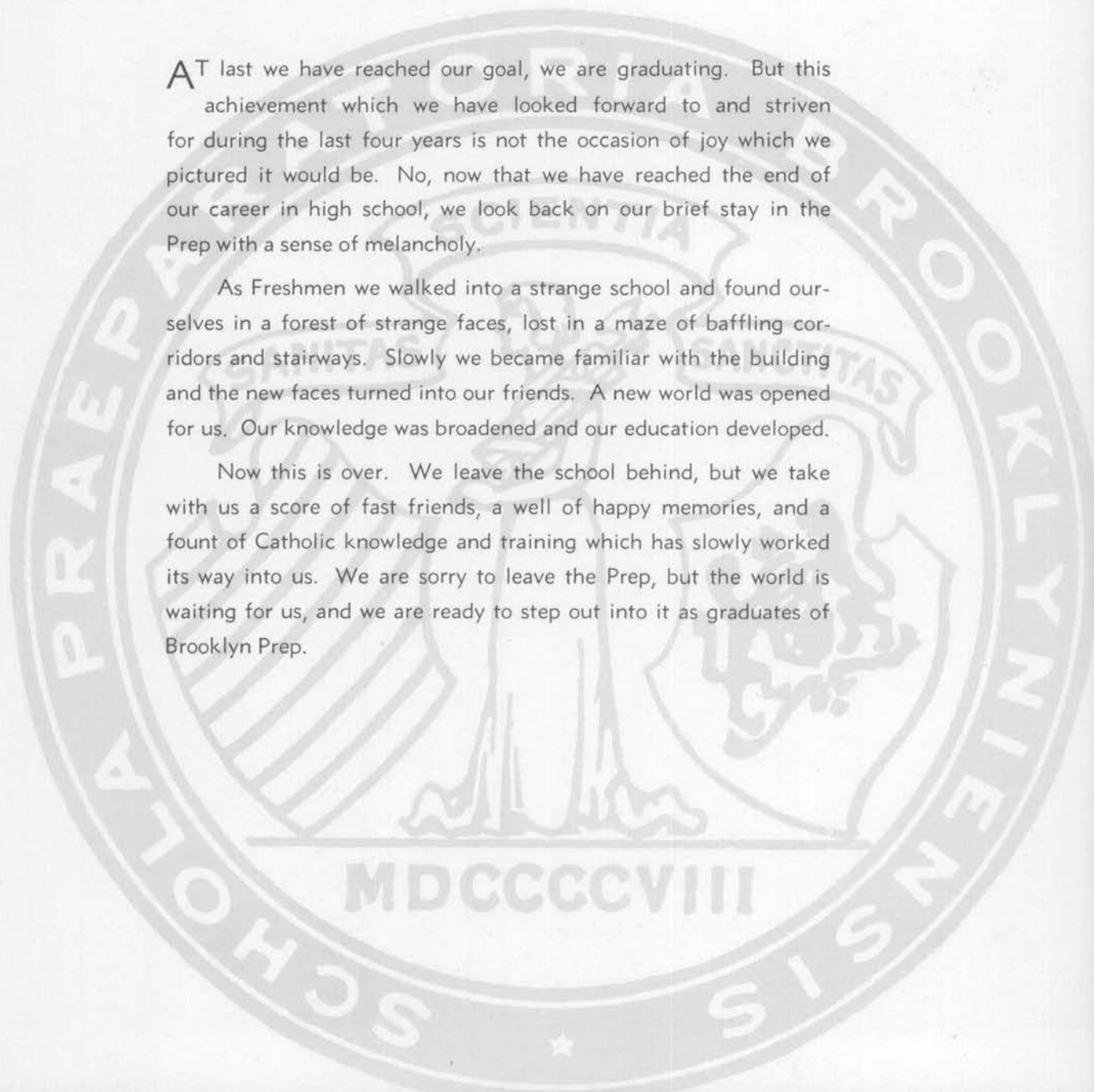


SENIORS

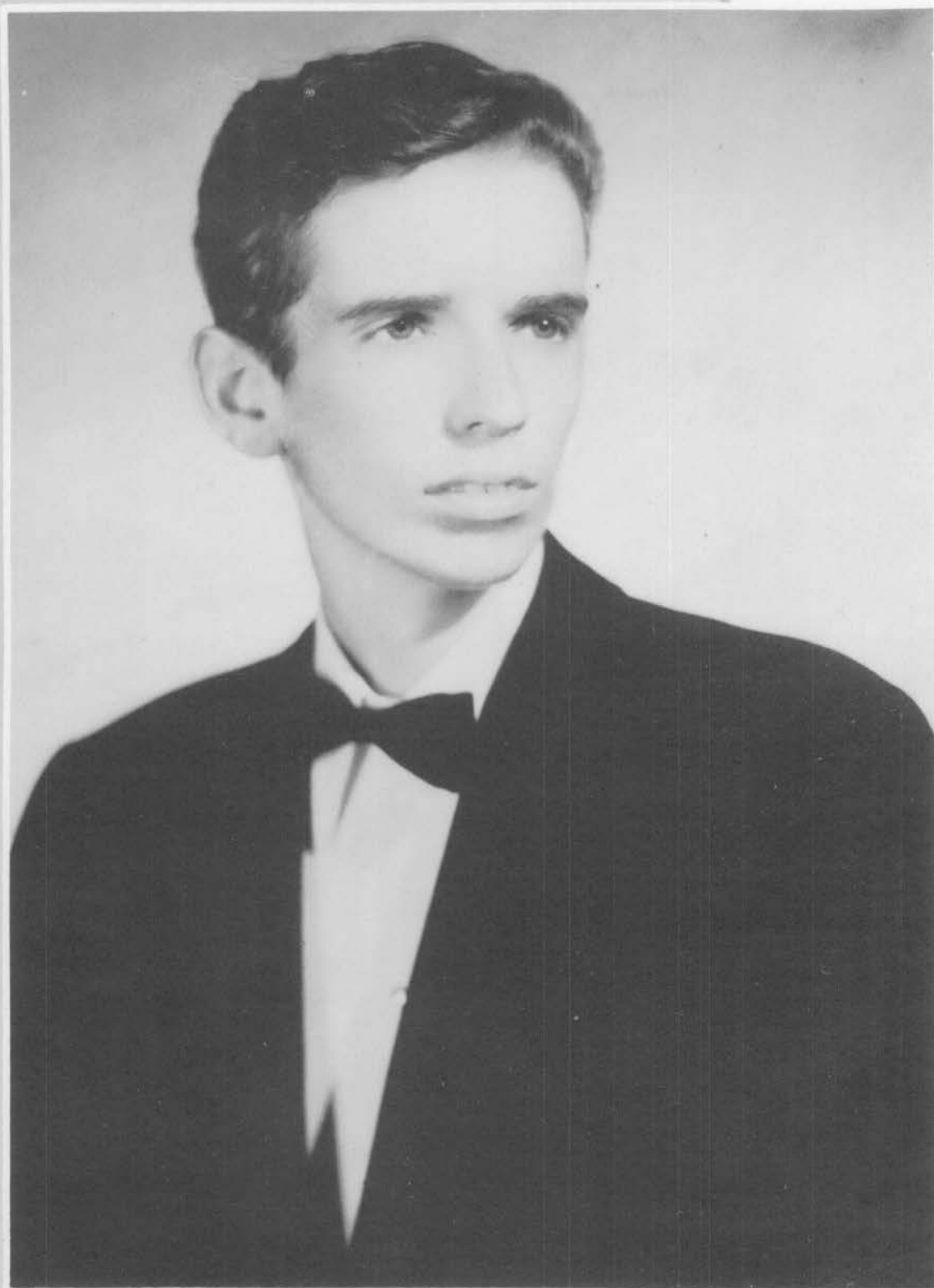


IN MEMORIAM

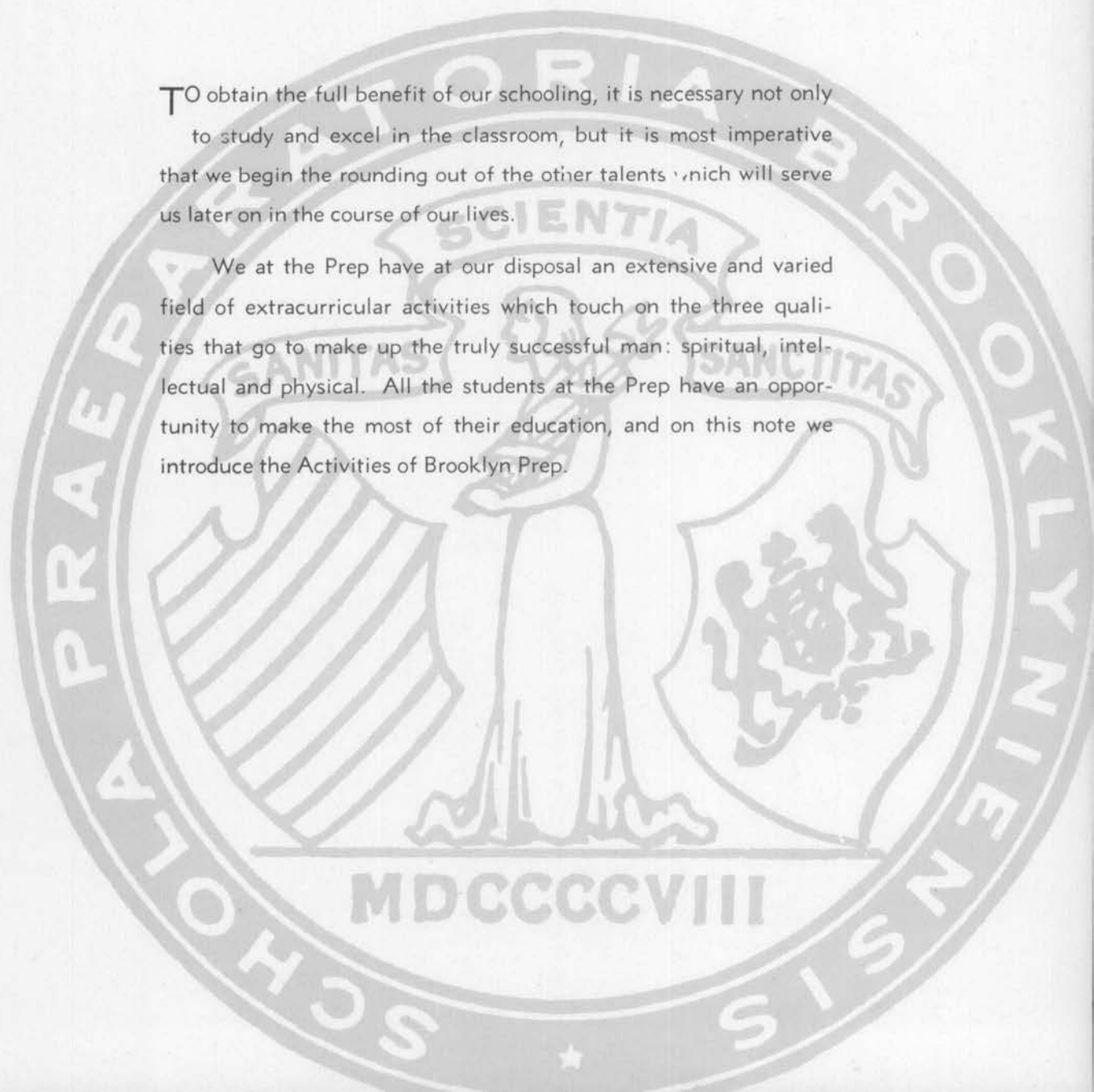




A C T I V I T I E S

We at the Prep have at our disposal an extensive and varied field of extracurricular activities which touch on the three qualities that go to make up the truly successful man: spiritual, intellectual and physical. All the students at the Prep have an opportunity to make the most of their education, and on this note we introduce the Activities of Brooklyn Prep.





SENIOR SODALITY

IN attaining personal sanctification, the main aim of the Sodality, Leo Daly and Donal McAllister as Co-Prefects, and James Kelly as Secretary led the Seniors in an intensive year of activity. The means we used to obtain our goal this year was a closer association between the student and God through the sacraments and mental prayer.

To foster this association between student and sacrament, each Sodalist endeavored to attend Mass and receive Holy Communion at least three times each week: on Sunday, at the Guard of Honor Mass each Wednesday morning, and on Friday mornings at K. B. S.

Fr. Kleber, S.J., our moderator, stressed the importance of mental prayer in several of his talks to us, and during the month of May, each Sodalist spent ten minutes in mental prayer in the Student Chapel.

