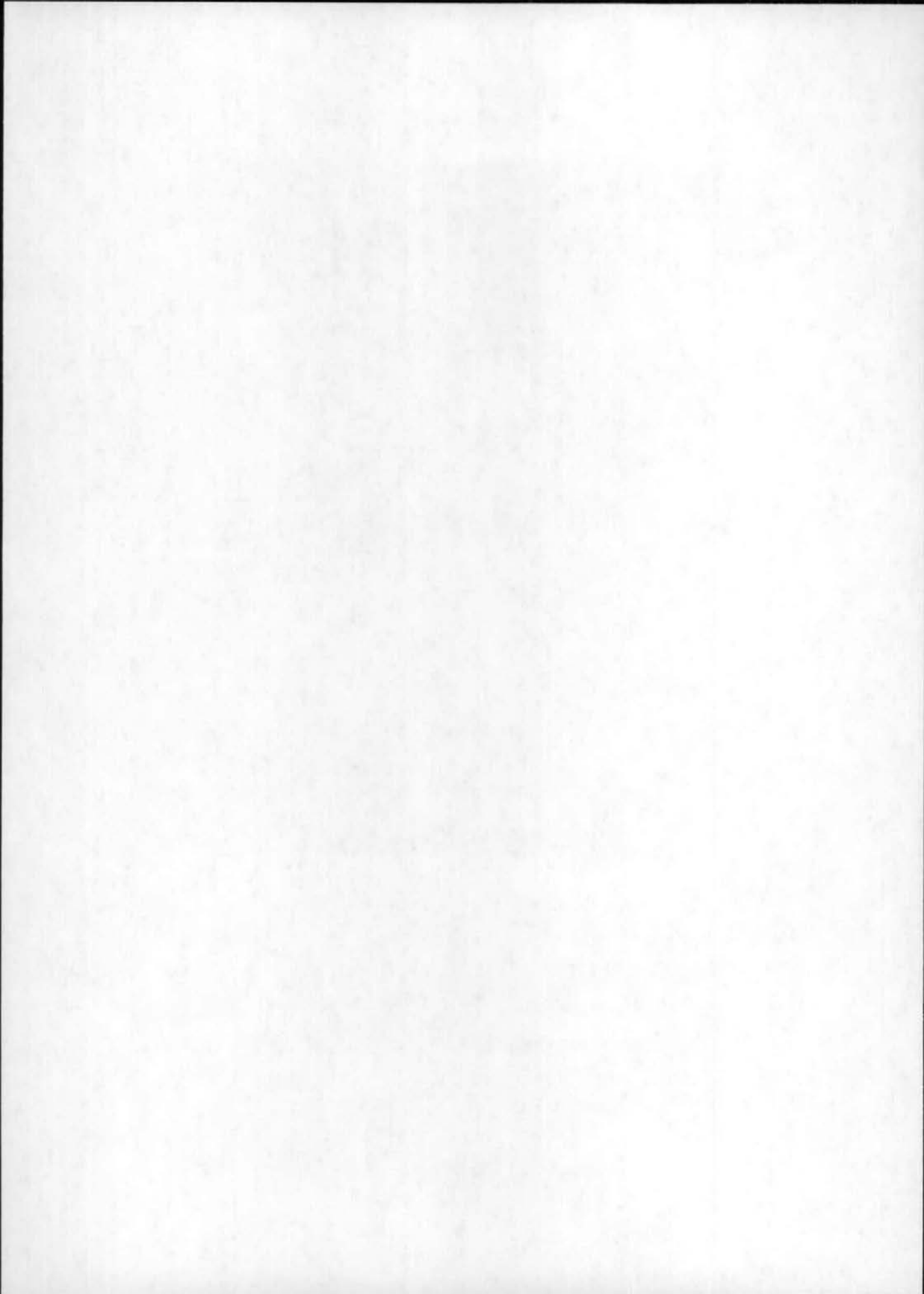

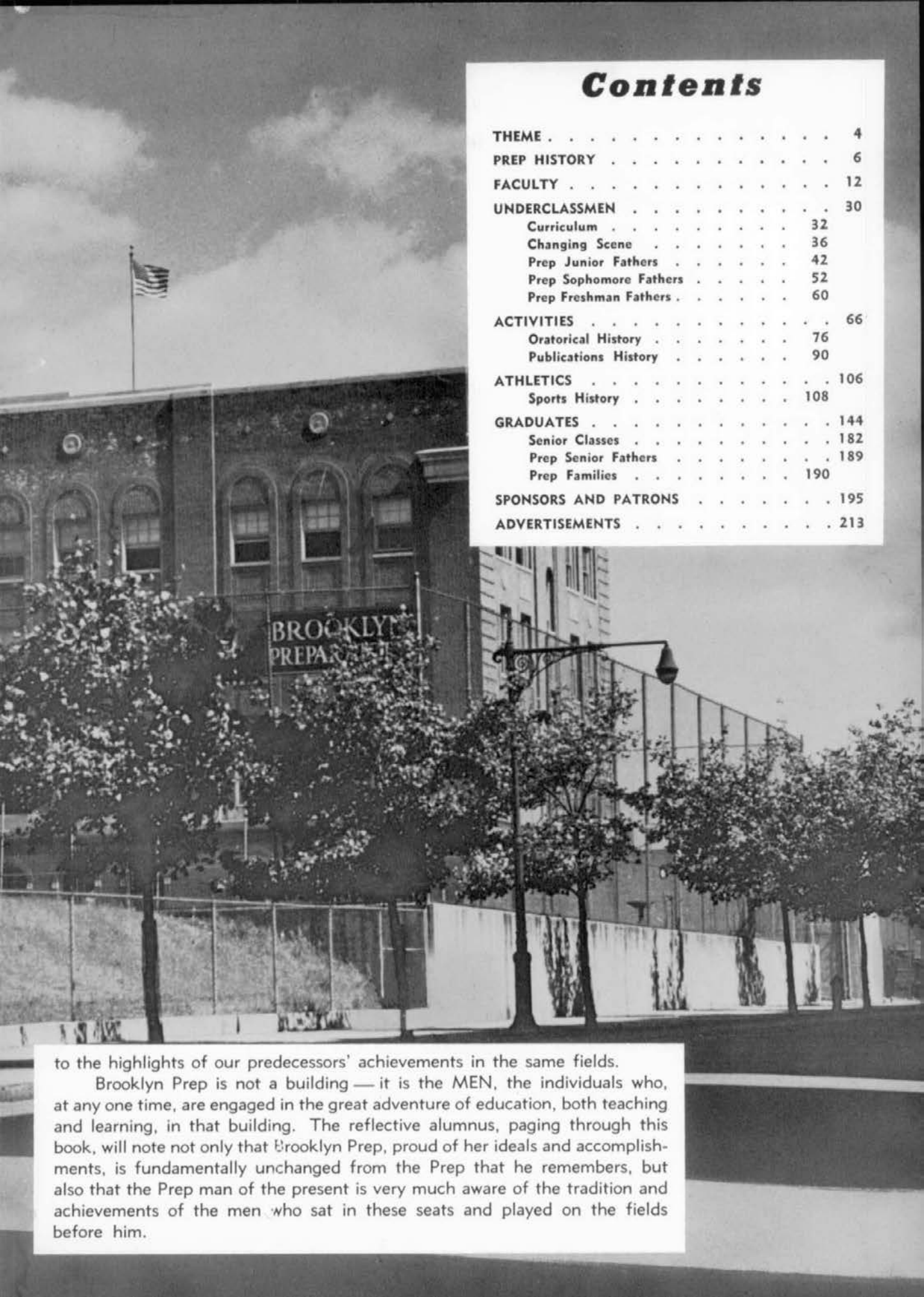

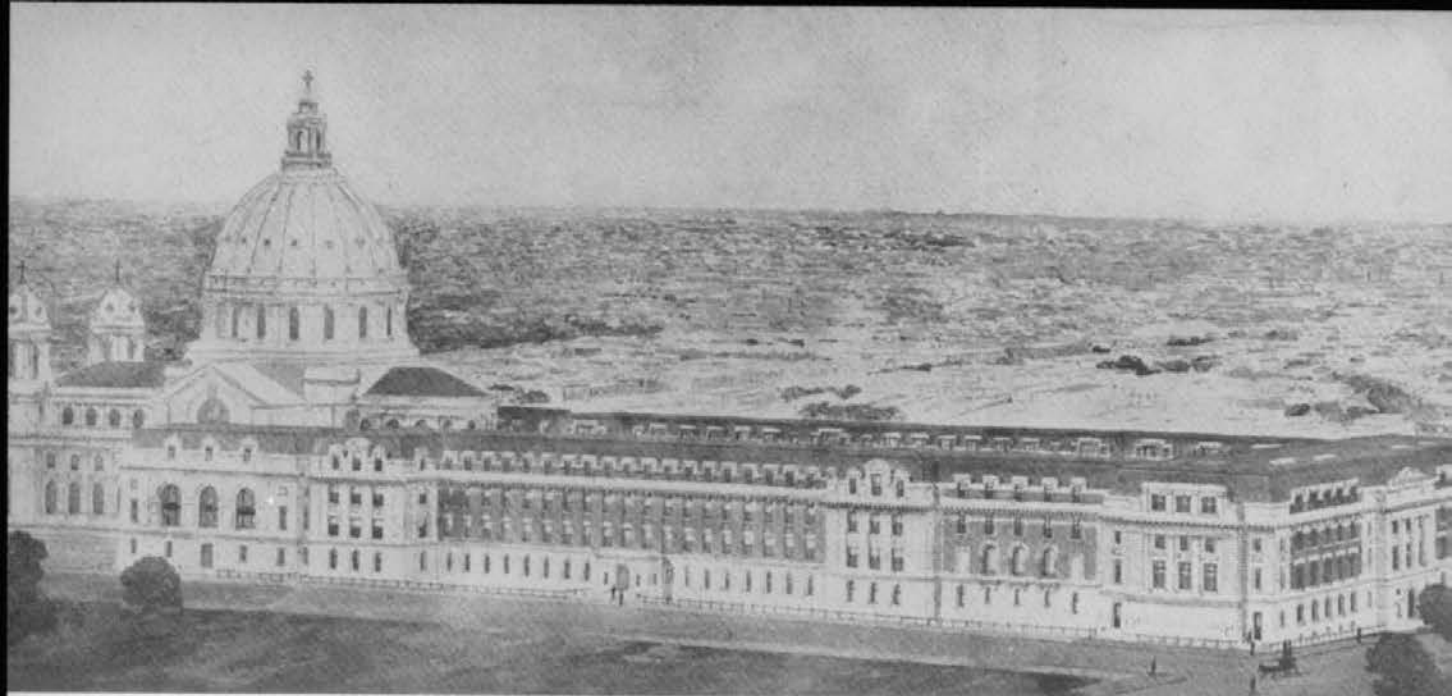

Brooklyn Prep is not a building — it is the MEN, the individuals who, at any one time, are engaged in the great adventure of education, both teaching and learning, in that building. The reflective alumnus, paging through this book, will note not only that Brooklyn Prep, proud of her ideals and accomplishments, is fundamentally unchanged from the Prep that he remembers, but also that the Prep man of the present is very much aware of the tradition and achievements of the men who sat in these seats and played on the fields before him.

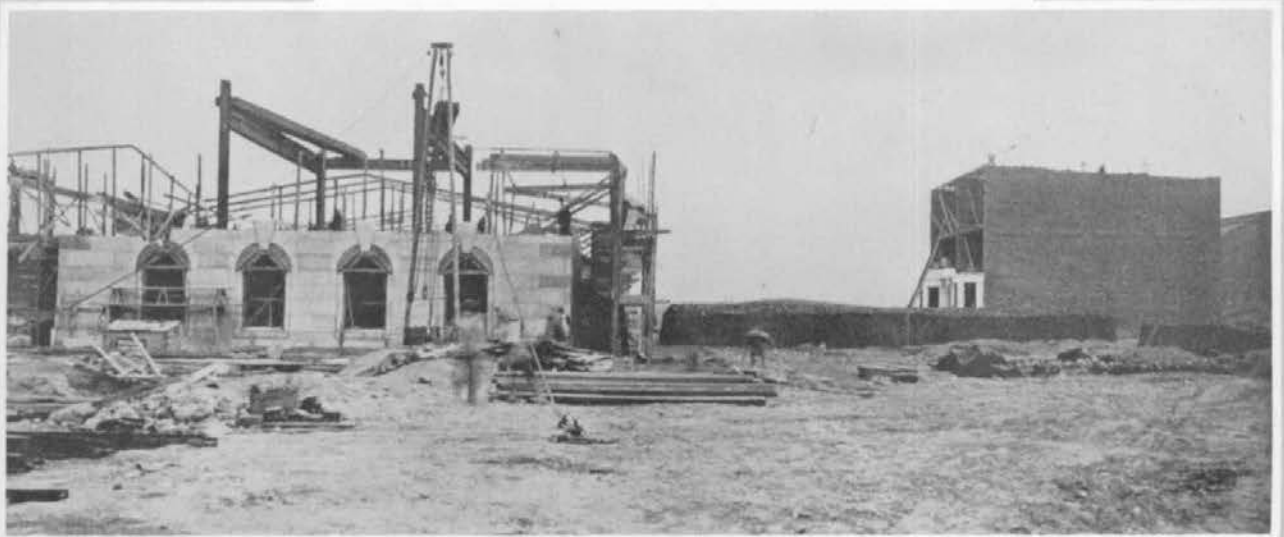

the building of Brooklyn College, including two years of grammar school, a preparatory school, and a college. One relic of those days which still endures is the BC monogram on the glass of the front door, which dates back to the days when Prep was known as Brooklyn College. The original plans called for a spacious college, a huge square building encircling the entire block, climaxed by a white-domed basilica. However, World War I and the drafting of college students brought unavoidable modification to those plans.

