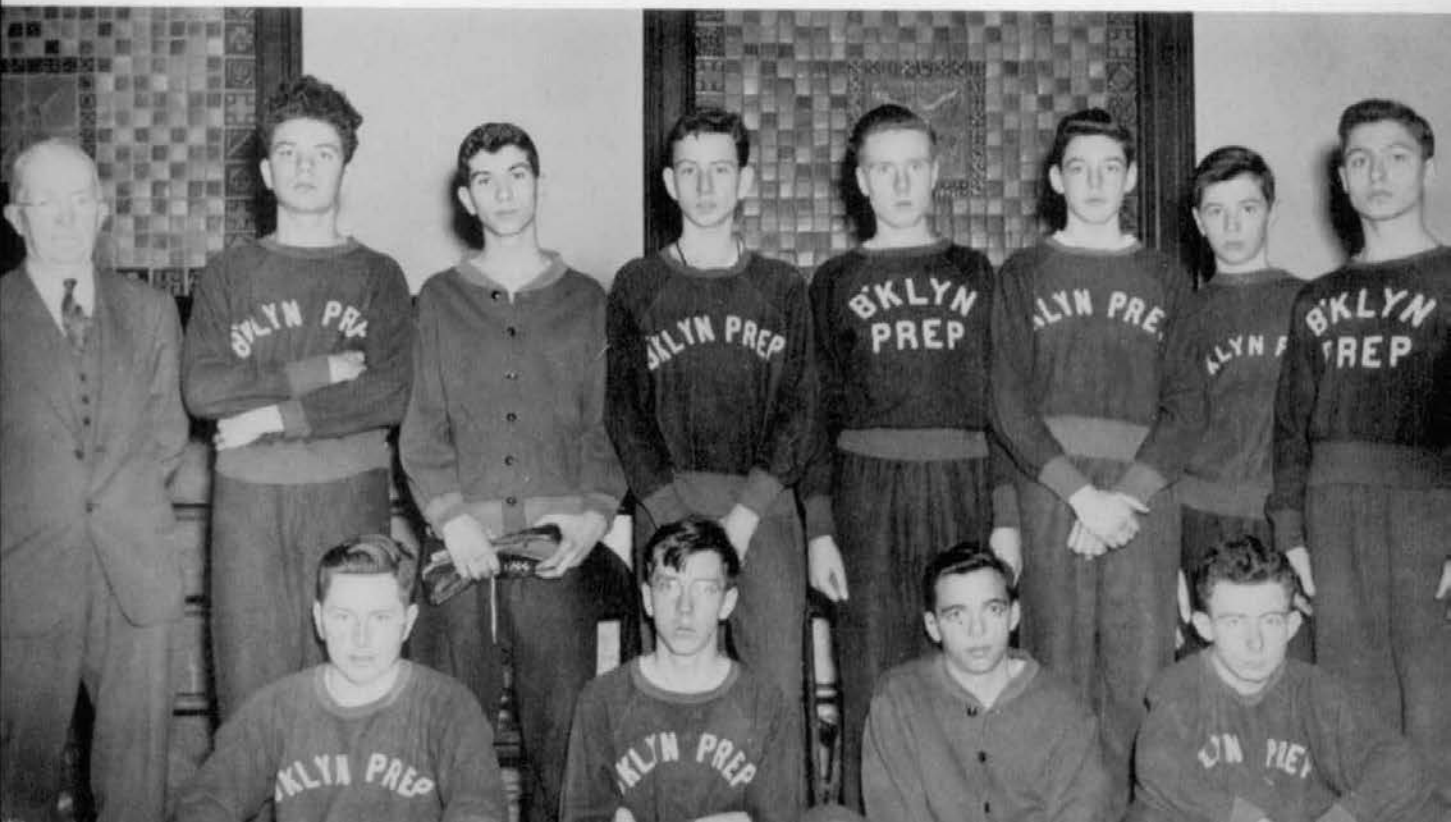

A promising outfield, consisting of Chase and Grant also went through the paces, showing themselves of Varsity merit.