SOPHOMORE SODALITY



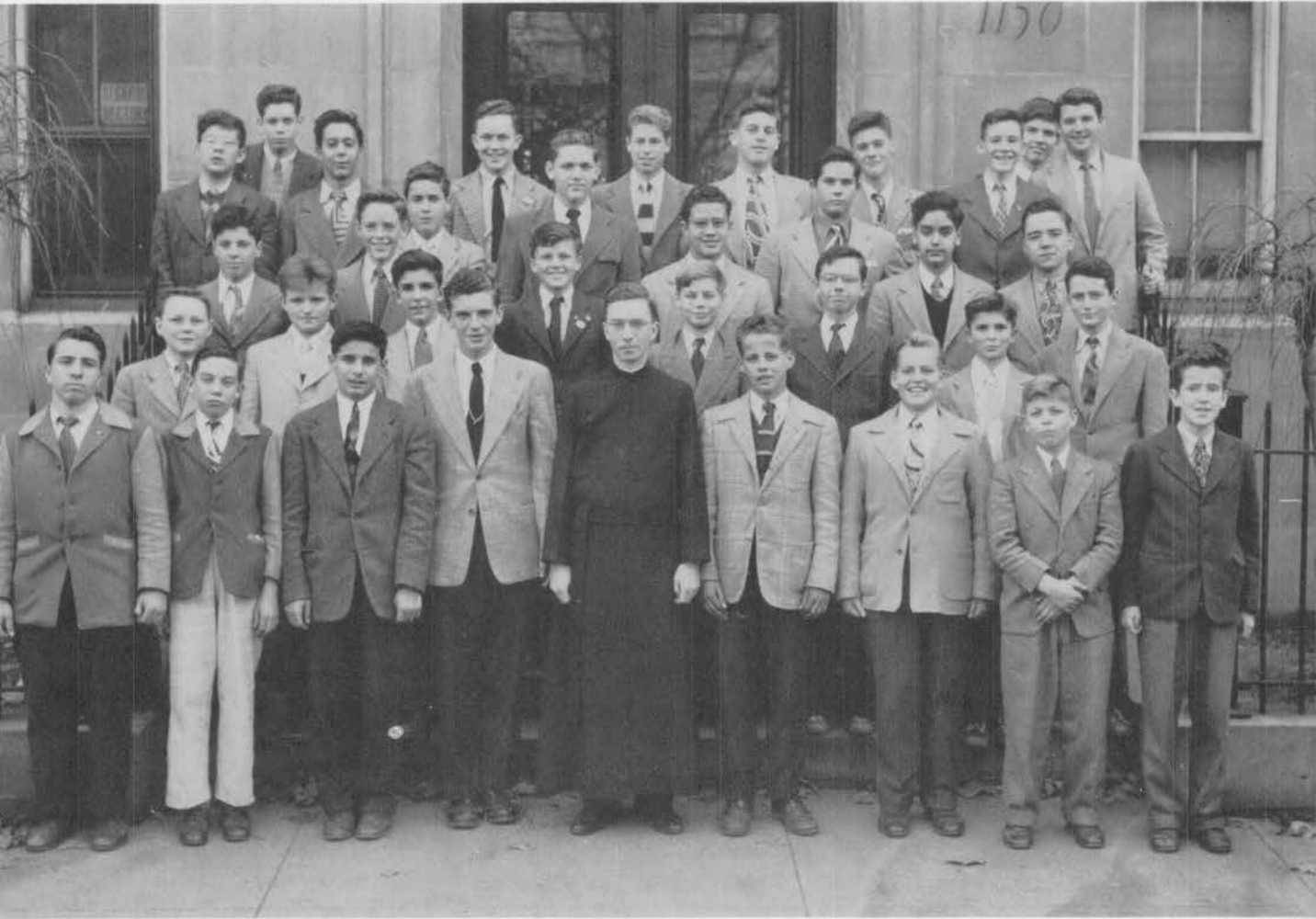

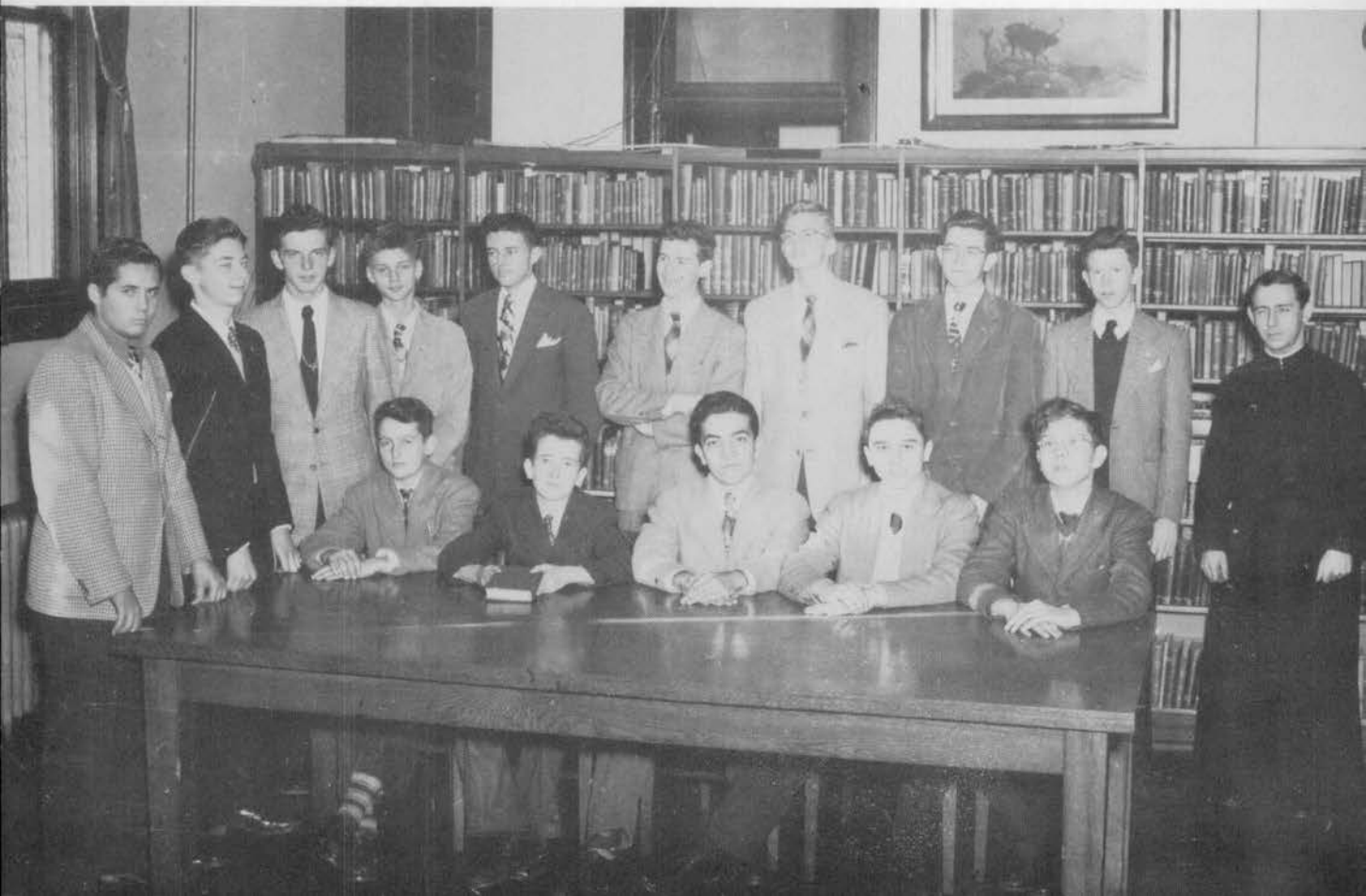
VOX MARIAE

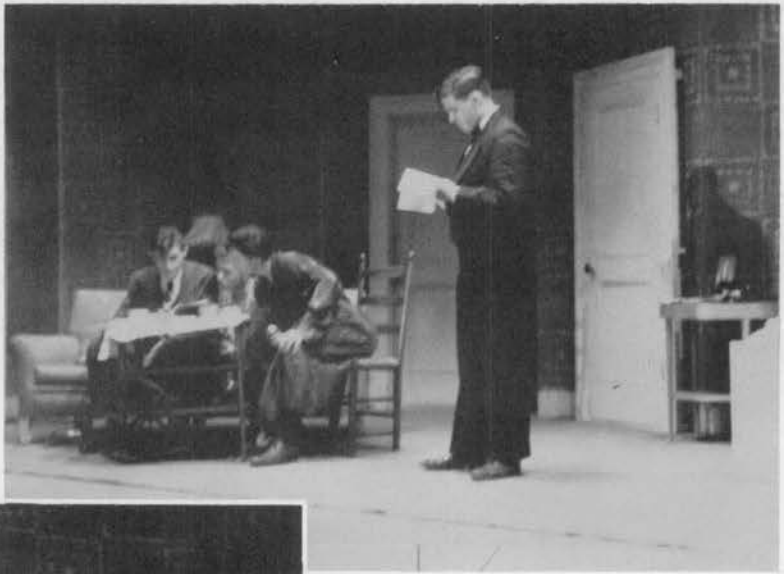

Wagner, the excited Hotel Executive. Minor roles were filled expertly by Albert Bader (Sasha, the Russian Waiter), James Moran (Christine), Edwin Schmidt (Hogarth), Joseph Contarino (Bank Messenger) and John Sinnott (Senator Blake).

A comedy which was received with great acclaim on the Great White Way a short while back, Room Service will remain in the memory of those who follow the fortunes Prep Players as a delightful experience. The members of the cast, most of whom graduate this June, will have reason to look back with satisfaction on December 1947 as they recall the fun they had in doing this play.

CAMPION DEBATING SOCIETY

THE Champion Debaters, taking an active part in the speaking program of the newly-formed Catholic Forensic League, enjoyed one of their most successful seasons. Besides engaging in more than one hundred twenty-five inter-school debates, two-thirds of which they won, Prep's orators participated in the numerous contests sponsored by the Catholic Forensic League in original oratory, oratorical, dramatic and humorous declamation, and ex-tempore speaking.

The debaters turned in their best performance of the season early in February when they won 17 out of 18 debates in three days. Taking three out of four from De La Salle was but the beginning; they followed this up by emerging undefeated in eight debates at a tournament at Dominican Commercial High School, which included teams from eight of the C. F. L. schools. In seven of the eight debates, a Prep orator was chosen best speaker. Two days later they won the C. F. L. debating tourna-

ment, winning six debates out of six and garnering best-speaker honors every time. Twenty-one schools participated, each sending two teams. When the best teams of the day had been chosen, George McCormack and Free, Prep's affirmative team, were voted tie for second, while their negative confreres, Hugh Smith and John Coleman, were the third place winners.

Our arch-rivals from St. John's fell victims ten times in eleven contests, and we had winning averages against Xavier, Chaminade, Blessed Sacrament, St. Agnes, Loyola, and Dominican Commercial. Regis, LaSalle, St. Barnabas, and De La Salle proved a little harder, but Prep won its share of the debates.

Fifteen of our outstanding debaters were honored by the Catholic Forensic League in the form of membership certificates, testifying to excellence and activity in the forensic field. Half of these speakers received the higher "Degree of Honor" for exceptional proficiency in speaking.

The voices of many of our leading speakers were heard over the air-waves. On WMCA's "Young Book Reviewers" program, Dick Doyle, George McCormack, Ray Gallagher, Joe Halpin, Paul Shlichta, and Jim Tully spoke, all on different days. John Coleman was one of the six panel speakers on WQXR's New York Times Youth Forum, while Hugh Smith was recognized from the floor in the discussion which followed; John Wood was heard from the floor a few weeks later. We were represented on television by Ed Goerner, who appeared on the "Americana" program on WNBT. Ed also represented Prep very creditably in the American Legion Oratorical Contest, from which he was eliminated by the narrowest of margins, and in the Journal-American Oratorical Contest. In this, Ed won the first round by a unanimous vote, but that close-second jinx overtook him in the semi-finals. John Coleman did an excellent job in the Jesuit Oratorical Contest.