The original building was part of the section which faces Carroll Street, measuring 40 by 200 feet. The portion extending from the front door towards Rogers Avenue was not built until 1928, when the new wing of classrooms and the gym-auditorium were also added. The old wing standing alone for twenty years, housed both college and Prep students, but did not include living quarters for the Jesuit faculty, who lived across the street at 1125 in the two buildings which are now a convent for the Dominican Sisters teaching at Bishop McDonnell High School.

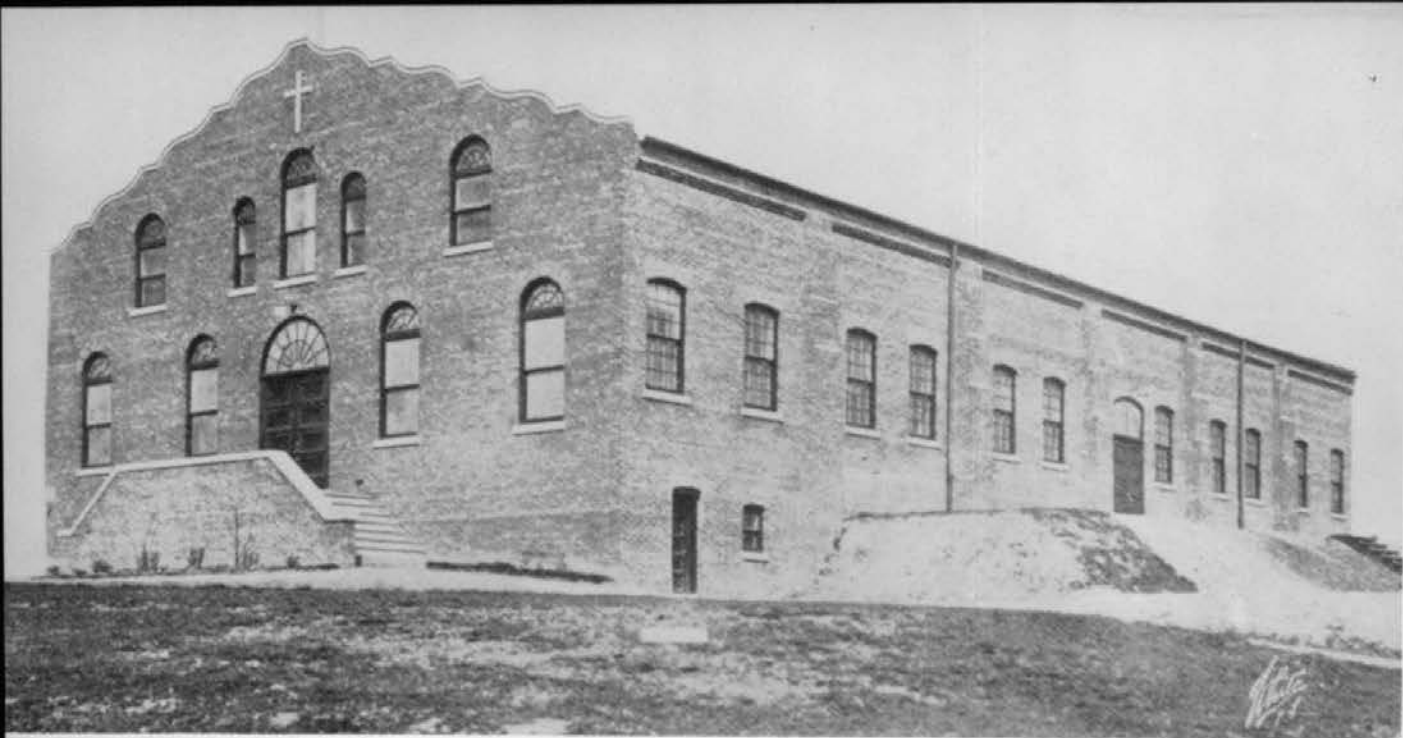
Where the cafeteria is now situated was originally the site of the Prep chapel, until the parish church of St. Ignatius was erected. The space on the second floor above the library was a biology



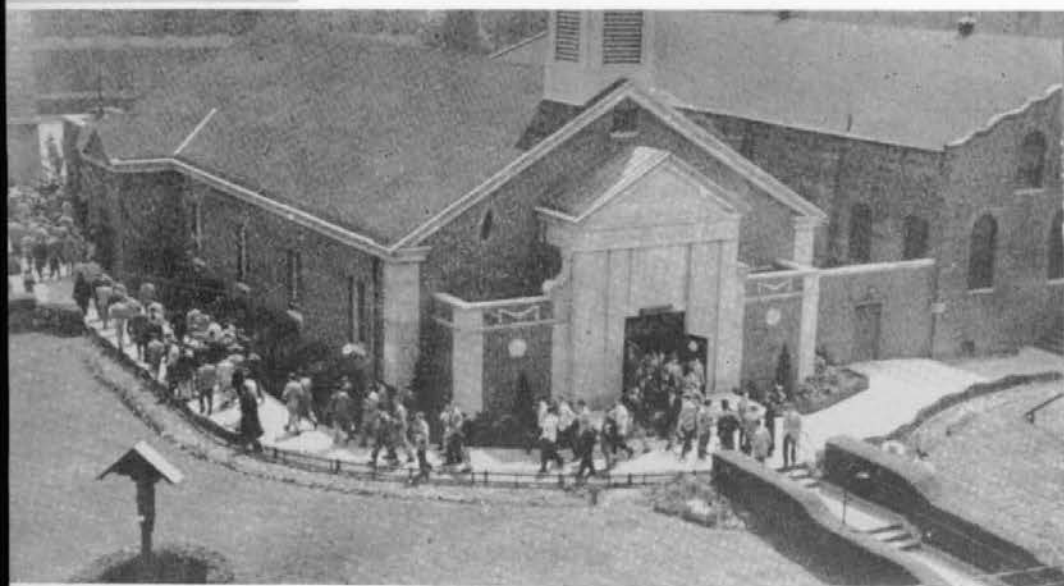

The quadrangle was added at the same time as the new wing (right).

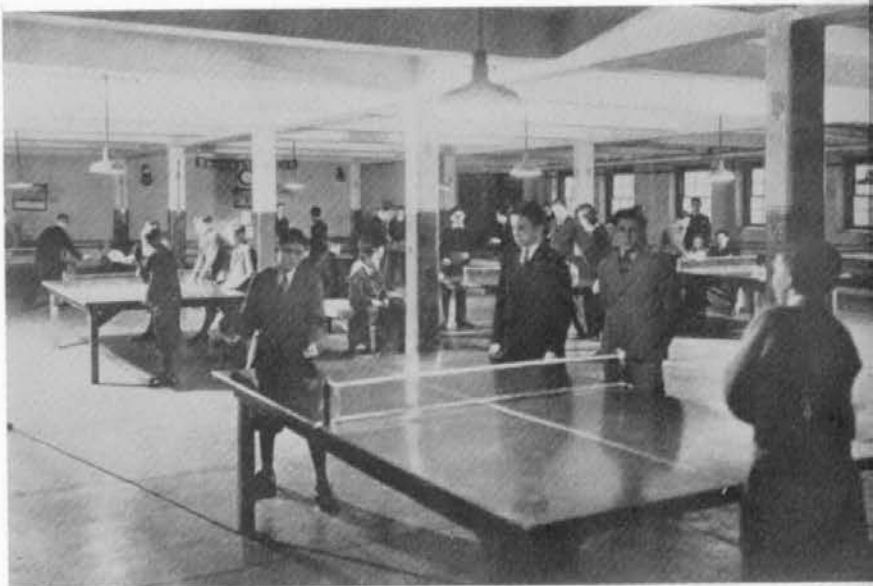


lecture room. The present Registrar's office was the office of the Rector and Headmaster, while the current Headmaster's office was a college classroom and, after school hours, the "jug room," connecting as it still does, with the office of the Prefect of Discipline, which always has been, is, and no doubt ever shall be located right there, relentless against the ravages of time and crime.

At the Nostrand Avenue end of the first floor, now the library, was an auditorium, small but sufficient at the time, with a stage on the Rogers Avenue side. Under it, in a small basement room, reposed a seismograph, which was rendered ineffectual, after a few years, by the thundering of the Nostrand Avenue trolleys.

Prep's first cornerstone was put in place by Bishop McDonnell on the twenty-fourth of April, 1908. At the ceremony were read messages from Pope Pius X and President Theodore Roosevelt, expressing congratulations and hopes for the school's success. In September of that year the high school was opened for enrollment, with five dollars as the entrance fee and twenty-five dollars as the quarterly tuition.

On June 15, 1909, the first commencement exercises were held. The infant Prep had survived its first year, and looked ahead, with faith and hope in God, to many thriving years of contribution to Catholic education in Brooklyn.



What is now the locker room, in the basement of the new wing, was furnished with gleaming new ping-pong tables in 1937. At the time, lockers lined the corridors; they were moved downstairs in 1947.

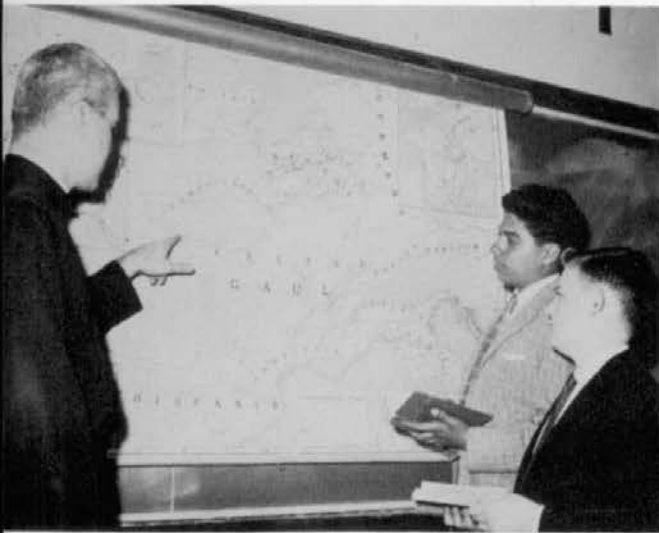
*THEY MADE ME TAKE GREEK

°THEY MADE ME TAKE SCIENCE

Ever since my sophomore year at Prep my goal in life has been to be an English teacher. With literature in mind I concentrated on the classics since an A.B. Greek course in college was most valuable for the English major. I never intended to let Mathematics or Science predominate in my schedule primarily because of a lack of desire and ability. Late in my junior year I was told I'd be a member of a new accelerated senior class. My immediate thought, of more English, was shattered by the prospect of more Science. I began September with the idea that Science and Math were necessary evils: along with Shakespeare, Ibsen and Shaw came permutations, electrolysis and the Kinetic theory.

Now after six months of senior year, I'd like to alter my opinion on Science in general. Of course I still have the ambition for literature and teaching but now I consider Science essential for that goal. The benefit of science for me has been intangible but invaluable. Long after my mind has clouded over tangents and graphs, there will remain behind the qualities of order and perception—qualities which are basic to any student of literature. This I feel is the value of science for the non-scientist. I know I shall retain it always.



Increased emphasis on science in recent years trains Prep men for modern needs without sacrificing literary schooling necessary for men of any age.

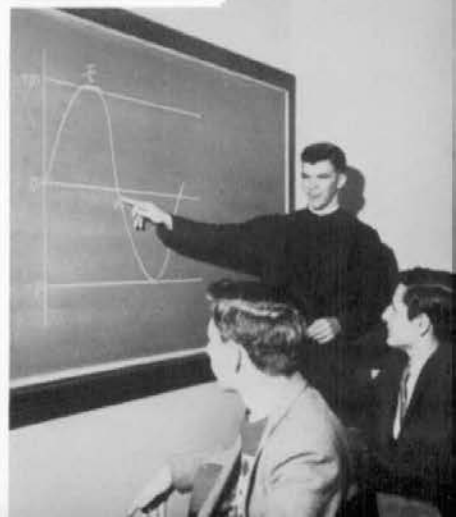


Regular laboratory work in both Physics and Chemistry enables Prep men to experience first-hand the fundamental problems of these sciences.

Graphic illustration of mathematical exactitude, through four years' training in algebra, geometry and trigonometry, introduces students to this rapidly developing science.



The beginning of Greek in second year, cementing the habits of precise thought first laid in the study of Freshman Latin, lays the groundwork for contact with ancient Greece through Homer in third and fourth years.





Constant practice in written self-expression, beginning with grammatical fundamentals in Freshman year, aims to produce men with the ability to produce clearly and vividly what they have experienced in their other studies.

Sophomores probe more deeply and widely into the field of literature, with emphasis on constant private reading, and try to appreciate the nature of the drama, experiencing Shakespeare, as here, as more than mere reading.



Seniors dispense to a large extent with classroom reading, instead report on and discuss their opinions of what has been assigned to be read privately.



The catechetical method necessary for a firm knowledge of basic doctrine is stressed through the first three years of Religion, which is complemented by fuller explanation by one of the priests of the faculty every week, but Seniors delve more deeply into the rational explanations of their faith.



Three years of the study of History, including the writing of term papers, enable Prep men to appreciate more fully the significance of the world they are growing up in.

Two or three years' training in a modern foreign language, both in writing and speaking, adds another dimension to the education of the Prep man.

