We trust that this yearbook will remind us of the many prayers, works, joys, and sufferings we have offered to God during our years at Brooklyn Prep.

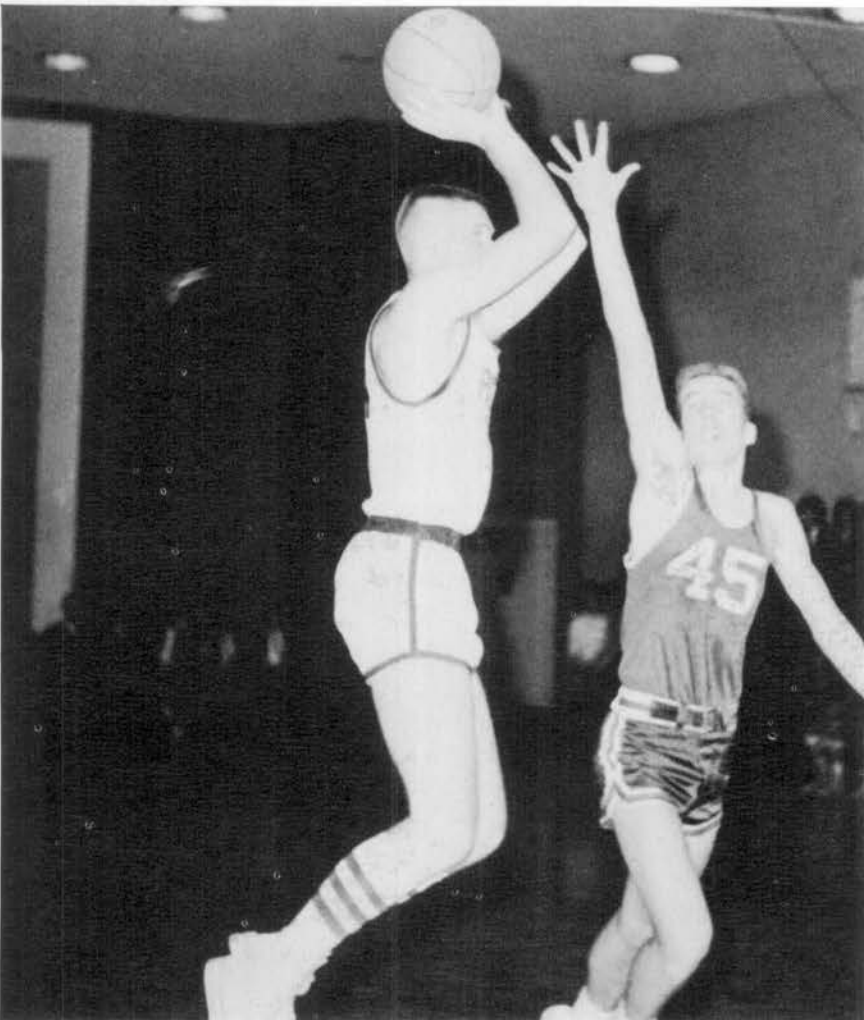

Almost every day this year the Morning Offering ended with this intention: ". . . and in particular for the success of the Council." These words were a constant reminder that the most important events of this year were not taking place at Brooklyn Prep, but in the Eternal City.

And yet the two places were not totally unconnected. Our Bishops were there taking part in the Council, and through the Morning Offering our own actions were directed toward the success of these important meetings. And in time the connection between Brooklyn Prep and the Vatican Council will become clearer still. When asked one day about the purposes of the Council, Pope John XXIII walked over to a window, opened it up, and said that he summoned the Council "to let some fresh air in." That the fresh air of a more vigorous Catholicism will soon pervade the whole Church, including our own school, is a very reasonable hope.

In the eyes of the administration the most important events at the school itself were concerned with a process somewhat similar to that of the Council. This was the year for the visit by the Middle States Association evaluation committee. Here also was the opportunity for renewal and improvement. In preparation for the visit, months were spent in dozens of faculty meetings which gradually and painstakingly produced a comprehensive self-evaluation of Brooklyn Prep. The hard work of this "year of the meetings" was appreciated at the end of March, when the committee visited the school. The fifteen educators who inspected the school and who saw every teacher and class had many recommendations for improving Prep, but the final, overall report rates the school as "very good" in all major areas.

The evaluators were able to find much that was new in the Brooklyn Prep of 1963, as well as the traditional strong

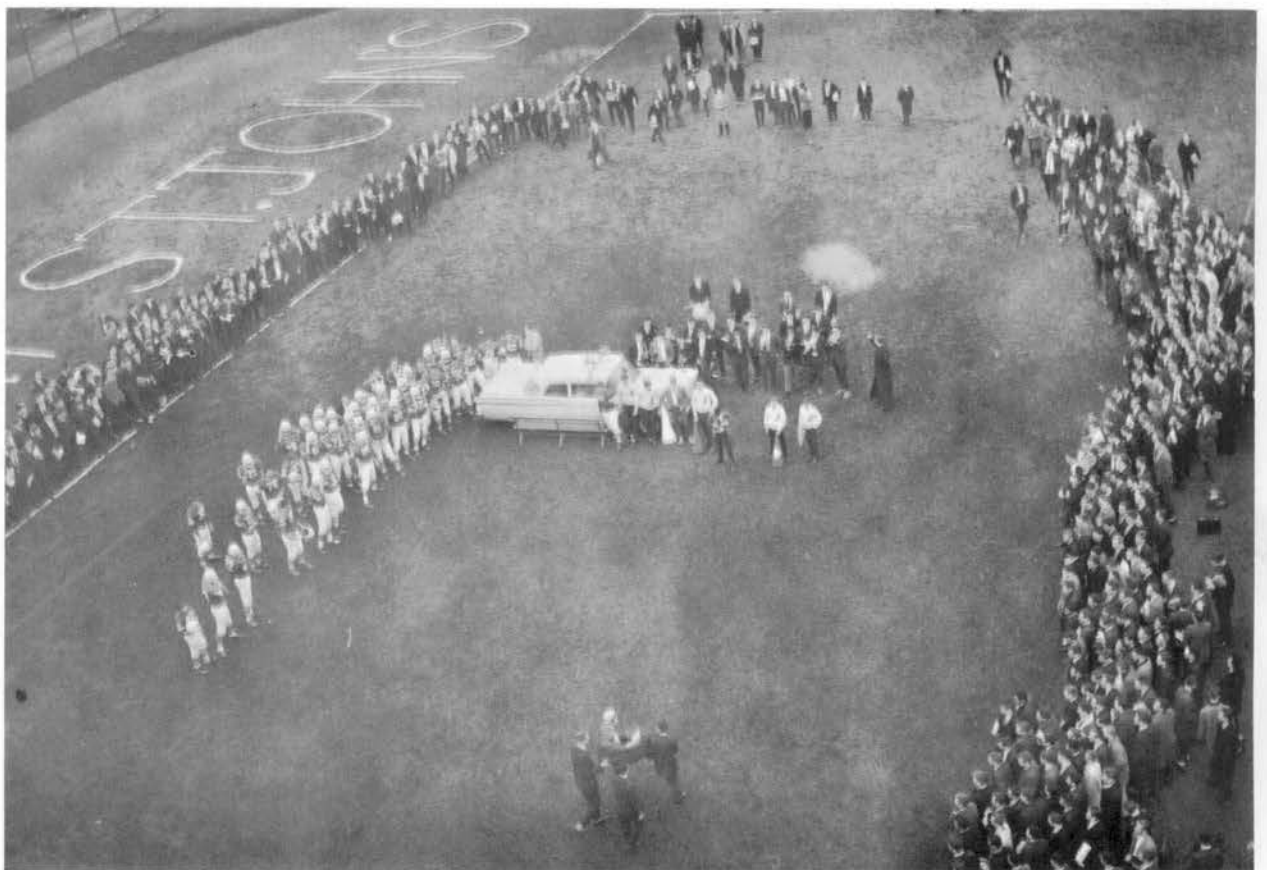

Not least among the new faculty members was the new registrar, who quietly and efficiently filled the gap created when Mr. Burke left to return to teaching.

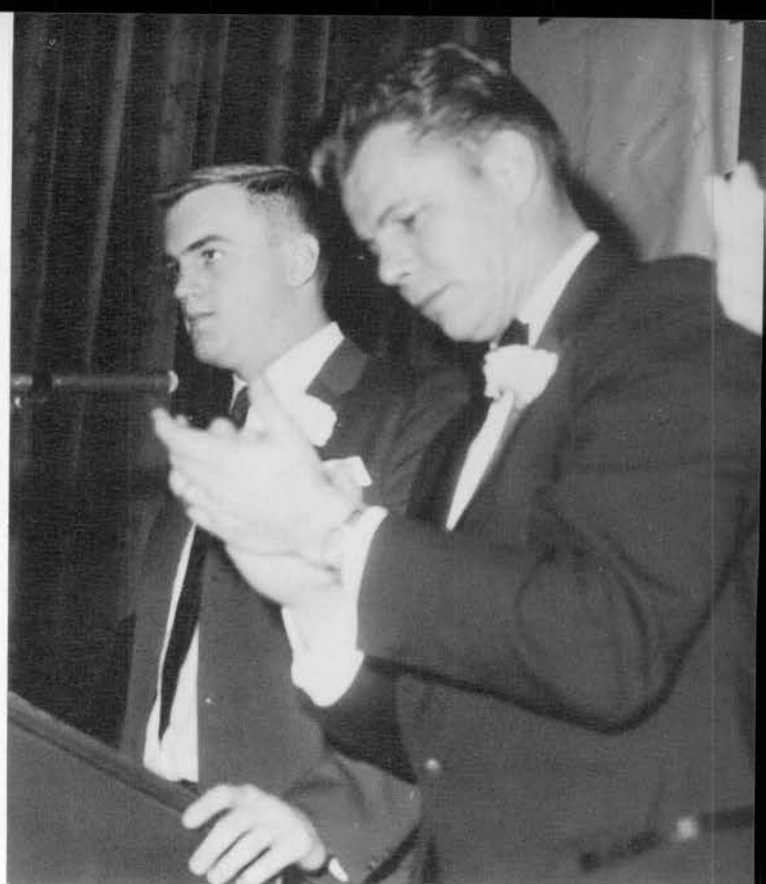

system was put into operation with the help of the electrons in one of Remington Rand's Univac computers. When fed the marks and other data turned in by the faculty, the computer produces the end result of four printed copies of each report card with each student's average and his academic rank in each year, and separate lists of the ranking and of all failures within the entire school. These lists are often consulted by the faculty and administration for guidance purposes. A rating for "effort" was added this year to all report cards to make them more informative and helpful for both parents and students, and a corresponding Effort Honors Card is now being awarded at school assemblies. The computer is working efficiently, if not flawlessly, and the school is continuing to look for ways of improving the system further.

Machine Age report cards with name, rank, and jug totals are just one of the memories left with us this year. The Modern Language department made its impression, too, with the whole-hearted introduction of the Audio-Lingual methods. Under the direction of Father Farrand, the Apostle of St. Cloud, the spoken word now holds even greater importance in the French and German courses. Slides, filmstrips, posters, maps, records, tape recorders—all found an appropriate place in the new approach, and presentations of spoken French and German highlighted the annual Parents' Night.

The French Club's production of Samuel Beckett's *La Dernière Bande*, starring Ed Haggerty, was followed by a dance. There seemed to be fewer dances and record hops this year than we had hoped for, but those that were held