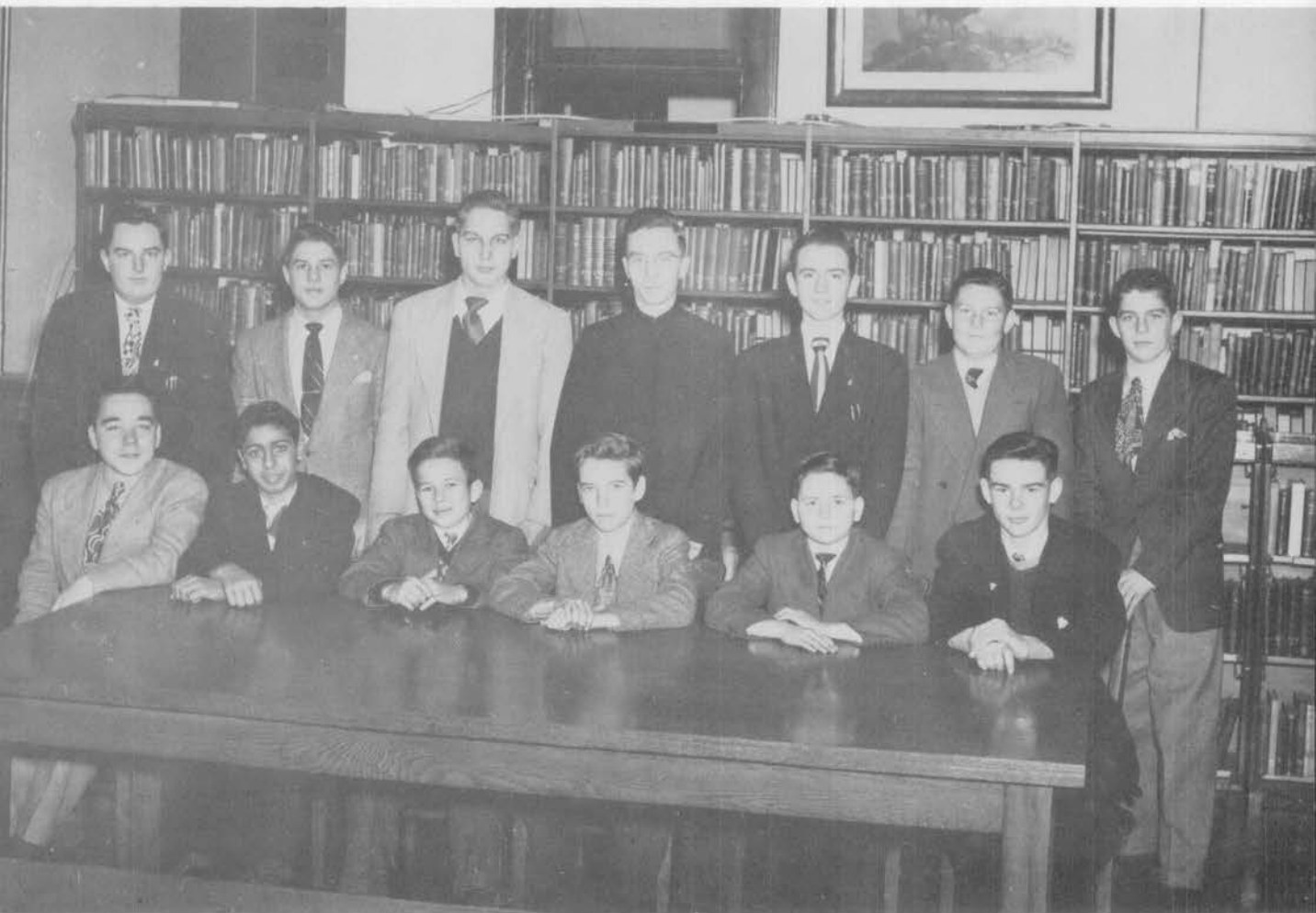

In the progress of the year, the society increased in number; among these newcomers were many green recruits—the rookies of tomorrow's championship Champion teams.



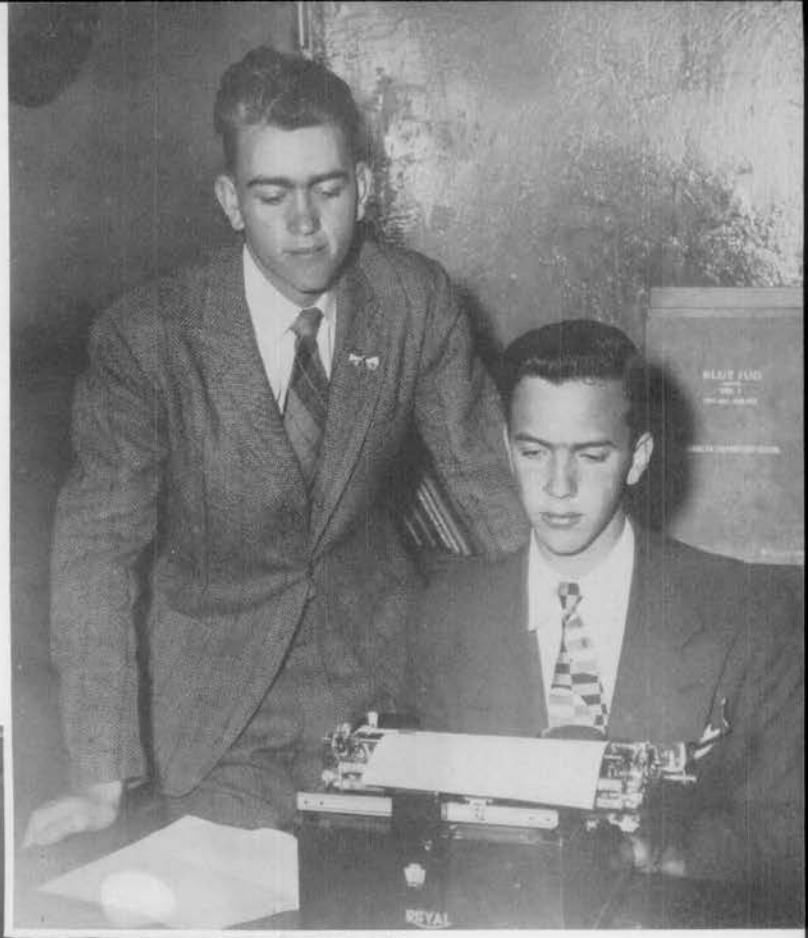
BLUE BOOK

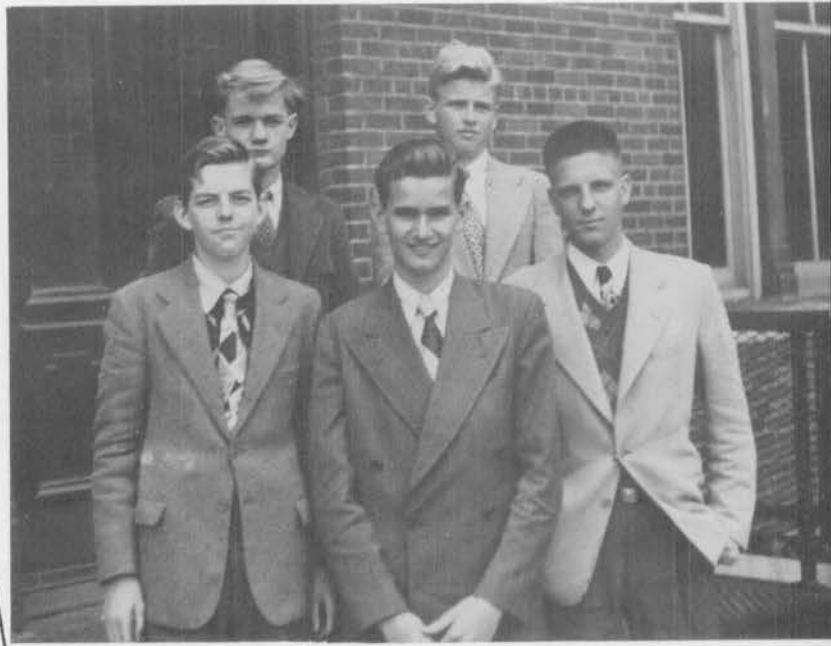

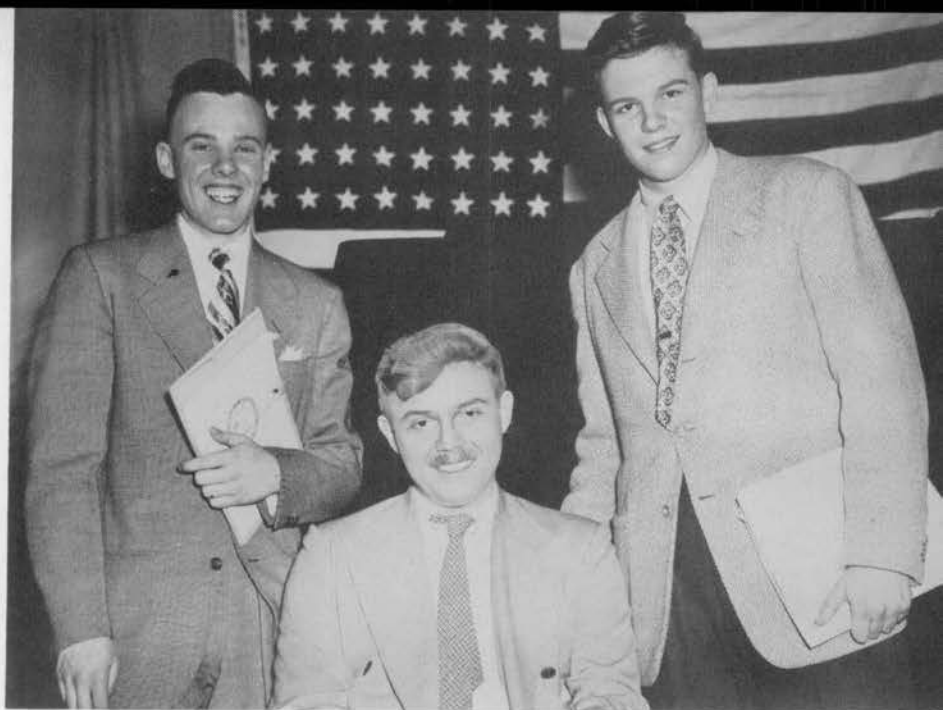

The prosecuting attorneys were Frank Free and Hugh Smith. They brought forth as witnesses William Dowling, as a confessed German spy, George McCormack, as a court clerk, four F. B. I. agents portrayed by Donald Reilly, Raymond Gallagher, Leo Daly, and Lawrence Karam, and finally, Robert Coan, playing the part of Norma Kopf, a friend of the defendant.