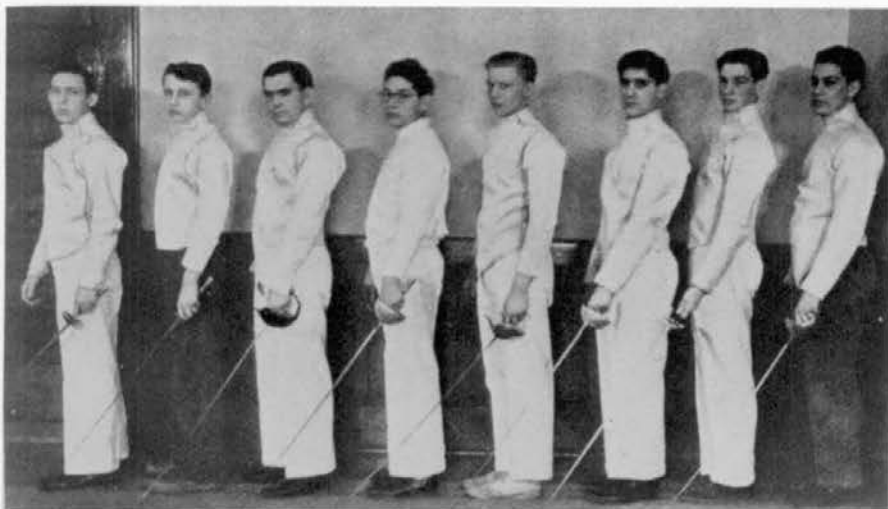

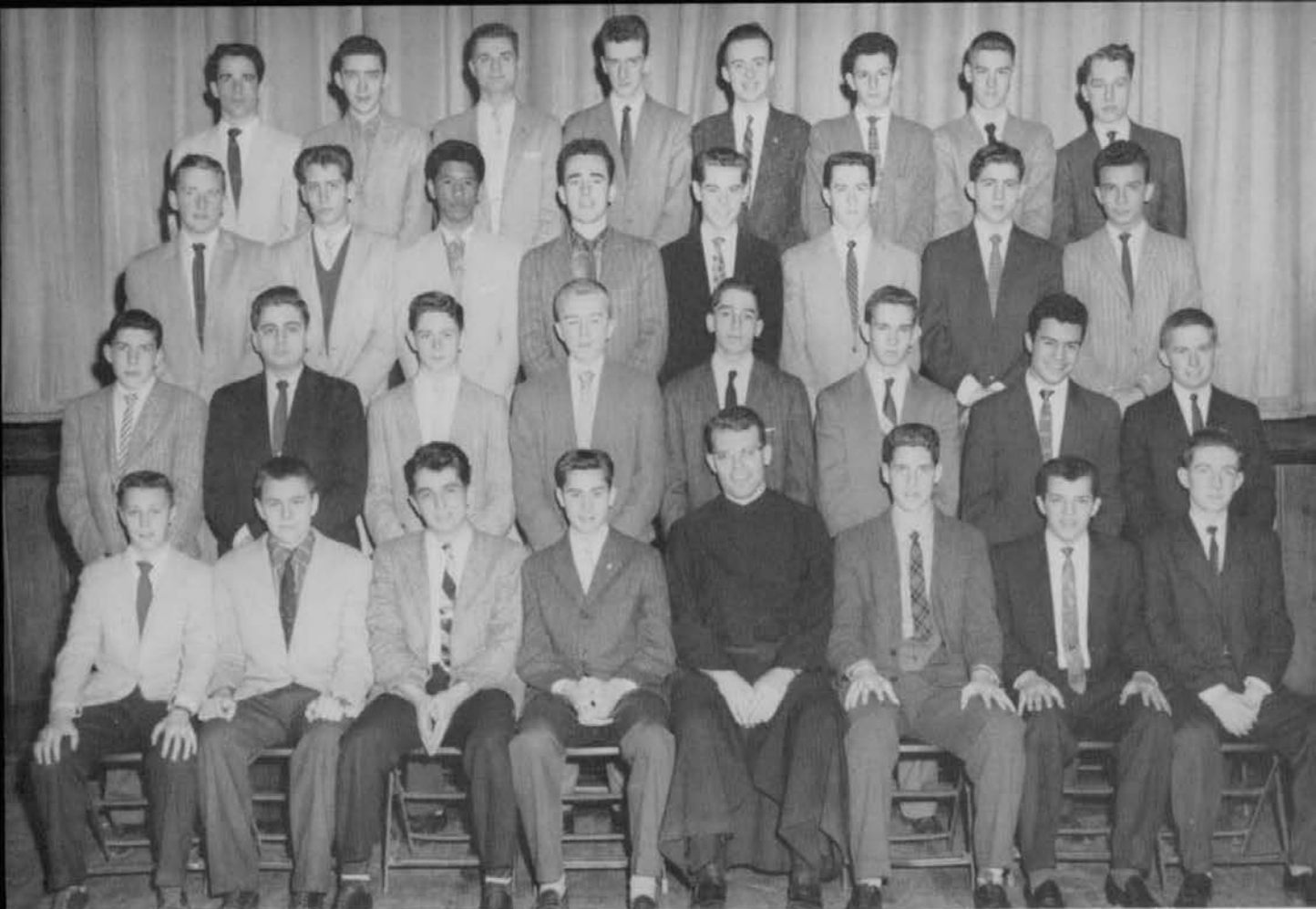

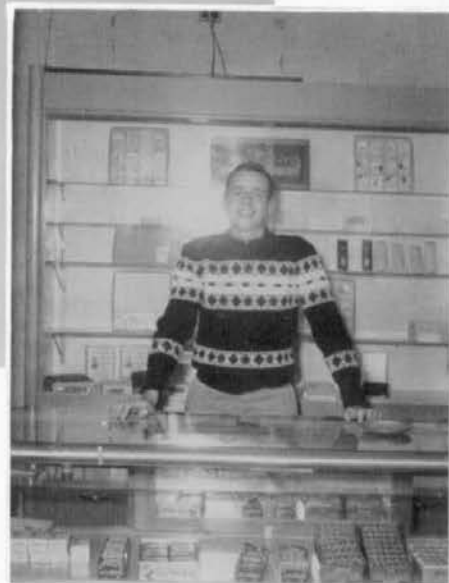

It has always been considered at Prep only a logical extension of mental training to instill oral ability to express the results of that training. Consequently, the achievement of rhetorical proficiency has always ranked high in the hierarchy of Prep activities. The three activities most directly aimed at developing rhetorical skills are Dramatics, Debating, and Oratory, all of which have proud records at Prep.

In the original building plan Brooklyn Prep was to include its own theater on Roger Avenue. Although the theater was never constructed, Prep nevertheless boasts an enviable history of theatrical accomplishments.

The present custom of producing a Shakespearean play each year, initiated by Mr. Charles Winans of the Prep faculty, has flourished for only four years, but its roots extend back to 1929, when the Bard's mood Dane, Hamlet, in the person of William Rorke captivated Prep audiences. While a list of the plays presented in the interim does not do justice to the thousands of hours of rehearsal or to the many stirring performances produced, it is noteworthy for the sheer variety of choice throughout the past several decades.

On February 28, 1913, the first chapter of the Brooklyn Prep Debating Society was held.

or the "cultivation of eloquence and the promotion of knowledge," with Frank Heinz presiding and Father Walsh, S.J. acting as moderator. The list of the subjects debated during the half century mirrors the climates of an era of growth and easy spending, of two World Wars, of economic depression, and of atomic discoveries. Included on the list is a topic of the day forty years ago: "Resolved, that equal suffrage should be granted to women in the United States."

Sowing the seeds of triumph during many grueling hours of fact-finding and speech polishing, Prep debaters have continually reaped their harvest of trophies in tournaments from Worcester to Washington, and as far west as Chicago, reaching a peak last year as champions of New York State.

On frequent occasions, too, Prep has been represented in individual oratorical competition at the finals of New York City and the state, but it was David Leahy, '55, who climbed the national heights in that department. Triumphant in county and city competitions, Dave swept through the state and regional contests to the national finals in Kansas City. There, pitted against the three other regional winners of the country, Dave finished second, missing by one slim point the title of National High School Oratorical Champion.

Debaters, Orators Continue Winning Ways

The speakers representing Prep in Debating and Oratory this year were faced with the task of sustaining or, if possible, of improving the records of the activity that has in recent years been the most successful in the school. While triumph in the two talent-packed tournaments of St. Peter's College and Georgetown University, each captured by Prep debaters the two preceding years, and the oratorical heights attained by Dave Leahy, '55, and Bob Bennett, '57, eluded them, Prep speakers, both in debating and oratory, posted outstanding records for the year.

In fourteen tournaments, Prep debaters, arguing the pros and cons of the national topic of foreign aid, averaged a rank of between second and third; the excellence of this showing is illustrated by fact that the average number of competing schools was between twenty and twenty-one. The tournaments they won were those held at Holy Cross College, in which nineteen invited teams took part, Red Bank Catholic High School (18), and St.

Joseph's College of Philadelphia (29). The debaters also scored three second places, one in the Catholic Forensic League Grand Tournament, in which sixteen teams were entered. In addition, the Novice debating team, composed of Sophomores, kept Prep in the limelight by winning the New York State tournament finals in Albany.

When they turned their attention to oratory, the speakers were only slightly less successful. George Loehr won first place in the Brooklyn—Staten Island American Legion Contest, and finished third in the Long Island bracket. Mike Ryan posted a second in the Catholic Forensic League competition, and a third in the Grand Tournament. Tom Collins was first in another league tournament, with Frank McGrath third, and Brian Griffin finished fifth of 120 contestants in the tournament at Mary Louis Academy. In addition, McGrath was elected chairman of the first Student Congress, and, with Collins and Griffin, was nominated to the National Student Congress.

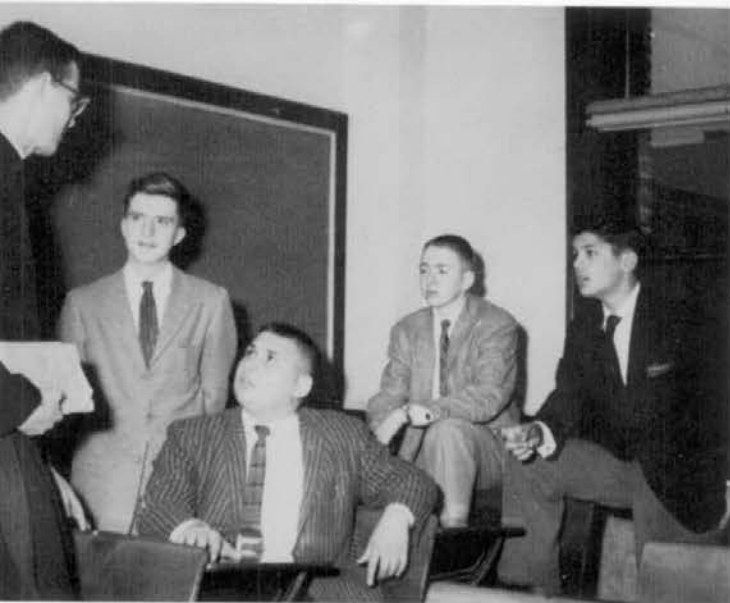

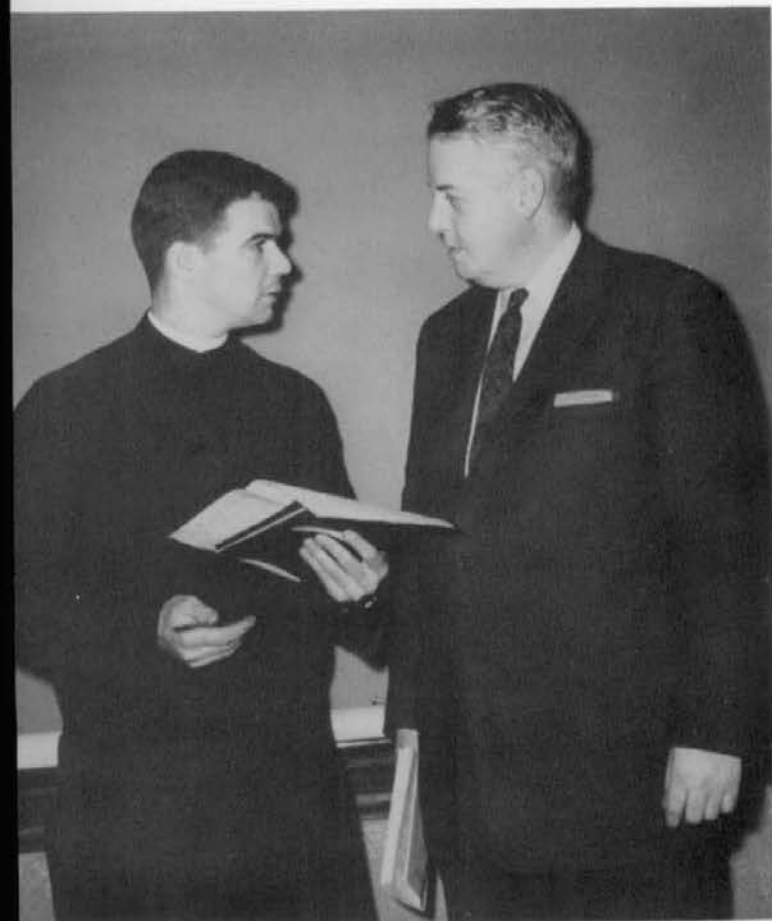

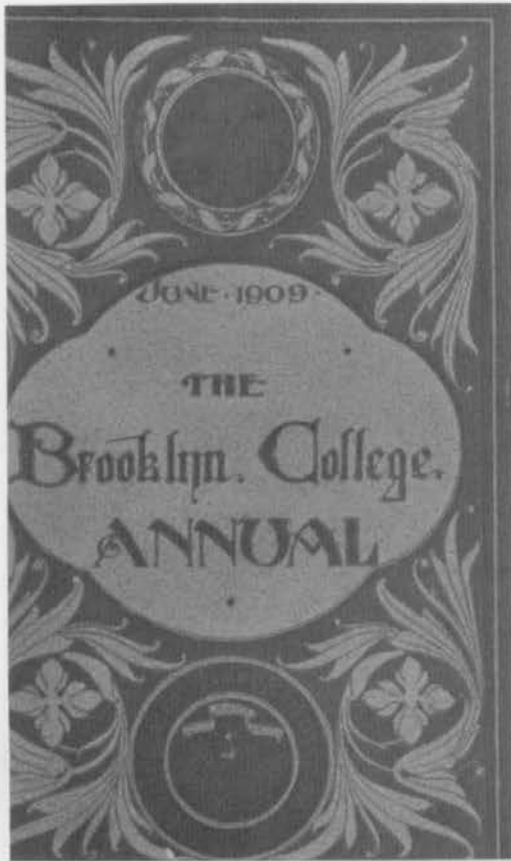

Three Publications

To trace the history of Brooklyn Prep as it is lived each day, to keep a permanent record of the school's outstanding personalities, to discover how each generation of Prep men has responded to the high ideals set before them — such has been the purpose of Prep's journalistic publications over the years. There are now three official student publications at Prep, the Blue Jug, the Brooklyn Prep Magazine, and the Blue Book. Their beginnings and development attest to the steadily increasing interest and proficiency of Prep in the realm of undergraduate journalism.

