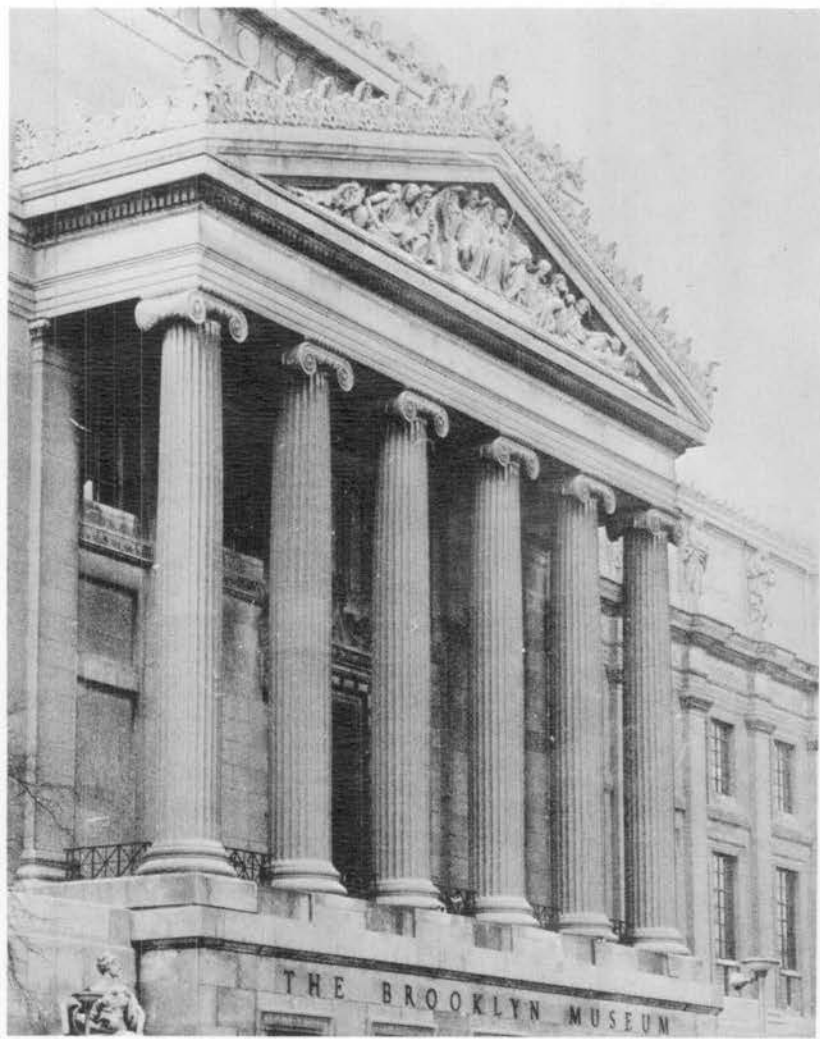


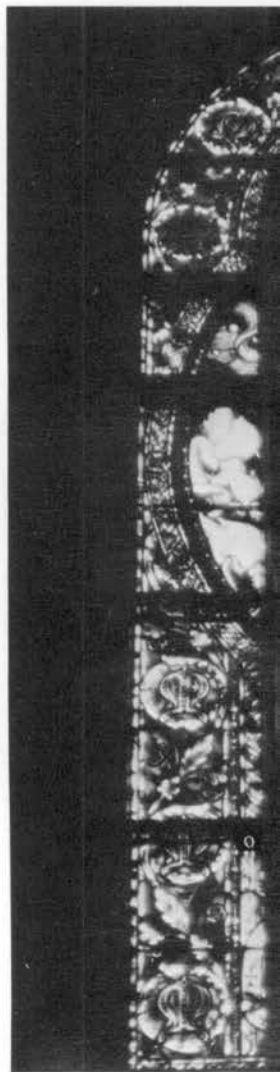


BROOKLYN IS A CITY OF MONUMENTS TO MEN AND LEARNING

In the heart of the borough, the Brooklyn Museum stands for our ever-expanding knowledge of man's past. To open horizons on this knowledge, to begin the lifelong assault, this is part of Brooklyn Prep's work. But to narrow man to his books and arts is short-sighted. The Arch in Brooklyn's Grand Army Plaza (above), commemorating the Union dead in the Civil War, reminds the Prep man of his right to put down any remnant of the past to fight for the ideal of

the future. Likewise, Brooklyn's monument to John F. Kennedy (opposite, top right), a man who nationally acted out the script Prepmen learn in school, reminds them they must be vigorous in pursuit of Christian leadership. Such vigor exists at Prep; pictured opposite is sophomore Sal Matera tutoring in the Higher Achievement Program men of the future whose past has not been so full of advantage as his own. 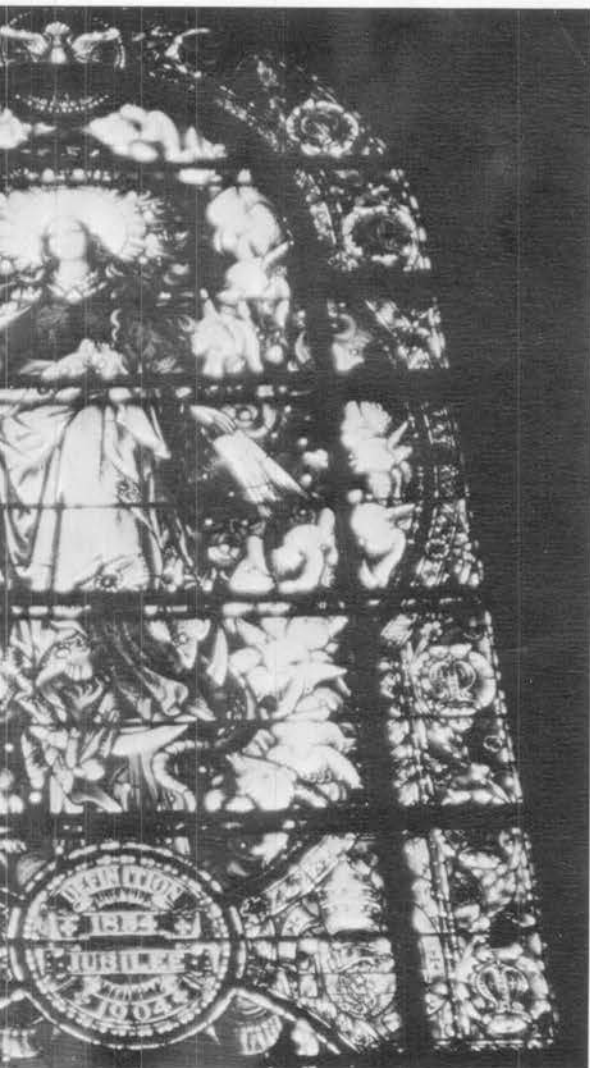




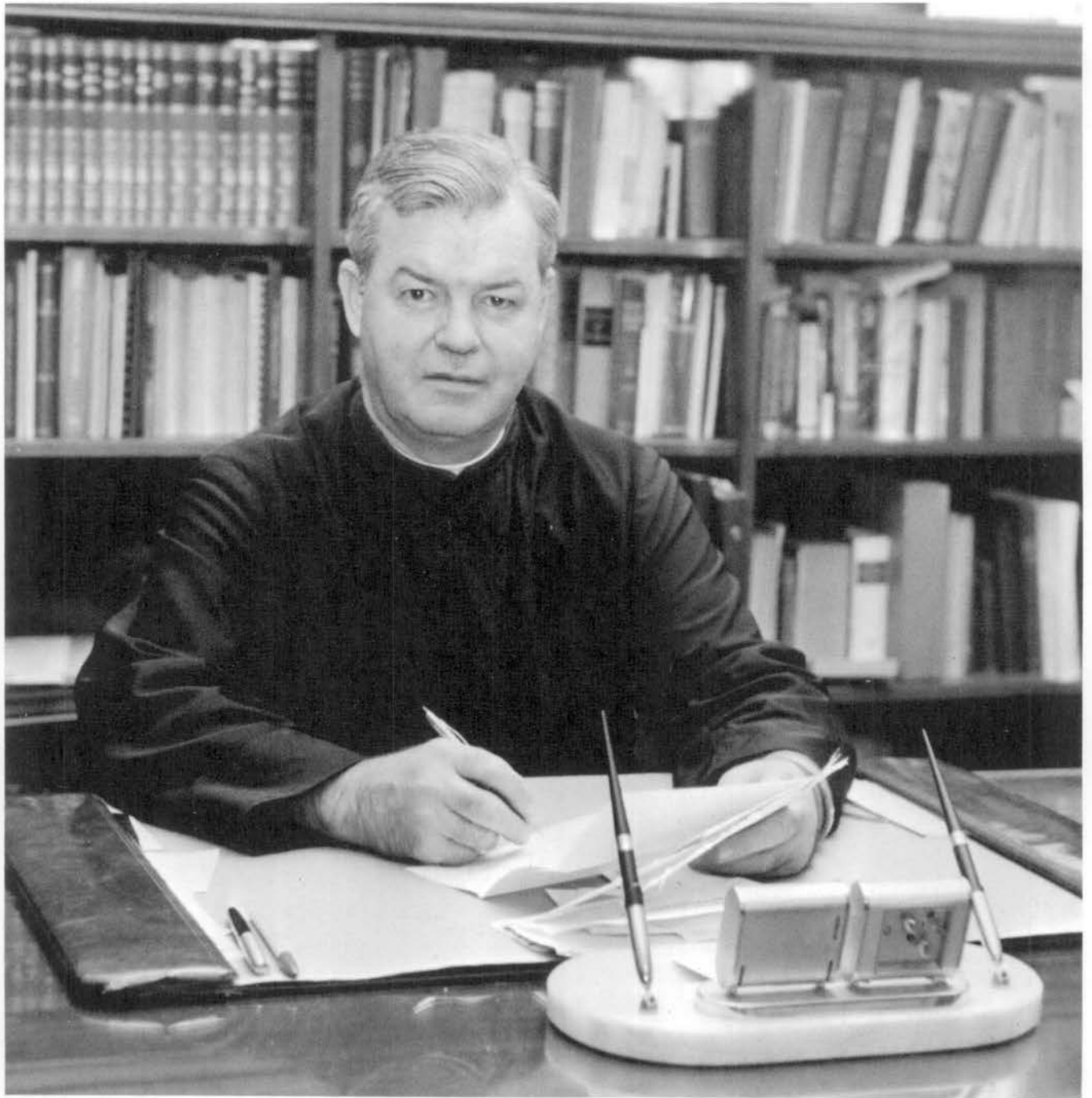


BROOKLYN IS A CITY OF CHURCHES

St. James Pro-Cathedral is the oldest church in Brooklyn. For decades its cupola (opposite) and stained glass window (left) have symbolized the Brooklyn man's quest for God through His Church. In fact, the faith so flourished here in Brooklyn that the borough has earned the title "The City of Churches." Brooklyn Preparatory School, a Jesuit school, exists to keep alive the Catholic tradition, an old tradition, as the Pro-Cathedral reminds us, but also a tradition that renews itself. Such renewal causes the Bishops of the Church to give their people more communal forms of worship, such as the concelebration of the Eucharistic Banquet shown above: Father Kelly, the Headmaster of the Prep, raises the Body of Christ during the concelebration of the Mass of the Holy Spirit in October. 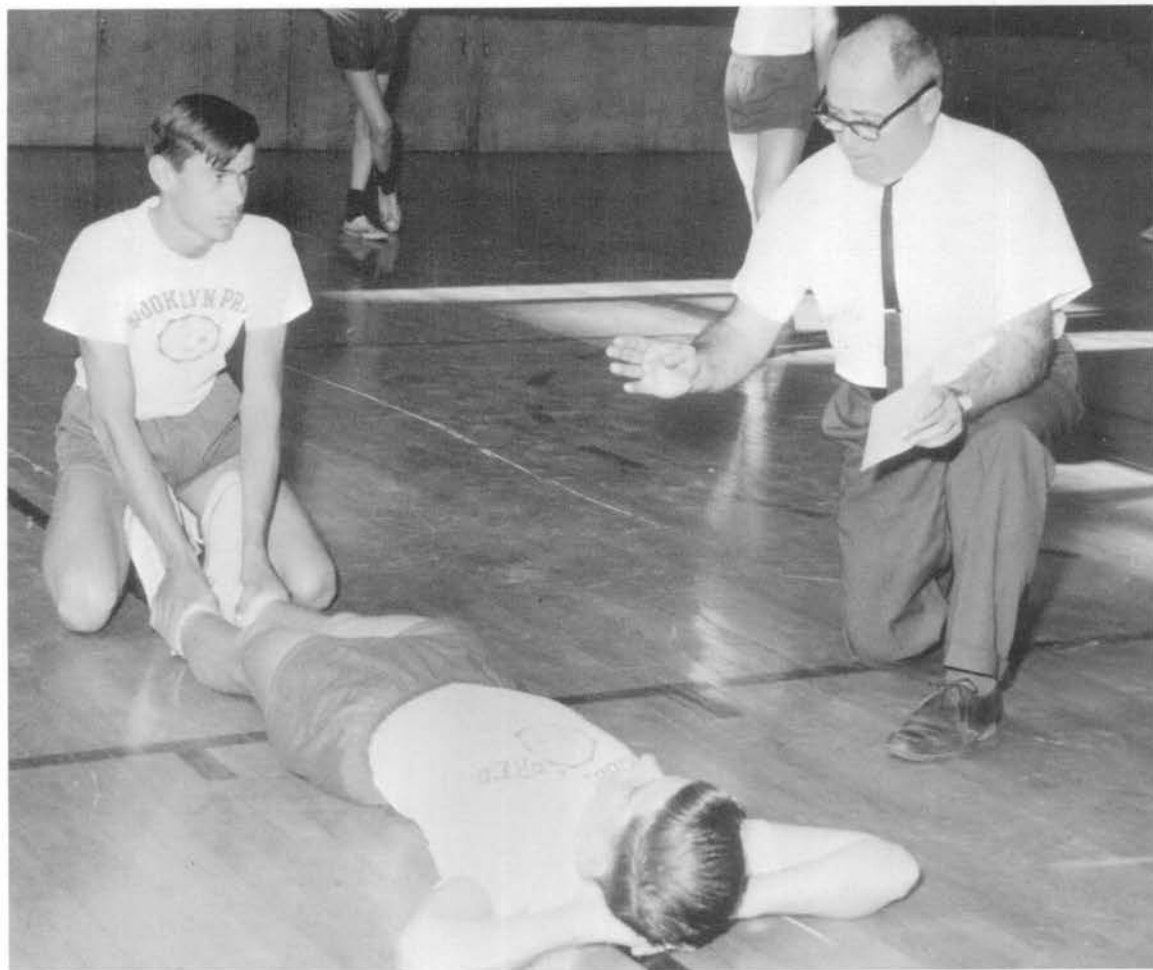
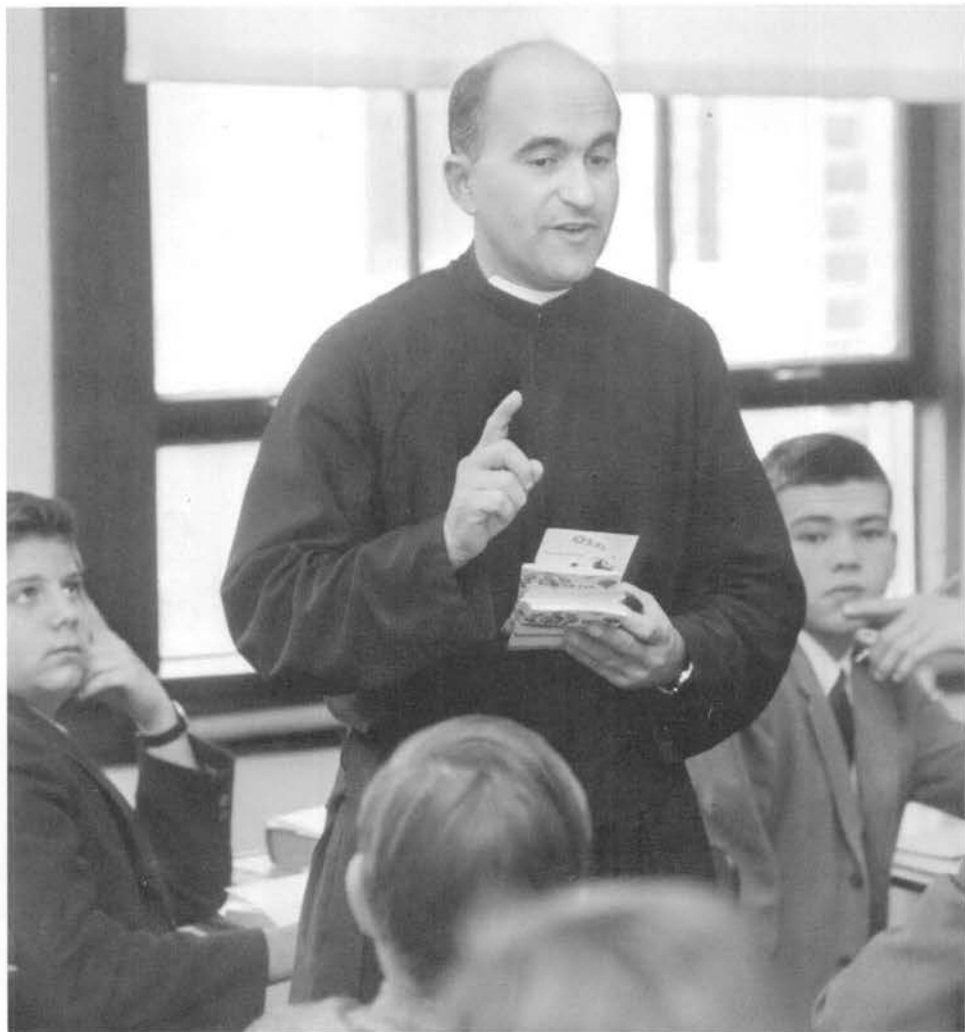


MR. JOHN LAWN leads sophomores through the wilds of American Literature. He also coaches Varsity Basketball.