Star witness in his own behalf was Michael Westfall, as Anthony Cramer, the defendant. He was represented before the court by defense counsel, Albert Bader and Richard Doyle.

The Gold Medal for best lawyer was awarded to Frank Free, and the Silver Medal went to Richard Doyle. The prize for best witness was won by Robert Coan in a close contest.

The Fathers Guild gave its usual splendid help and cooperation. Hon. Charles E. Ramsgate served as judge; medal awards were judged by Mr. Lewis F. X. Cotignola, Mr. Gerald J. Carey, and Mr. Henry Mannix; and finally, twelve other good men and true of the Guild made up the jury.

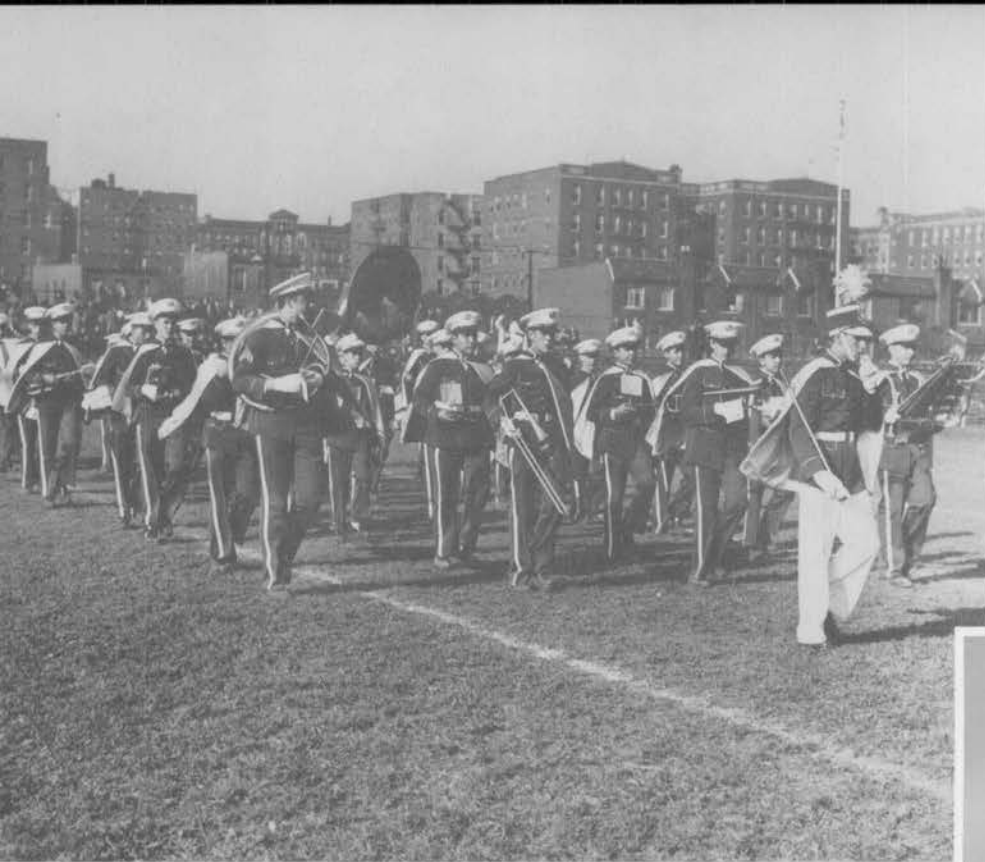




PREP ORCHESTRA

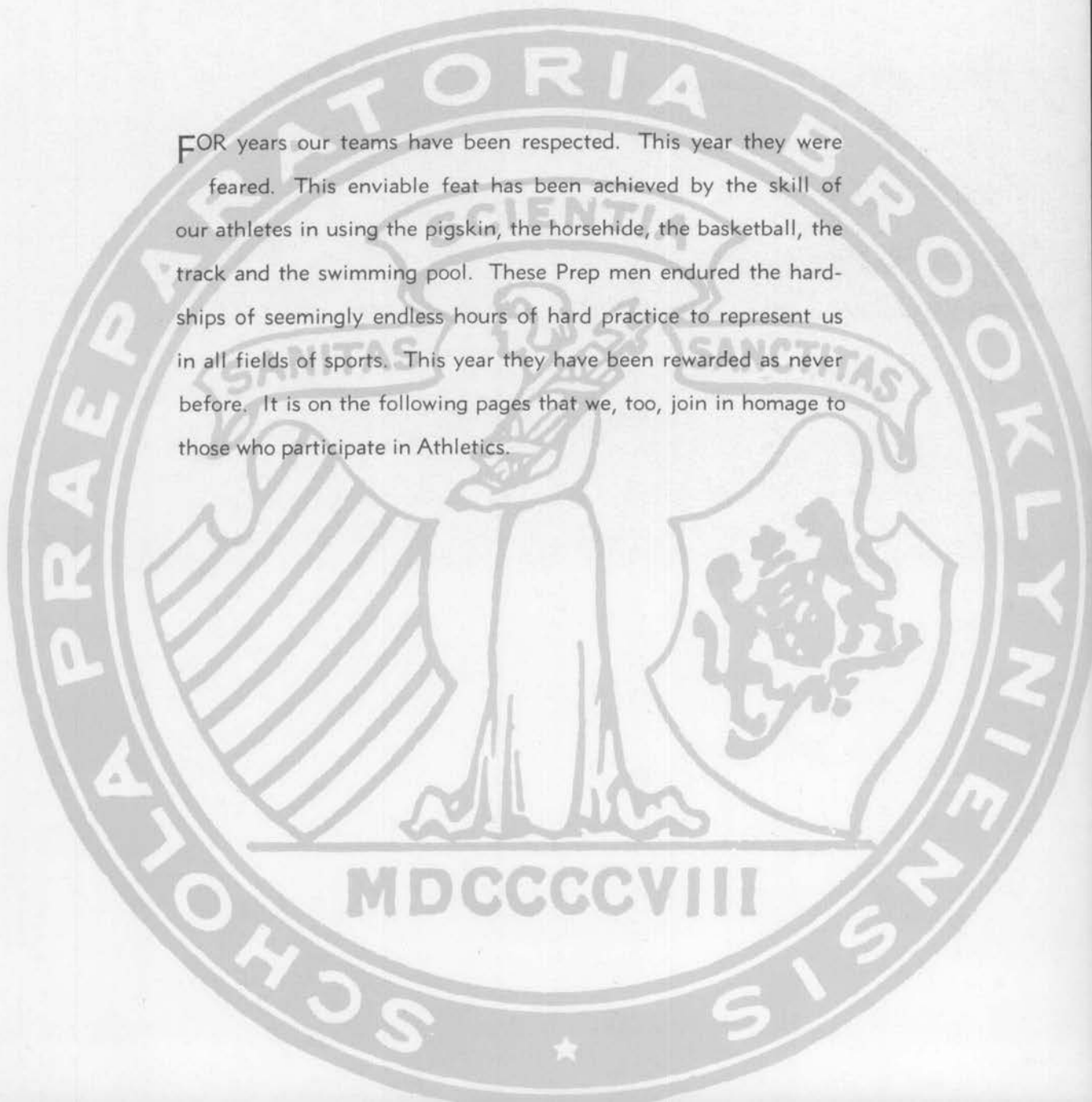

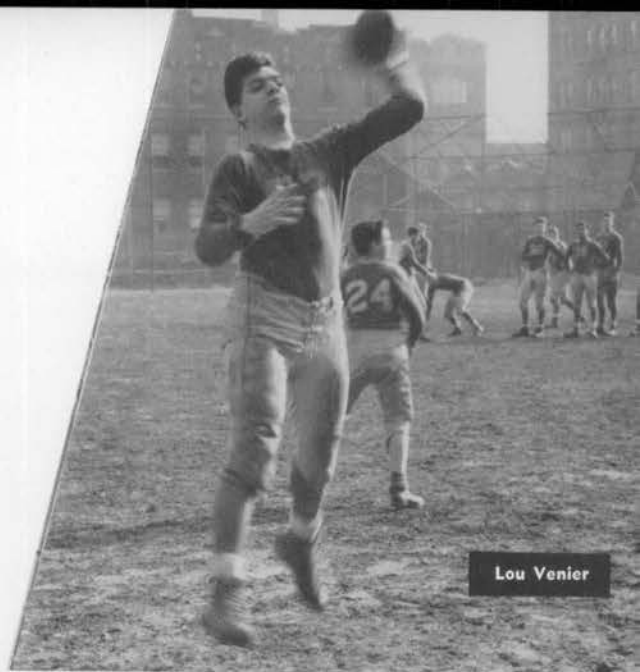

FOOTBALL

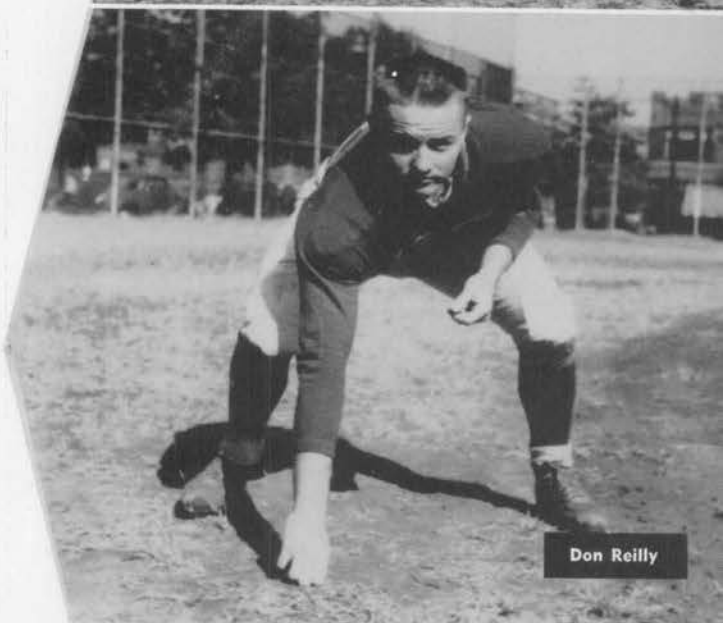

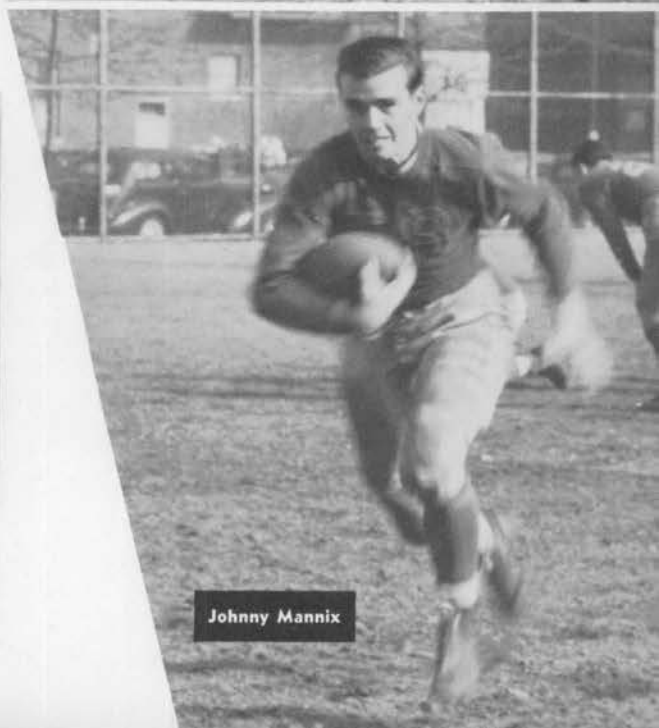

A. championship and fourth place in the New York City Catholic Championship was a ten and three record. The following total of the mermen's doings does not include those meets that took place during the championship competition.

After the able coaching of Mr. Walter Doolan during the pre-season practice, the Prepsters opened with a 31 to 26 triumph over All Hallows on December 8. The Blue and



White then proceeded to drown the St. John's swimmers by an overwhelming 40 to 17 score. They continued to prove their ability in the tank by sinking Dickinson High School 34 to 23. Then in a tense battle, St. Francis discovered that Prep was the team