On the first pages of the Brooklyn College Annual begins the first chapter in the history of Brooklyn Prep's writing tradition. In the first yearbook the Editorial Board, joined Francis X. Doyle, S.J., the first moderator, in the delightful misery of meeting a looming deadline. These annuals, however, published from 1909 till 1918, differed a great deal from the yearbooks we have today. They consisted of a very few rigidly-posed photographs, bio-

graphics, creative writing, class write-ups and club and team records throughout the year. From 1919 till 1927 we had no yearbooks at all except for field outing (boatride) annuals, heavily larded with advertisements, in '22, '23, and '24. The Blue Book as it first appeared in 1928, is a recognizable predecessor of the modern Blue Book, but greatly altered in design and content through the years, chiefly due to the vast strides during that time in the field of photography. In recent years, the Blue Book has regularly been awarded citations for excellence.

Recording the deeds of Prep men who broke records, who accumulated debating trophies and produced dramatic triumphs, and who gave their lives in defense of their country, Prep yearbook editors have forged a chain of memories and simple sentimentalities which fifty senior classes have experienced, but which each holds as original and sacred. The members of each year's staff have left for their posterity a record of their spirit and



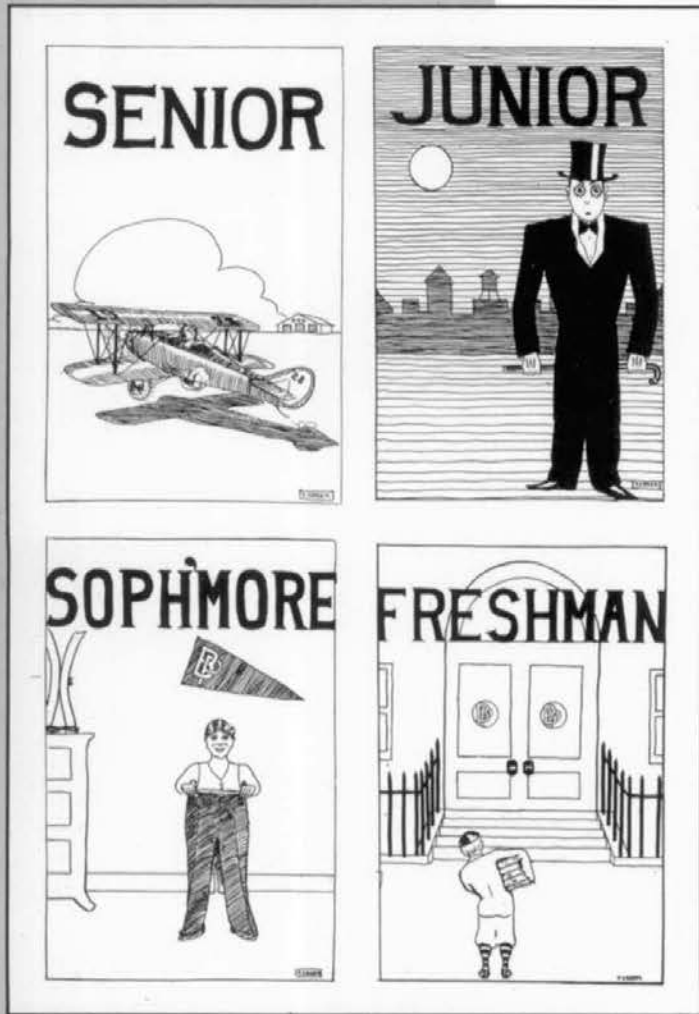

deeds which now affords to that posterity, the Prep men of today, a tangible link with Prep's treasured past.

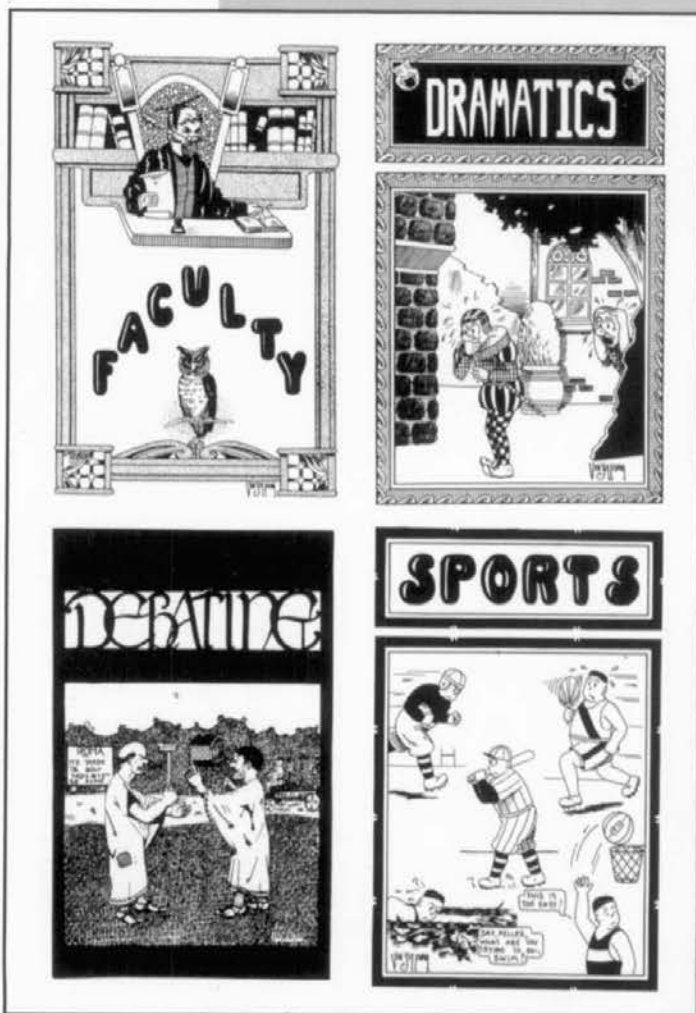
Six months before the Great Depression, our school newspaper, the Blue Jug, emerged to give current and frequent reporting on the daily events at Prep. On April 10, 1929, when the Blue Jug first made its appearance, financed by student subscriptions, the goal was immediately set: "to record the efforts of present Prepmen to uphold the glorious past." Editor-in-Chief S. Murray McCoy, now a renowned Brooklyn surgeon, began at a fast and steady pace to achieve that goal. Now, three decades later, the presses still roll out expert coverage on Prep activities, as well as forthright, intelligent editorials for Prep students by Prep students.

In the Fall of 1951, Fr. J. Vincent Watson, S.J. issued a new challenge. From the ranks of Prep men, talented writers, one hundred strong, rose to the task of editing a school magazine, completely original and revolution-



ary in its field, presenting feature articles of historical, educational and cultural interest, personality profiles, and literary composition in prose and poetry. With Donald O'Brien at the newly-shellacked editor's desk, the Brooklyn Prep Magazine won the Georgetown University award for the best high school accomplishment of that year. In its seven years of existence, the Magazine has five times won the highest national award for a magazine in its field, the "Medalist" rating of Columbia Scholastic Press Association, as well as top acclaim from both the Catholic and the Empire State scholastic press associations.

On the pages of each bound volume of the Blue Book, Blue Jug, and Magazine, each recording from its own appropriate perspective what has been memorable at Prep, are recorded remarkable tradition, great achievements and man-size challenges met and mastered. The history of our journalistic publications is the history of the spirit of Prep, gleaming and vibrant on each printed page.

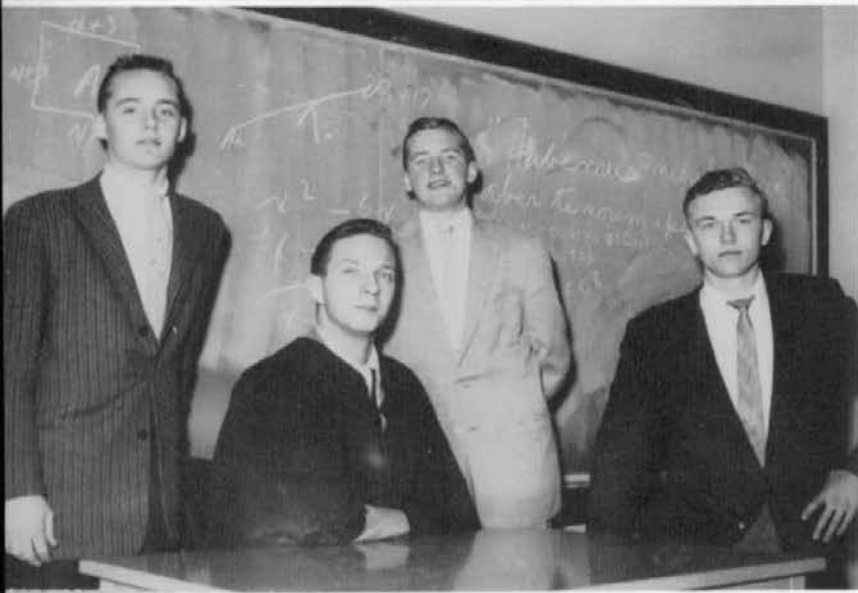

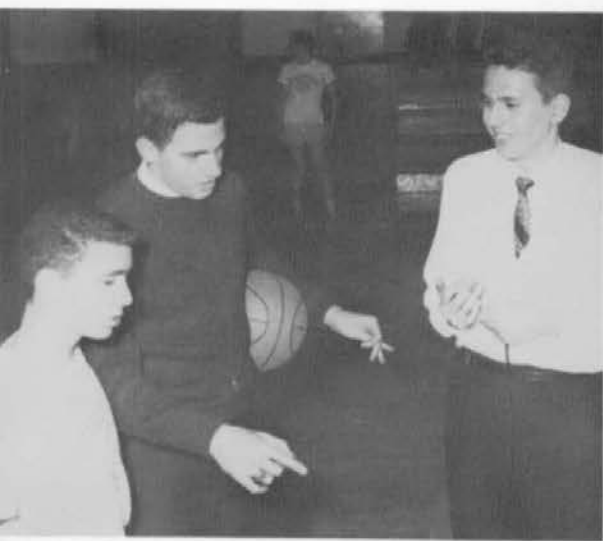

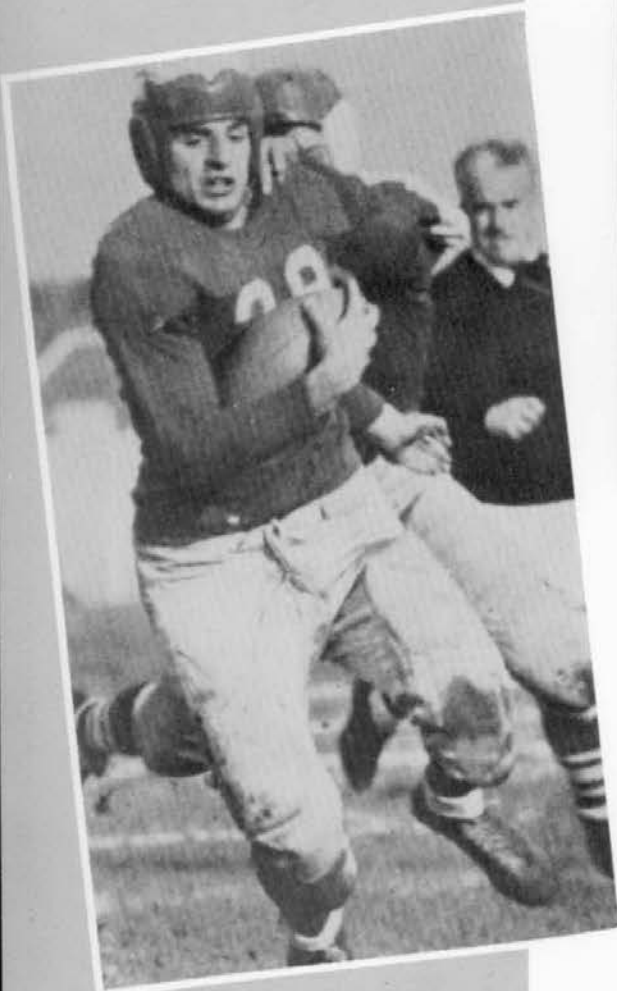

As Brooklyn Prep completes its first half-century, its alumni, students and faculty can look back with pride on a colorful and spectacular era of high school sports. Down through the years, Brooklyn has made its mark in every sport and has played a major role in inter-scholastic athletics of New York City.