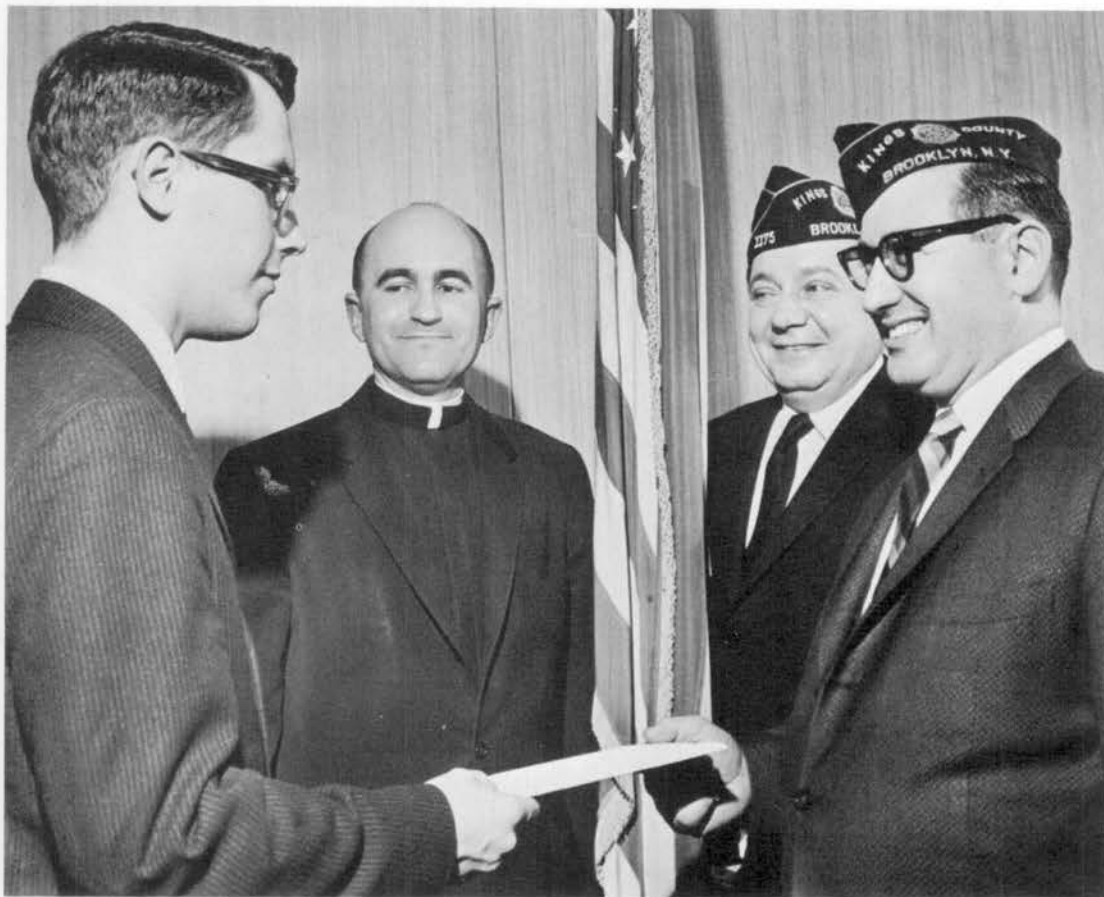

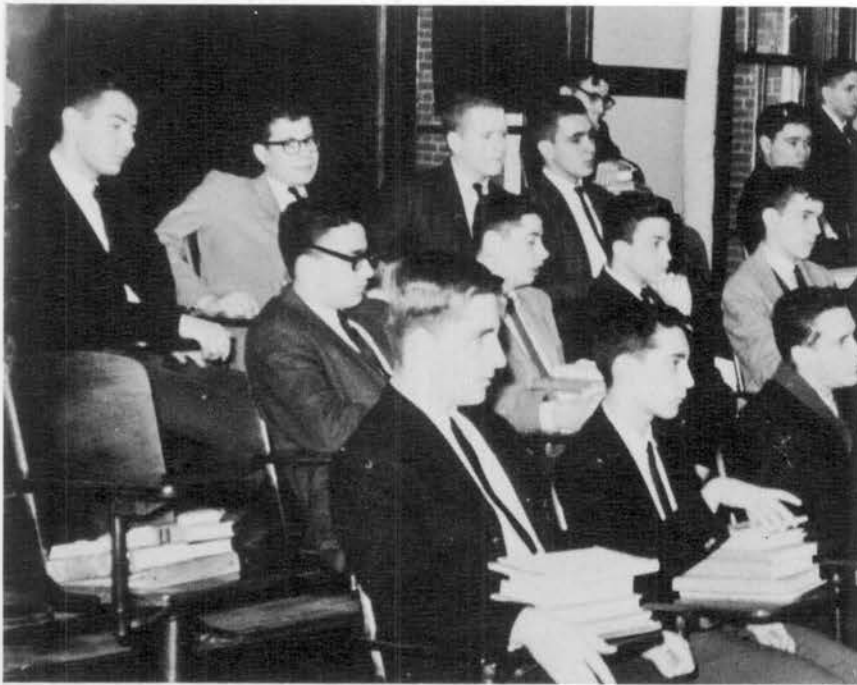

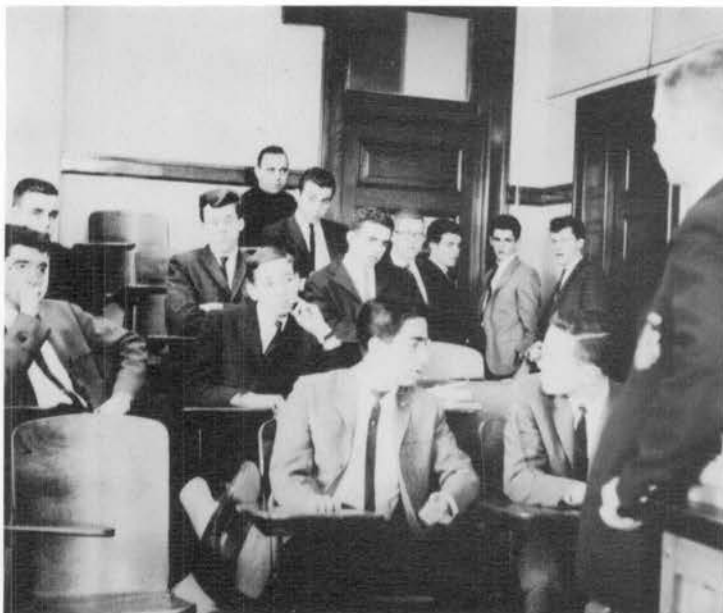

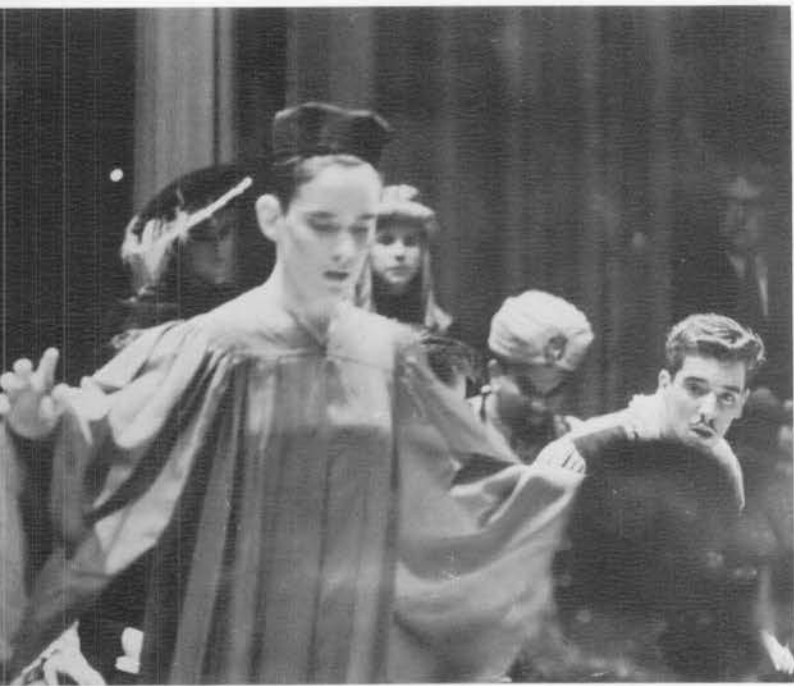

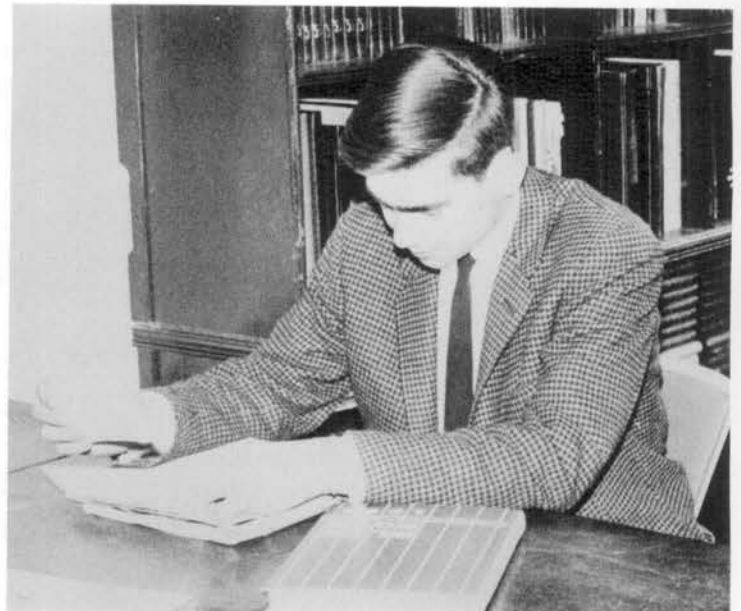

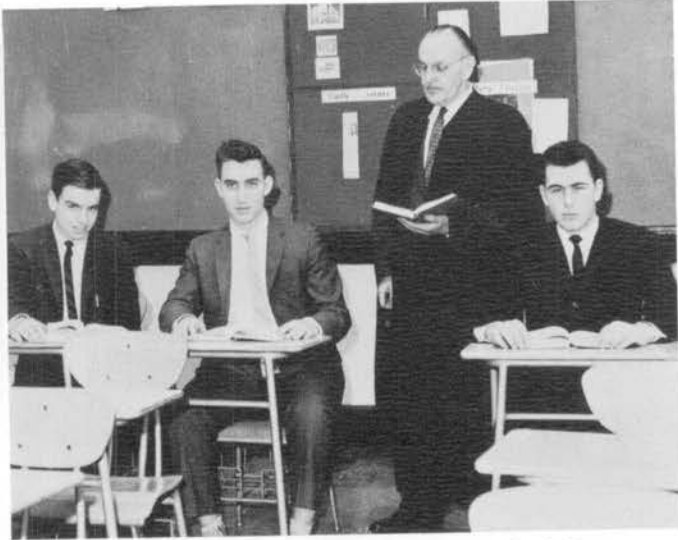

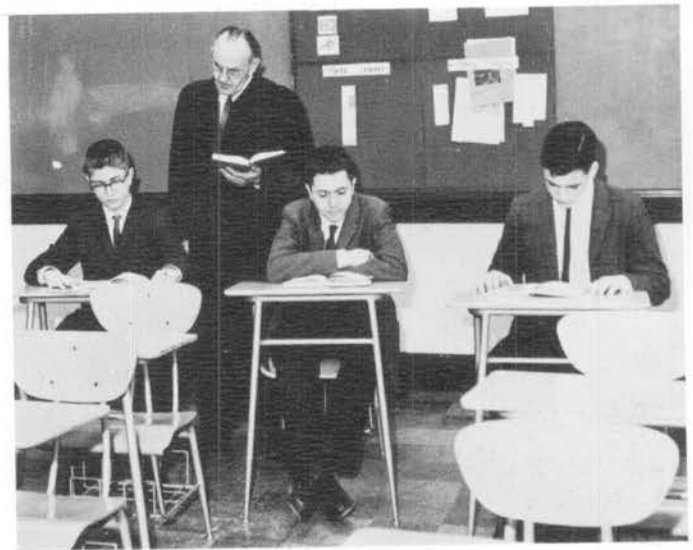

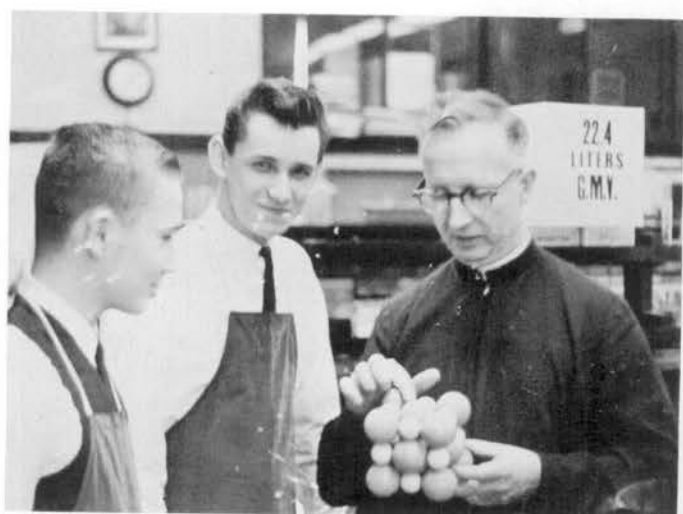

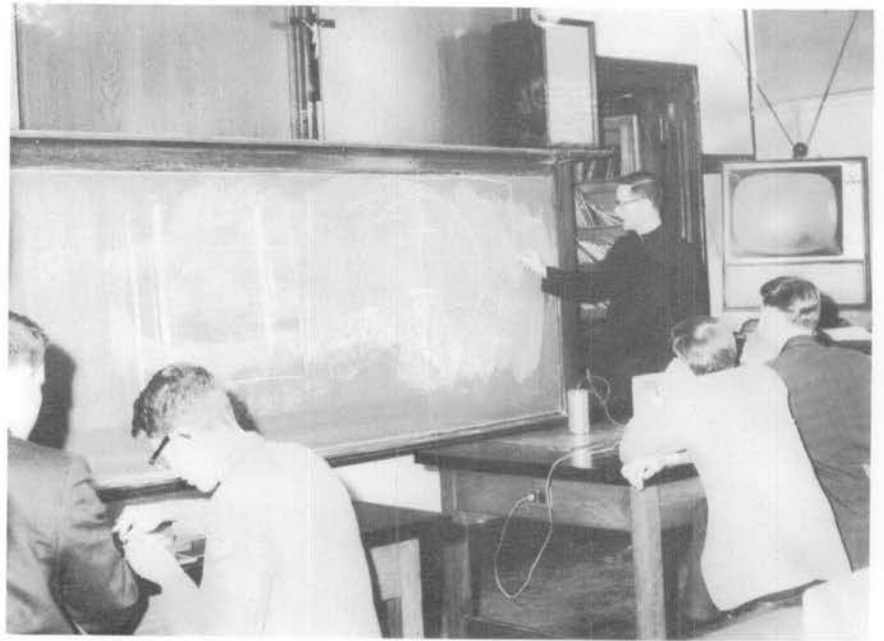

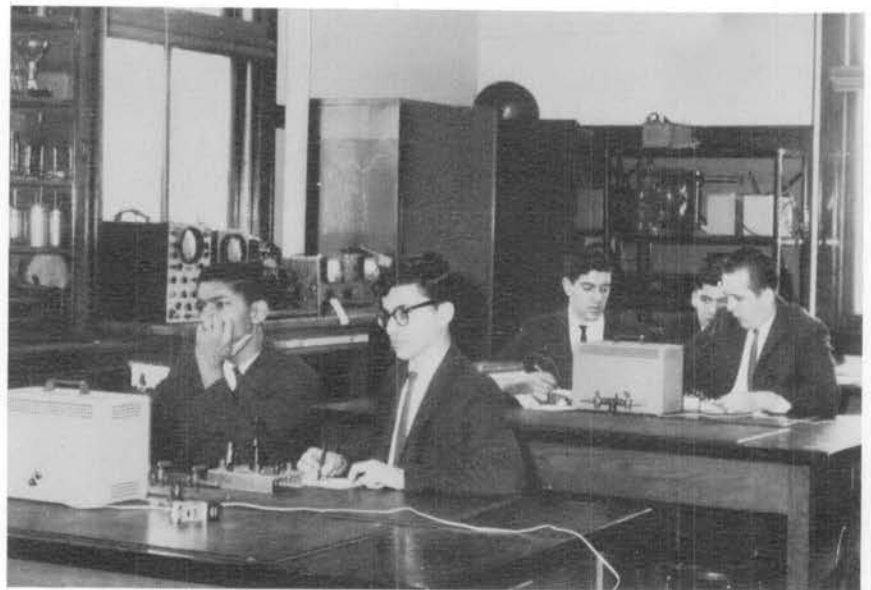

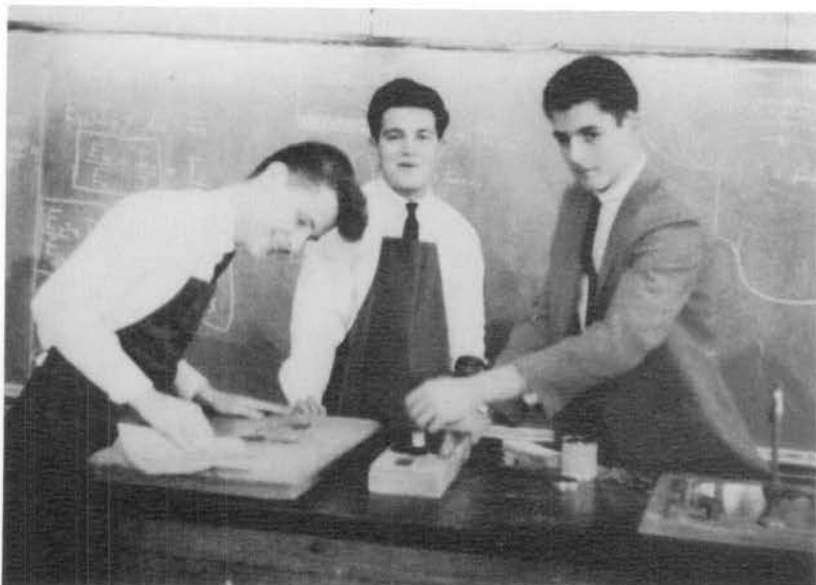
Fr. Guth, S.J., details the finite points of radio communications to senior physicists.

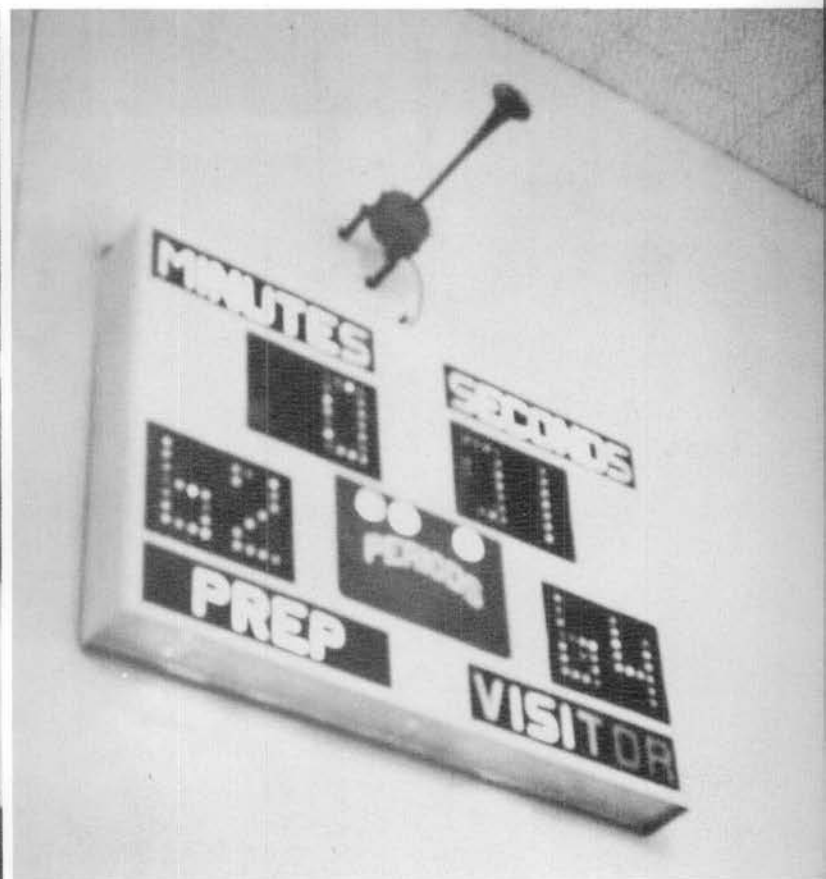

Football Bounces Wrong Way for

A raw Eagle team opened its season against the bigger and faster team from Mount St. Michael. The Mounties, led by their all-city quarterback Mike Cunnion, bewildered the Eagles with their near-perfect control over the pigskin. The rawness of the Eagle team was clearly visible when, after checking its opponents' ground attack, it failed to produce the proper defense against the pinpoint accuracy of quarterback Cunnion. A final score of 31-0 showed the Prep team that much work would be needed to iron out the deficiencies in both offense and defense.

In its game against Don Bosco H.S., the Prep squad again faced a powerful team. The Don Bosco team, highlighted by a quick backfield and an extremely mobile line, proved to be another tough adversary for the raw Eagle squad. Prep was severely hurt by its fumbles and general lack of ball control. In spite of the fine defense efforts of line-backer Lee Cutrone, the Eagles met their second defeat of the season by a score of 32-0.

At the New York Military Academy game, the Prep eleven finally came through. After being behind 6-0 in the first half, the Eagles went on to play their best second half of the year. The team, which for the first time was functioning as a well-coordinated unit, got moving after tackle Tom Harmon broke through the line and blocked an