MR. RICHARD WINCHURCH tries to help those students challenged by their first encounter with basic Physics through a recently introduced course in Physical Science.



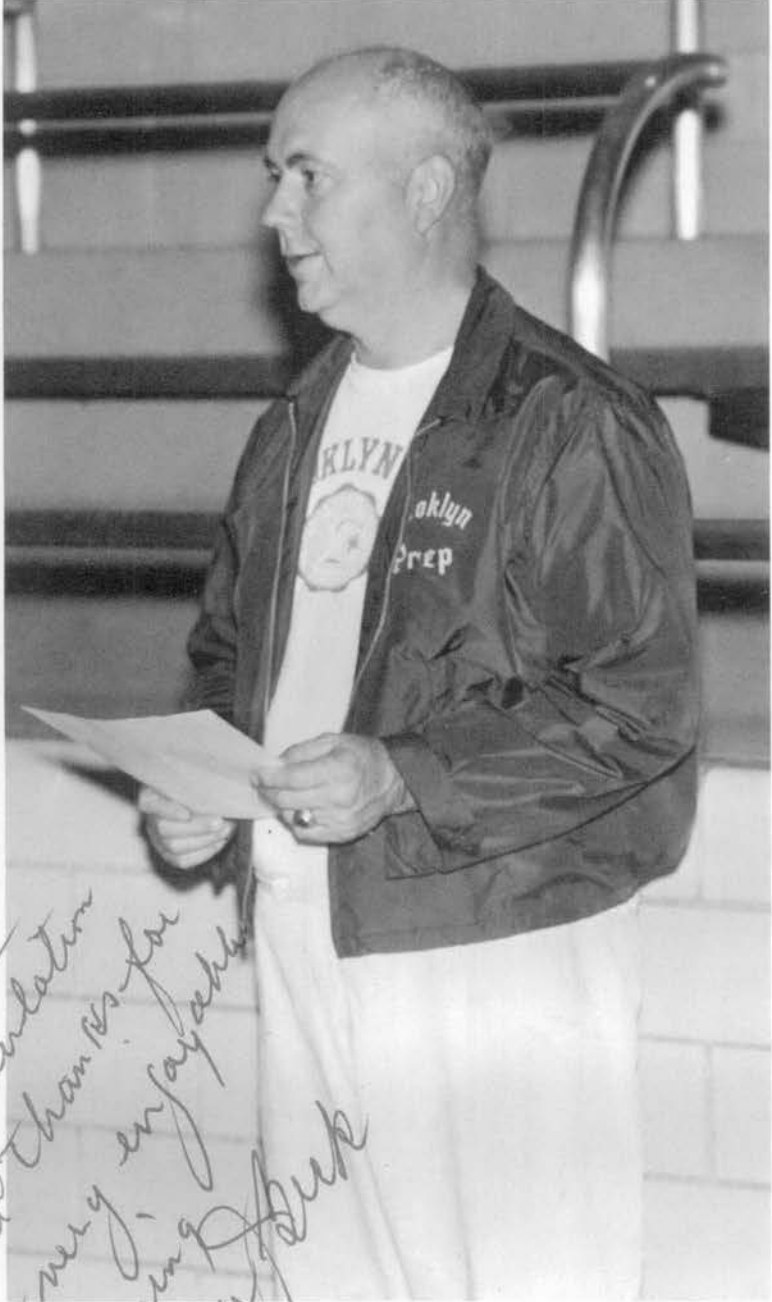

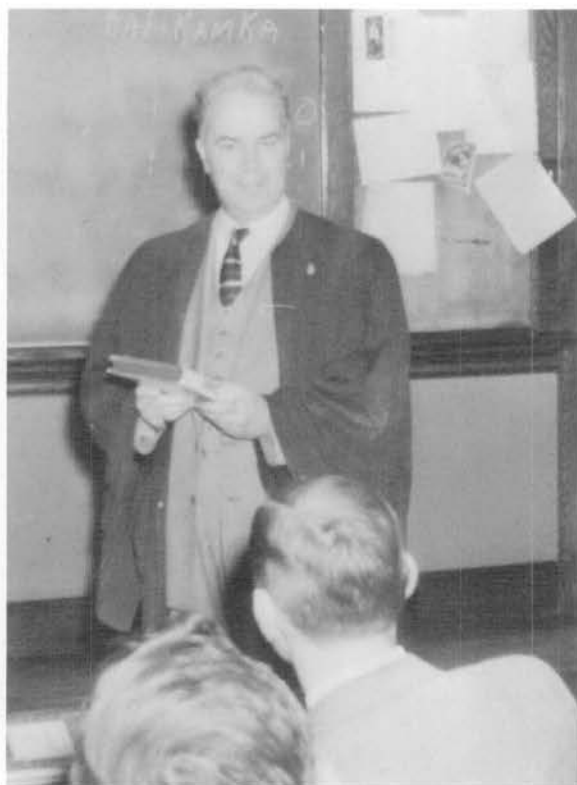
A cosmopolite in appearance, MR. JOSEPH QUINLAN is really stuck on America, the fascinating history of which he teaches seniors and juniors.



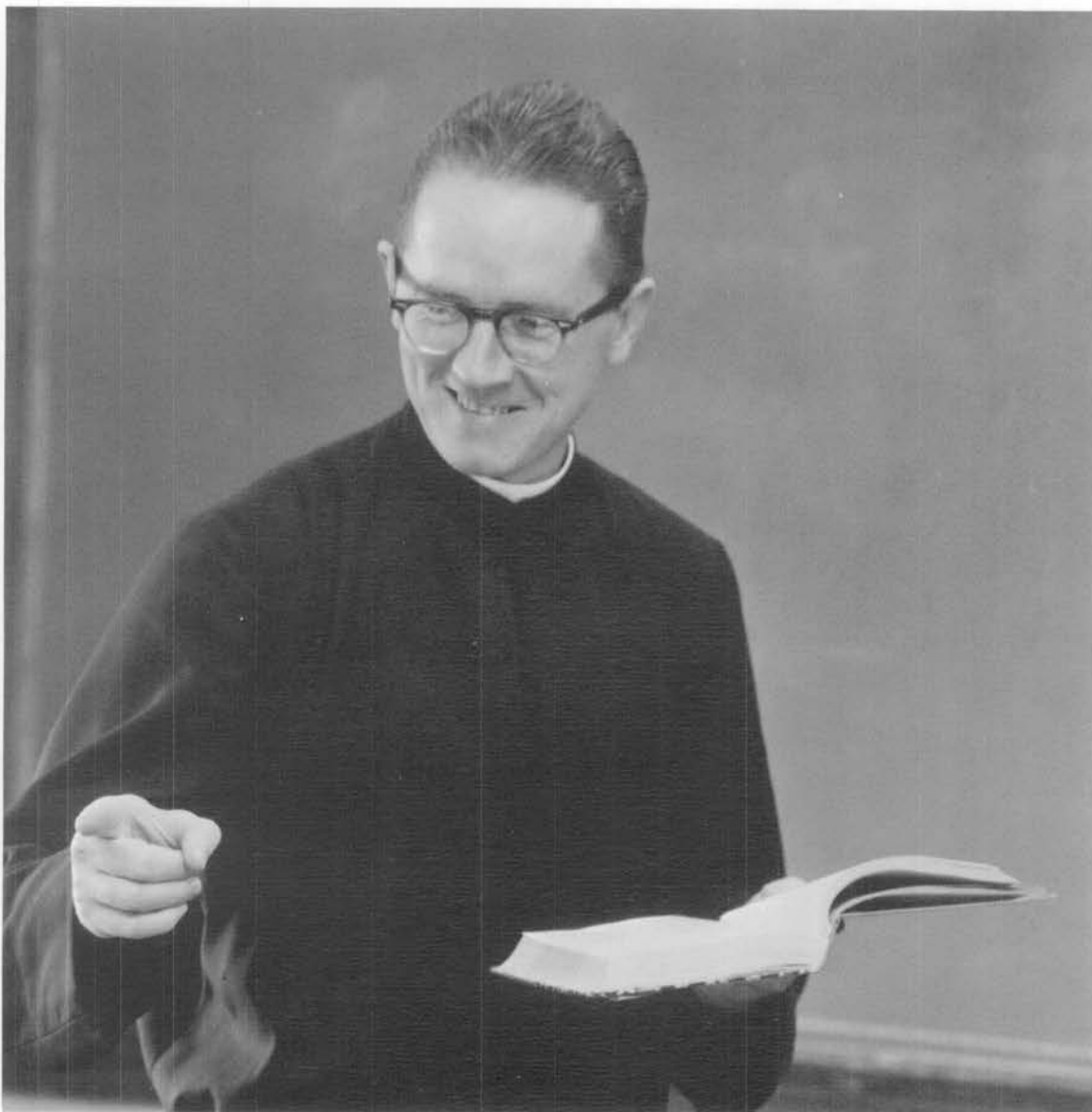

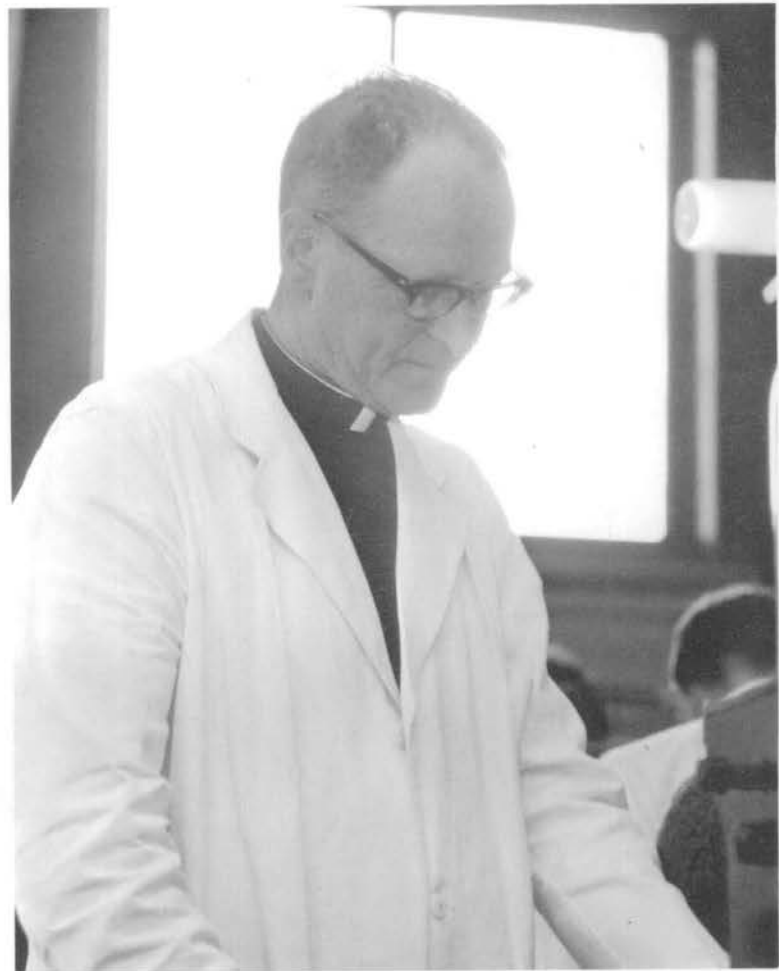

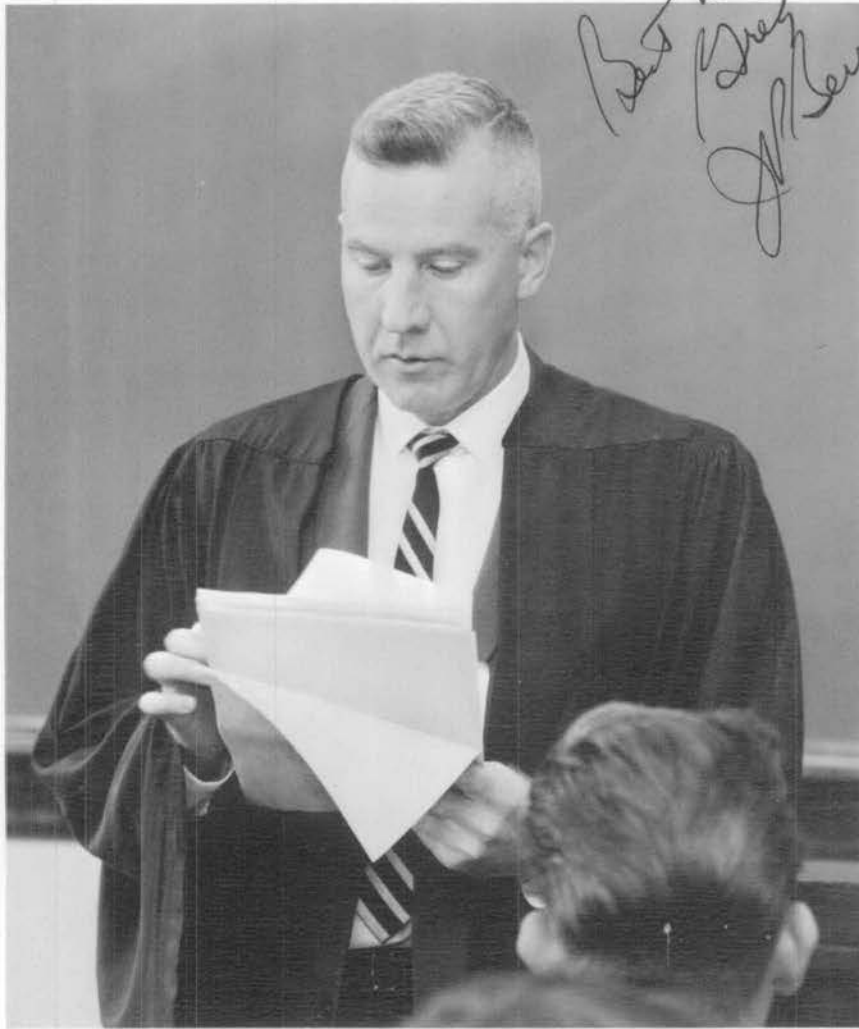

1963

On September 10, 1962, the Class of '66 began its Freshman Year. The beginnings were hard as the freshman had to get used to such things as jug, cafeteria food, and subways. Anxious to get into some activity, most of the Freshman class showed up for the first two Sodality meetings. This membership, however, rapidly diminished. Many victories belonged to these Brooklyn Prep frosh. The first Freshman football team in the history of the Prep was formed. It finished with a fine 2-1-1 record with Lumpy Lombardo, Mike O'Hara and Pete McColl gaining experience and fame. Mr. Bartley's Frosh basketball team finished at 16-3 which at that time was the best record ever posted by a Freshman team. And finally the Freshman swimmers went undefeated and were the City Champs. From this year's group, a fine Frosh debating team also emerged. But where there were some winners there were also some losers. Class 1F scored the overwhelming total of one point on Freshman Day to clinch last place. In the humor department, what freshman can ever forget Mr. (Good Joe) Streger, the Music Theory instructor, or the difficult Health and Safety course? And so the year passed with most freshmen getting into the groove of Prep life and avoiding the shame of being 2:45 men.

1964

Sophomore Year was a sad year filled with losses. During this year the whole world was shocked at the death of John F. Kennedy. Everyone at Prep mourned Father Ricardo Fernandez, S.J., the Director of Development, who died in 1964. But the biggest loss was felt by Sophomore Year and Class 2G in particular when fellow classmate Jay Loughlin passed away. The losses continued in a different sense as none of the J.V. teams were anything to brag about. The J.V. football and basketball teams finished under .500. Brooklyn Prep lost on the television program "It's Academic." Also during the course of the year, Father Thomas Dorney, S.J. replaced Fr. Engel as Prefect of Discipline during his leave of absence. The Student Council brought back the boat ride to Rye Beach. A Glee Club was formed under Mr. Ell. The Brooklyn Prep Band played at the N. Y. State Pavilion at the World's Fair. And the Latin Sight team was renamed the Cicero Longhorns by the sophomores—the rage was Latin Sight team jokes. Second year students imagined Mr. Nebot drilling the team in their sweats on a tough passage from Caesar's Commentaries. A significant Sophomore Year thus came to a close, and the stay at Prep for the Class of '66 was half over.