Since football was just as popular a high school sport in 1908 as it is today, Brooklyn Prep fielded a football team as soon as its doors were opened. That first team, led by Harry Walsh and featuring the three McNulty brothers in the backfield, had a break-even record. Father John O'Hurley, S.J., Prep's Treasurer, who played for the losing St. Francis Prep against that team, remembers them as a tough, bruising squad. After the first game, an 11-4 loss to Commercial High, the Brooklyn Eagle reported, "The showing made by the Prep School was remarkable, when it is considered that that institution only opened in September last." Prep won its second game, against Heffley Institute, 51-0. In that same season, the Xavier and Fordham series were inaugurated, the former in victory, 33-0, the latter in defeat, 27-2.

1914 saw the beginning of the great rivalry — the annual Prep vs. St. John's grid contest, which Prep never lost until 1932. During that time, Prep met with phenomenal success and became well known for its spirit and sound athletic ability. The Eagles played almost all of the schools in Brooklyn, including Erasmus, New Utrecht, and many other present PSAL members. For many years they reigned as borough champions.

The days of the depression saw the first loss to St. Francis (1933), as well as to St. John's. 1934 was a good football year, but the next six seasons witnessed a downhill trend in Prep's football record until, in 1939, the Eagles didn't win a single game.

The forties provided the best of modern Prep football. The Blue and White lost only one game out of ten in 1944, and again reigned as city champs. The following year, they broke even, but tied the favored St. John's, 6-6, in one of the most exciting games played in the Thanksgiving series. Captain George Paterno, now Prep's assistant football coach, won the game's Most Valuable Player trophy for himself and the moral victory for Prep by his great

playing. In 1946, Prep posted an outstanding triumph in beating Chaminade, Long Island Champion, 13-7, but the season ended in a heart-breaking 20-19 loss to St. John's. One of the stars of that team, Dick Reilly, is now the Head Coach back at Prep.

The 1947 season witnessed what was without a doubt the greatest team in Prep's history. It played through an undefeated and undefeated season against the strongest teams in the city, piling up 263 points to the opponents' 19. Halfback Johnny Mannix, leading scorer in the city, was named to the all-city team, along with Dick Imbornoni, quarterback, and guard Don Reilly, Dick's younger brother.

A decade of disappointment followed, during which Prep failed to post a single winning season, and lost to St. John's steadily from 1949 through 1957. Coach Reilly, however, has made great strides towards former glory in his one season, Prep's first winning one since '47, and is pointing for the most satisfying victory in history next Thanksgiving.

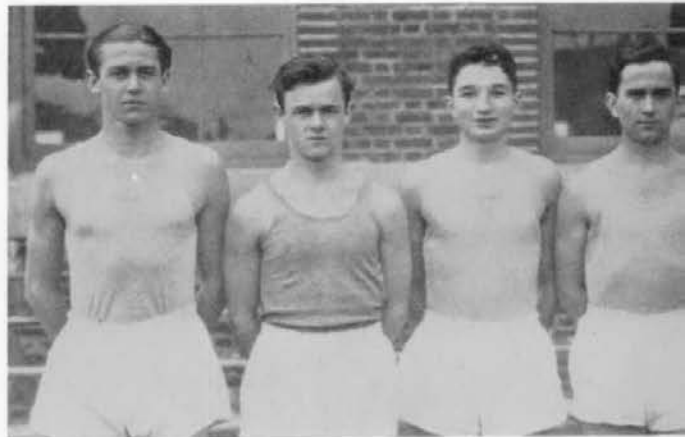

Basketball began at Crown Heights more slowly than football; not until the 1910-11 season could Prep boast a basketball team. But that team started in the proper spirit, playing in the new Loyola Hall, and finished the season with seven wins and two losses.

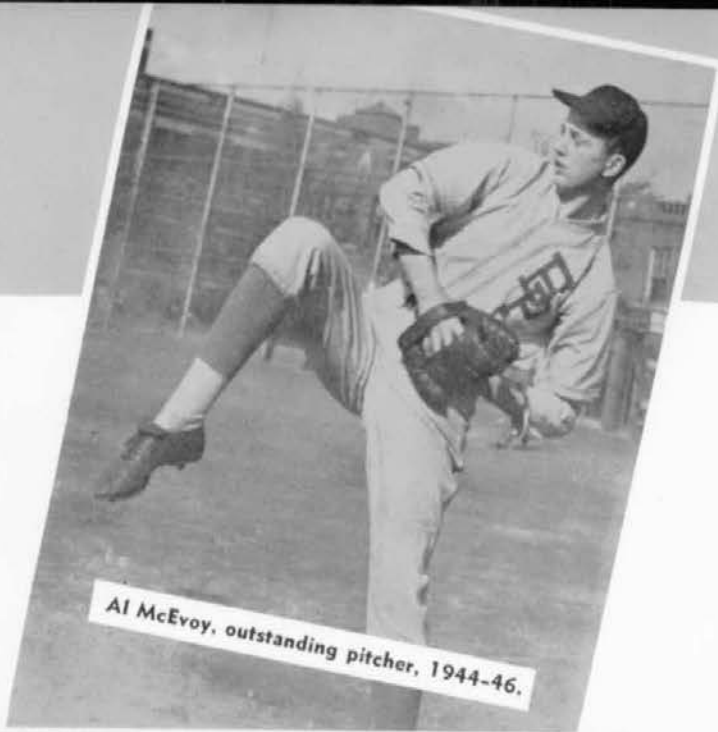
The 1928-29 team, the first to play in the present gym, finished with a .500 record. The next year, Prep's Ed Walters, with 255 points was the high scorer of the city, under Coach Joe Flanagan. Coach Henry Shanahan, taking over as coach in 1931, guided Prep through a decade of successful seasons. In 1936, Prep lost in the Jesuit Tournament finals by one

point, but the next year the Eagle five made up for it when they won the tournament in an irresistible sweep.

Throughout the forties, Prep's basketball team was hot and cold, and it was not until the 1954-5 season that Prep had a top-flight basketball squad again. Led by Luke Latkany, and under the tutelage of Coach Bill Duffy, they ran and passed through many taller and heavier teams, losing the Jesuit Tournament finals only in the second overtime period. Great as they were that day, greater tribute was paid to the Prep student body by a Jersey official, who, he said, had never seen such loyal and vociferous support of any team.

* * * *

Over the years, no other has matched track for its consistently good records. The first team (1909), with Harvey Cohn and Lawson Robertson as coaches, and James Tallent as captain, began the tradition of excellence, and the next twenty years established Brooklyn Prep as a track power.

During the '28 season, Prep won the CHSAA Senior and Junior trophies. That team, coached by Jack Kelly and led by Jack Kilgallen, also boasted the city high-jump champion, Hal Kiechlin. In 1929, Prep repeated as CHSAA Champions. One year later, Chet Maxson won the National 440-yard Championship while running for Prep, and was a member of what was called at the time "the greatest mile relay team in Prep history". Very recent teams, however, have refuted that statement.

In 1931, Jack Connor led his teammates through a very successful season and won the 100-yard dash in the CHSAA Championships. Three years later, new coach Bob Gie-

gengack, now a coach of international fame at Yale, inaugurated Cross-country at Prep. In that same year, the acquisition of a new outdoor track at Prep gave new impetus to track, now enjoying its greatest era.

By 1936, Prep had lost only one cross-country dual meet and had won six major championships. During that year, Prep became Long Island Track Champions. Captain Murtha Lawrence, Prep's present track coach, played a major role in his team's success, and set a school cross-country record that was unbroken until years later, after the course had been changed.

The next two years continued the winning trend; in fact, it wasn't until 1939 that Prep was defeated in a dual cross-country meet, the first loss in six years. But through the forties, Prep, though occasionally boasting an outstanding star, suffered an eclipse in team fortunes on the track.

In 1952, the city high-jump record of 6' 1/4", held since 1928 by Hal Kiechlin, was broken by another Prep man—Gene Kiechlin, son of the former record-holder. His height: 6' 1/2". Another Prep champion, on an even larger scale, was Gerry Salvatore, '54, who was the National Interscholastic Indoor Mile Champion.

The fact that Mr. Lawrence has built up the track and cross-country teams of the present generation to the championship caliber of years ago is attested to by the record of this year's runners, given on a later page.

* * * *

The records of Brooklyn Prep baseball are incomplete, due to the lateness of the season. We do know that in 1916, '17 and '18 Prep won the Brooklyn Championship. The teams of

1928, '29 and '30 repeated this feat.

1945 was another peak year for Prep's diamond athletes, who swept through an undefeated season to the city CHSAA Championship. Virtually the same team, however, lost the title to St. John's the next year, despite the fact that three different pitchers threw six no-hitters, with three of them to the credit of Al McEvoy, Prep's all-time star.

* * * *

The Brooklyn Prep Swimming Team began operations in 1913. For many years it remained in the background, but in 1929 Prep had a very successful season under Frank Winters, who doubled as coach and star. After two more good seasons, in 1932 Prep won the CHSAA title and broke ten scholastic records. The late thirties also saw Charlie Sheid establish the 100-yard backstroke record and Bill Madden the 50-yard freestyle mark.

The later history of Prep's swimming team concerns its most famous era. Beginning with city champion Tom O'Connor, '50, the swimmers' Golden Age hit its peak with Jim McCarthy, '53, Jack Hayman, '55, and Drury Gallagher, '56. McCarthy was captain for two years and led the team to the city championship, breaking records too numerous to mention. Gallagher and Hayman are now the mainstays of the Fordham University swimming team, and are still setting records all over the East.

The word "Sanitas" is one of the three on the seal of Brooklyn Prep, and from the record sketched above, it is clear that Prep has not neglected this aspect of the development of the full man during the fifty years of its educational life. As it enters its second fifty years, Prep is looking forward to future generations who will equal and surpass its proud records of the past.

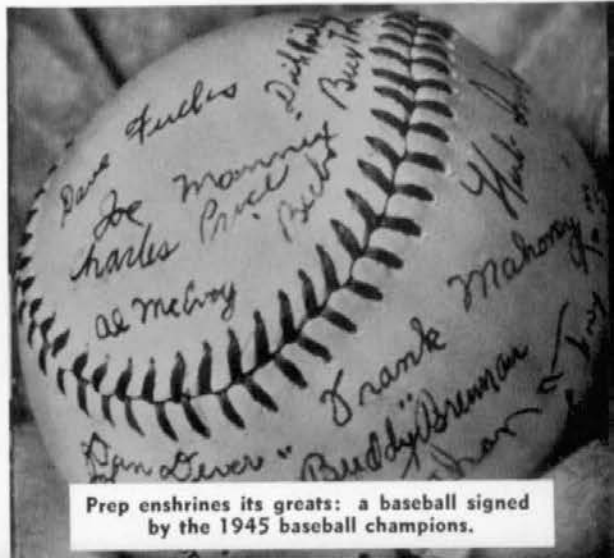

'58 Football

Haunted by losing football records throughout the last decade of its first half century, Prep looked to the 1957 team to raise its football banner to its accustomed heights and to revive a winning tradition Prep men could once again point to with pride.

In the first game, on the rain-soaked Fordham field, the team proved that the Prep ability and desire were still alive, that Prep, back in the fight for football laurels, would yield to none without a fight. Never relenting in their dogged defense, they kept pounding the heavier Fordham team till Al Milian knifed across in the fourth quarter for the lone touchdown of the day and a richly-deserved, clear-cut victory, 6-0.

The next week Prep clinched the mythical Jesuit City Championship, edging Xavier by the same 6-0 score. The finely-honed sharpness of offense looked somewhat dulled, but the defense gave little, and that grudgingly, to the Xavier attack. Finally, a wobbly, heart-stopping pass from Milian to Joe Sumperer set

up the scoring smash by Dan Russo, who earned the Rector's Trophy as the outstanding player of the game.

Pre-game statistics showed Prep inferior in every way to the next opponent, bigger, faster, experienced St. Francis. But Prep's relentless defensive heroics had fans wondering, at the half, at the 6-0 score, and though three more touchdowns in the second half gave St. Francis the game, 24-0, it was a bitterly fought contest, with every inch fiercely challenged.

After a two-week respite, a mid-season slump hit the team. Outplayed for a great part of the next game by Holy Cross, a momentary splurge of true power gave Prep a 7-6 victory. Deep in their own territory during the fourth quarter, Holy Cross, leading 6-0, found the suddenly aroused Prep line impregnable, had a punt blocked, and were scored upon on a quick handoff, all within a minute of playing time. Milian, whose end zone interception had averted one enemy touchdown, scored the

touchdown and extra point.

The slump hit its depths the next week, which saw Prep absorb a 19-7 drubbing at the hands of Seton Hall of Patchogue. Prep's fourth quarter tally, set up by John McGurk's interception and runback, was scored by John Cascone.

The determination evoked by this defeat was vented, the next week, upon LaSalle, by a score of 31-0. The scoring, spread among Russo, Milian, McGurk, Cascone and Schiebel, shared plaudits with the passing of Bill Martin, who completed ten of twelve for 197 yards and two touchdowns.