N.Y.M.A. punt attempt on the Cadets' thirty-yard line. On the second play from scrimmage, halfback Sam Fant raced twenty-five yards around right end for the six points. Bob Kelley's field goal put the Eagles ahead 7-6. The Prep defensive unit then stopped the N.Y.M.A. drive, and the Eagles took over deep in their own territory. Fullback Bob Schiebel carried the ball back down field and, behind the powerful blocking of Bill Blum and Tom Ferramosca, scored the Eagles' second touchdown of the day. The final score of 13-6, gave the Eagles a well-fought and well-deserved victory.

With renewed confidence, the Eagles next took on their traditional rivals from Fordham Prep. The initial score occurred when a Fordham player recovered the Eagle punter's fumble from center in the end zone. The team was further hurt by the loss of Bob Schiebel and Tom Harmon who were forced to leave the game due to injuries. In the lost minutes of play, a Ram safety intercepted an Eagle pass and ran twenty yards for the touchdown. Despite its improved defensive system, the Prep once again was crippled by bad ball-control and frequent fumbles. The final score: 14-0.

In the game against Xavier, the Prep offense was once again having difficulty in scoring. The lone score of the



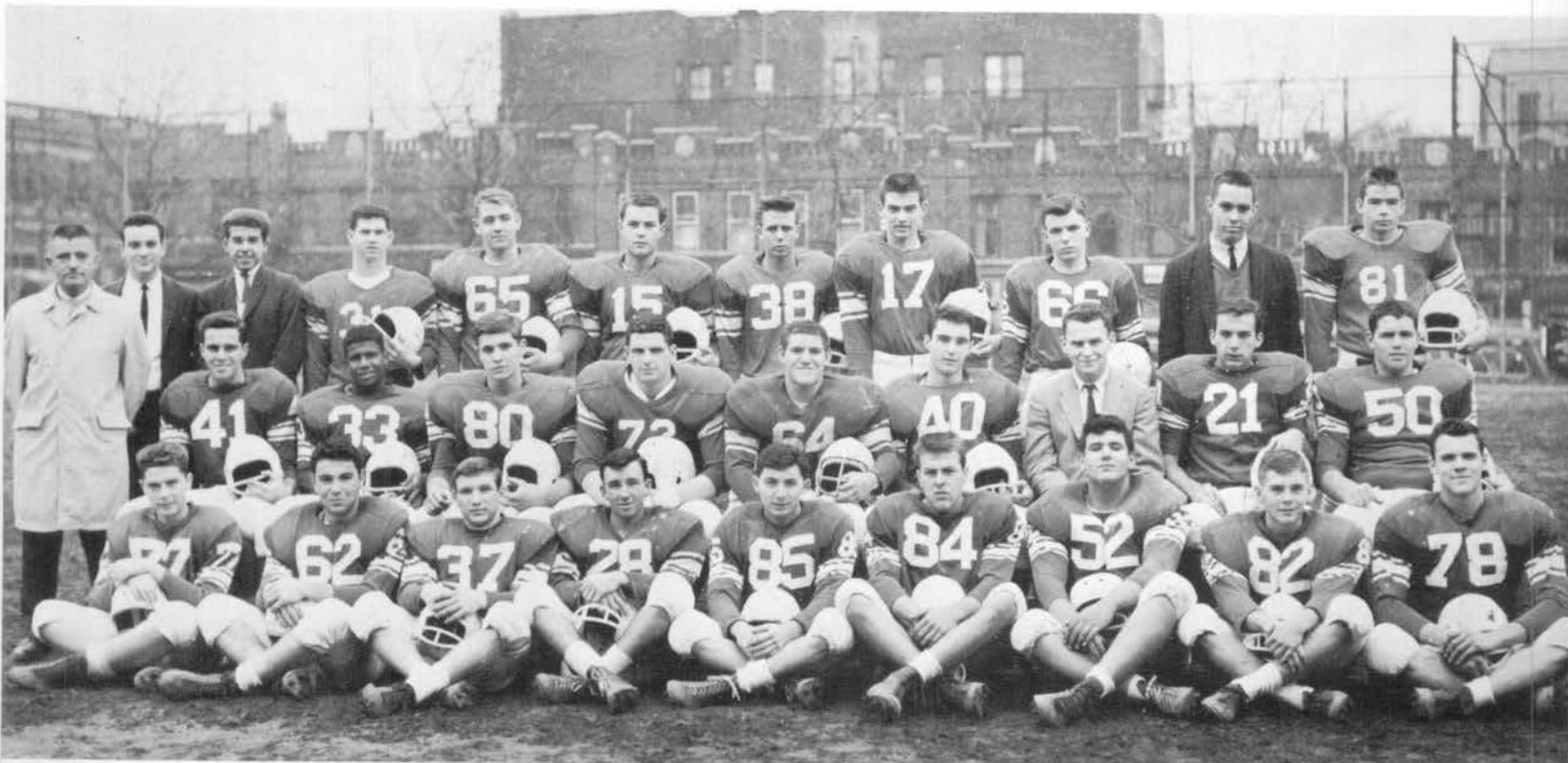

day came when Xavier halfback Frank Merlo scored after a forty-yard broken-field run. The Eagle defense, showing great improvement since the start of the season, did a fine job in holding the Kaydets to only one score. 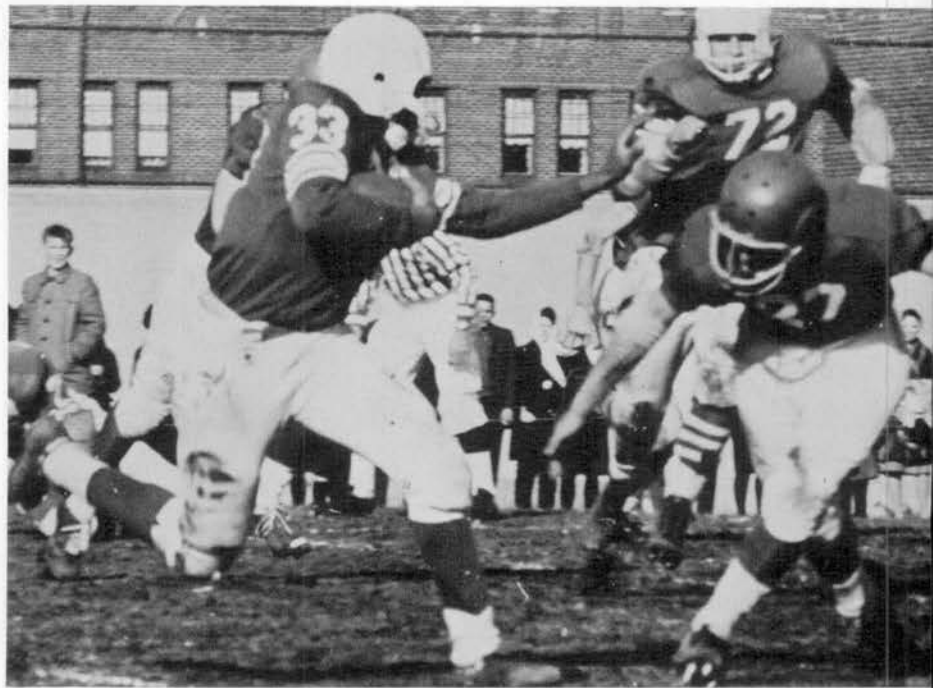

Because the principal end of any sport on the junior varsity level is the development of talent for the varsity team, this season's J.V. football team may be termed a success despite its poor record.