to beat by a thrilling $33\frac{1}{2}$ to $32\frac{1}{2}$ score. The following morning at Fordham University, our natators placed second in a hard fought contest for the Jesuit Championship. Sad to recall, Iona closed the season for the Prepsters by sinking them 39 to 27.

Opening the campaign, the varsity lost to La Salle Academy by the score of 34 to 21, with the Freshmen victorious by a similar score. The standings were reversed against St. Augustine's, the varsity winning by a score of 33-22 while the Freshmen met their only defeat, losing 18-37. Both Varsity and Freshman squads scored clean sweeps over Regis by scores of 40-15.

In championship competition the Varsity moved up in the scoring steadily. Starting with tenth place in the City Catholic Schools Championships, seventh in the Private Schools meet and third in the Jesuits, the Varsity climaxed their season by taking second place in the Eastern Prep Schools championships. 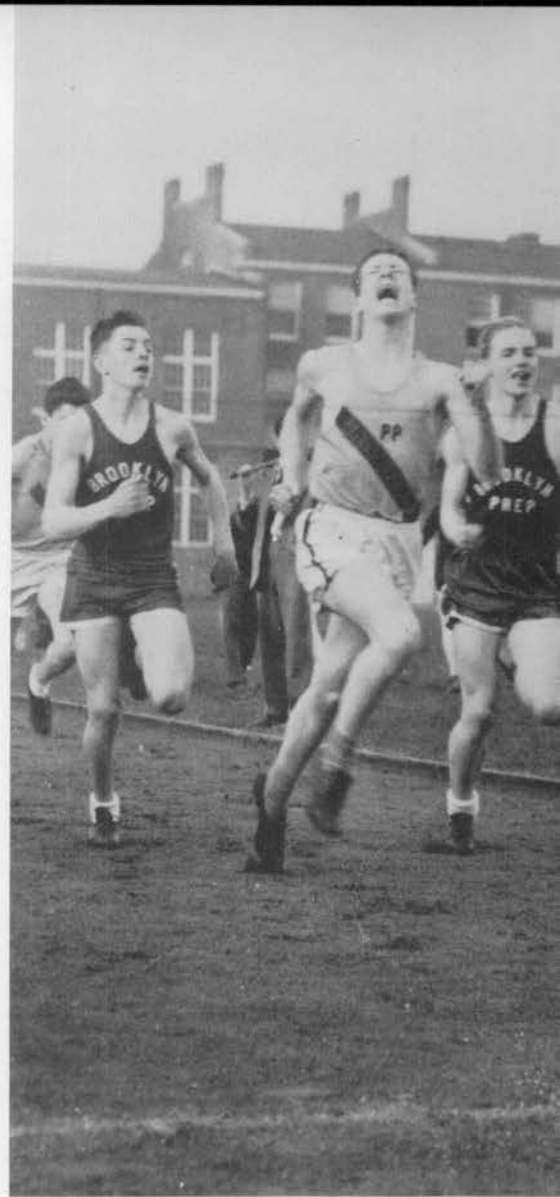

The team is looking forward to a successful outdoor season encouraged by a good start and will show their best in the Seton Hall and Penn Relays, expect a repeat of last year's team victory in the Junior Division of the Jesuit Championship and are confident of improving their standings in the Private and Catholic School meets.

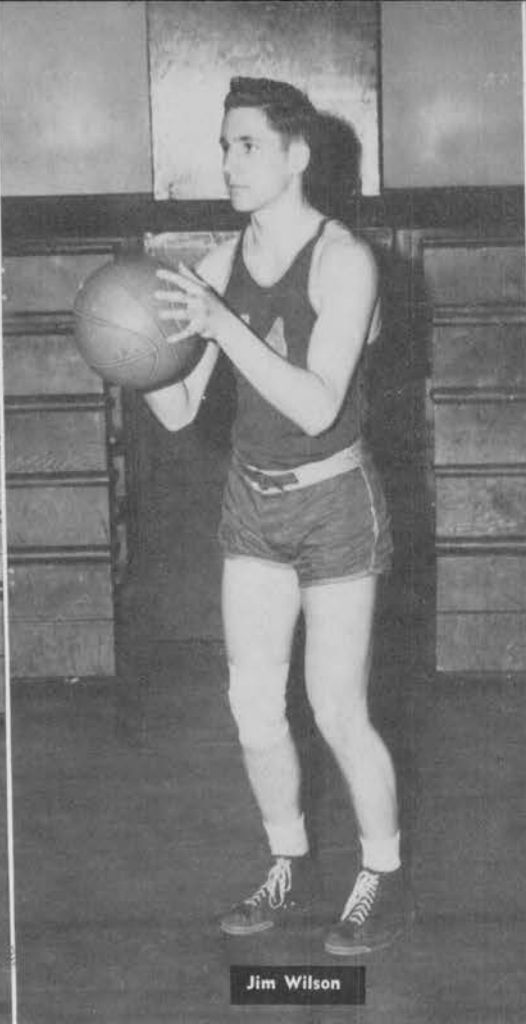
Dunn, McHugh, Abbate, and Harry DeMotte are the chief holdovers for next year's squad. Their play this season makes next year's prospects look much brighter.