Having basked in fair weather and endured the foul, Prep approached the St. John's game determined to break the eight-year skein of St. John's successes. But an opportunist team of Redmen let Prep dominate the mid-field play and the statistics, scored on two plays from beyond midfield and one from the twenty-five, and won, 20-0.

So, successful though its fiftieth season was in ending a disastrous decade and revivifying its victorious traditions, Prep enters upon its second half-century with one football objective clearly in mind: to win back and keep the advantage in the St. John's series, which, so heavily ours in the beginning, has been wrested from us in recent years.

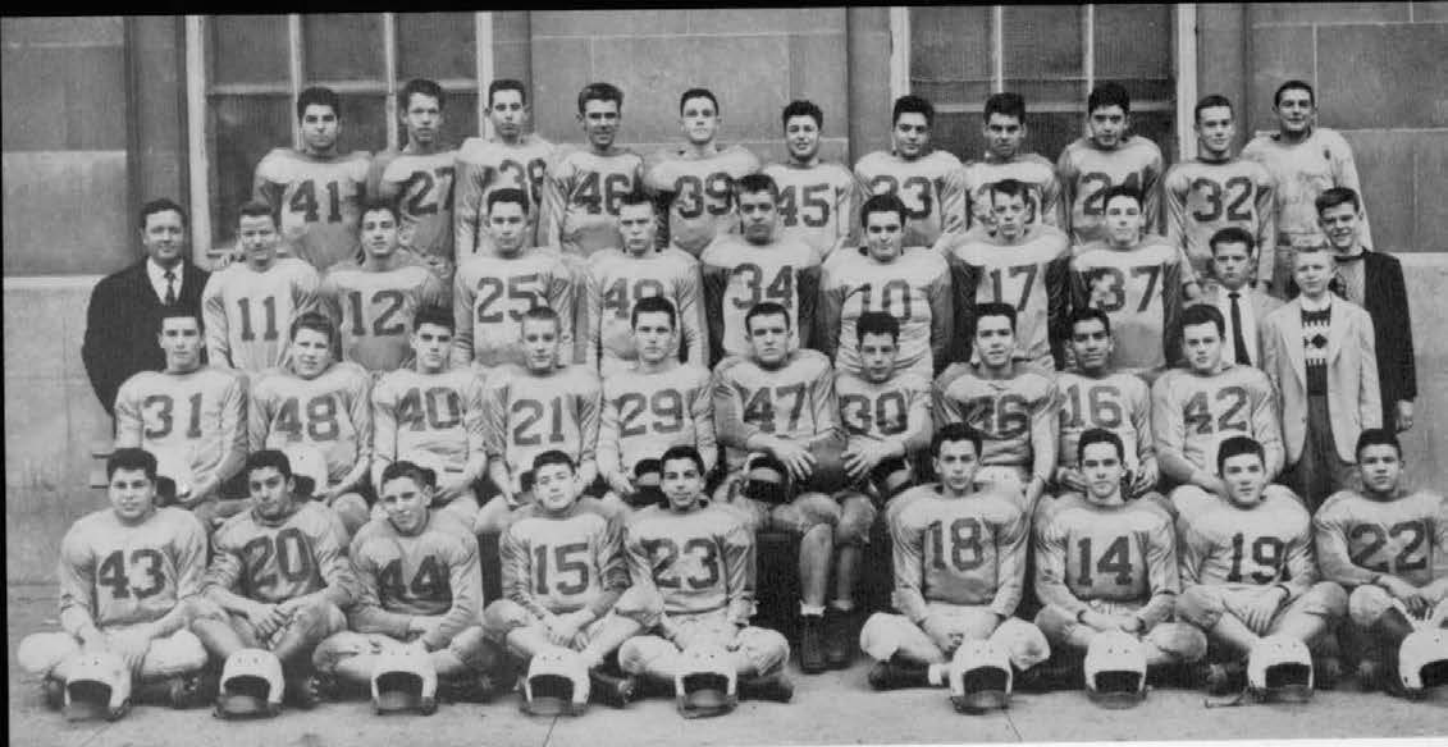

J.V. 3-2, Finishes

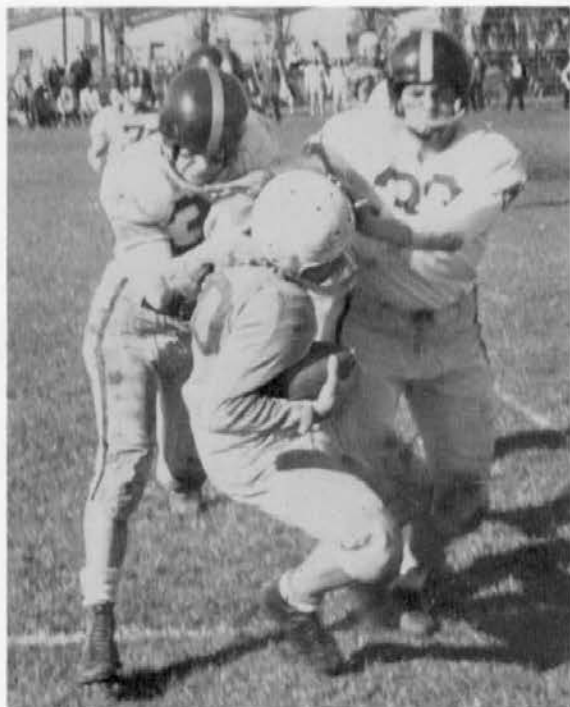
After a slow start against Brooklyn Tech, a 6-0 loss, Mr. Tom Gibbons' Junior Varsity began to roll with a sharpened passing attack and improved line play. Tech was trounced in a return engagement, 33-7. Poly Prep halted the victory surge temporarily, 6-0, but after a two-week respite during which they polished their offensive tactics, the Prep Jayvee defeated St. John's, 21-13, in a game much more one-sided than the score indicates. Functioning smoothly now, Prep trampled Fordham, 34-0, to end their short but highly successful season.

With the possible exception of the first game, the line play, on both offense and defense, was excellent. In the first game the blocking was weak on passing plays and punts, but experience helped the linemen, led by Co-captain Brian Payne, George Loehfelm, Sal Russo and Bill Jack, to strengthen this as the season progressed. Their improvement made it easier for the backs, especially Co-captain Brian McCullagh, who ripped off a sixty-five yard touchdown against Fordham, Barry McCloskey and Frank Betron, to turn in fine rushing performances. The proficient passing and smooth ball-handling of quarterback Nick LaRusso was an important cog in the offensive mechanism, and Freshman Charlie Dietz's linebacking stiffened the defensive strength.

This year's Jayvee, noted for their extraordinary team spirit as well as their ball-playing ability, give strong hope of providing many experienced "alumni" to fight for varsity posts next season.

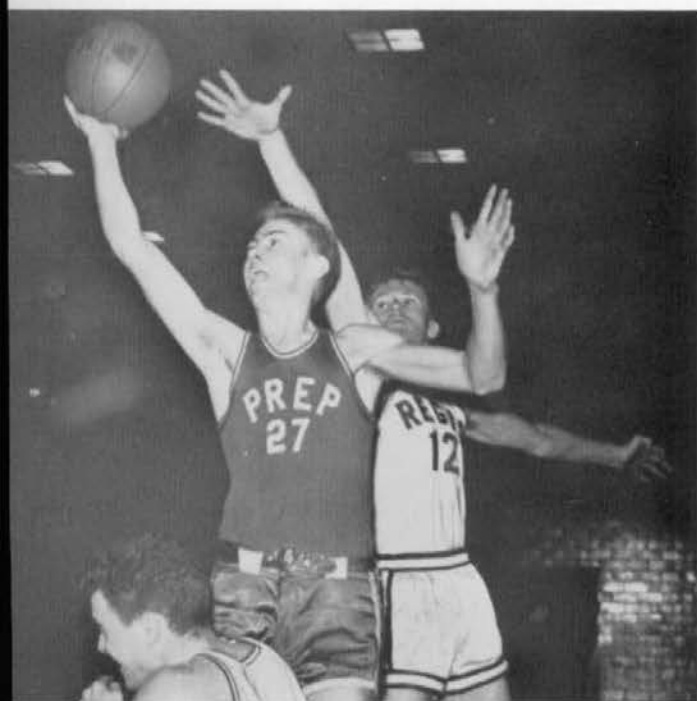

BASKETBALL STORY — ***Thrills and Spills***

Prep's 1958 basketball team, counted on before the season by Coach Bill Duffy to be a winning aggregation by supplying in shooting accuracy what they lacked in size and experience, finished the campaign with a disappointing seven-and-nine record, but, as usual, kept their fans jumping to their feet in excitement through many quarters of the season's play. They had their ups and downs, but the latter will linger longer in the memories of the fans, especially the near-perfection achieved in the Xavier game at the Jesuit Tournament.

Beaten by Xavier by twenty-two points six days before, on the 16th Street court, the Prep team reversed the whole complexion of things in the second game so completely as to make the first one, in retrospect, almost unbelievable. The previous game had seen Prep as five raw basketball players; this one saw them a pol-



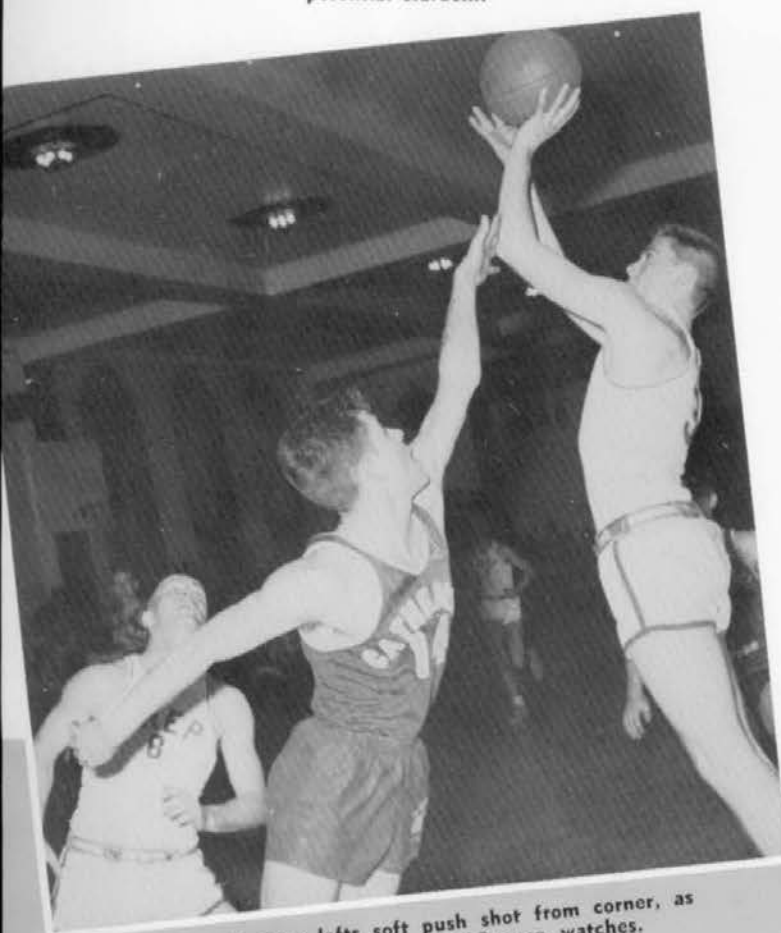

ished, proficient team. The fast breaking and ballchasing of Dave O'Connell and Jim O'Connor, the offensive rebounding of Frank Orlando, the maneuvering and shooting of Bob Ryan and Dan Berkery — all were seen at their best in this expert demonstration of team play.

Examining the season's performance as a whole, the statistician discovers two outstanding weaknesses in the team's play. One, and an important one, was in the defense, as is evident from the number of games which Prep, though scoring well, lost to teams which penetrated their defense all too regularly. Another weakness seemed to be a third quarter let-down. Usually ahead at the half, and often spiritedly surging up during the last quarter, Prep let games slip from the win column due to an

unexplainable lapse after the half-time intermission.

Captain Dave O'Connell, though he did not shoot enough to be a high scorer, was a capable back court operator and team leader. Jim O'Connor, swift, brilliant and exciting as he was, disappointed in the scoring department, but Frank Orlando's late-found scoring ability, added to his acknowledged prowess under the defensive boards, made him the pleasant surprise of the year.

The team's sharpshooter, Bob Ryan, wrote a fitting conclusion to the story of a half-century of Prep basketball by dropping in two foul shots with six seconds remaining in the last game to give him a total of three hundred points and an average of twenty points per game for the season.