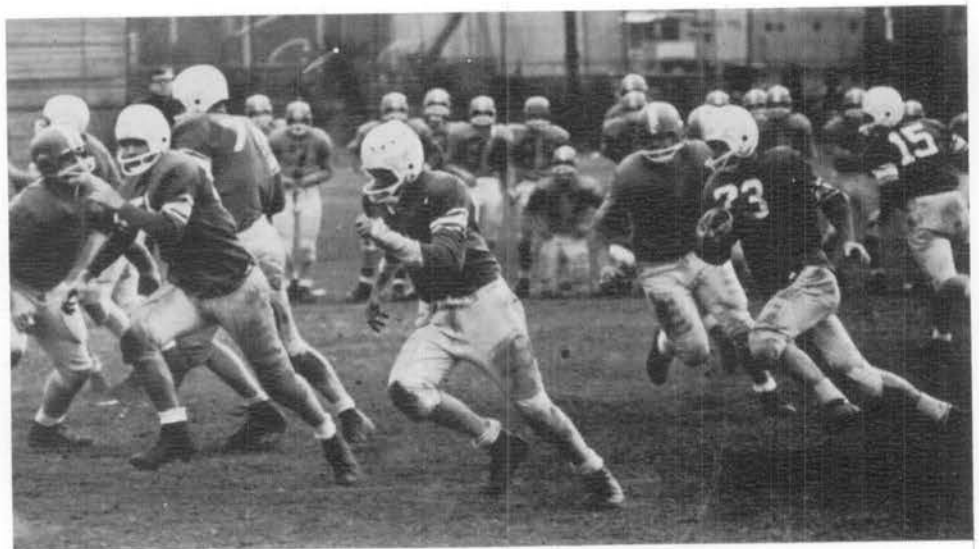

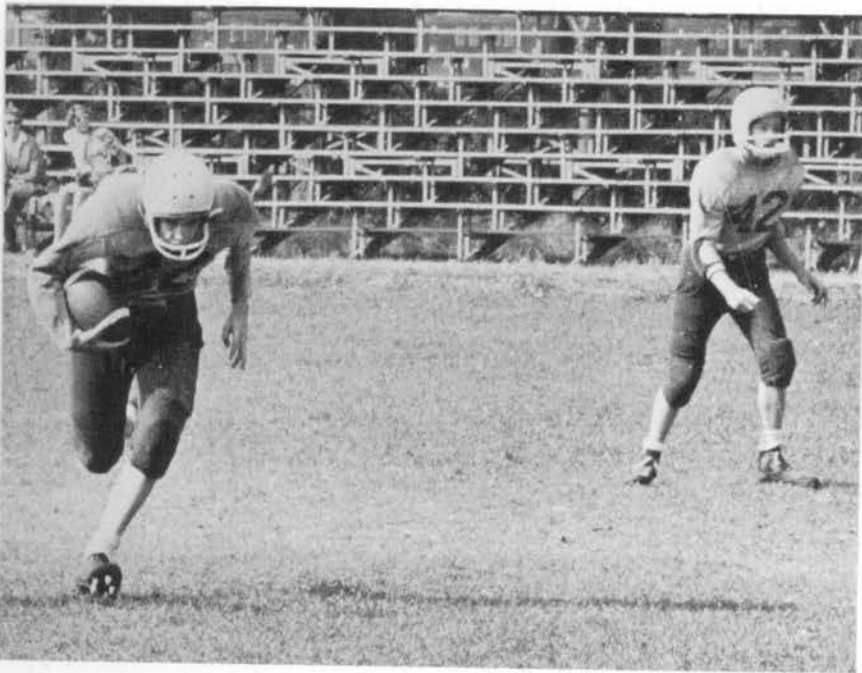


Halfback Brian Butler churns out 6 yards against Tech.

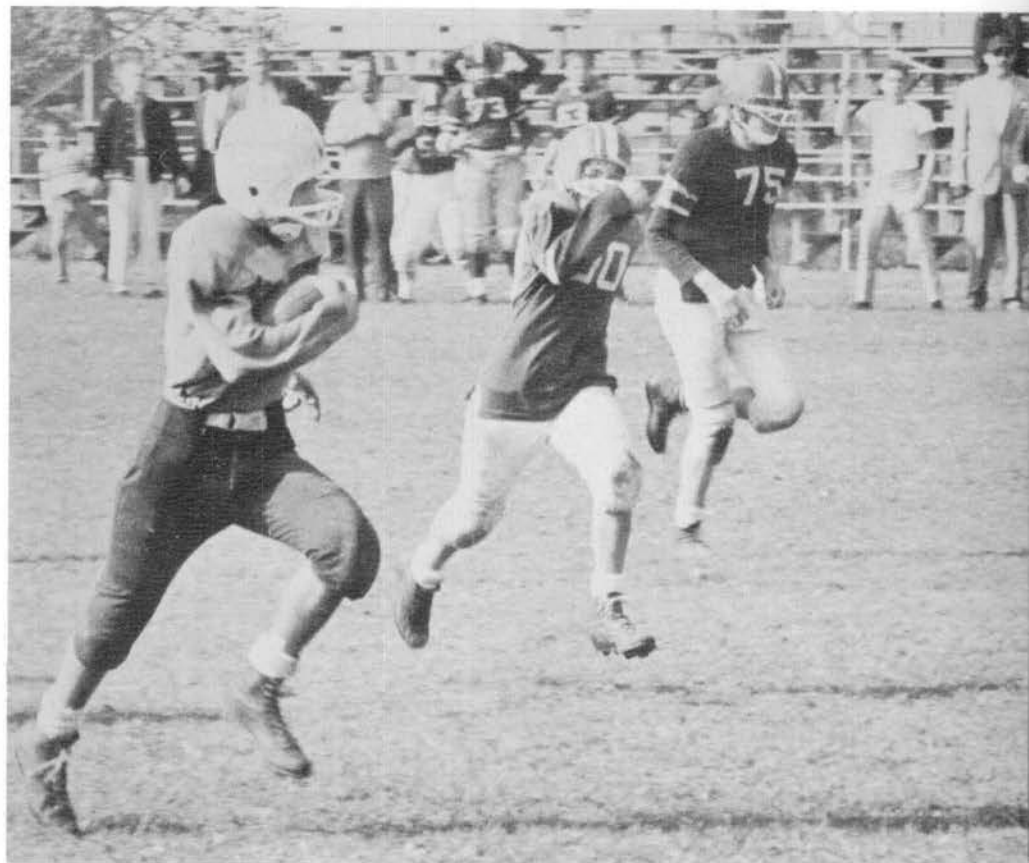

score in the fourth quarter on a roll-out pass play from Butler to Sharkey.