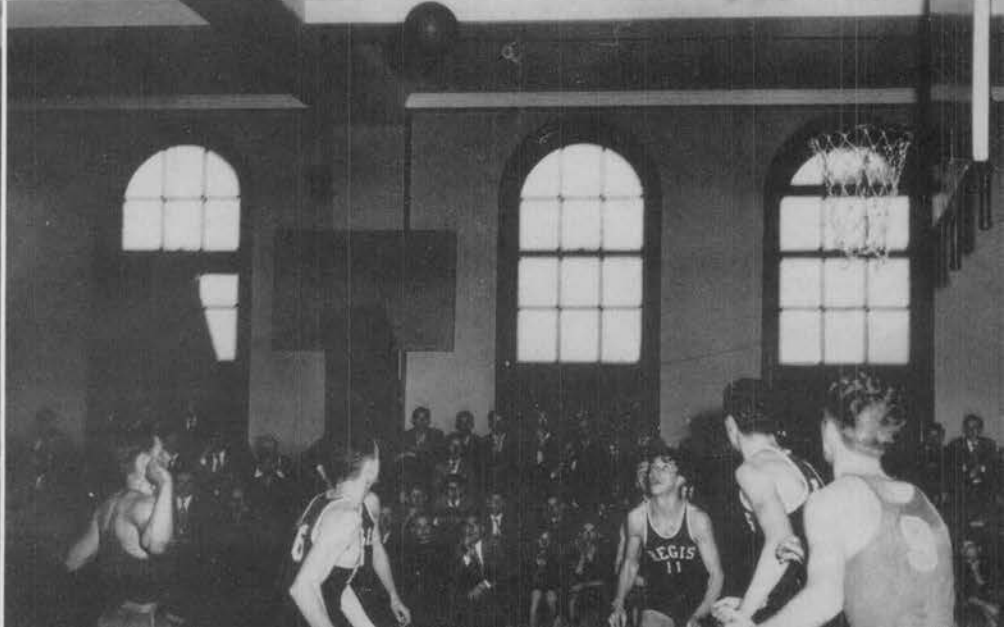
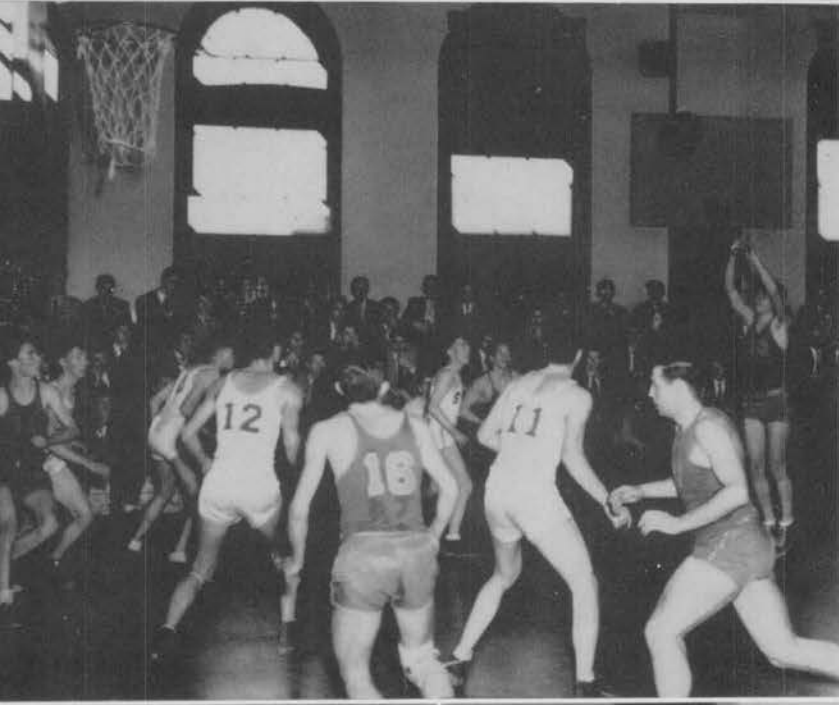