Because so many things happened in Junior Year, it would be better simply to recall them in succession. Father Stephen Meany, S.J. replaced Father Engel as Prefect of Discipline and the latter was named as Head of the Alumni Office. The seniors staged a mass protest on the library by borrowing six or seven books each. They were protesting that some of the material kept in the library was actually on the grammar school level. This demonstration fizzled when it was announced that a 500-word typed book report was to be handed in on each book that was borrowed. The Varsity swimmers excelled, as did the Track and Cross-Country teams. Juniors learned about college on College Night and took their first big tests, National Merit and SAT. They went on their first Closed Retreat. Most juniors found it inspiring. The Higher Achievement Program was started, and the National Honor Society was established at Prep. The juniors got their rings at the February Ring Dance. John "Lumpy" Lombardo won the intramural Heavyweight Wrestling Crown. Humor? One junior melted a thermometer in the Chemistry Lab. The skateboard craze hit Prep students and some even tried it in the hallowed halls of the school. And finally the big thing of most of the year was imitating Soupy Sales and White Fang. Junior Year? Quick and eventful.

1966

The most recent memories come from Senior Year. The great Varsity football team with a 4-2-1 record beat St. John's Prep in a suspenseful, long-awaited victory. Kevin "Speedy" Serrapede, who finished with an average of over nine yards per carry on the year, and Ray "Nick Pietrosante" D'Antoni starred along with Pete McCall. The seniors took the six and one-half hour State Scholarship Test. A protest of protests saw some seniors burning their G.O. cards. Our All-American swimmer, Bob Burke, left the Prep for California. Mr. Charles Winans became irked when the Times went on strike. The opposite sex invaded Prep life as five girls from Bishop McDonnell High School had parts in the Shakespearan production, Richard II. Also the first girl cheerleaders in Prep's history greatly boosted school spirit. When Prep was plunged into darkness along with most of New York, 32 stranded Prepsters spent the night in the gym. During the transit strike school started again after an extended Christmas vacation. Subways out, the Editor of the '66 Blue Book roller-skated to school. These were some of the events of the beginning of Senior Year. Still to come were the Varsity basketball team's record, the Senior Closed Retreat, College choices and applications, the Senior Prom, and GRADUATION.

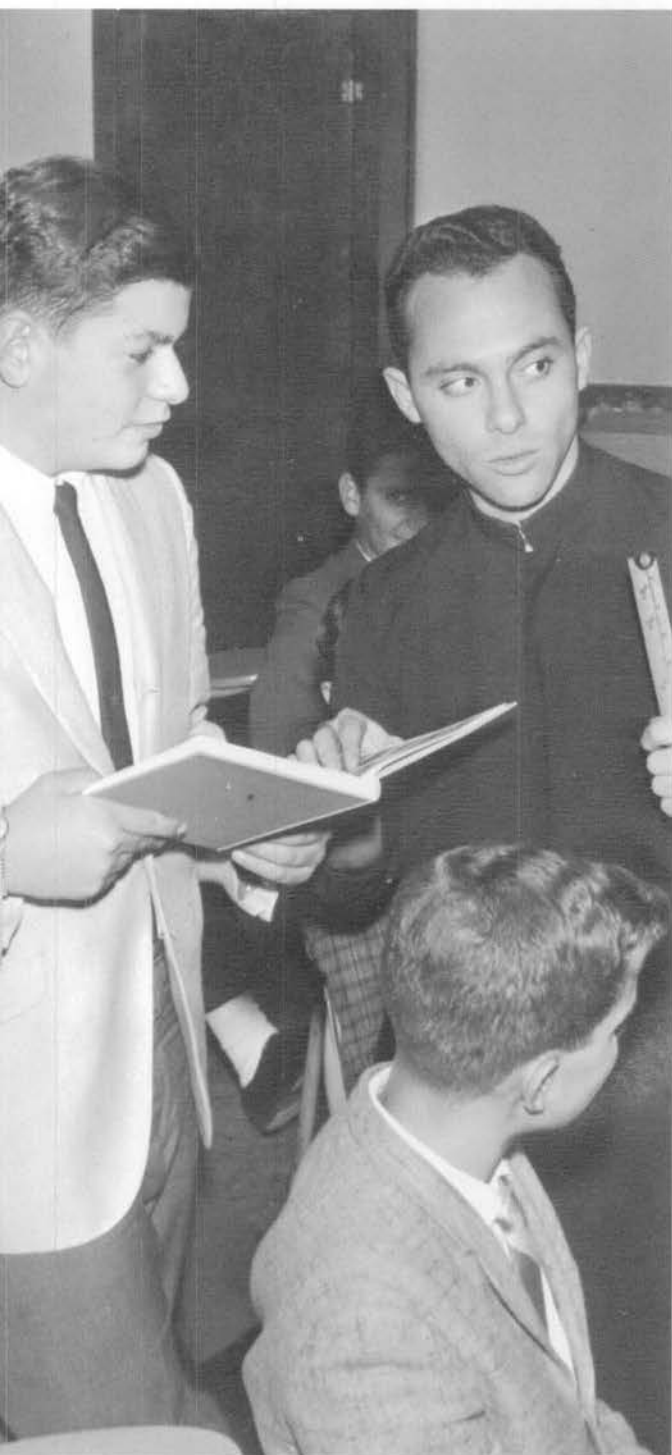

FROSH SWIMMERS WIN IN ALL CONTESTS

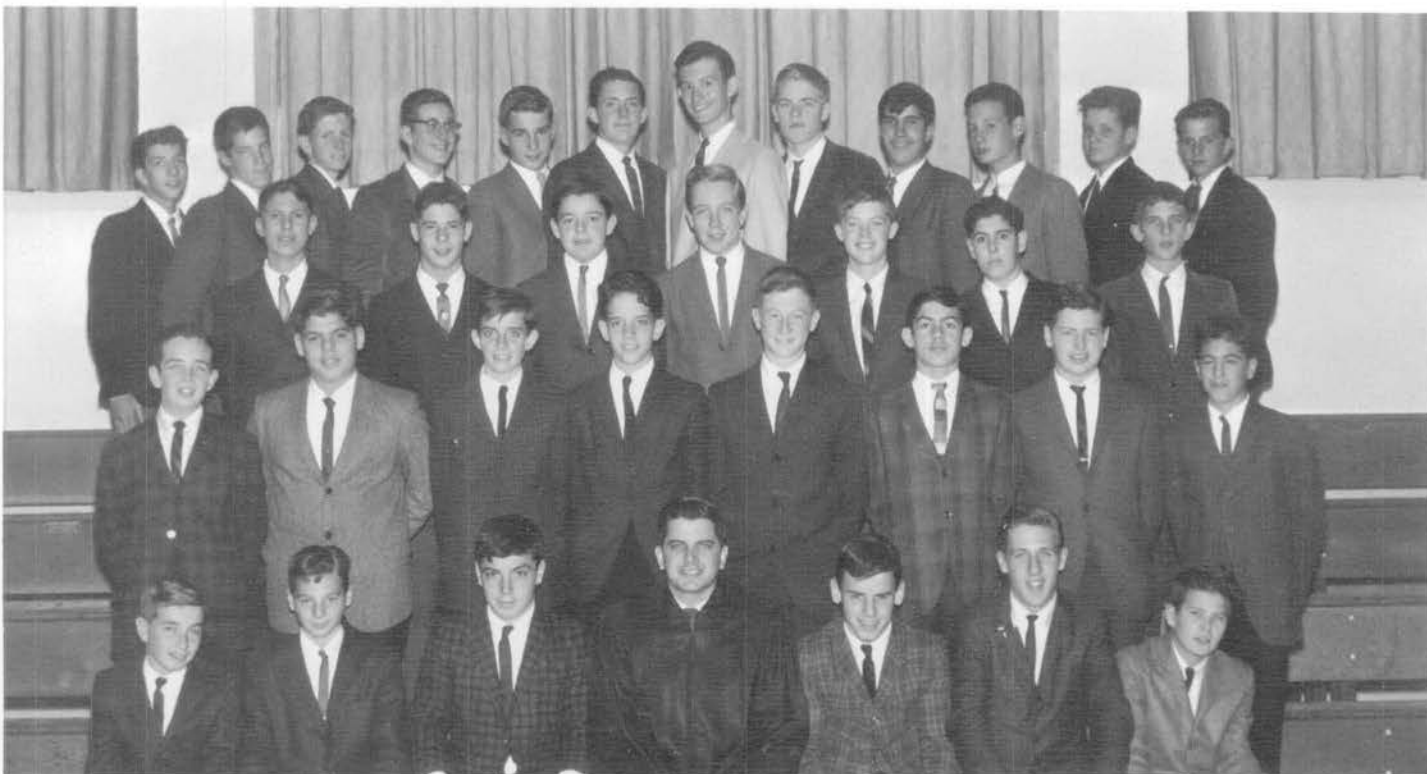

EAGLES START EARLY, MAKE 1965 THEIR YEAR

Prep opened the 1965 season with two objectives: to bring back the prestige that the school enjoyed a few years ago, and to end the four year drought on Thanksgiving Day. The team had many things in its favor. They had the advantage of living football day and night at St. Regis Football Camp on Long Island. They had new, multiple offensive formations and, more importantly, many solid football players.

The chief concern at the beginning of the season was the development of a good mobile line to complement the talents of the backfield of Kev Serrapede, Mike O'Hara, Pete McCall, Joe Russo, and Ray D'Antoni. Only Captain Pete Stevens, John Lombardo, and Tom Golden had previous experience on the line. By opening day, the problem was solved. Prep's first encounter was at Rockville Centre against St. Agnes, a mediocre team that had upset the Eagles the previ-

ous year. Prep, led by the inside running of Pete McCall, the outside running of Kev Serrapede, and the passing of Mike O'Hara, quickly scored two touchdowns. However, when the offense faltered, the defense, led by John Lombardo, Joe Russo, and Pete Stevens, picked up the slack and held the Stags scoreless. The final score was Prep 14 - Stags 0.

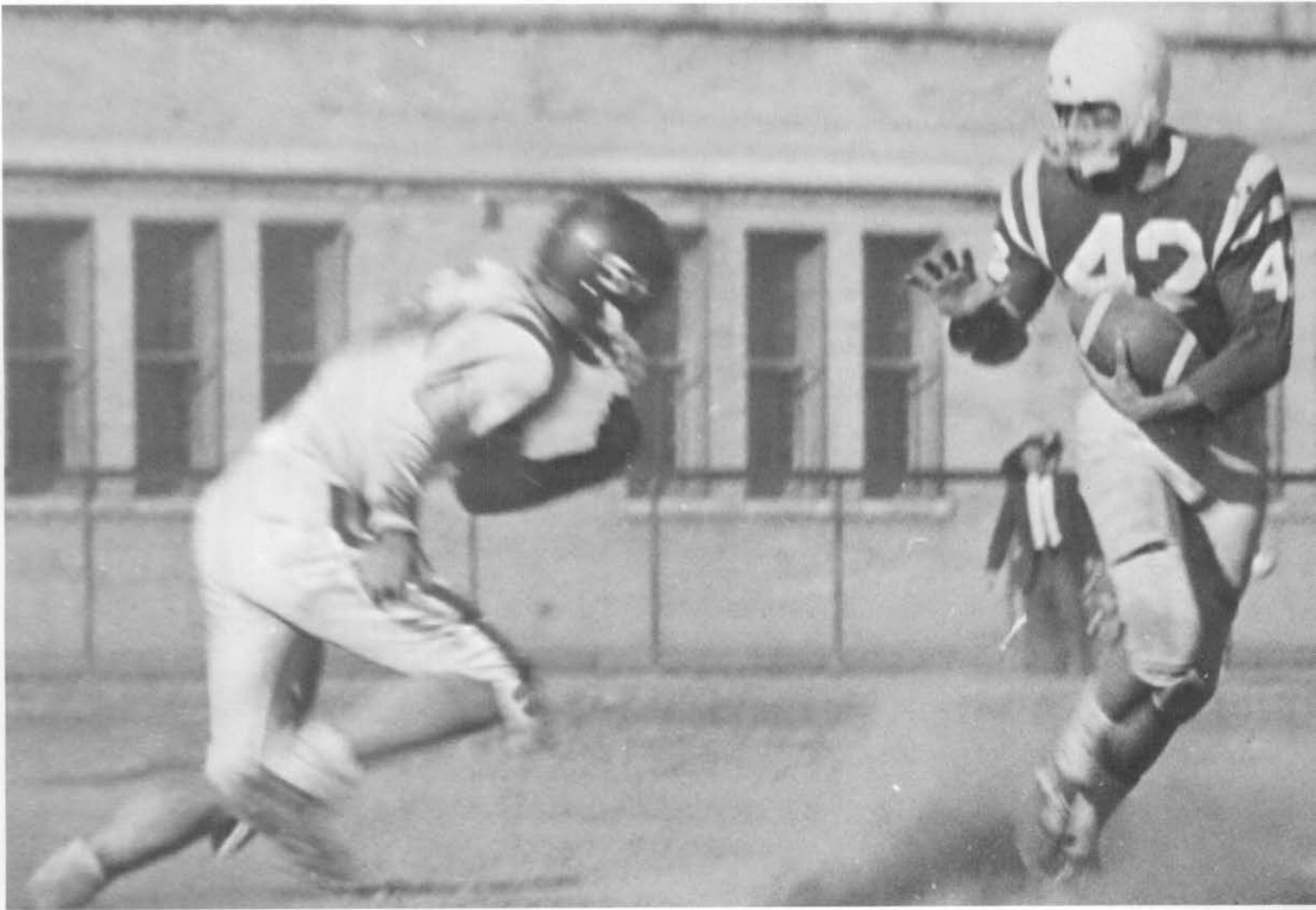
The following Saturday Roosevelt Stadium in Jersey City belonged to Kevin Serrapede. Kevin, single-handedly, defeated a powerful Ferris team. He scored three TD's on amazing runs of 54, 72 and 94 yards. The Eagles, on the verge of one of their best seasons, next met the Kaydets of Xavier at Randall's Island. Prep played without Pete Stevens, and, early in the game, fullback Pete McCall and tackle Bob Berger was seriously injured. Prep, weakened by the absence of three of its starters, fell to the Kaydets, 12-6.

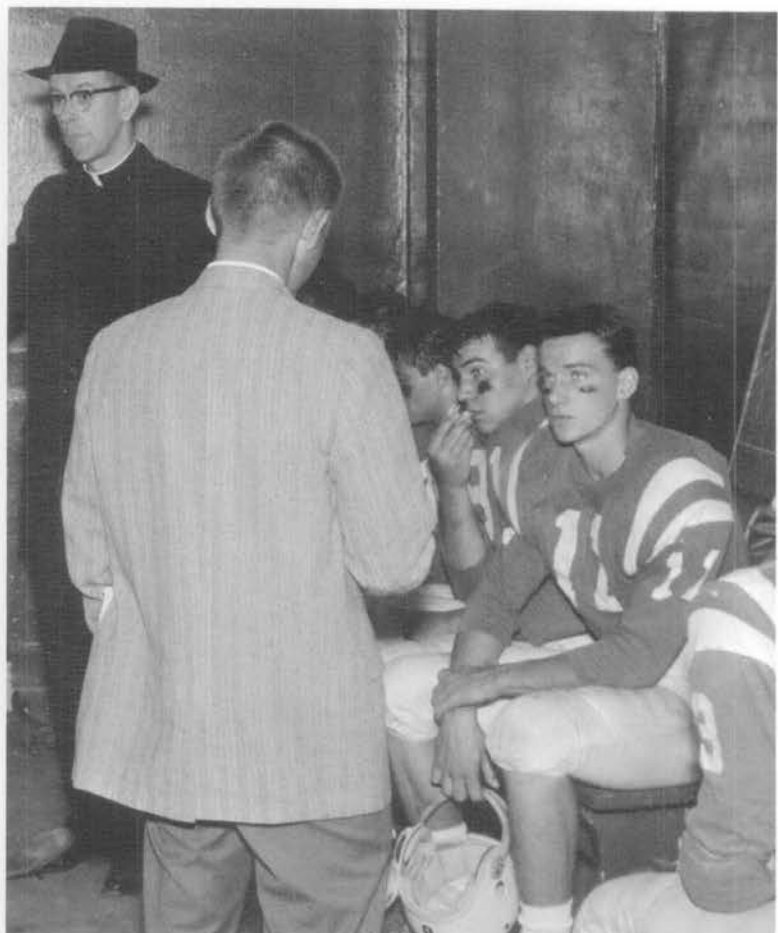
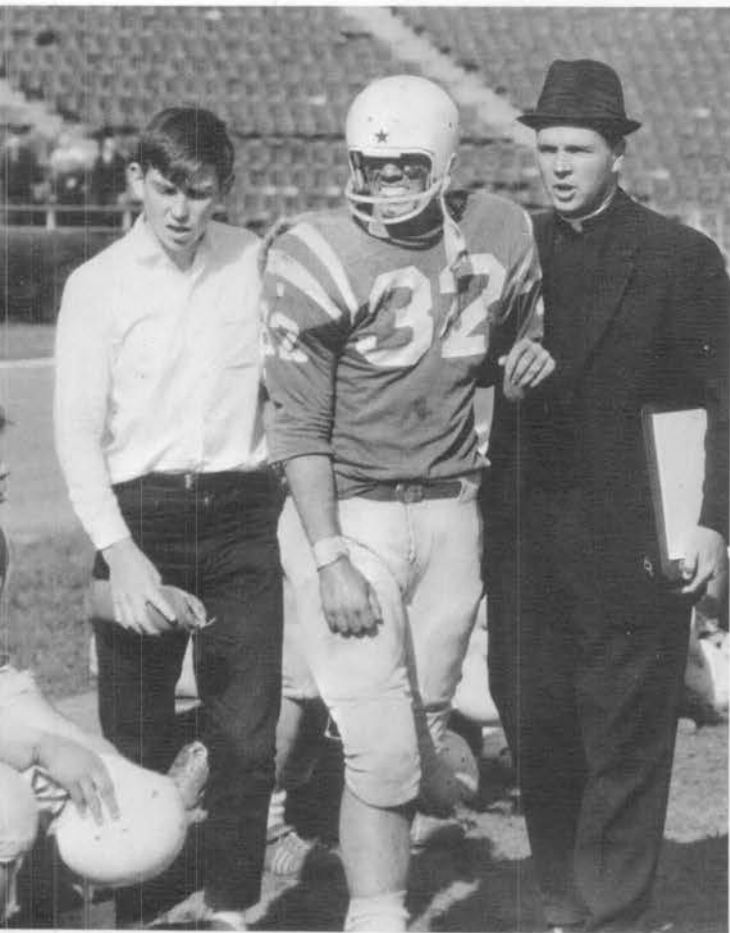
Tilden Field was the scene of Prep's next game against Seton Hall. An overconfident Prep squad quickly fell behind 13-0 at halftime. A completely different team came onto the field for the second half. On the first play from scrimmage Kev Serrapede ran 50 yards for a touchdown. Shortly afterwards, Tom Corridan raced 60 yards on Prep's most successful play, the keep. However, the conversion attempt failed and the game ended in a 13-13 tie.