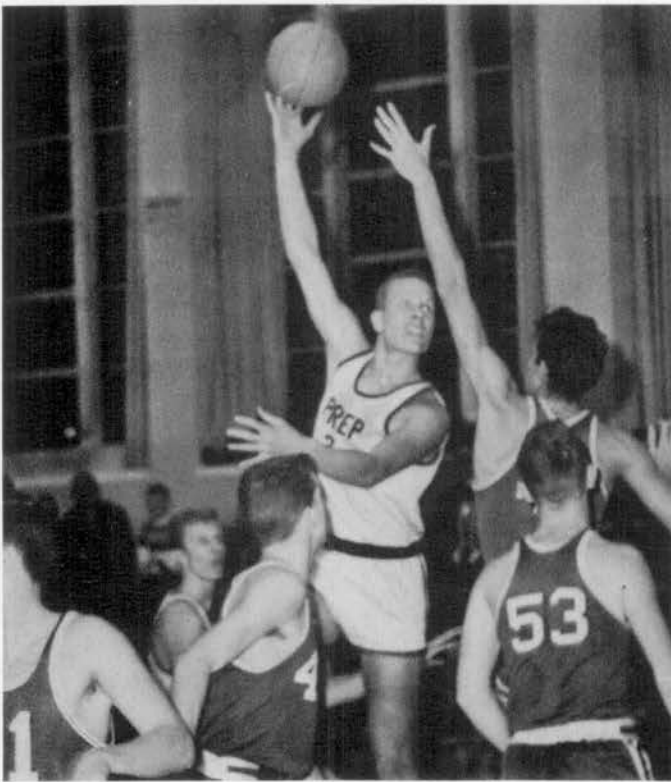

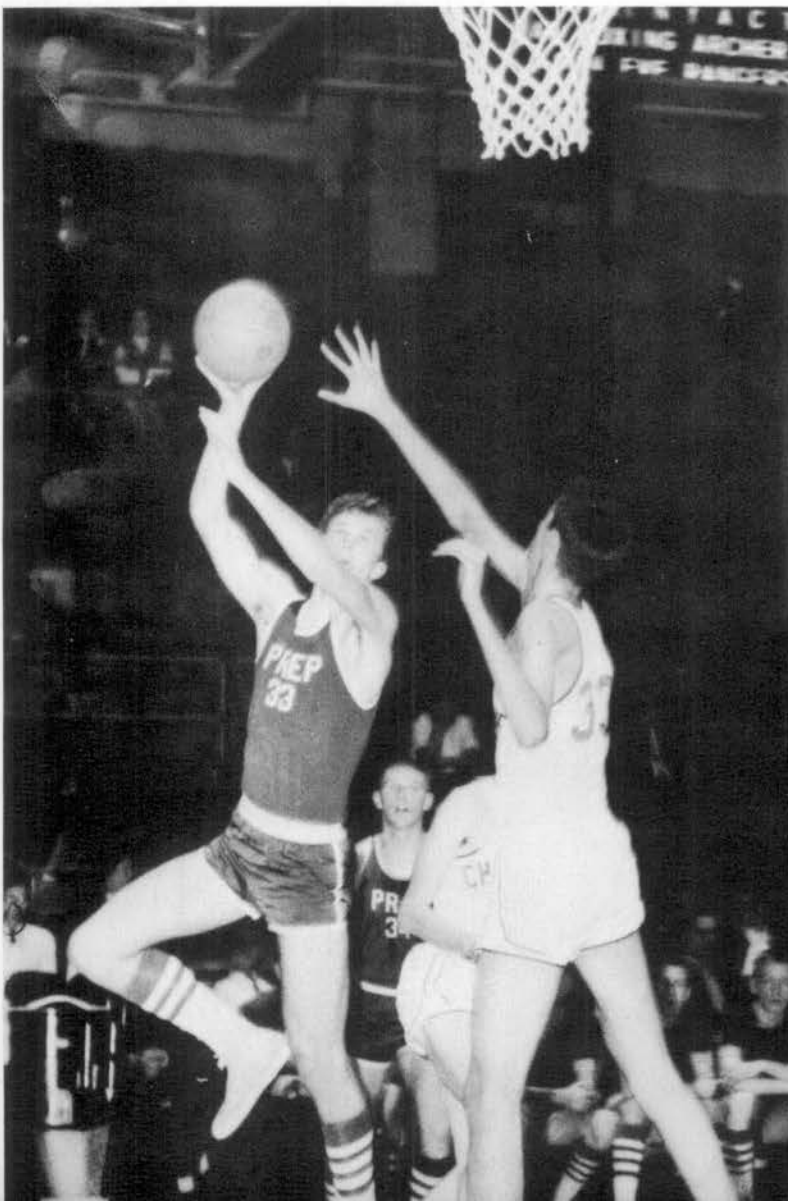

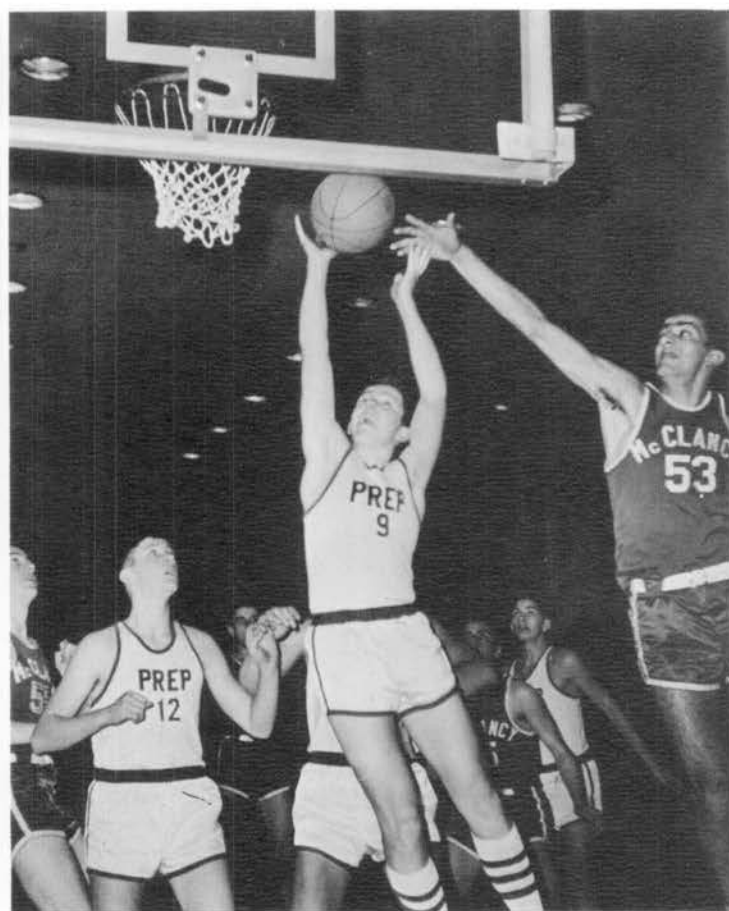

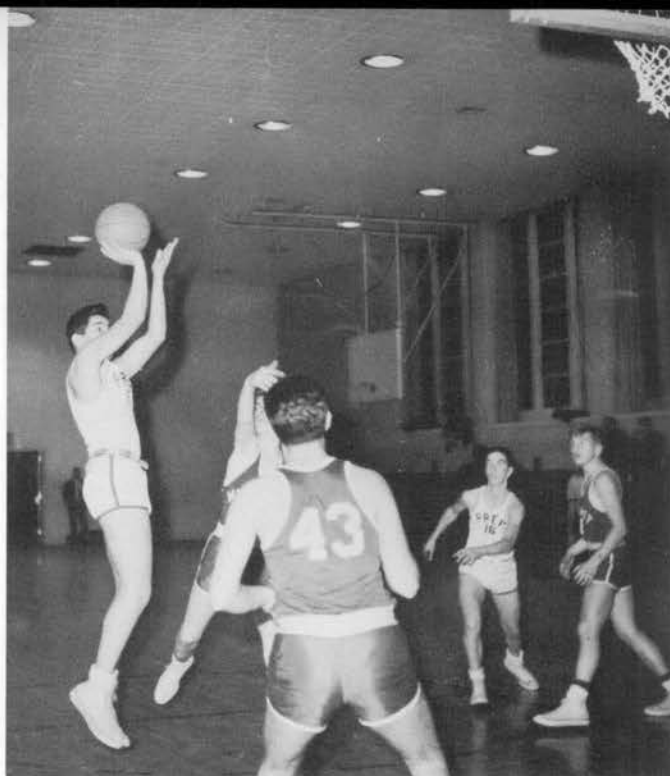

J.V. Captain Ed Petrazzollo hits for a deuce against McClancy.



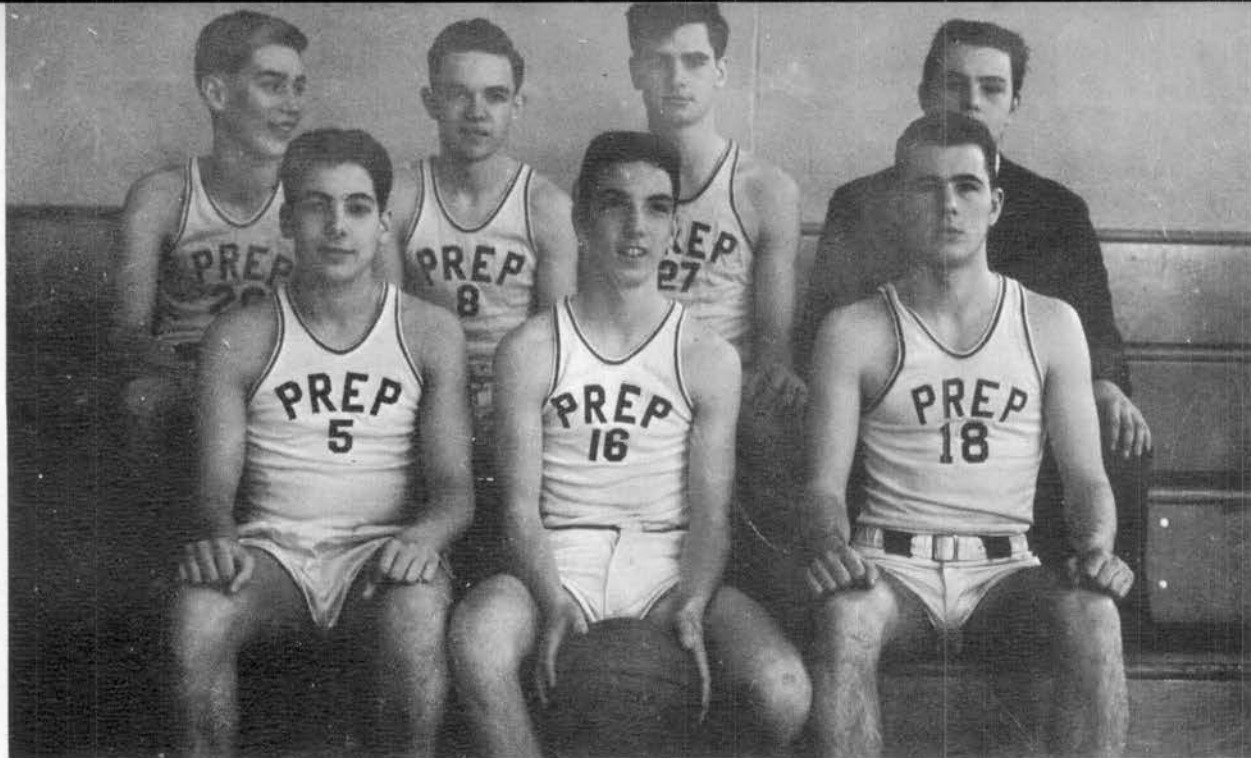
Tony Abbruzzese about to pop against McClancy.

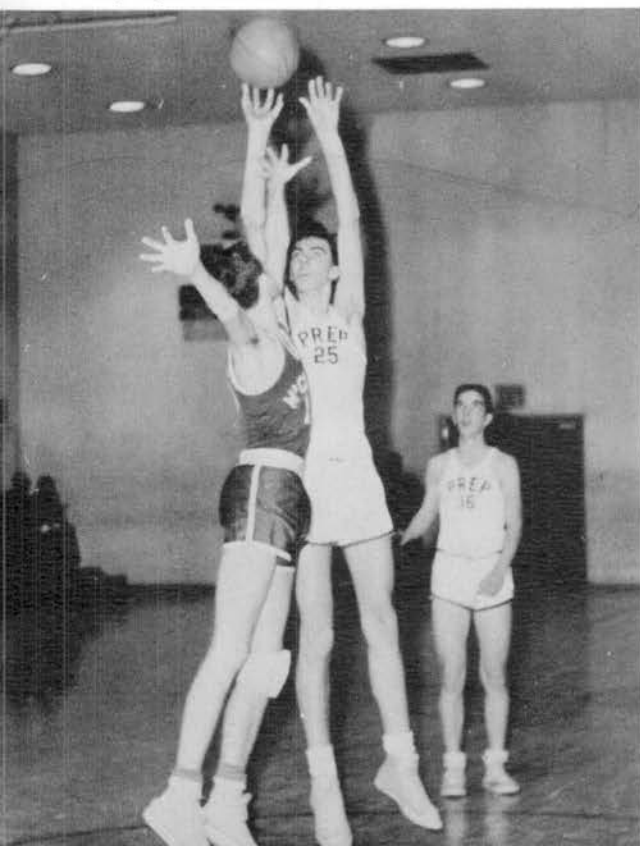

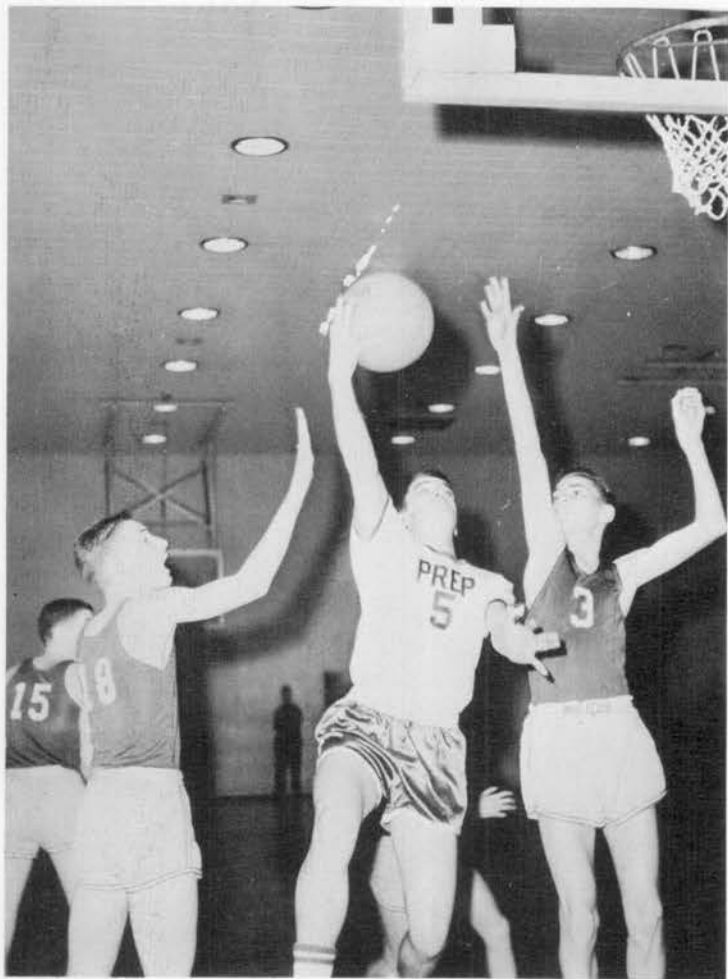

Giordano shoots with the defense around his neck.

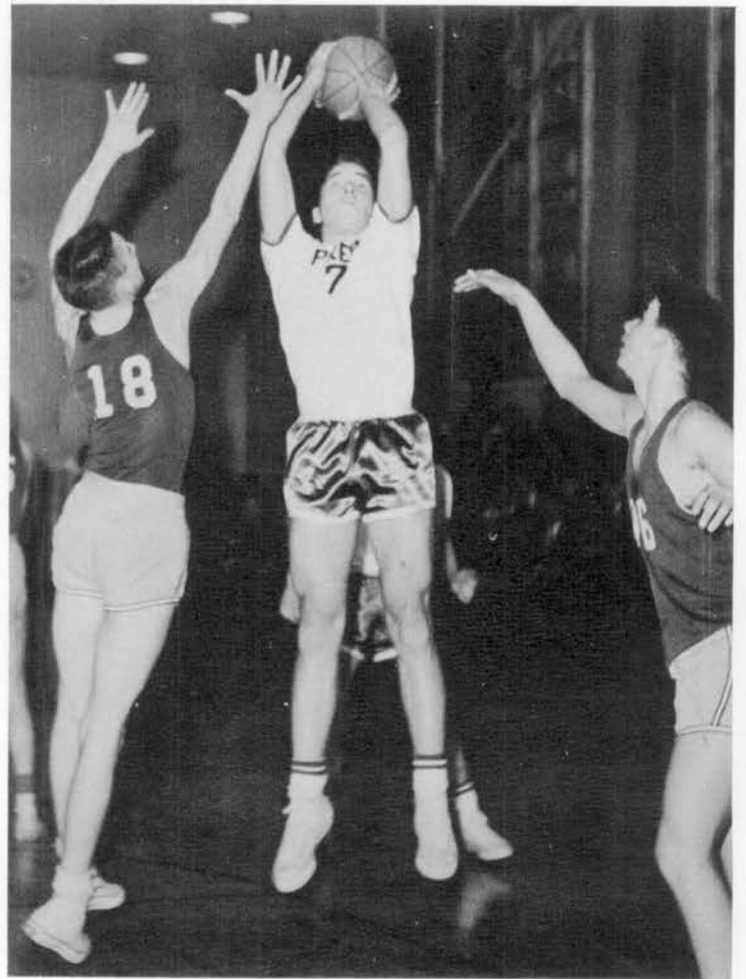


Skip Spano towers over Crusader forward.