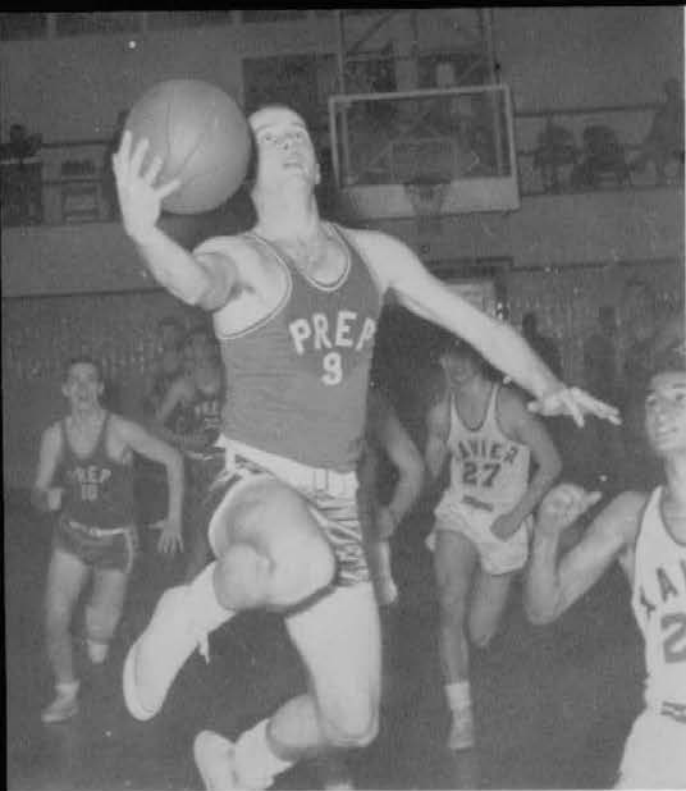

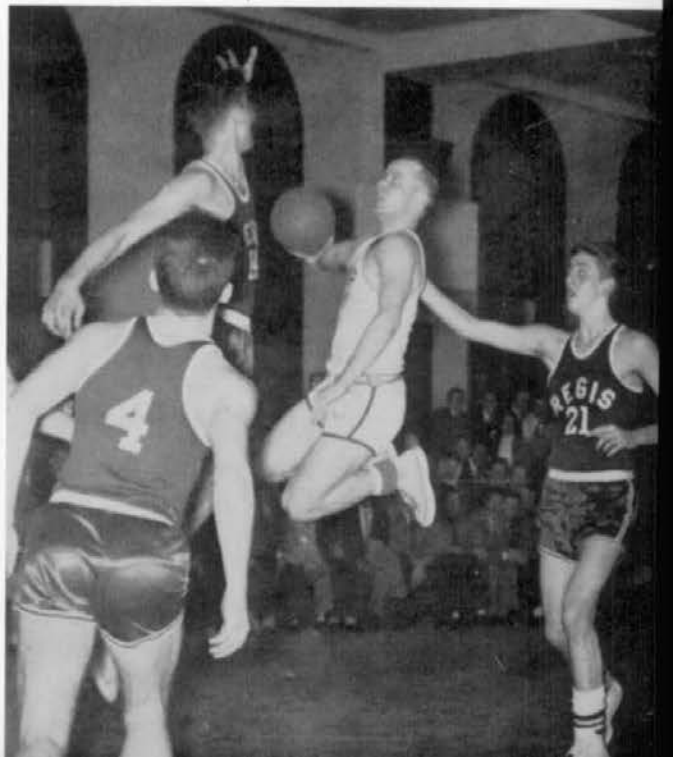


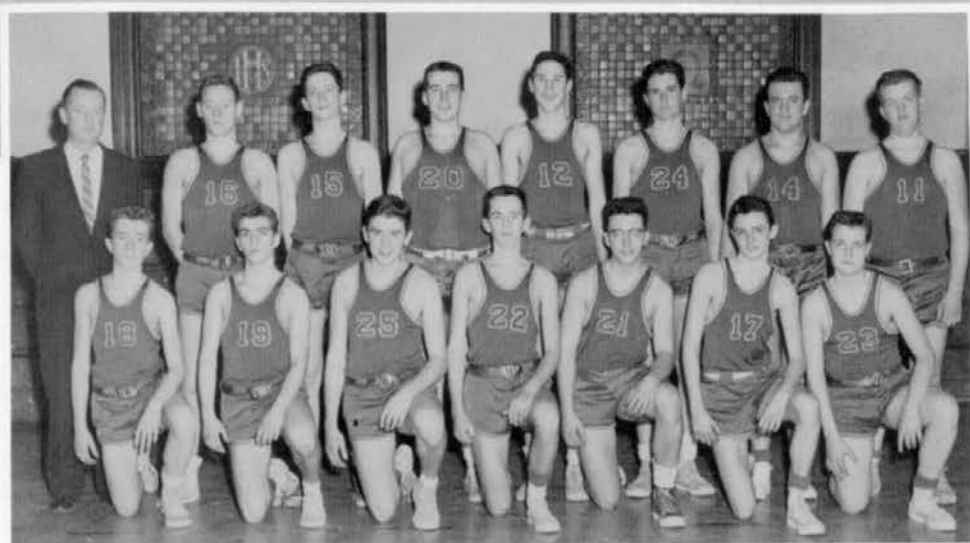

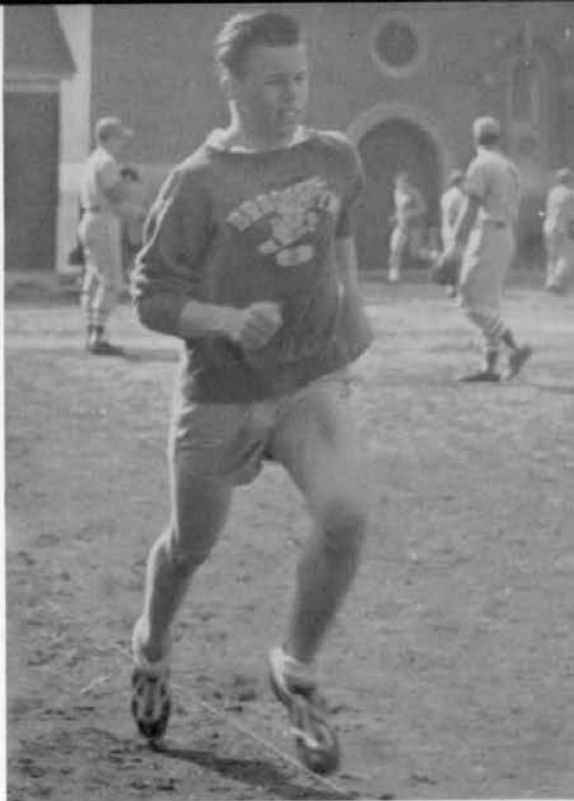
Best in Five Years

Few sports command the loyalty of their members and engender in them a spirit of camaraderie to the extent that track and cross country do. Since most of the track athletes double in both these running teams, their is a season which extends from September to May, and entails constant practice not only on Prep's cinder track, but also on cross-country courses all over the city. This year's team, no exception to this tradition of Prep's track athletes, had a fine record to show as a result of their hard training.

Considered the best team in five years, the cross country squad won six out of seven dual meets, and placed high among the many competing teams in their five appearances in championship competition.

In their first appearance, the Prep harriers gave a hint of things to come by trouncing Mount Saint Michael, with Captain Lou Ockey and Charlie Buchta placing first and second. This pair was outstanding until Buchta was sidelined by an injury, though not before he had placed third, (setting a school record of 13:38) eleventh and fifth in three large championship meets. Ockey, fourth, thirteenth and seventh in those meets, went on to win the Jesuit Championships and place third in the Brooklyn-Long Island meet, becoming the first Prep harrier to break the fourteen minute mark in six races in succession.

The fact that the rest of the team was never far behind their leaders is plain from the rankings of the Prep squad: fourth of 48, fifth of 30, third of all the Catholic schools in the city, and third of all Brooklyn-Long Island schools. The Junior Varsity, led by Nardella, Carey and Maloney, was among the best in their league, also, with two thirds and two seconds for the season.

Track Team Among Best in City

The Prep runners, in high gear after the cross country season, continued their championship performances during the indoor season. In the Poly Prep Invitation, Prep, finished second, had outstanding individual efforts turned in by Charlie Buchta, who won the 880, and by Pete Bracken, who won the shotput with a school record-breaking toss of 49' 7". The most dramatic triumph of the day, however, was scored in the medley relay, when Jack O'Connor, beginning his half-mile anchor leg seventy yards behind the leaders, broke the tape the winner by fifteen yards.

Eighth of 144 schools in the Mayor's meets, Prep was paced by Drew Kennedy's fourth in the 280-yard dash and by the second place of the two-mile relay, Bill Clancy, Lou Ockey, Buchta and O'Connor, which broke the school record by nine seconds. In the CHSAA championships, this record was lowered again by Clancy, Al Deanehan, Buchta and O'Connor, who missed first place by a foot.

The Novice team won the Catholic High School championship of the city, sparked by Buchta's first place in the half mile. The midget relay team of Buchta, Jim Maloney, Frank Tomeo and Jim McNeely set the school record of 1:14.6 at the Jesuit Schools meet, and repeated with a record for the 640-yard relay at Fordham.

On the basis merely of records broken and re-broken, this year's cross-country and track teams have carved a niche for themselves high on the list of Prep's most successful teams of the half-century.



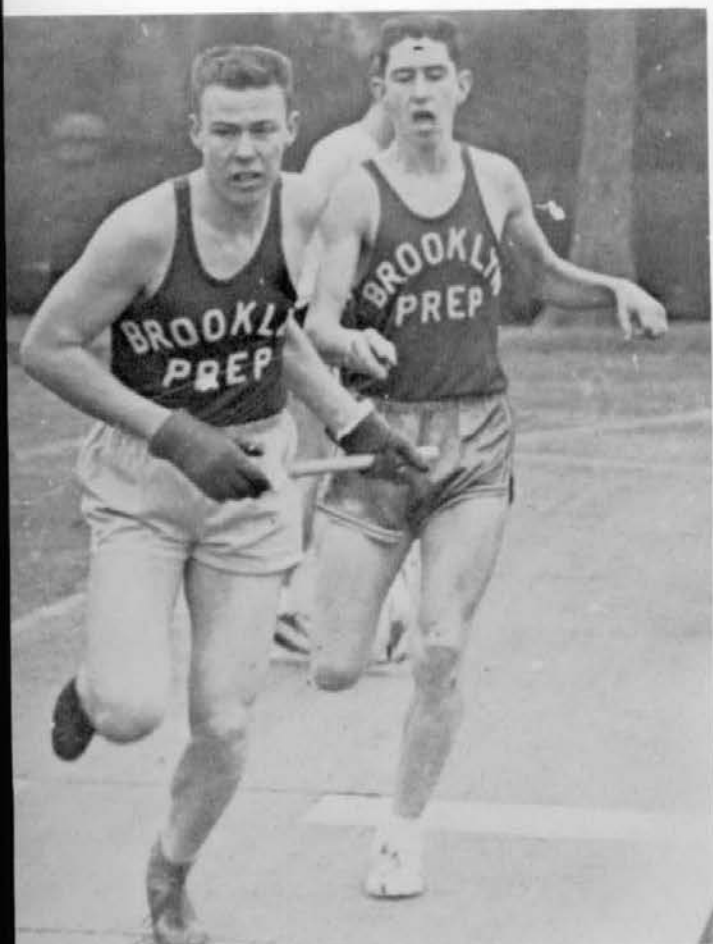

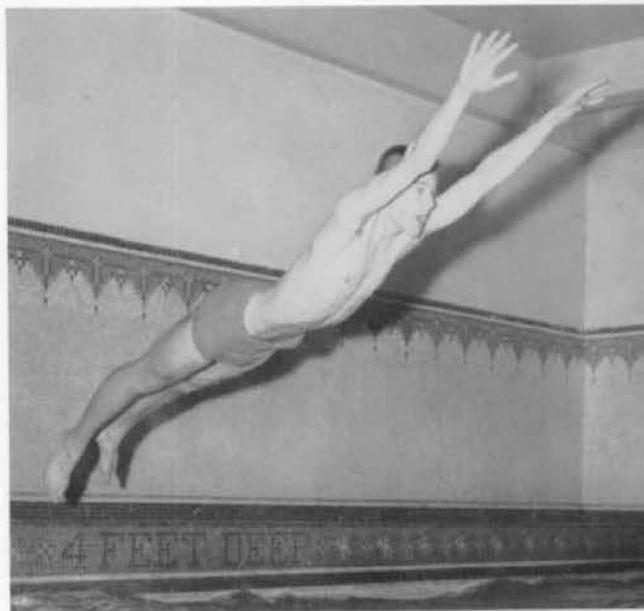

Losing Season

Although Prep had several city finalists among this year's swimmers, the team showed a disappointing record because of a lack of support to back up the stars. The team beat St. Augustine and Regis with little trouble, but was defeated by St. Francis, Loughlin, St. John's, McBurney, Cardinal Hayes, Trinity and Poly Prep, the last three by the same touch-out score, 44-42.

Prep blended its talent for the Catholic High School championships and pulled out two gratifying surprises: the freestyle relay of Bill Beck, Dan Devaney, Walt Trum and Jay Behr managed a third, while the medley relay of Ed McAvoy, Greg Smyth, Joe Eschmann and Bob Mullen scored fifth place. In individual events, Beck captured third in the medley and Schaefer took fourth in the 400-yard freestyle.

A young team, Prep had only three Senior swimmers, sprinter Jay Behr, breaststroker Greg Smyth, and distance freestyler Dan Schaefer, (who also swam fifth in the Private Schools' 400-yard freestyle). The Juniors, who made up the bulk of the team, were Captain Beck, Devaney and McAvoy, backstroke, Eschmann and Frank Cleary, butterfly, Mullen, breaststroke, Trum, freestyle, and diver Bill Gluck. Due to the experience they will bring to next year's meets, Coach Walter Doolan is looking forward to a team to rival those of several years ago led by Jimmy McCarthy, Jack Hayman, and Drury Gallagher.

Coach Walter Doolan's baseball team, its pitchers primed by two weeks' warm-up in the gym, came out into the open during the week before Easter, and, fitting games in between rain-outs, managed by Blue Book press time to show a record of four victories, two losses and a tie.