The following Sunday proved to be the most disastrous for the Prep. The Eagles played undefeated Monsignor Farrell, perhaps the best team in the city. Despite the fine efforts of the injury-laden Prep team, Farrell crushed the Eagles 34-6. Once more Serrapede saved the Prep from a shutout with a 60 yard TD run.

The Eagles won their third game of the season the following Saturday by man-handling Fordham Prep. Ray D'Antoni provided the power running while linebackers Bob Sharkey and Pete Stevens anchored the defense. The MVP trophy went to Stevens of the Eagles, the first lineman to win the award. With the St. John's game in the immediate future, workouts grew longer and harder. Prep, looking for its first victory in four years against the Redmen, was determined to win.

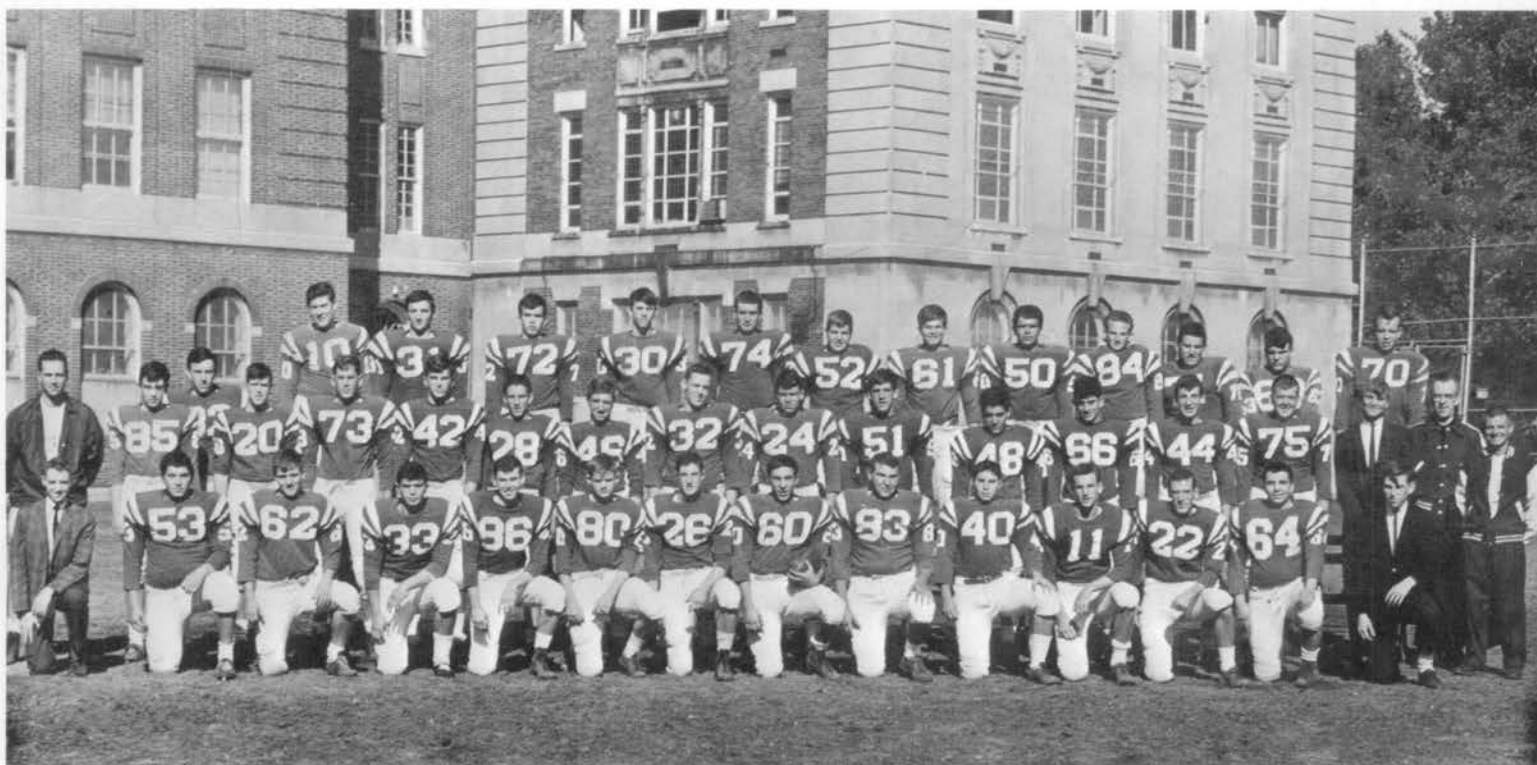

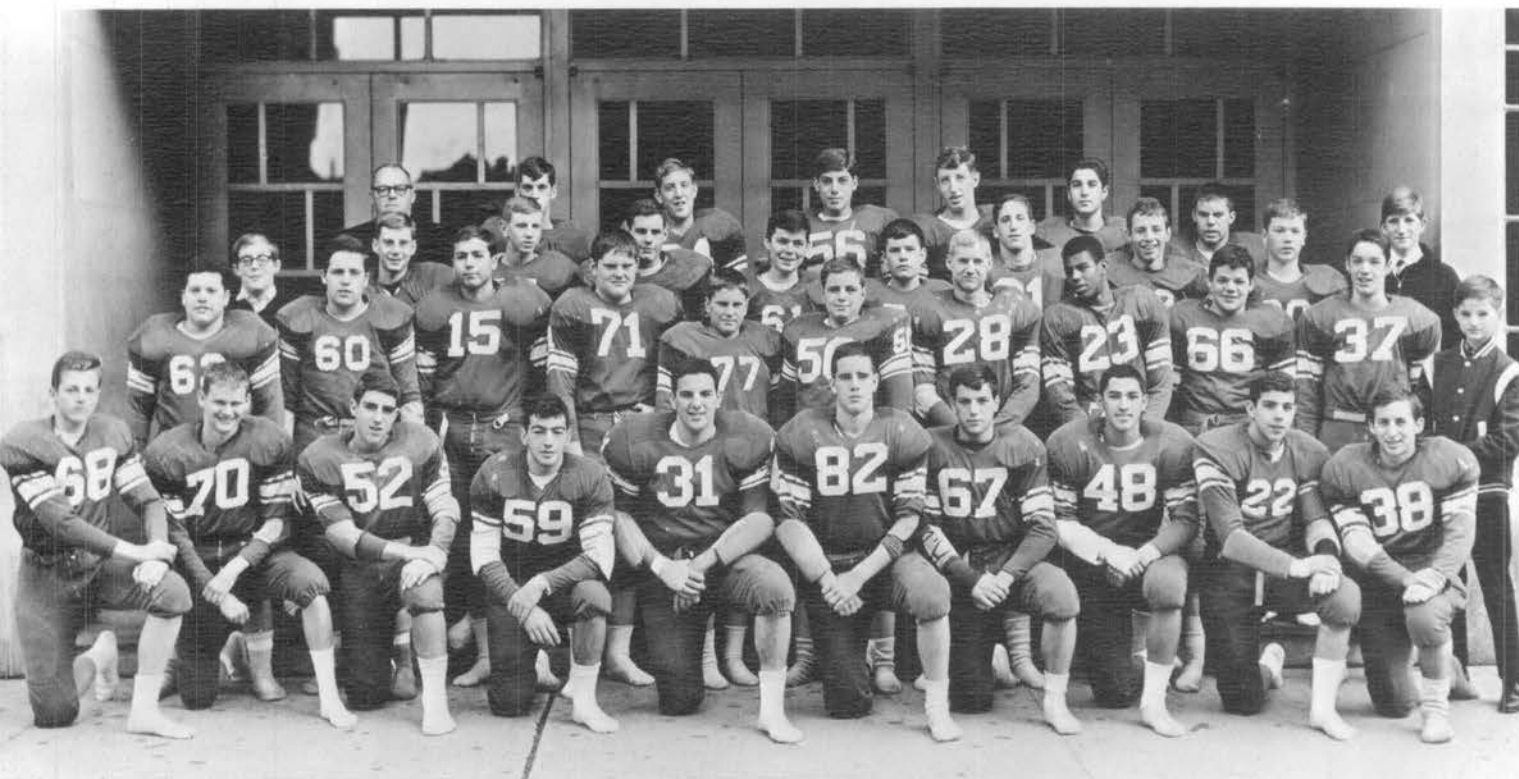

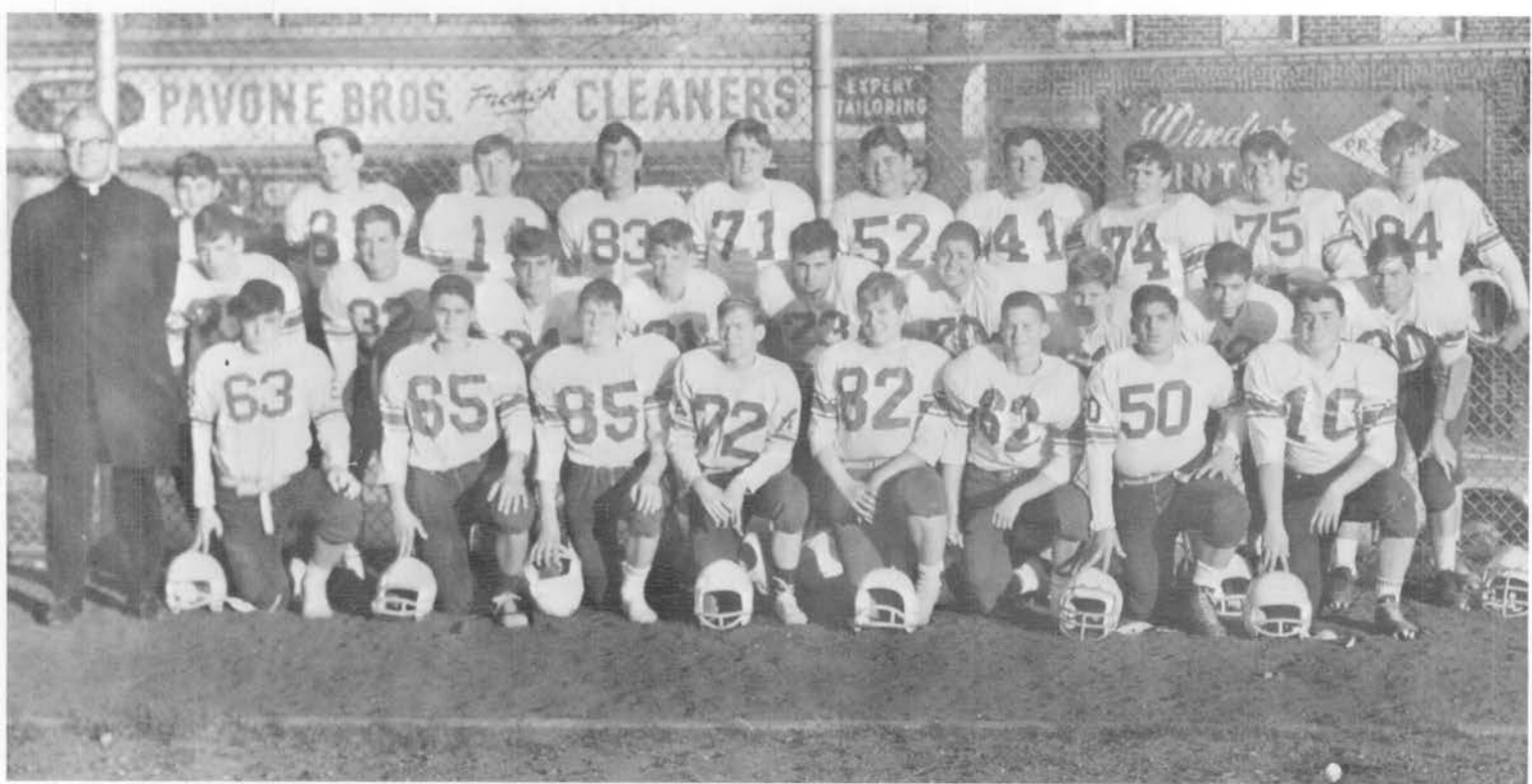

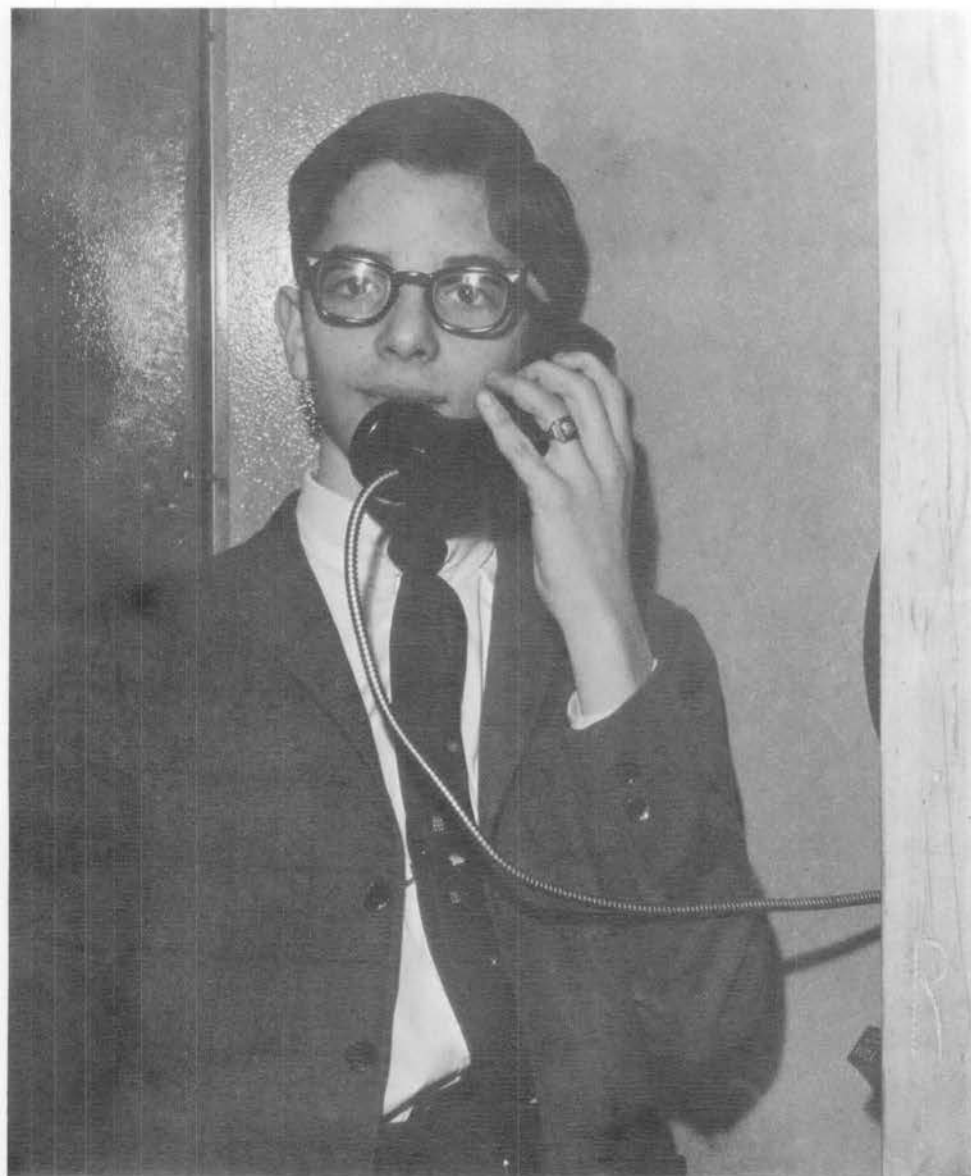

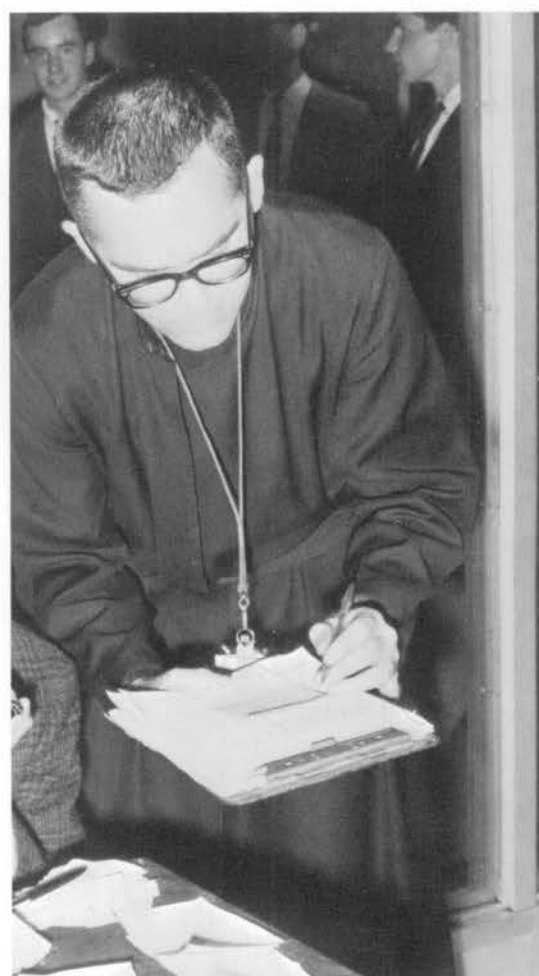

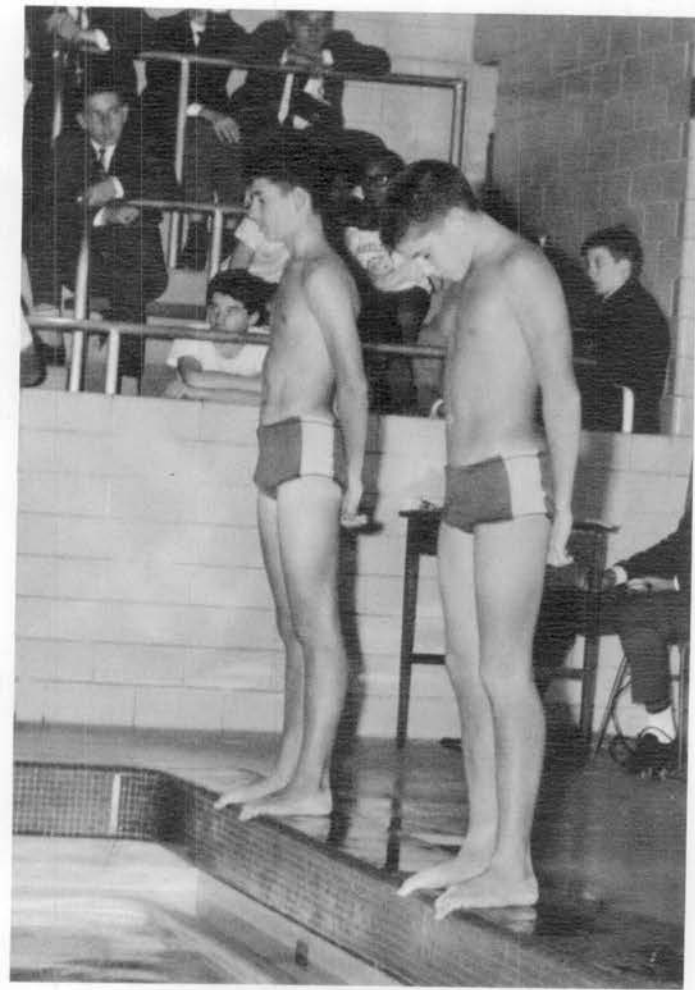

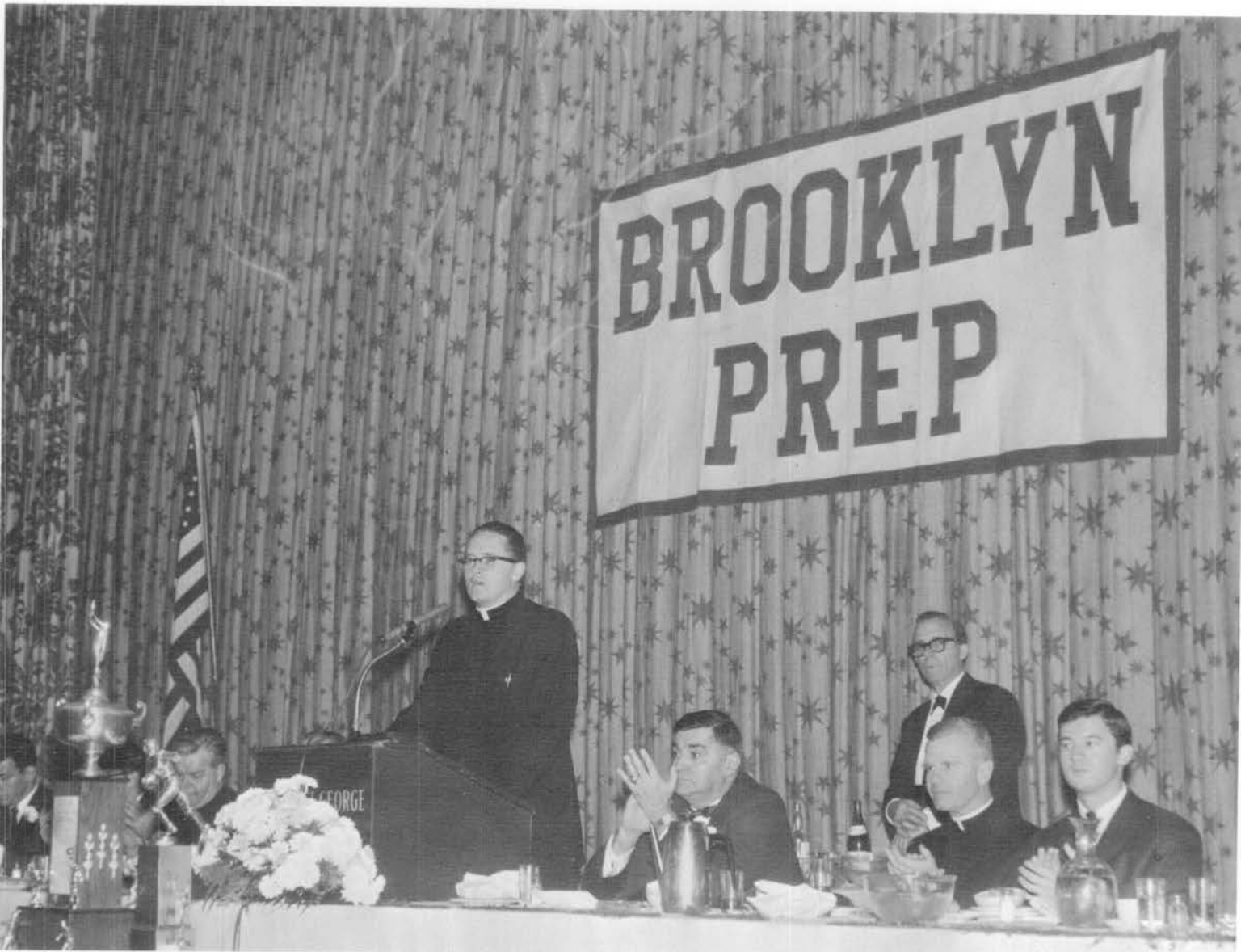
STAGE CREW

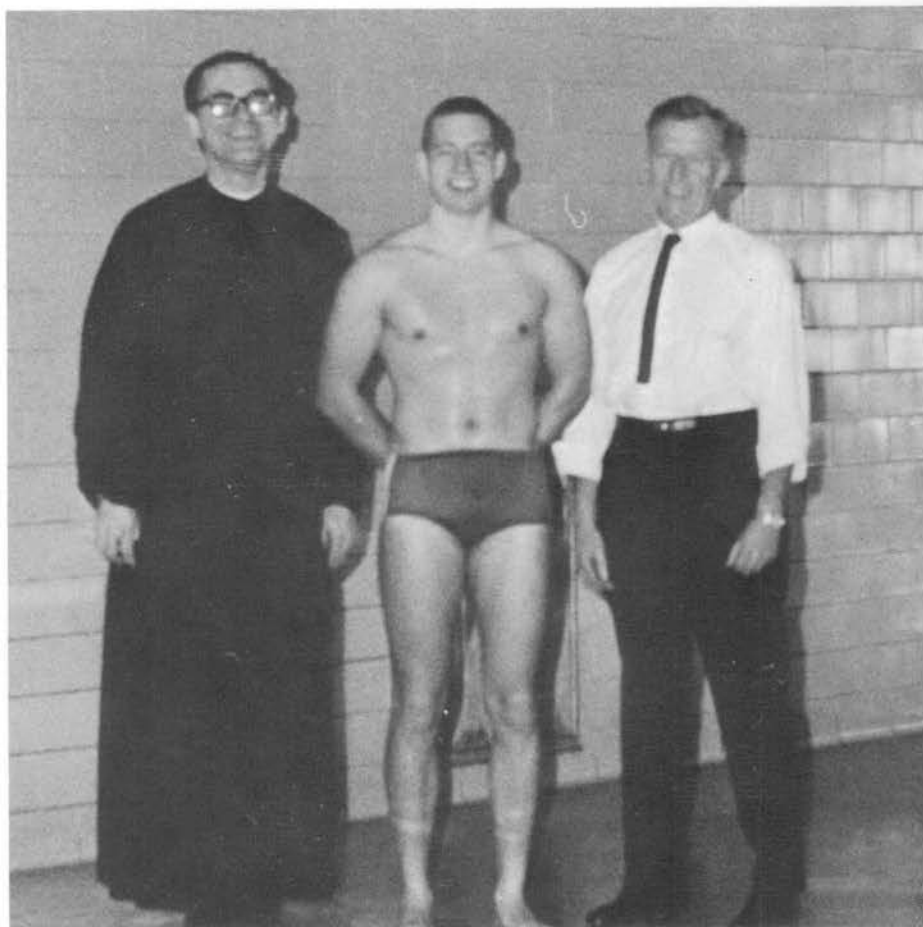

VARSITY TAKES CHSAA, PRIVATES

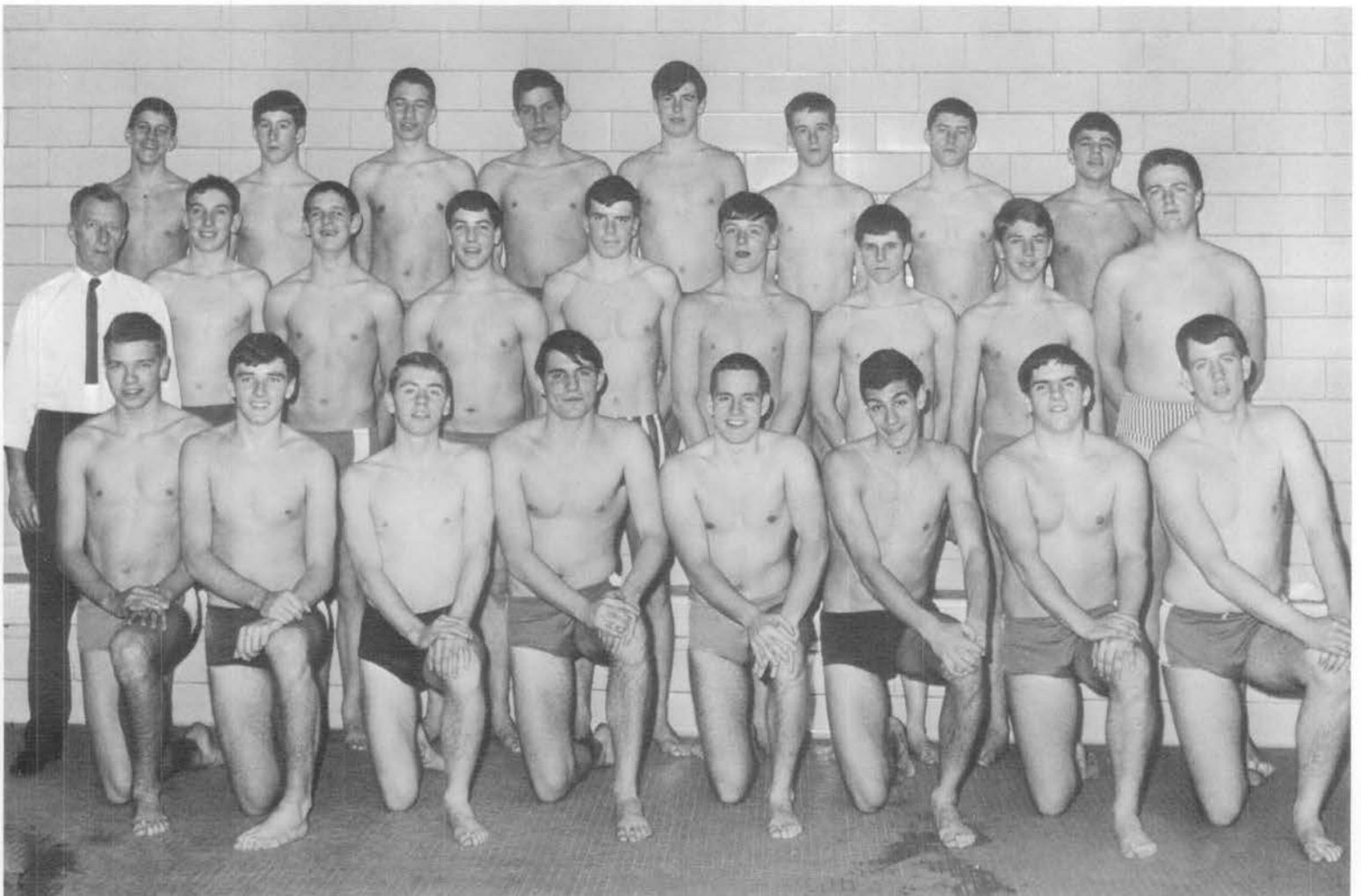
In their first meet against a powerful Holy Cross team, the 1966 Varsity Swimmers squeezed out a 50-45 victory. Anticipating a great season through hard work, the Varsity buckled down and easily defeated, in its next two meets, Bishop Loughlin and