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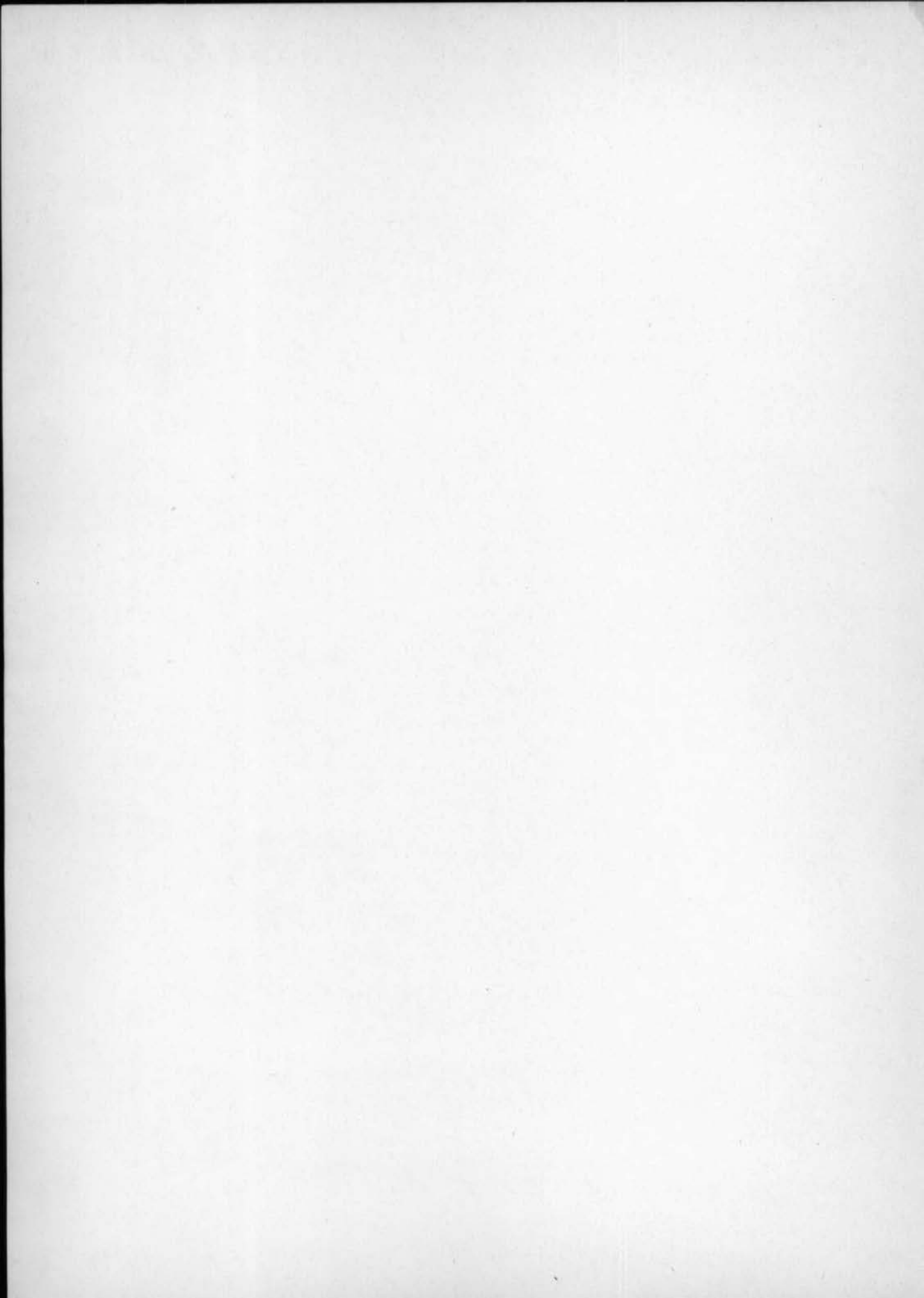


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