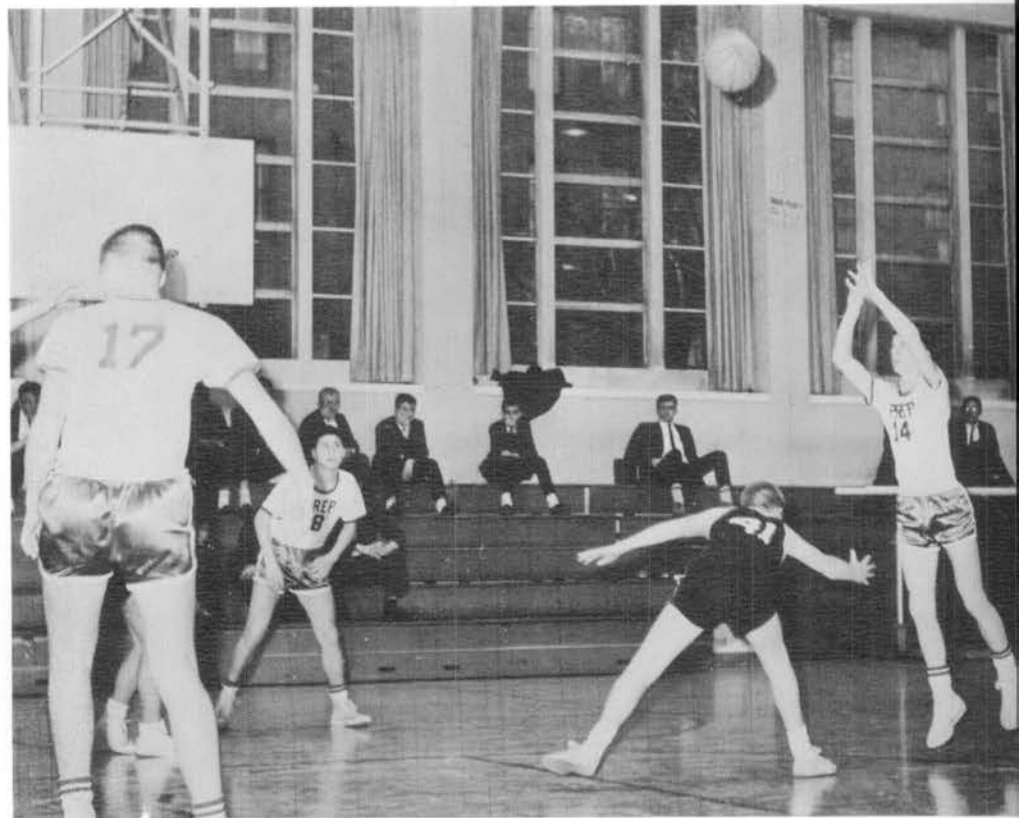

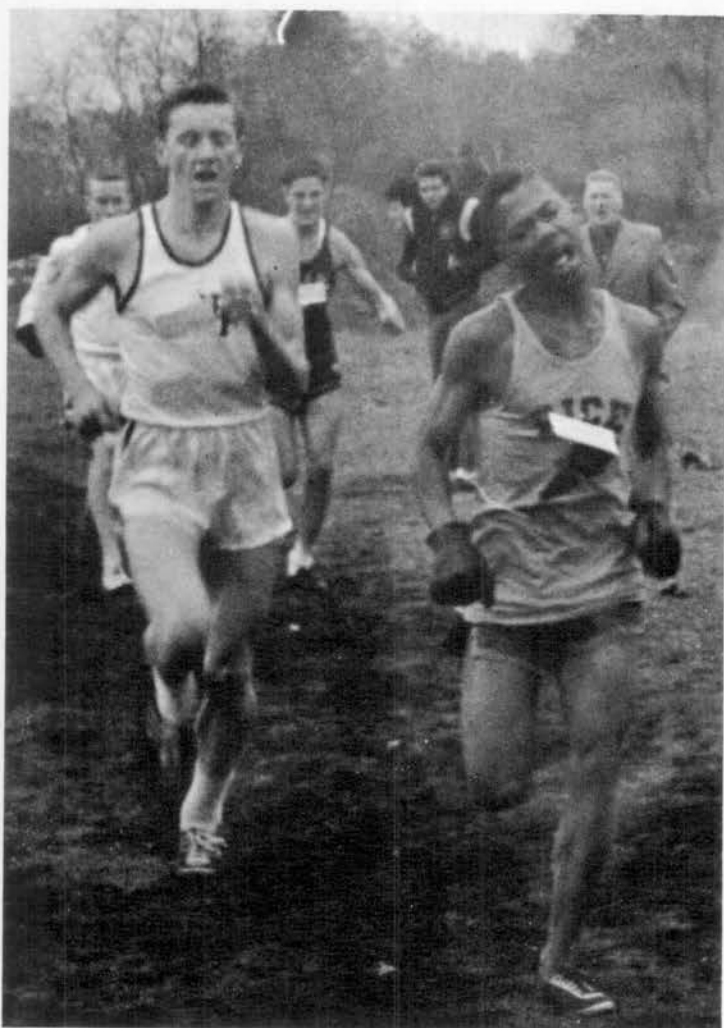
Cross - Country Team Wins Jesuit Crown

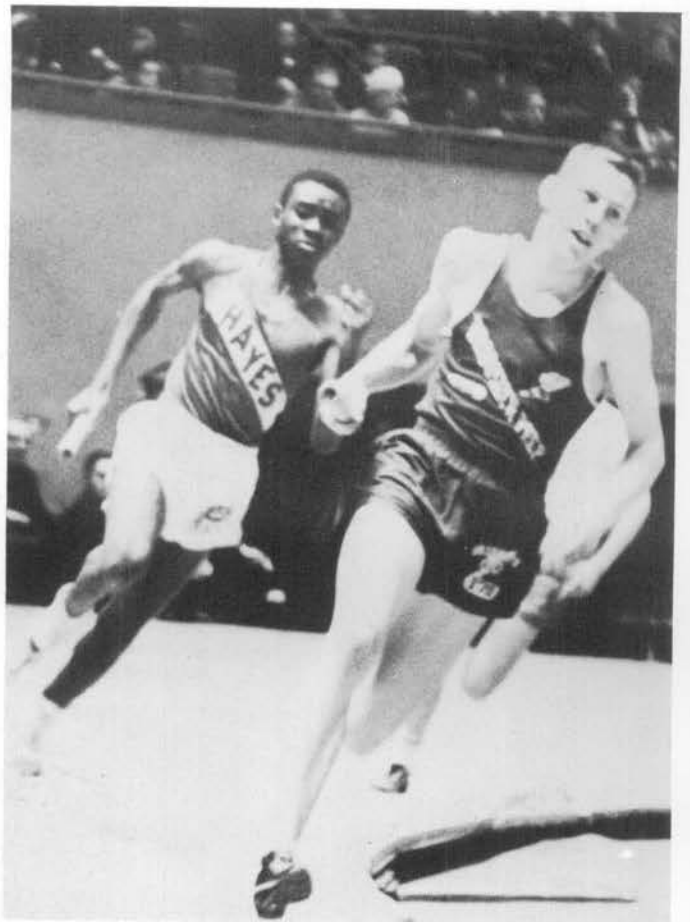

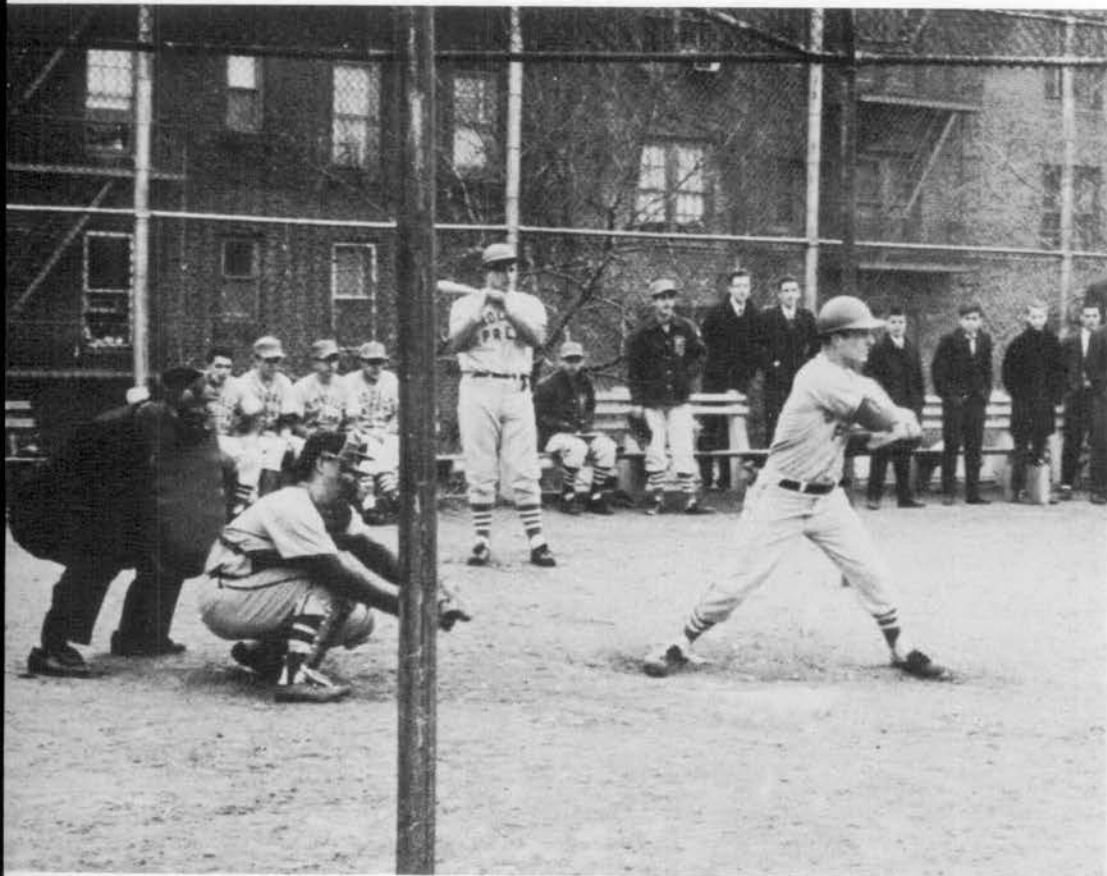

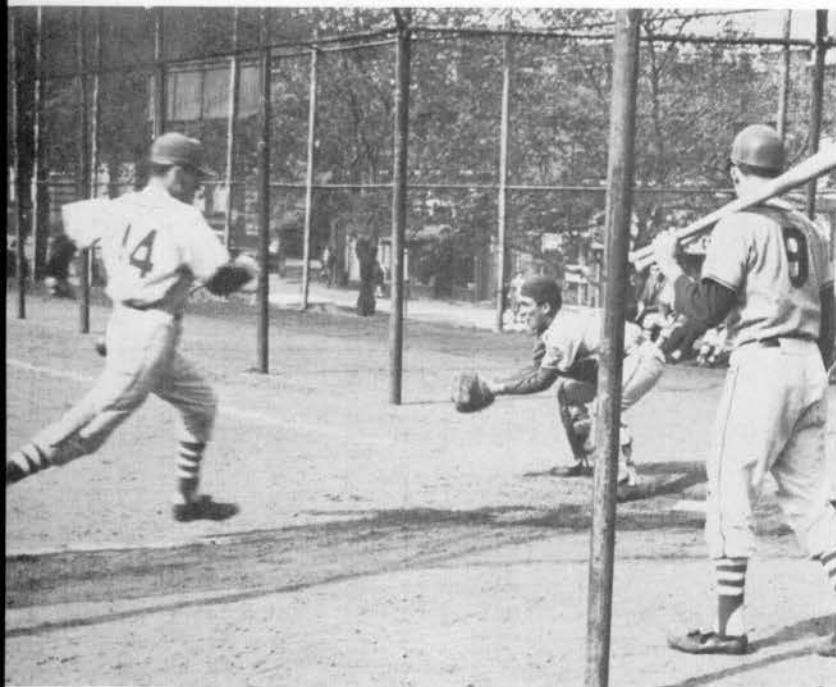

The Eagles then went on a four-game winning streak, beating Trinity, Cathedral, Xaverian and McClancy. 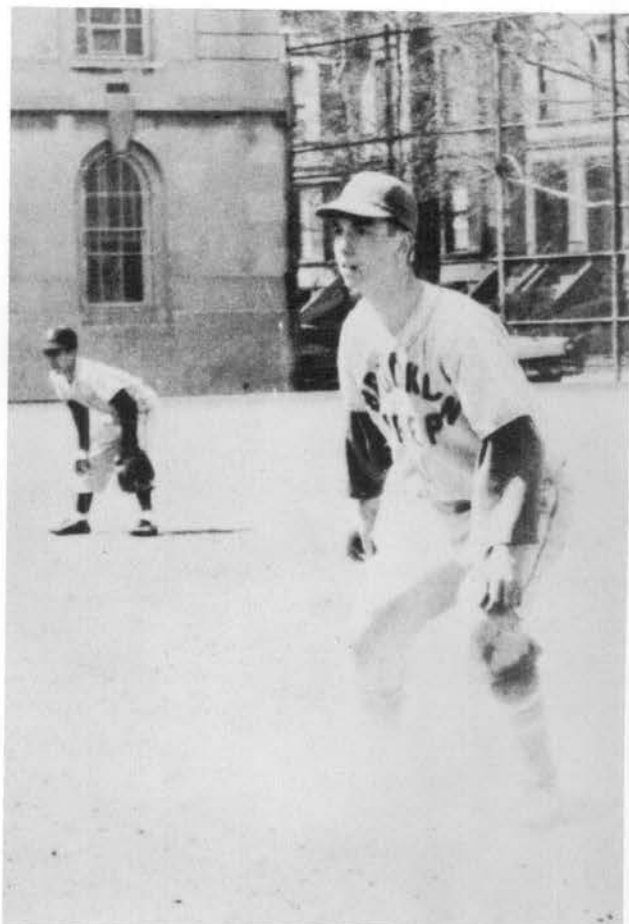
Tony Giordano handled the duties behind the plate. Tony picked off 14 runners in the first eight games of the season.

Chris Termini, Greg Foley, and Paul Purpi led the mound corps. The trio consistently turned in excellent performances but pitched in bad luck.