McClancy opponents. But for the past few years each Prep swimmer has known that the team's mettle is proved to its utmost against the arch-rival, St. Francis: led by the extraordinary diving of Ed Mallen, Prep won its first victory of the season against St. Francis, 49-46. Elated, the team trounced, in quick succession, Holy Trinity, 79-16, Bishop Reilly, 86-9, and Nazareth, 75-20. With these victories the Brooklyn-Queens Swimming Title was theirs.

But three great meets awaited Captain Tom Beck and the team. In the annual Metropolitan Championship at Seton Hall, the hours of work paid off: the 200 medley relay team of John Needham, Frank Jones, Pete Fitzgerald, and Tom Beck swam a 1:51; John Needham also took the 100 yard

backstroke in 1:02.8. In the swim-off for the City Championships, Prep was not as fortunate. Prep and St. Francis met again, but after a bitter contest, St. Francis won, 54-41.

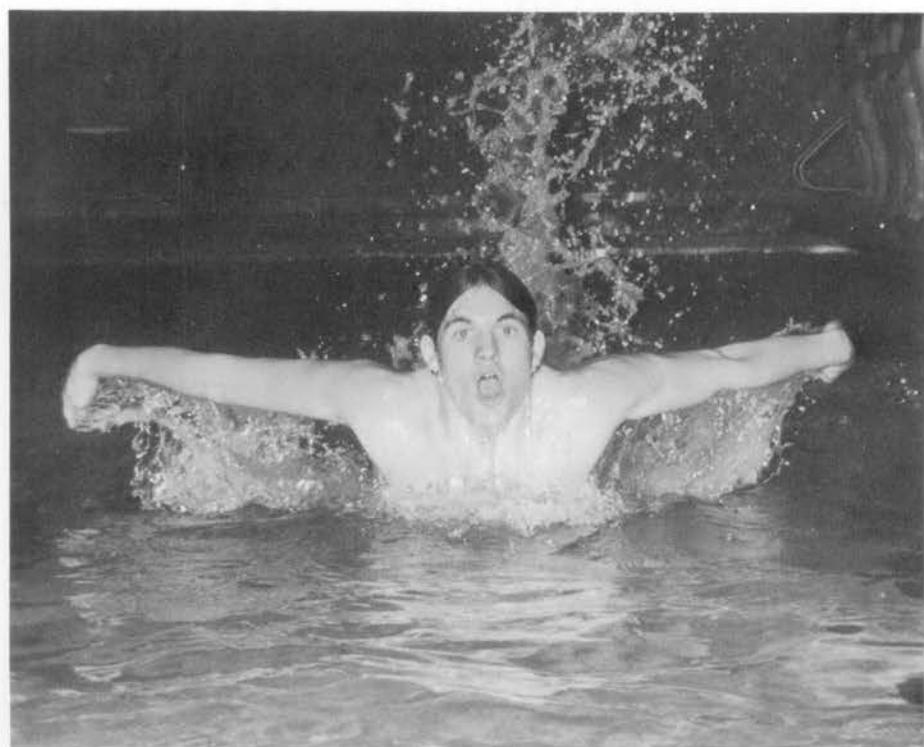
Revenge came sweet to the Varsity in the CHSAA Meet at St. John's. Edging out St. Francis, 66-64, Prep brought home the honors; the medley relay set a new record of 1:49.4; Richie Bell took the 400 free; the 400 free relay went to Richie Bolton, Dave Sheehan, Pete Fitzgerald, and Tom Beck; the 100 backstroke to John Needham. In the 100 breast-stroke Frank Jones set a new meet record with 1:07.6. Other medal winners were Ed Mallen, Dan Weinlandt, Mike Fitzmaurice, Bill Brennan, and John Manos.