FRESHMAN BASKETBALL



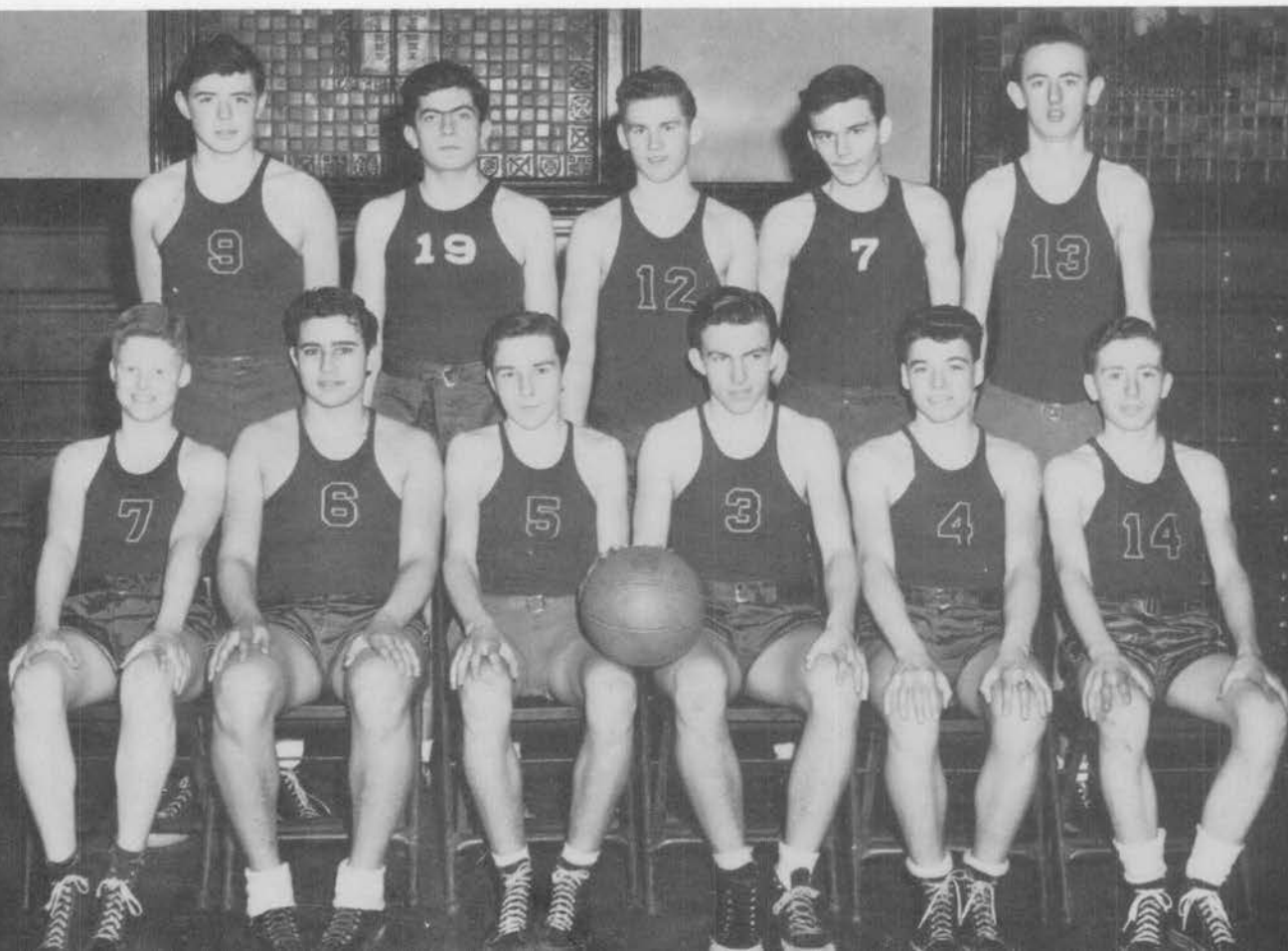

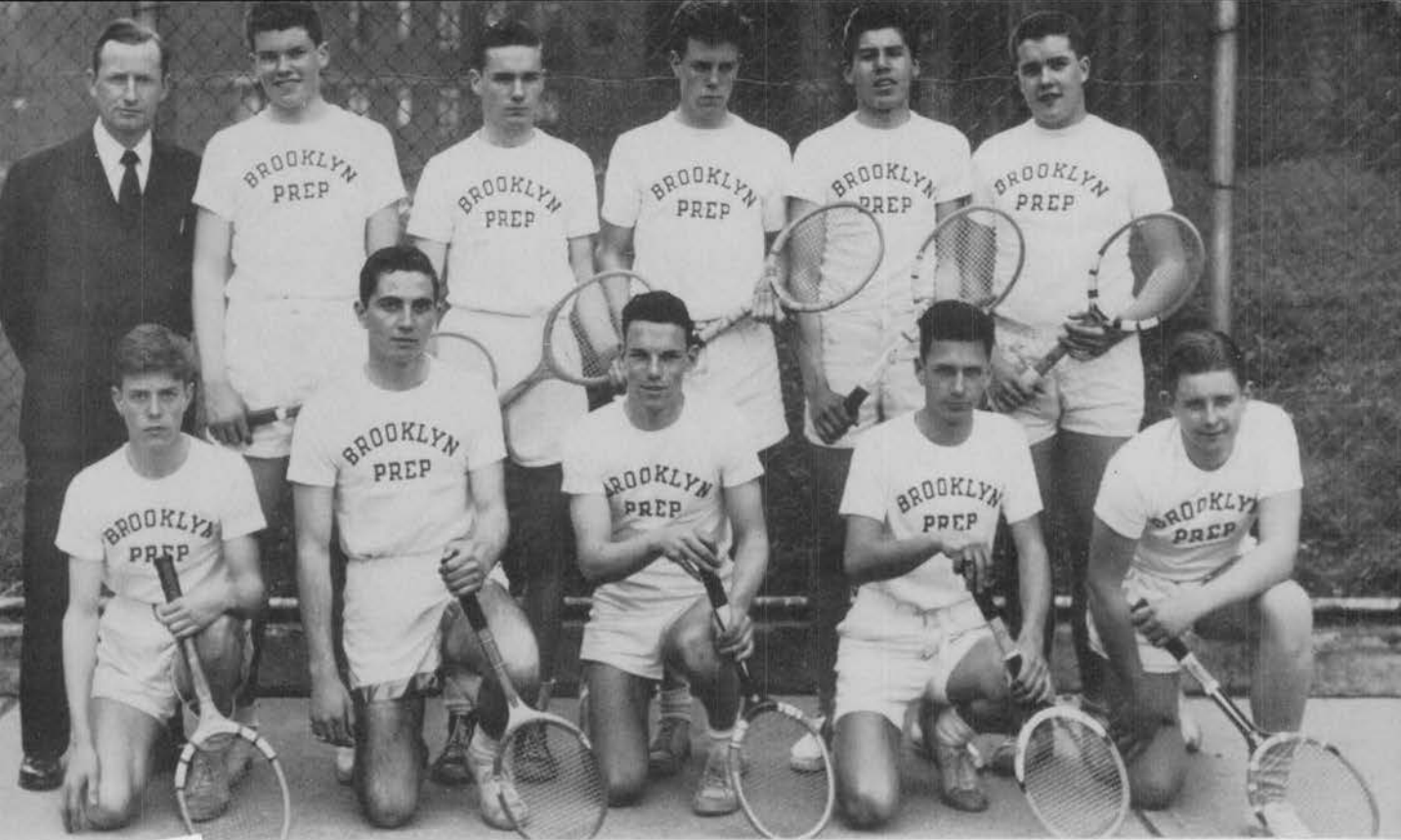


BOWLING

Tom Molanphy led the pack with his high