Besides two pitchers, the catcher and first baseman, Prep's baseball fortunes rested on the performances of last year's substitutes and Junior Varsity. Pitchers Tom Fry and Bill Schramm were backed up by Jim Sirico, up from Jayvee, and Seniors Jack Crowley, Paul Hoertz and Artie Wagner. Catcher and captain John Sena and veteran Ken Sergiacomi took charge behind the plate and at first base, but the rest of the infield was covered by Jayvee graduates Kevin Dineen, at second, and Vinnie Grandelli, at third, and by Senior Richie Cuneo at short. Leftfielder Walt Kelle, the only man back from last year's squad for the outfield, was joined by Juniors Joe D'Agostin and Art Barnes, Jayvee stars of last year. Seniors Dave O'Connell and Jerry Cimone and Junior Charlie Myers were on hand for infield utility, and Junior Frank Mastrapasqua for outfield insurance.

With such an inexperienced squad, prospects did not look bright, but the new men rose to the occasion. They began slowly in the opener against Xavier, won for Jim Sirico by Ken Sergiacomi's grand slam home run into Carroll St. In the next game, St. John's piled up a five run lead, but Prep tied it in the sixth on Art Barnes' three-run homer. Darkness intervened after two scoreless extra innings, but not before Barnes protected the tie he had earned by throwing out a St. John's runner at the plate.

The replay was held the next day, but Prep spotted St. John's too many runs this time. Eleven runs behind, Prep came

back with six in the sixth and two in the seventh, but fell short, 12-9, with ten hits and another defensive gem by Barnes, who cut down another Redman at the plate.

Holy Cross, third team to visit the Nostrand Ave. stadium, was defeated, 9-5, with Jim Sirico earning his second victory. Barnes was the offensive star with another three-run homer, and Joe D'Agostin took defensive honors by throwing out runners at second and third.

St. Michael's then found themselves in the losing column to Prep, by the same 9-5 score. Walt Kelle provided the hitting heroics of the day with a three-run home run. Jack Crowley was credited with the victory.

Next Prep exploded for seventeen hits to trample Trinity, 12-2, for Sirico's third victory. Kelle, D'Agostin, John Sena and Richie Cuneo collected three hits apiece, with Cuneo blasting the now-habitual home run with two runners on base.

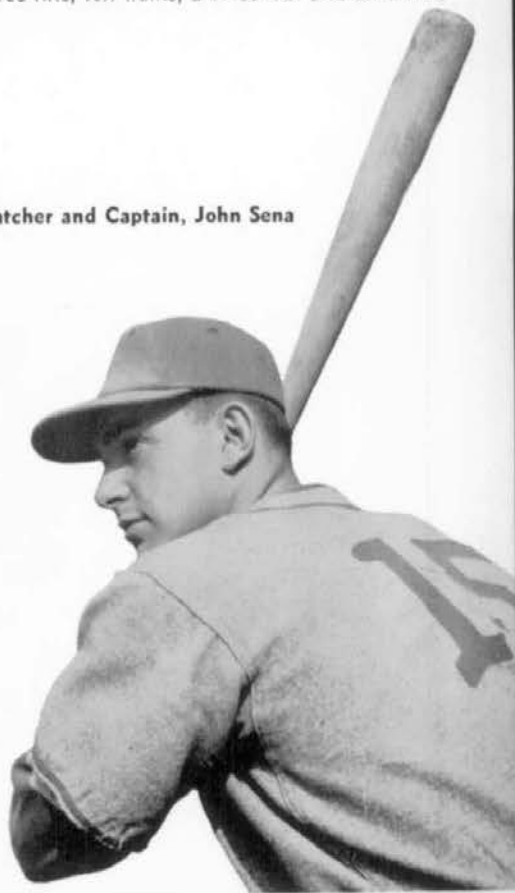
In the last game before we went to press, a superior Archbishop Molloy team smashed Prep, 16-3. Even in defeat, Captain Sena captured the attention of all, belting home runs on the first two pitches thrown to him, and adding a single in the seventh.

Individual offensive stars at this point of the season were Art Barnes, with ten runs batted in, and Richie Cuneo, with nine. During one stretch, John Sena reached base fifteen successive times, on three hits, ten walks, a force-out and an error.

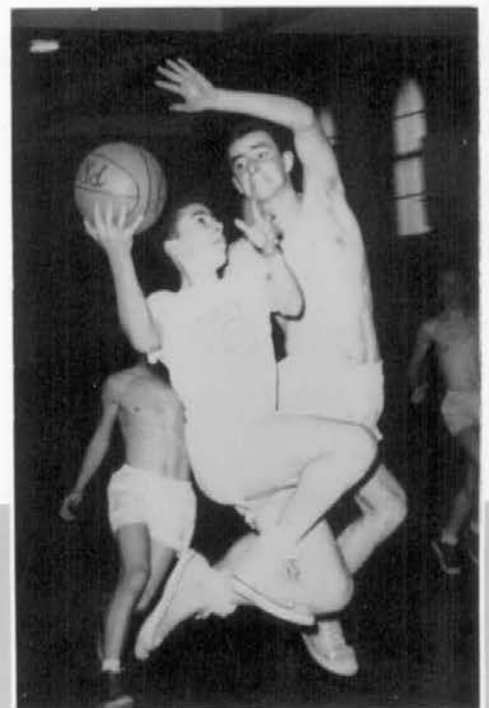

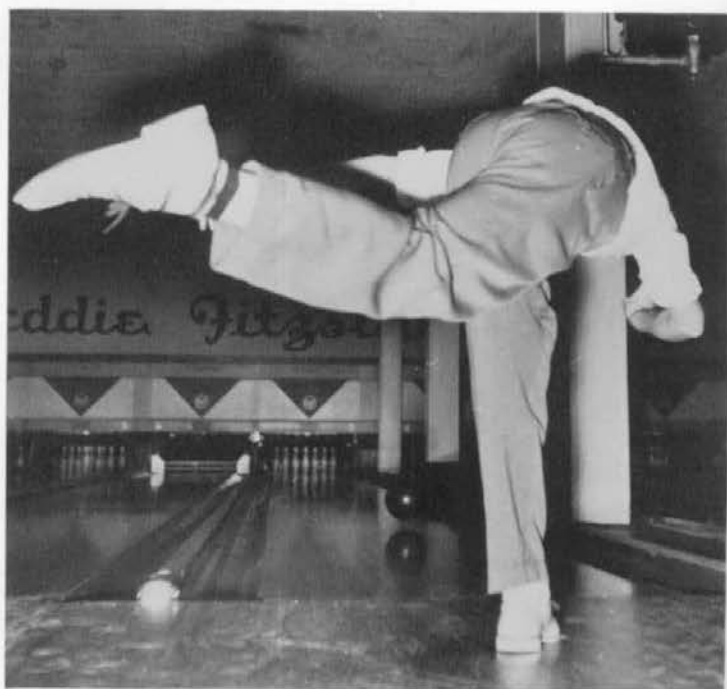

Many Prep Men Have



MOST REV. RAYMOND E. KEARNEY, S.T.D., '19, Prep's most distinguished alumnus, was ordained in 1927 and consecrated Auxillary Bishop of Brooklyn in 1934. After an intensely active life spent directly in the service of Church, he died in 1956 at the age of 54.

Prep's official name is derived from the fact that it is a preparation for college, but in a truer and broader perspective, it is a preparation for eternal life in Heaven. Therefore, governed by the realization that true success is the attainment of eternal glory, all of Prep's aims are correlated to this supreme goal.

Thus it is that, while grieving with the bereaved family and friends of graduates who have completed the years granted them on earth, Prep is happy to have helped them achieve the degree of sanctity God required of them before He called them to Himself.

Fifty years of preparing young men for life's work has necessarily meant that many of Prep's graduates have already accomplished that work. Certainly countless numbers of



DR. RICHARD A. RENDICH, K.S.G., '09, was a crusader in very real sense. A successful physician and outstanding Catholic who had founded the Catholic Physicians' Guild of Brooklyn and the Federation of Catholic Physicians' Guilds, he was seized with another ideal, and a zeal to spread it: an extraordinary devotion to family communion. He began gradually, but in 1950 the devotion had taken such root that he gave up practice to devote all his energies to what was officially established, with the ecclesiastical permission of Archbishop Molloy, as the Family Communion Crusade. By the time of his death, in 1956, the Crusade had gained official approbation in 184 episcopal sees in 47 countries of the world.



RICHARD KERNS, who entered Prep in February of last year, showed mature determination, even in the face of insurmountable difficulties, to lead the life God ordinarily expects of such a young person. At the end of grammar school, Dick, suffering from cancer, had his right leg amputated, which postponed his scheduled September entrance to Prep. But he struggled through a painful period of convalescing and accustoming himself to an artificial leg in order to be able to enter Prep in February. By Easter time, it was apparent that he was still infected, and he was once more forced to give up a normal life. Dick died in May, having met God's sternest demands for sanctity in a student.

them deserve whatever recognition we could give them, but that must be left to their omniscient Lord. But the life he had been leading testified that when God summoned him in an auto accident in July, he was ready. A stand-out in sports as well as in studies, "Spike" Tisdall, seriously developing his talents for a truly Christian life, was fully prepared for God's summons.

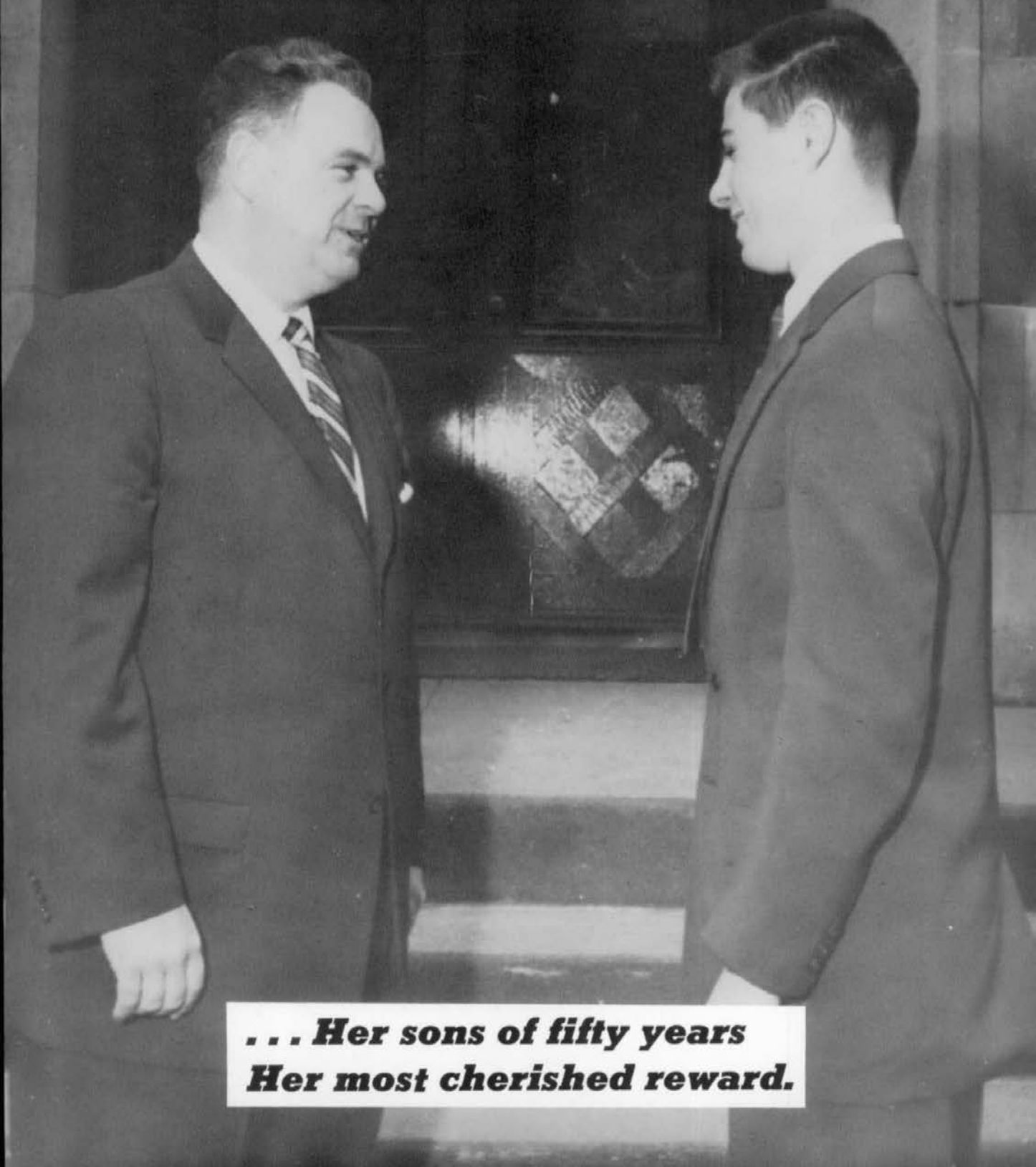


THOMAS GILL, a graduate of the February Class of 1941, was out of Prep barely a year when he enlisted in the United States Marine Corps shortly after Pearl Harbor. His life, in God's providence, was not to be greatly prolonged. Tom was called back by His Creator from the beaches of Guadalcanal, at the age of 19.

DONALD EGEN, graduating from Prep into the troubled world of 1950, fulfilled a boyish dream by enlisting in the Air Corps. For seven years he served his country in this service. At the very moment of his death, in faithful imitation of Christ, his thought was of others. Hurling in his out-of-control jet plane towards a hospital take-off, Don jettisoned a gastank which would have imperiled the building, meeting in the flames of his plane the death he had been preparing himself for.