The Private School Championships ended the year for Prep, as it had begun, in victory. The medley relay took first, Dave Sheehan in the 100 free took fourth, Ed Mallen third in diving, John Needham first, Frank Jones first, the 400 freestyle relay again first.

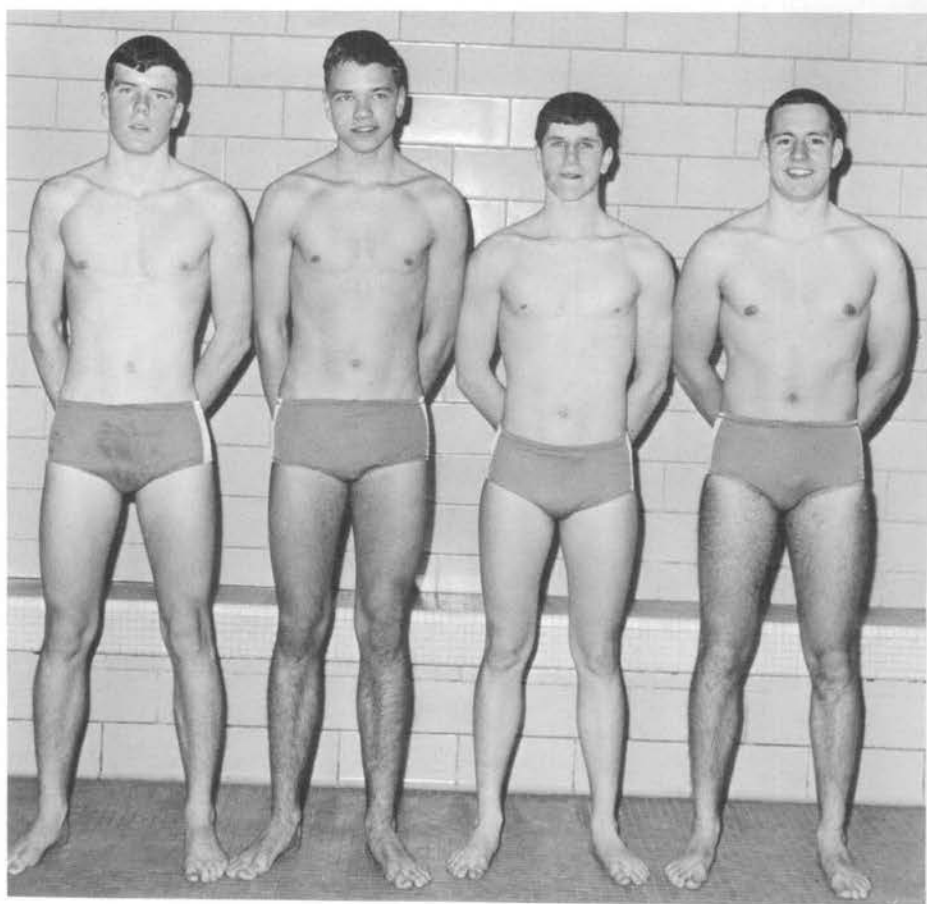


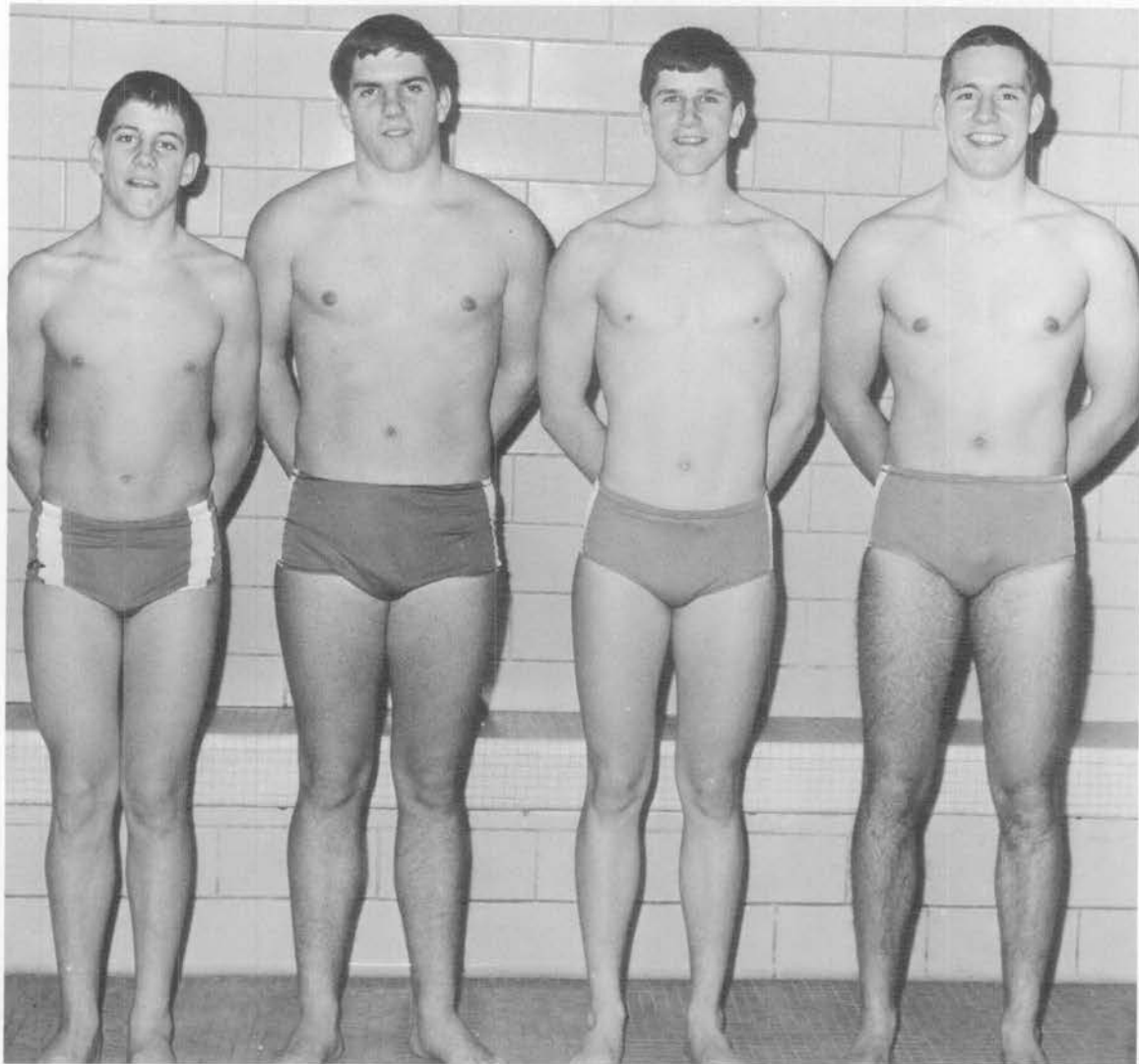

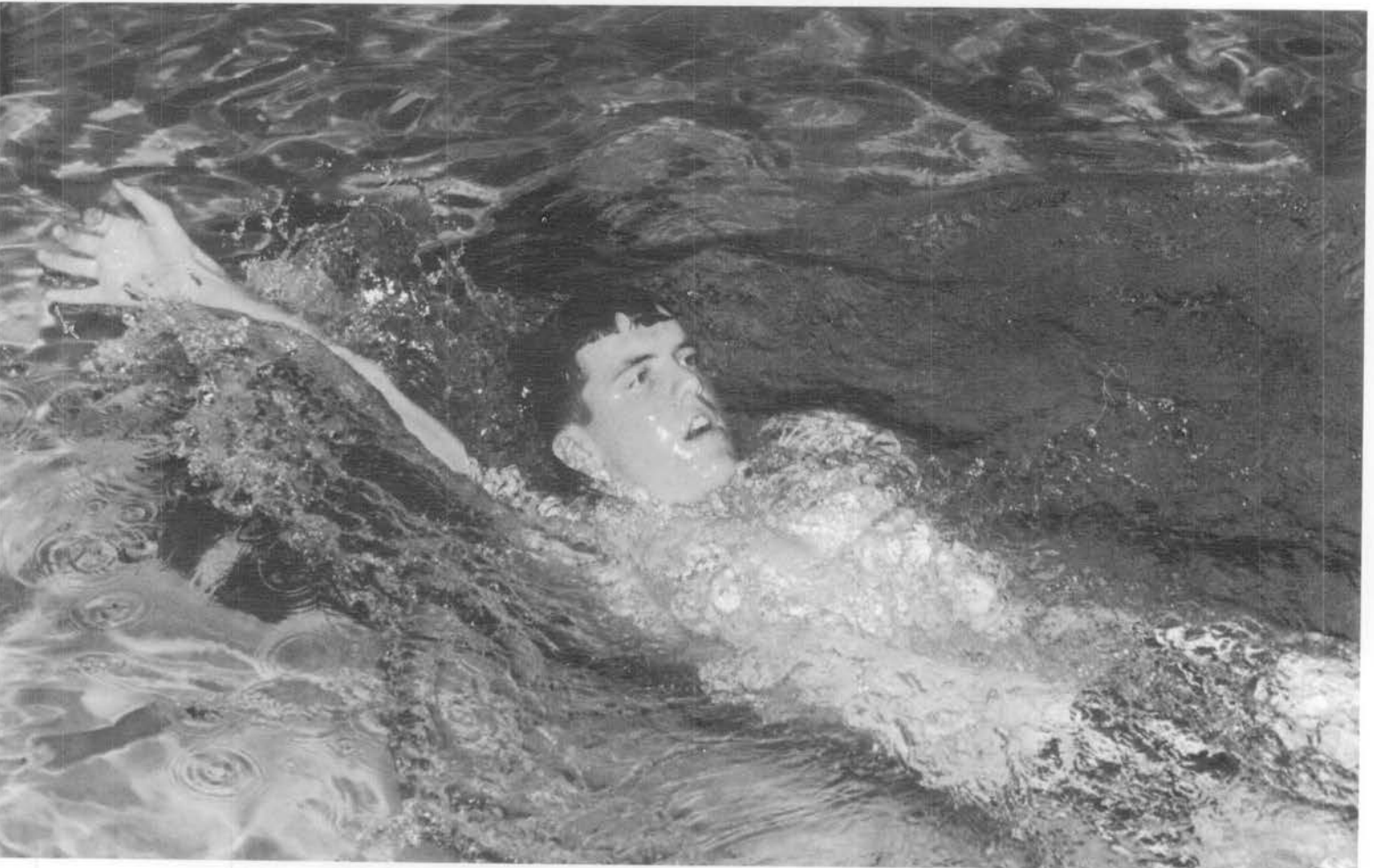

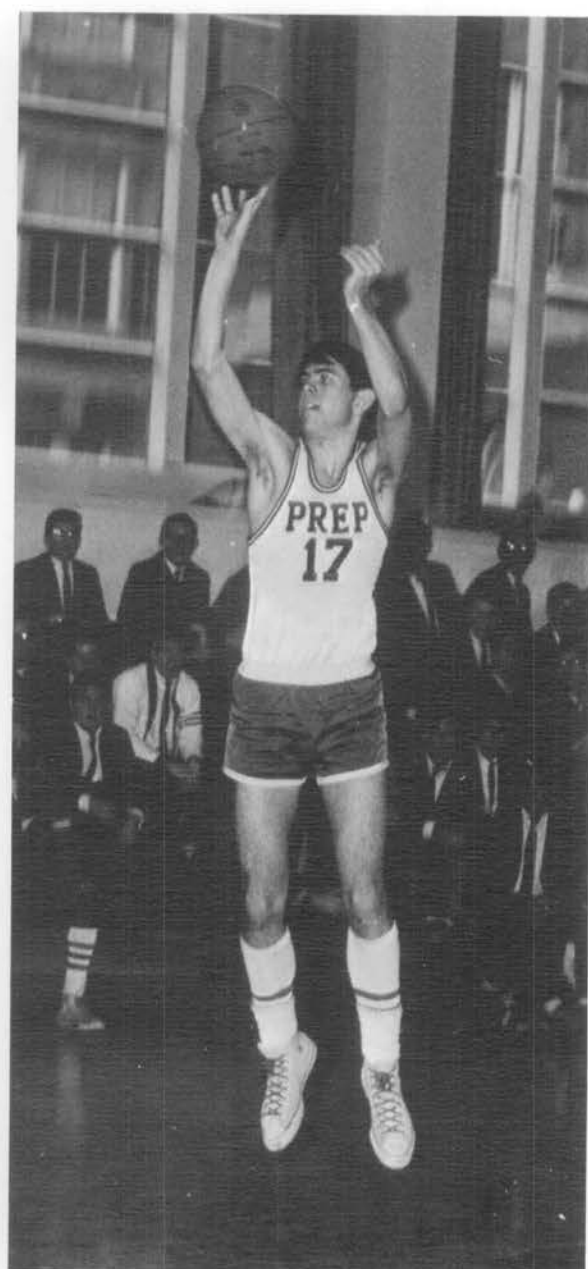
VARSITY HAS HUSTLE, LACKS HEIGHT

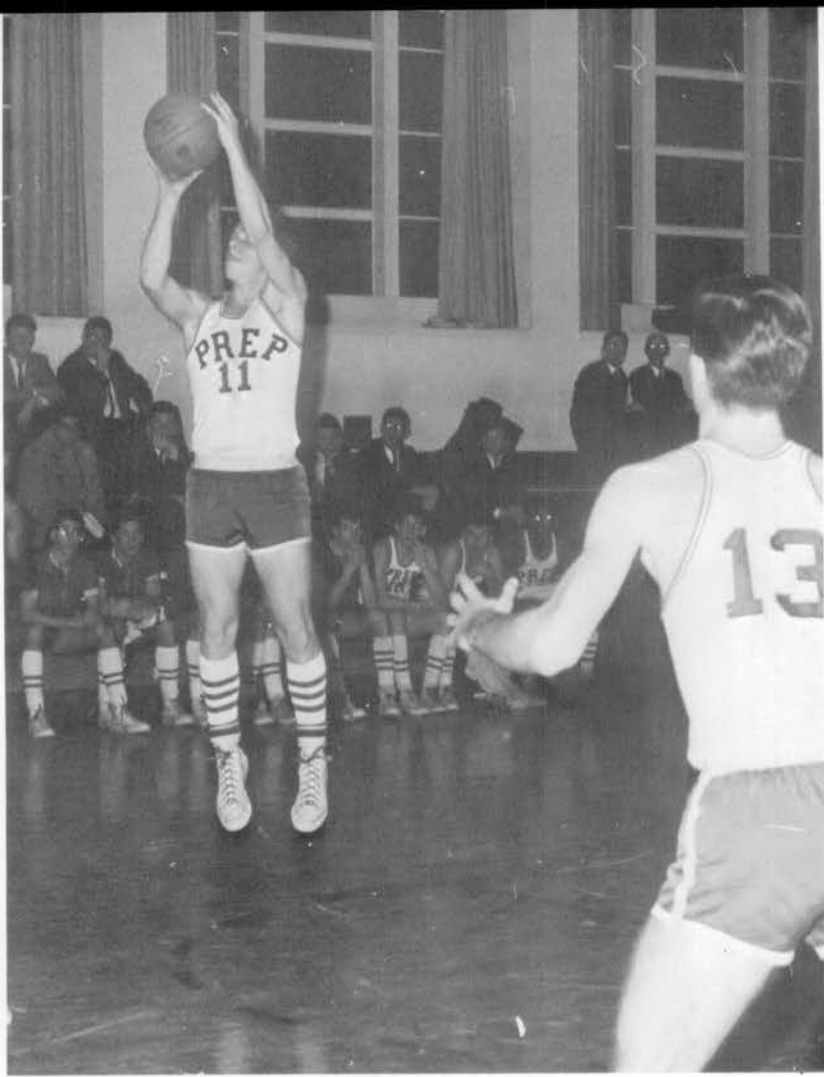

well, also leading the team in rebounds.