average of 154 and Tony Salamone took individual game honors with 210.



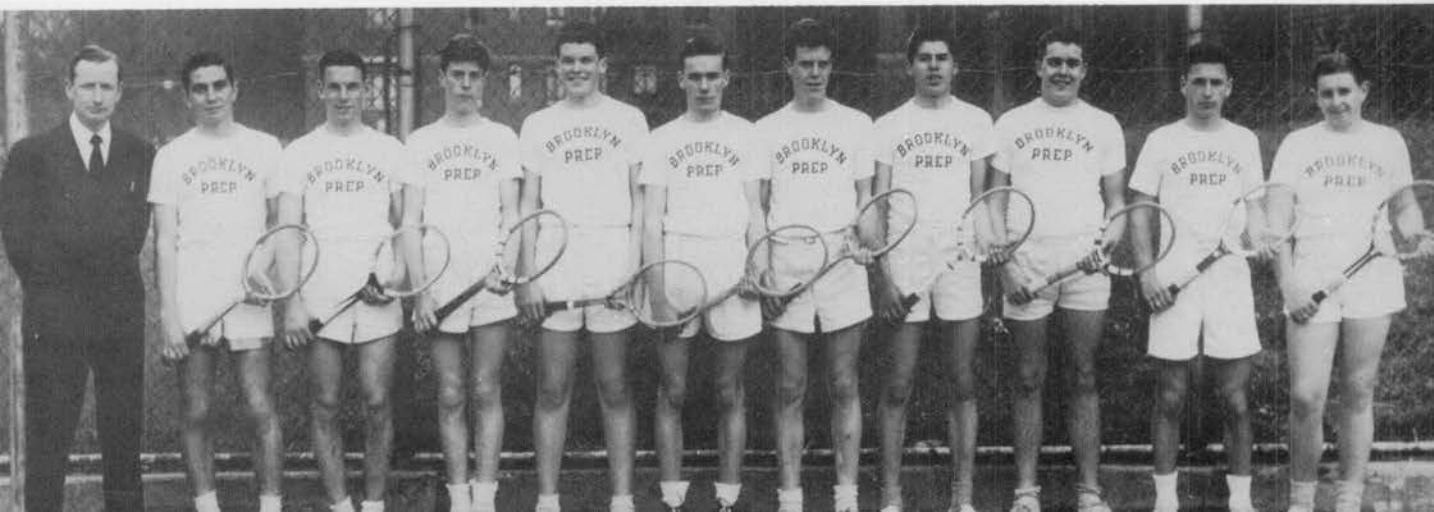


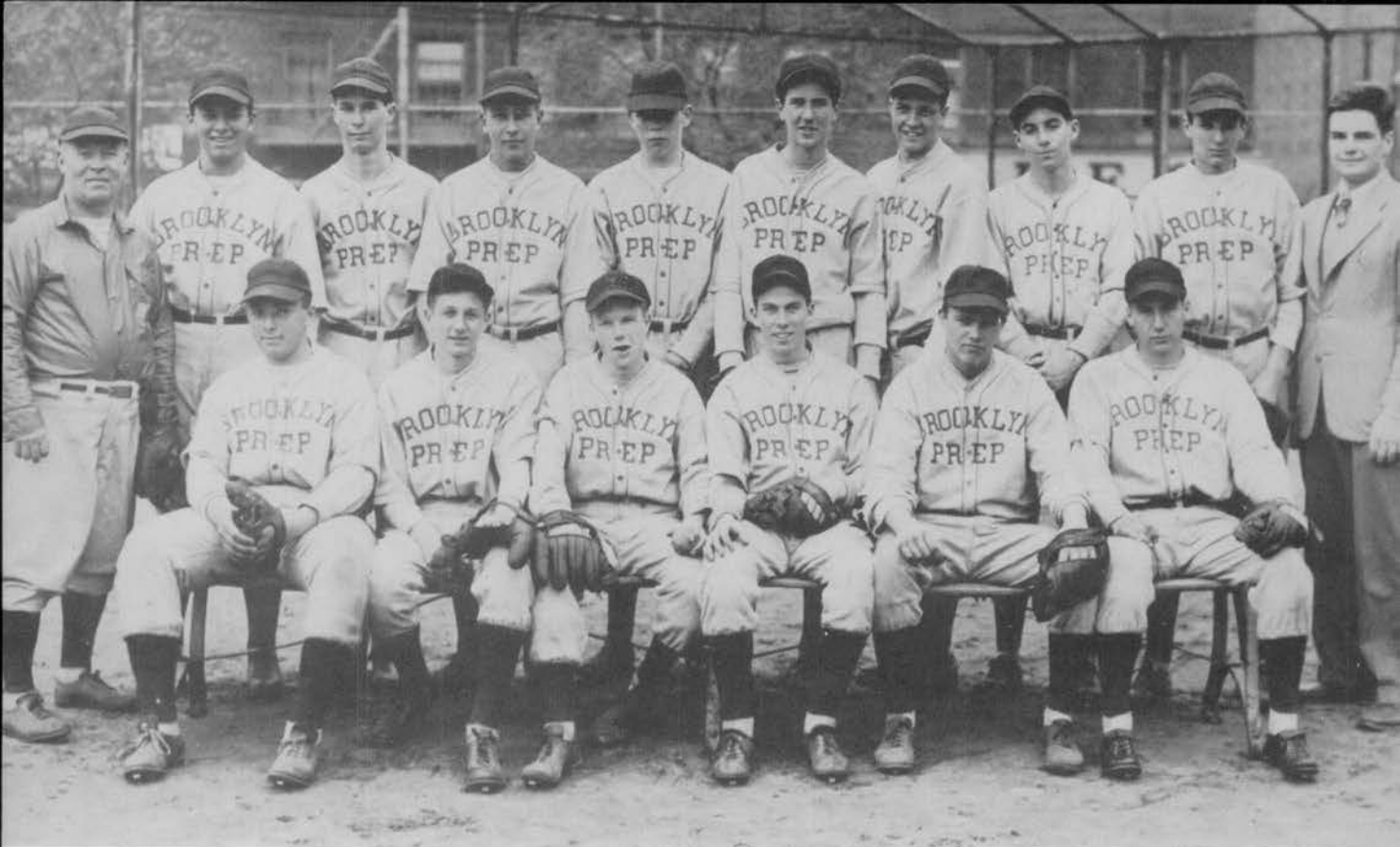
TENNIS