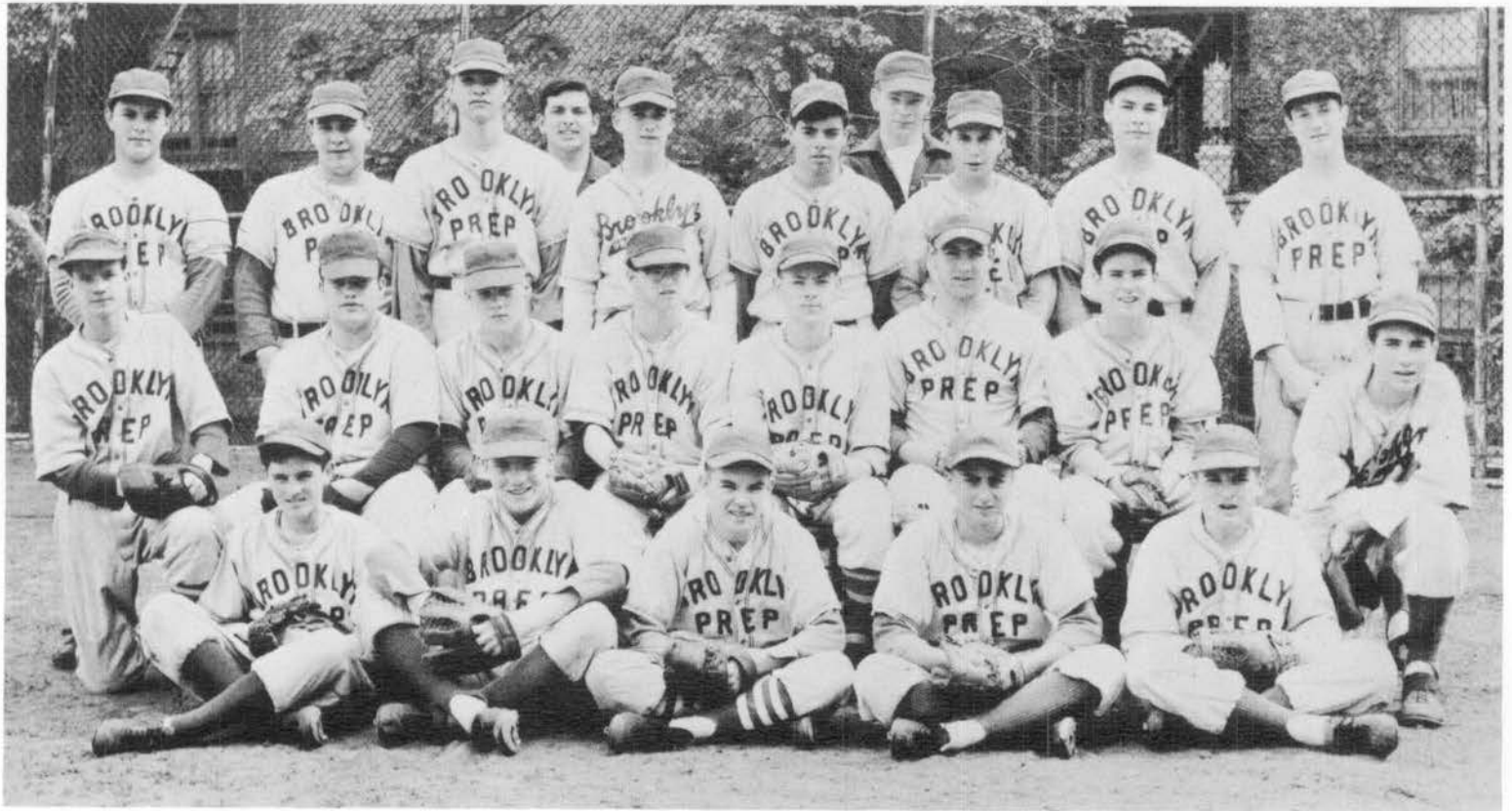

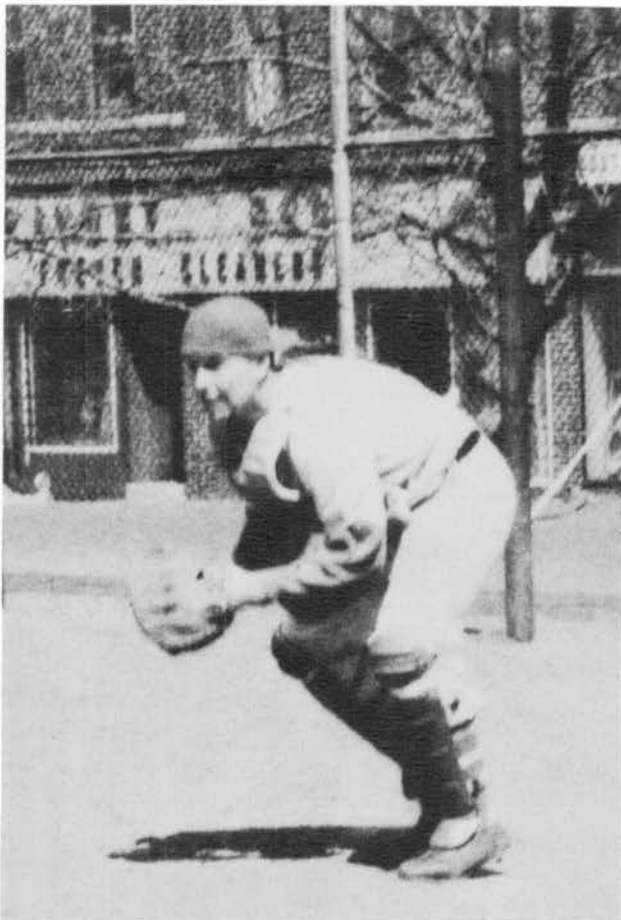
Paul Purpi fires one against Cathedral in the first victory for the J.V. team. Due to last year's experience, Paul will be a mainstay in the Prep's mound corps.

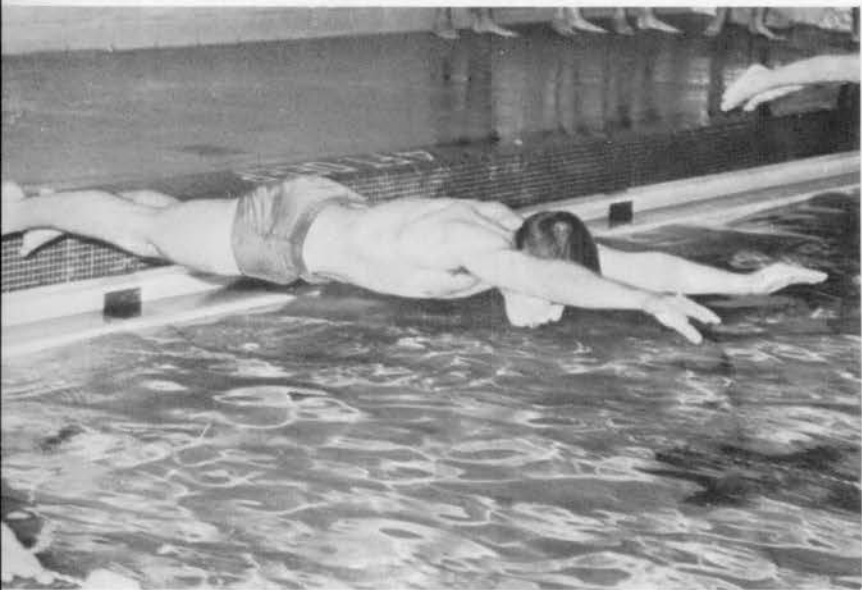

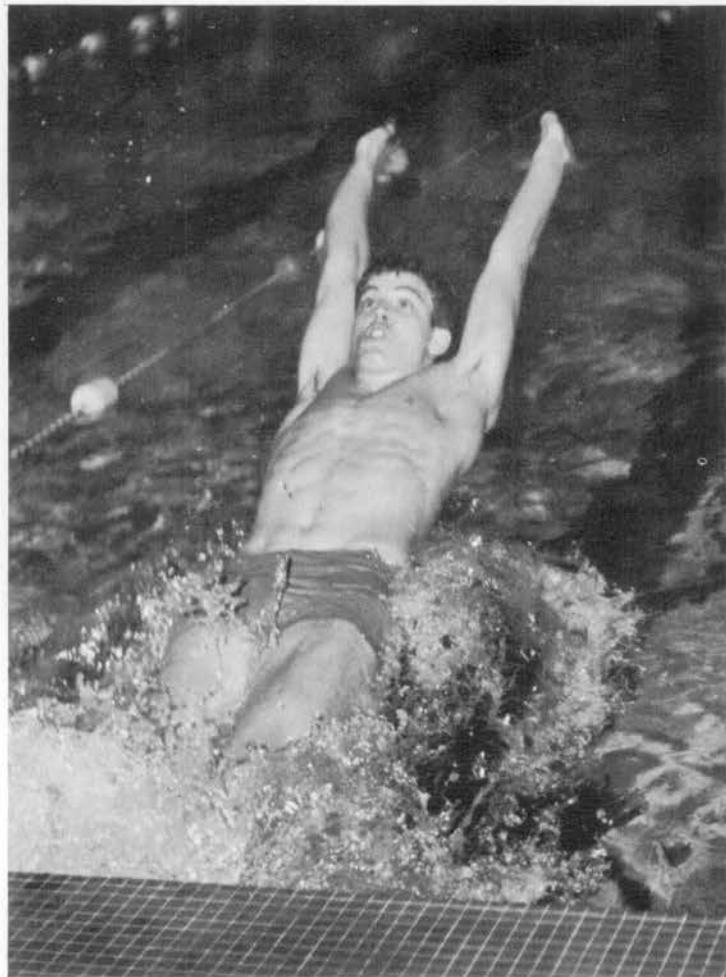

The varsity swimming team enjoyed one of its best seasons in almost a decade. The team earned many laurels under the guidance of its veteran coach, Mr. Walter Doolan.

The season began during the Christmas vacation with a victory over St. Peter's Prep from New Jersey. Two days later on a muggy Dec. 29, the Eagles journeyed to Fordham University. Late that afternoon they returned home with the team trophy for the Jesuit Metropolitan Championships. Many fine performances were turned in, but the best was by junior backstroker John Doherty, who won two gold medals. The medley relay, anchored by Tom Bell, took first, and senior Vic Howard won the dive with an excellent performance. The team scored a total of 48 points in capturing this title. The team now readied itself for the regular league season. Prep had little trouble in downing Holy Cross. The next meet was against the Terriers of St. Francis. Every Prep swimmer turned in his best performance and the battle went down to the last event, but St. Francis was able to take the freestyle relay and thus win the meet. Two weeks later the Eagles suffered their second and last loss of the season. A re-scheduled meet with Loughlin proved to be fatal to Prep's hopes for the city championship. Once again the meet went down to the last event; however, the team was not in shape for this meet due to the rescheduling. Prep bounced back in its next encounter by routing Trinity. 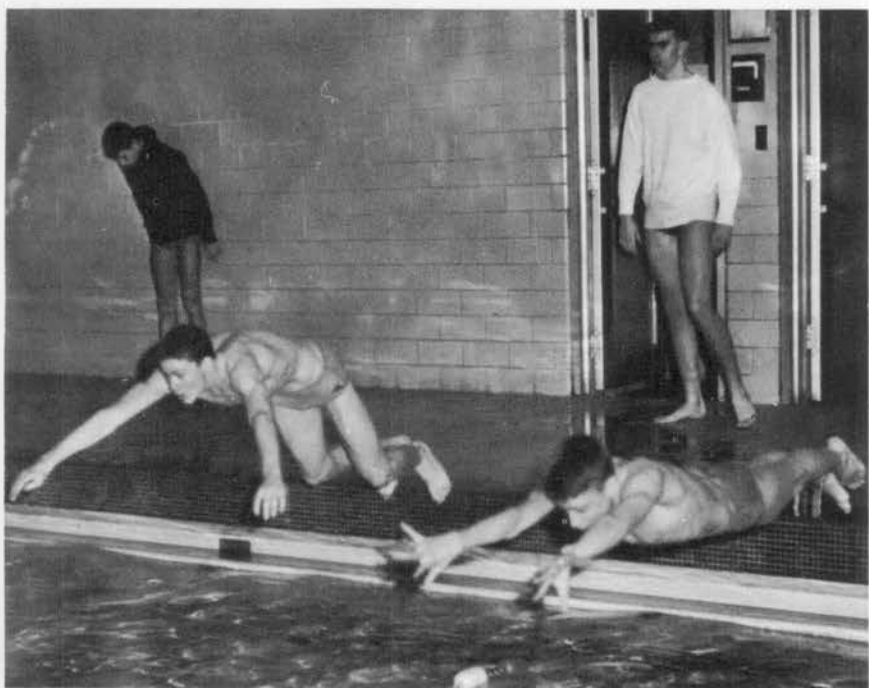
unbeaten in the 100-yard backstroke.