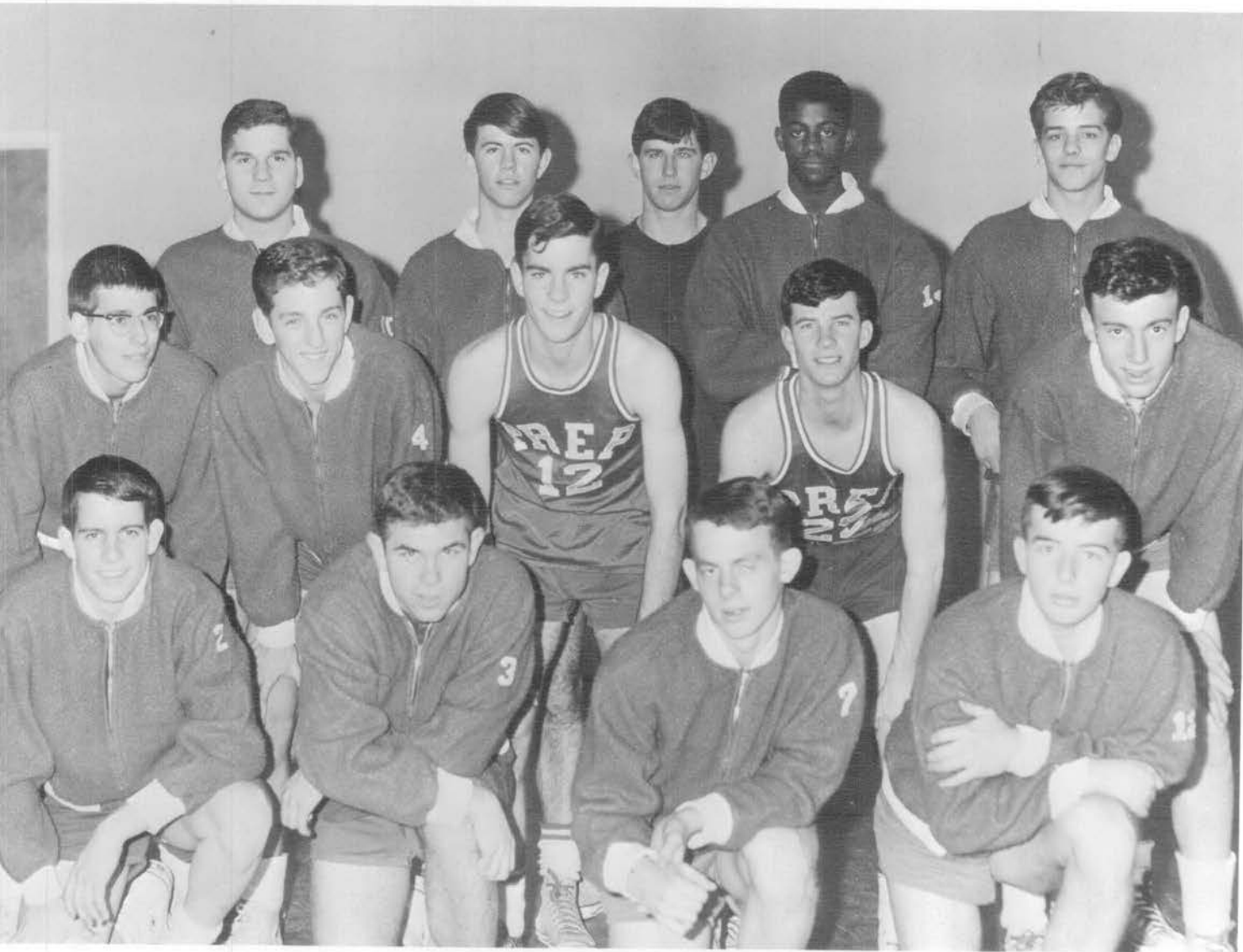

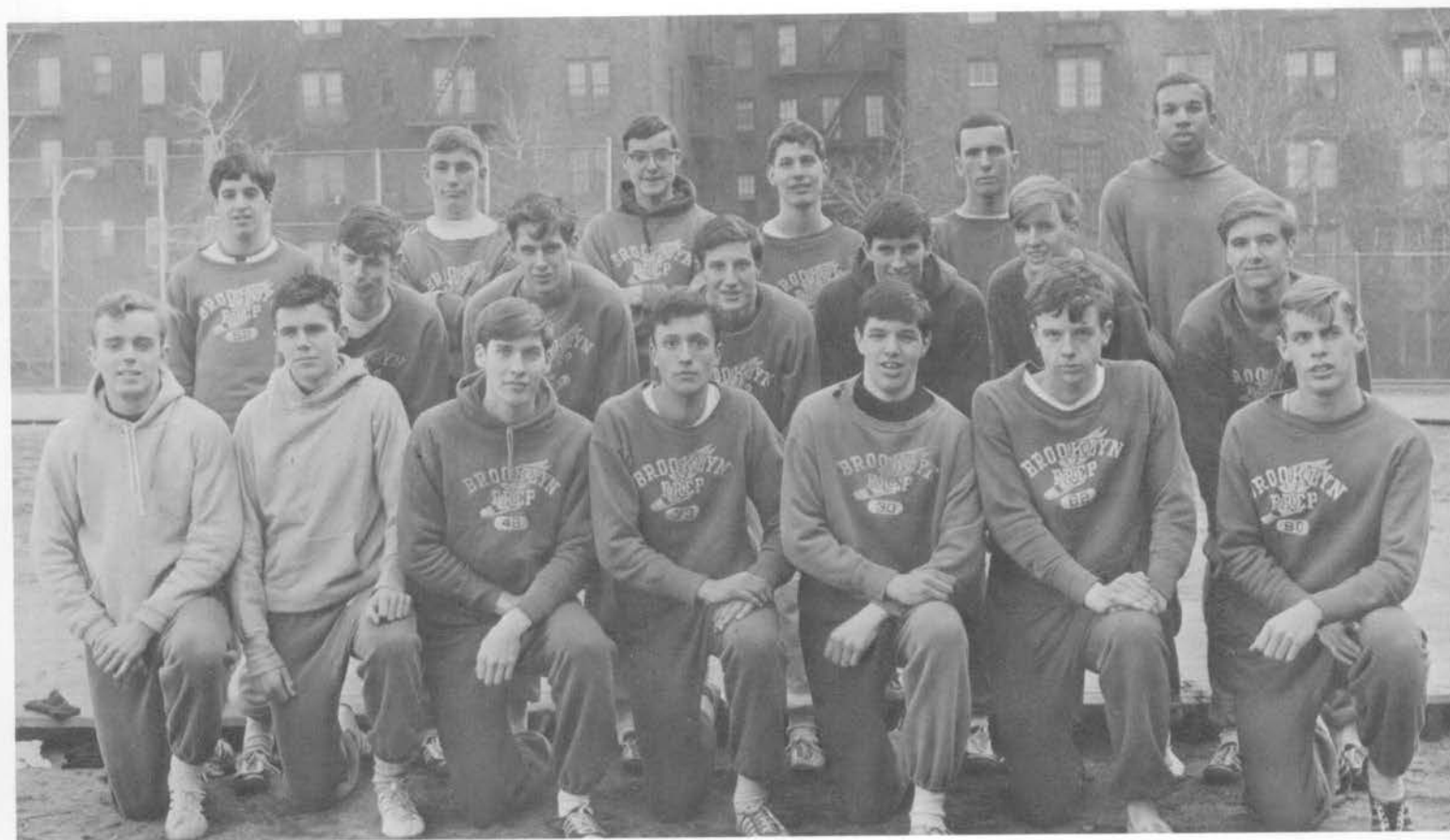

TRACK TEAM EXCELS

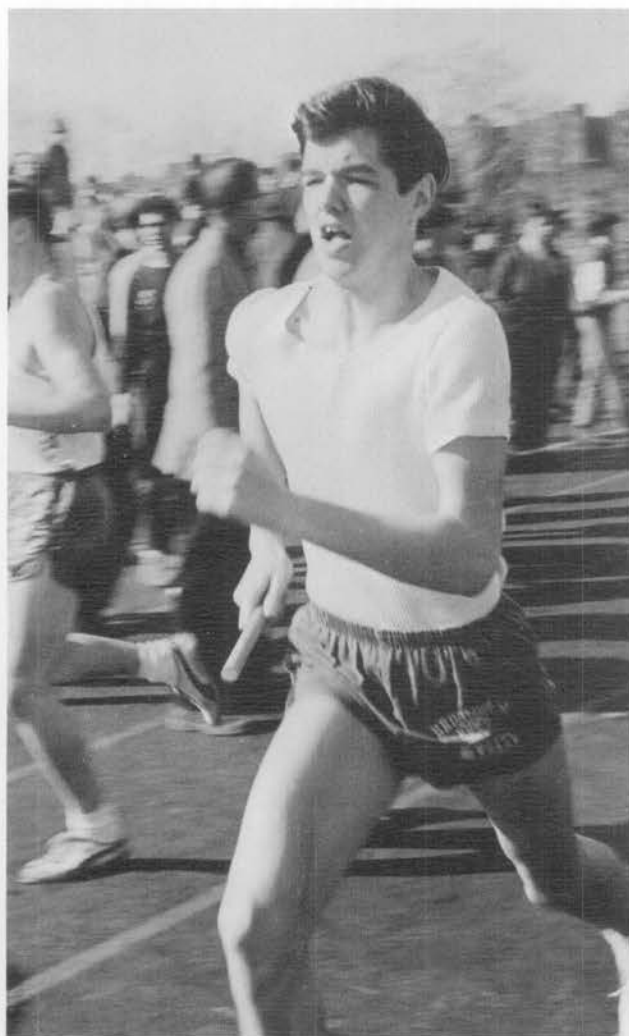

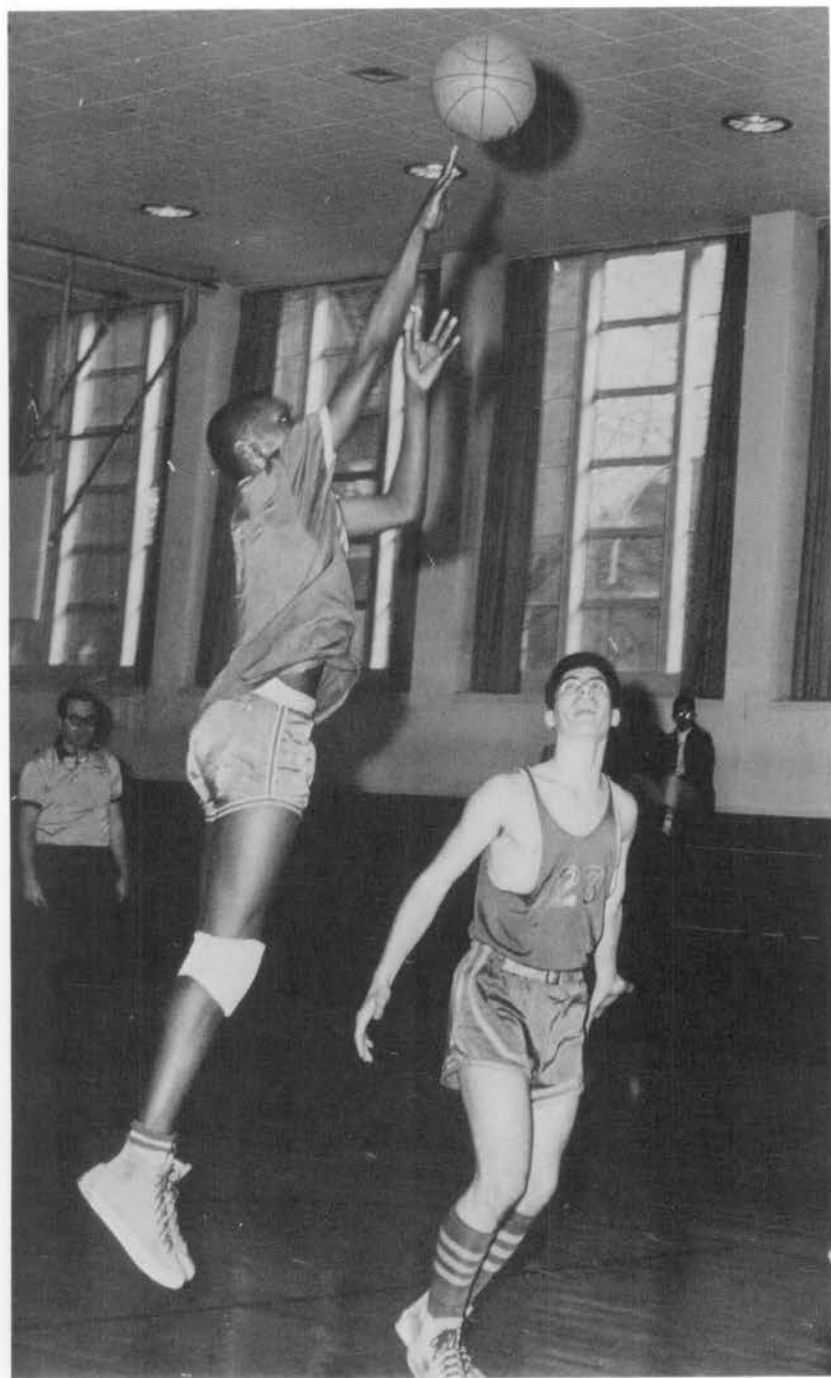

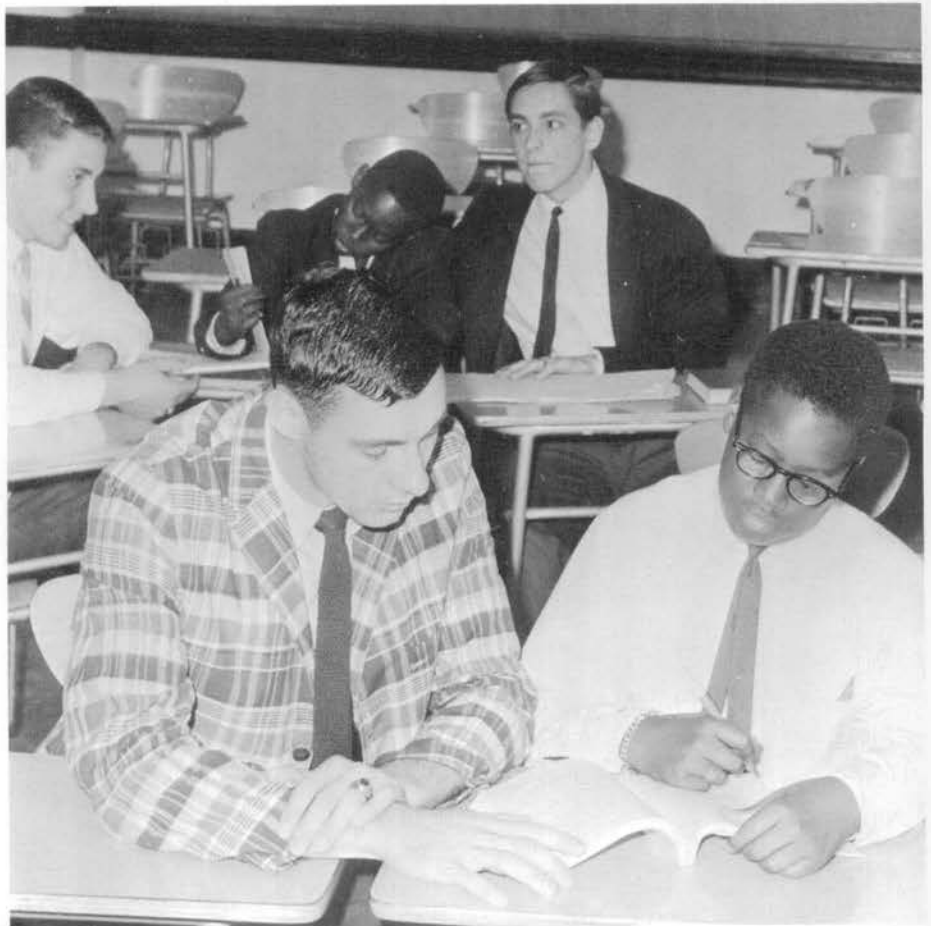

CORE CHOOSES ACTION

With the Sodality membership rapidly decreasing, Mr. Joseph Roccasalvo, S.J. (right), came on the Prep scene this year and revived the Christian spirit in Prep students. He posed the simple question of what it meant to be a Christian, and many students took the challenge of making the message of Christ operative in the world today. Because of these action-choosing men, the name of the Sodality was changed to the Christian Action Core. Among the Core's activities were participation in the Newman Club discussions at N.Y.U. and attendance at several college seminars to learn what similar groups were doing in their own communities. Core members joined with girls of the Sacred Heart Academy and visited St. Ambrose Parish in the Bedford-Stuyvesant on Saturdays. Some played with the children there, while others surveyed the neighborhood, checking tenements with violations, and bringing these violations to the attention of the landlords. This was the Core's effort to alleviate the problem of civil rights and poverty. Mr. Roccasalvo, S.J., sees the ecumenical effort of the 1965-66 CAC as perhaps the most significant. CAC members regularly attended the Episcopal Liturgy at St. Clement's and in the spring began a liaison with Crown Heights Jewish groups.