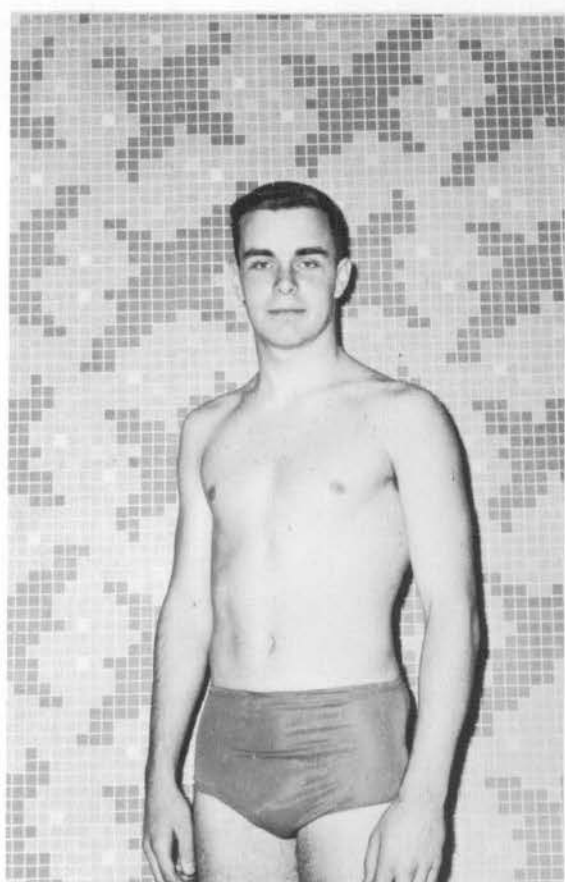

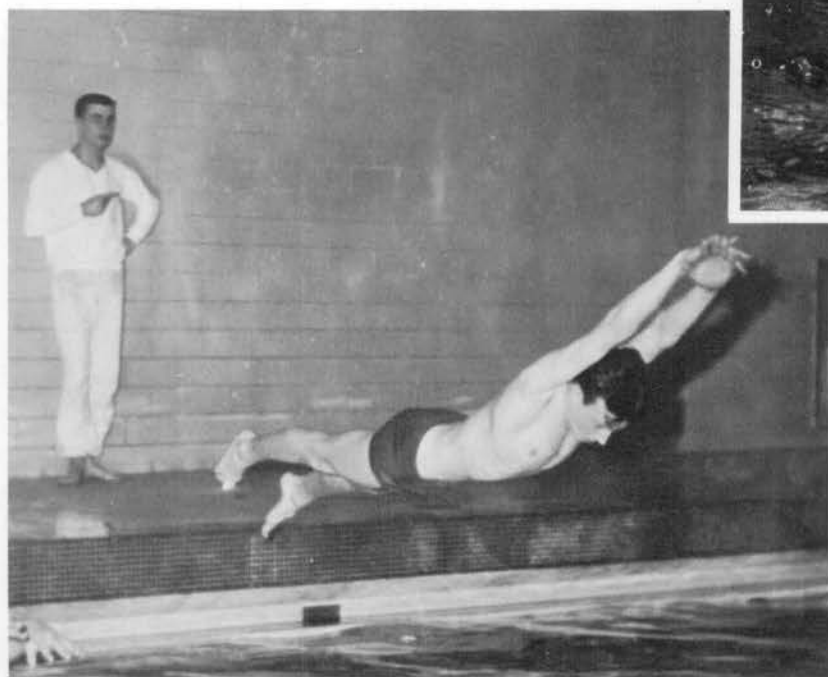

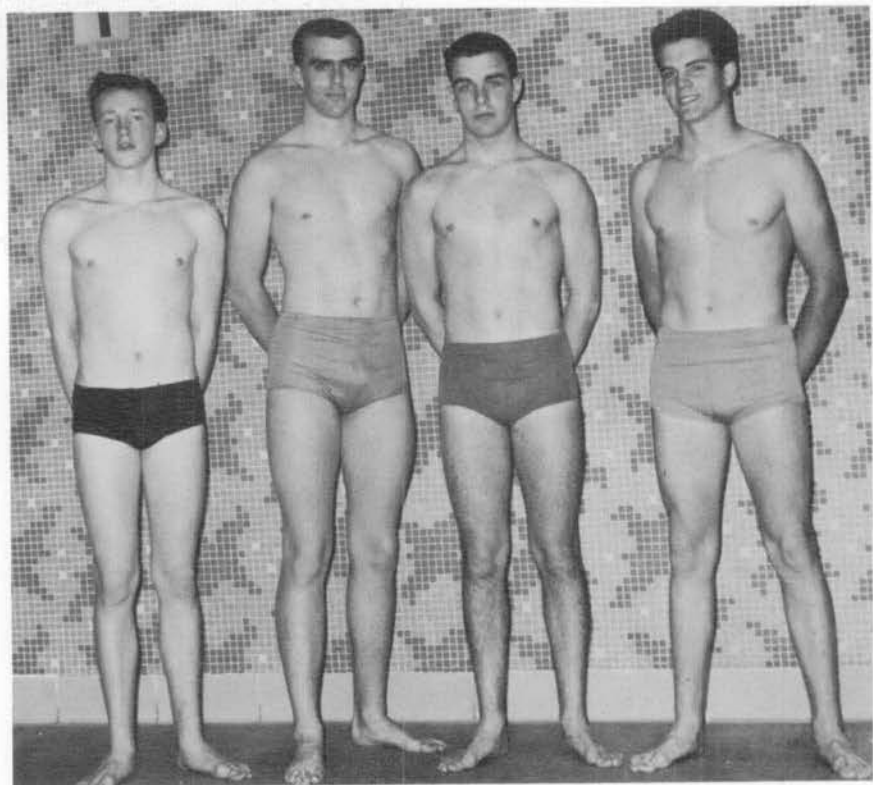

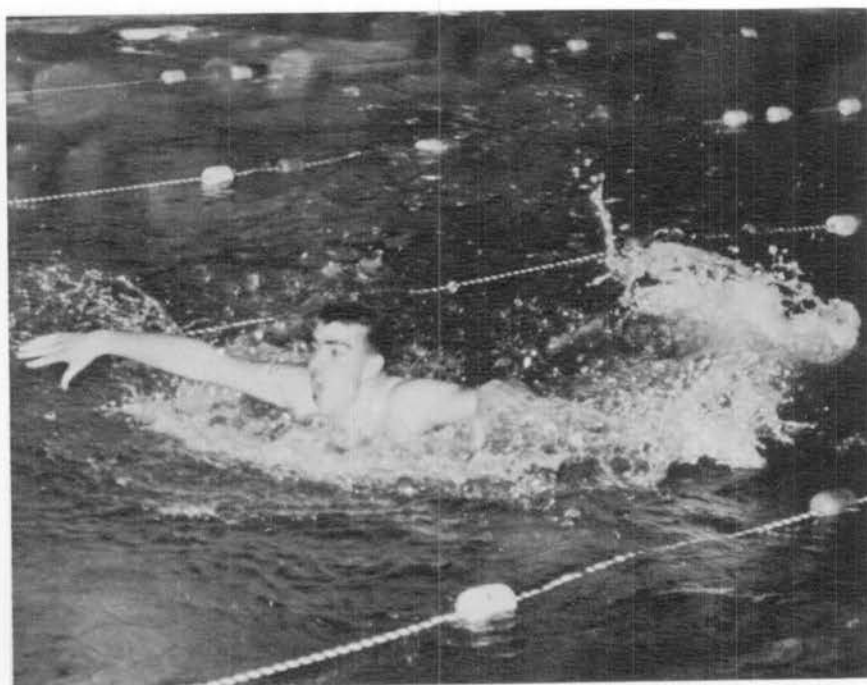
Tony Fiore demonstrates why he scored so heavily throughout the season. Fiore took second place in the Jesuit Championships.

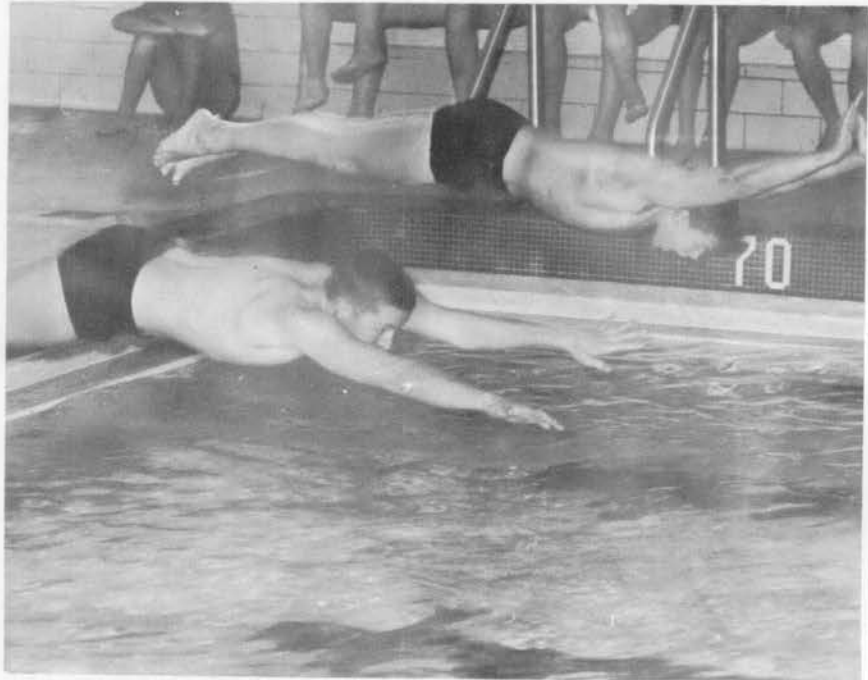


Senior Tom Bell readies himself for the start. Tom took second place in the 50 yard free-style in the A.A.P.S. championships.

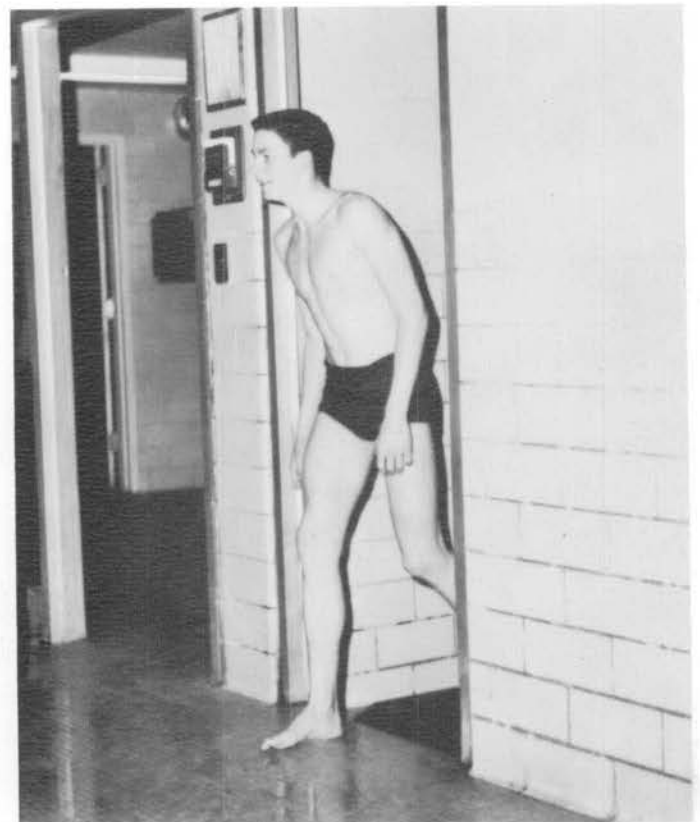

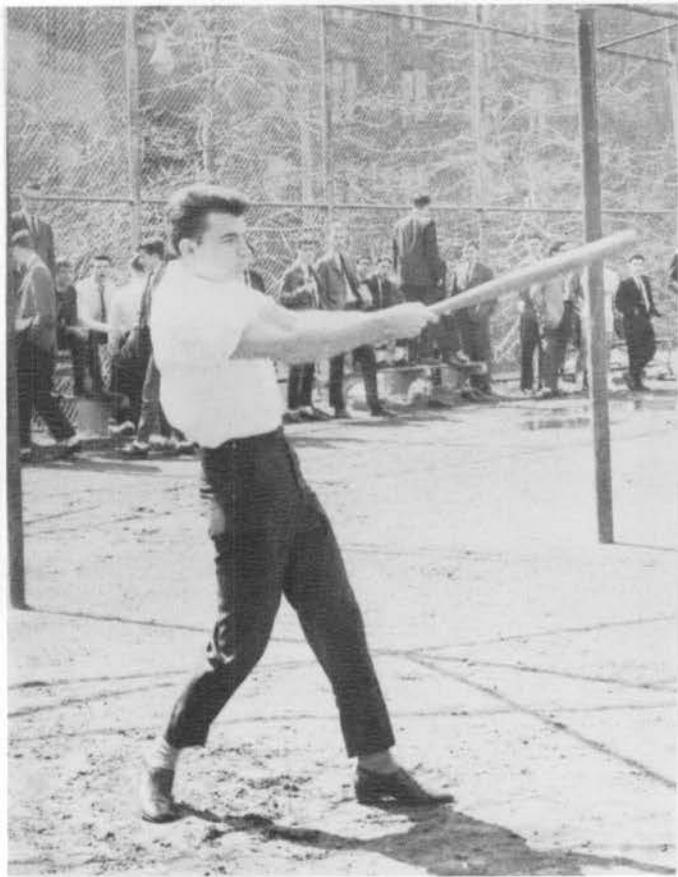