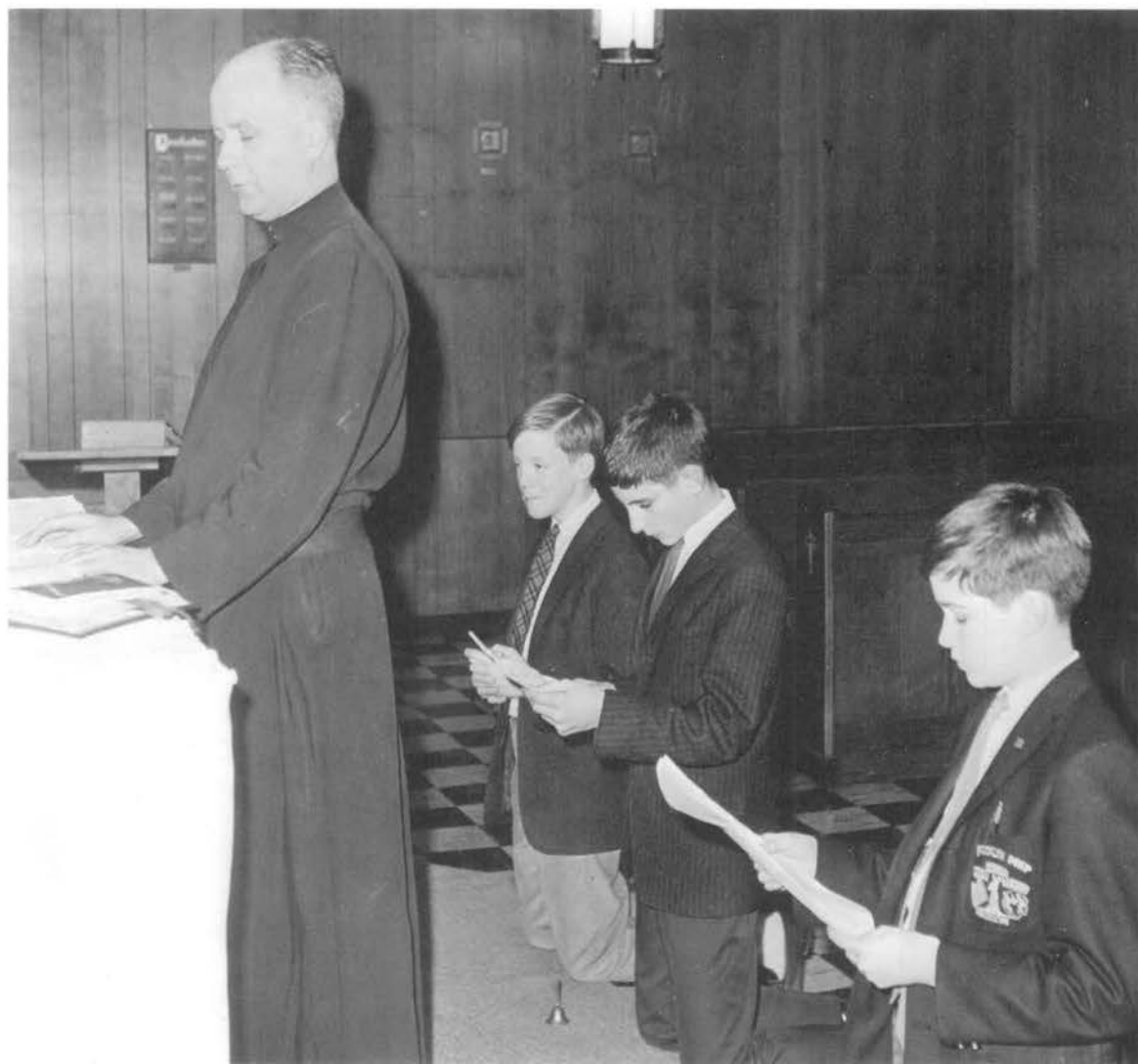

VARSITY BASEBALL

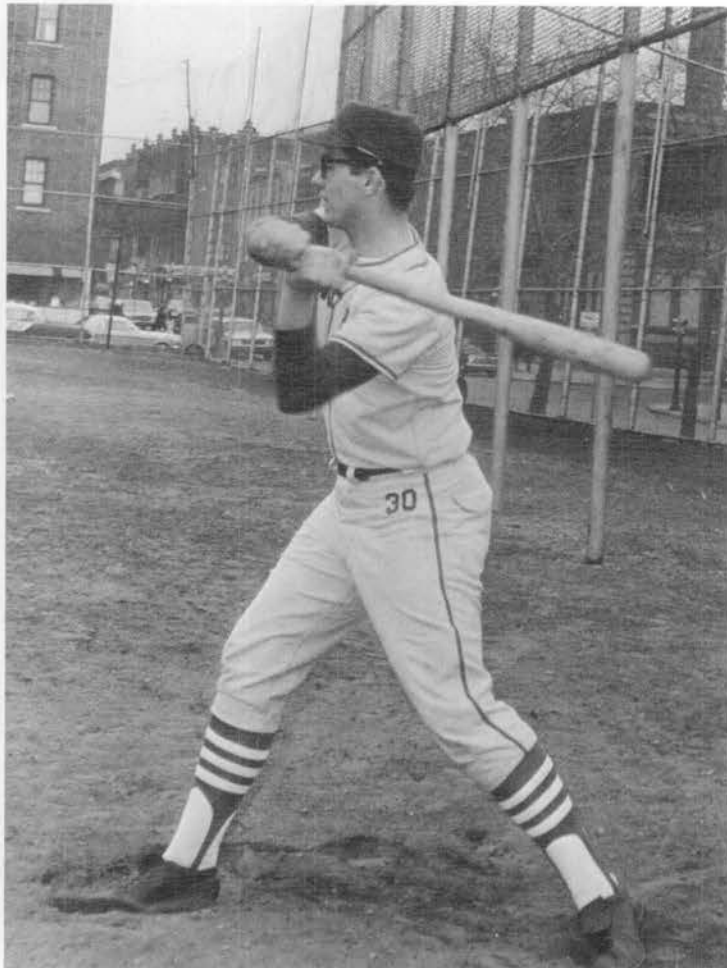
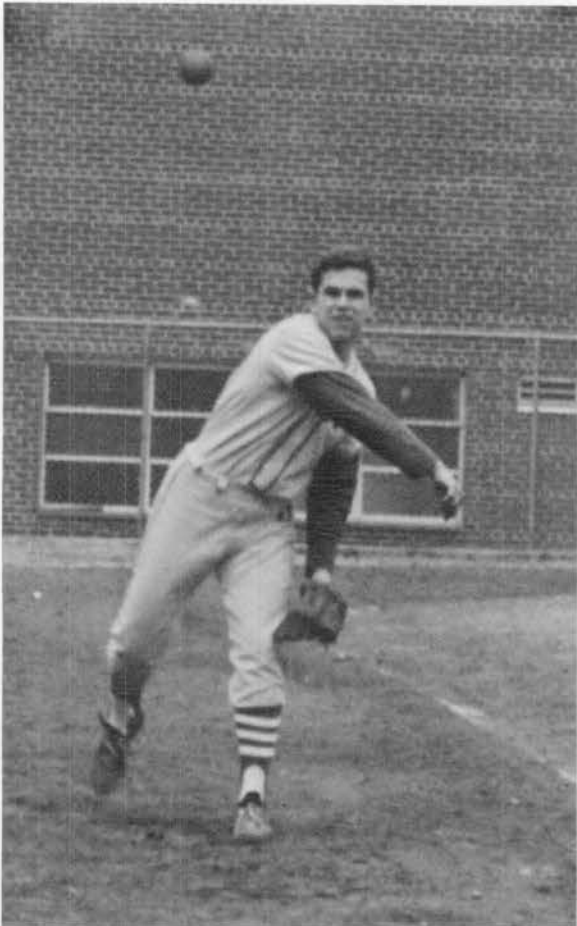

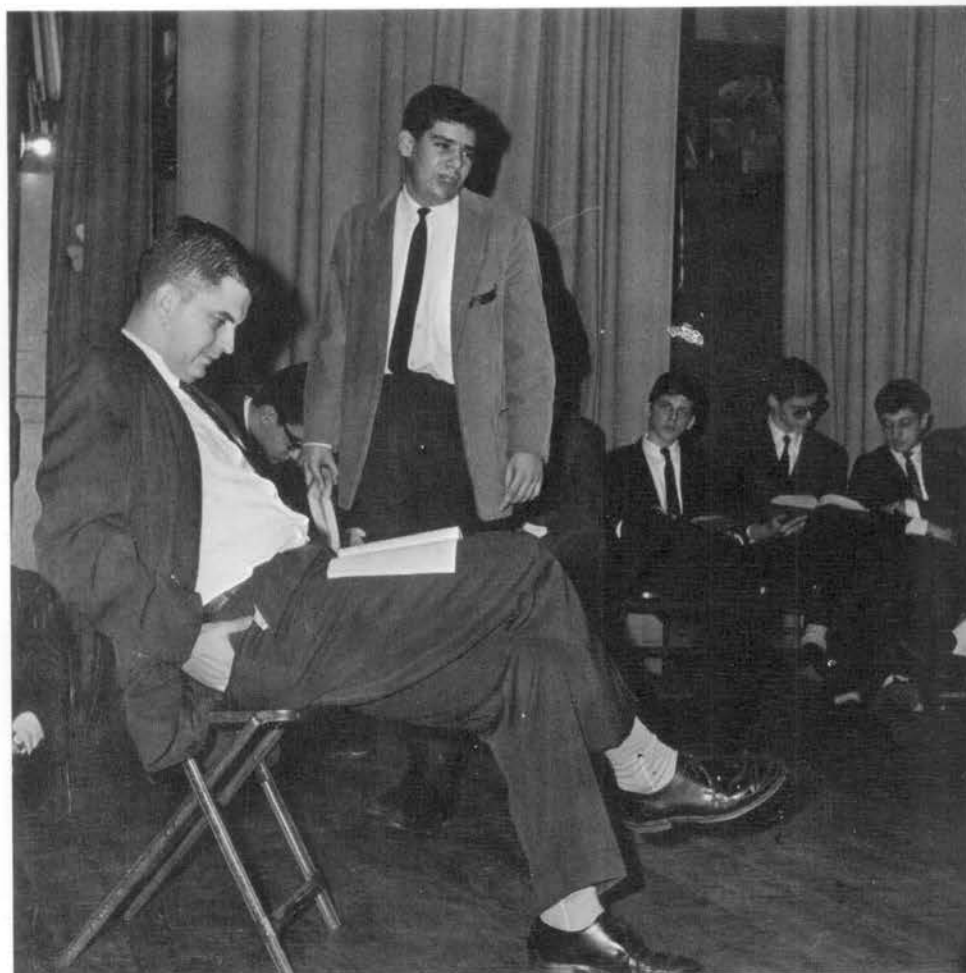

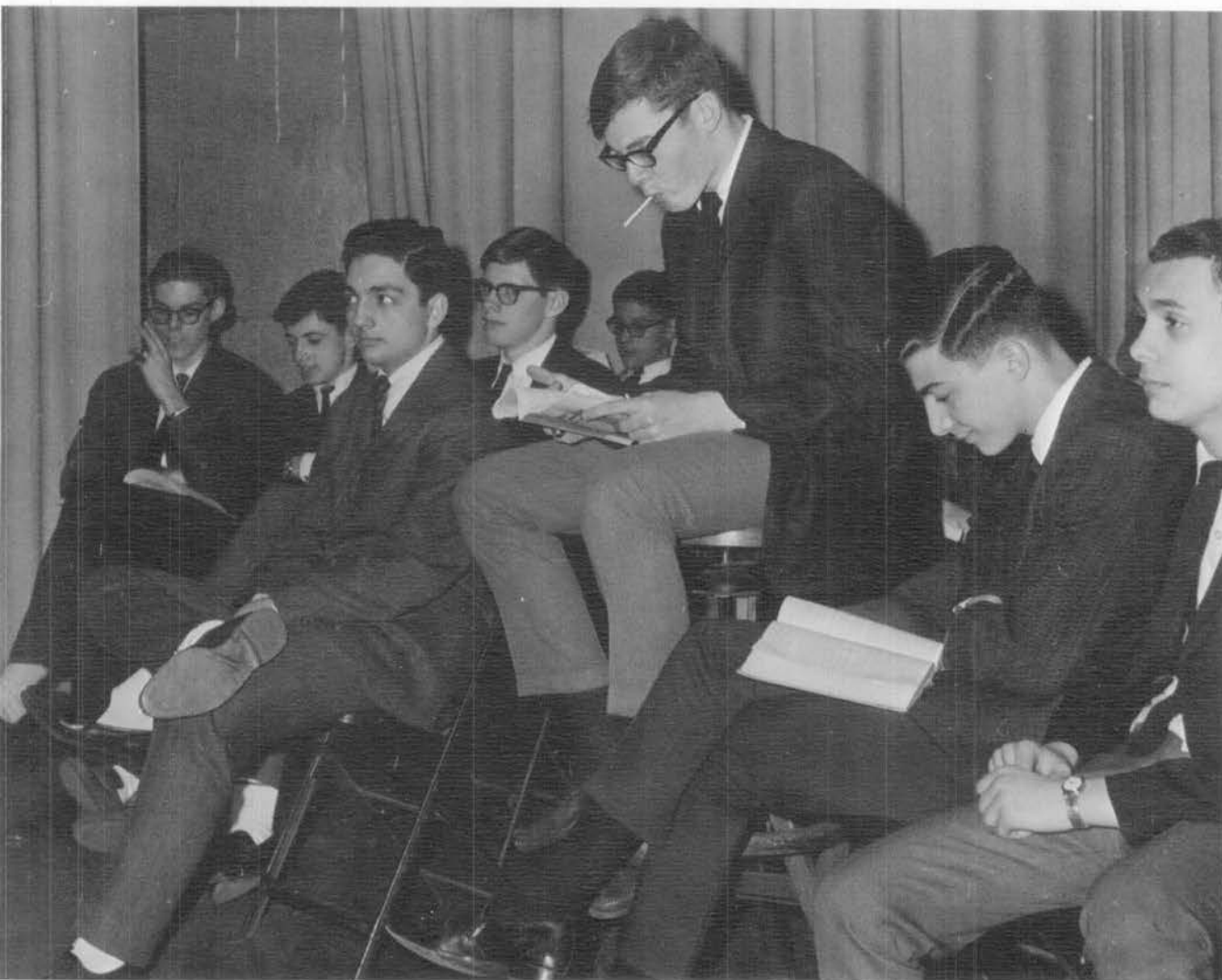

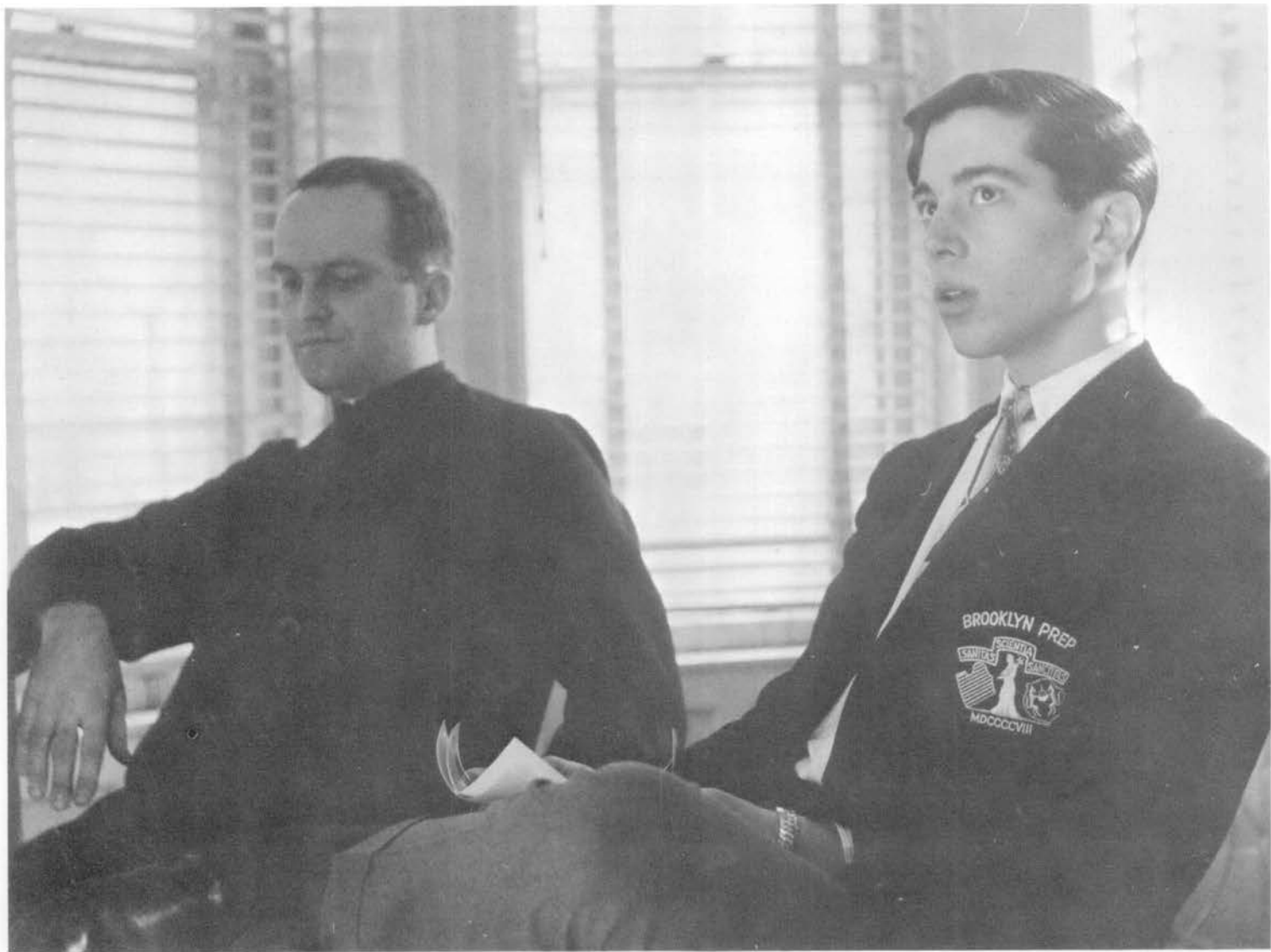




LO SCHIAVO COMES TO DINNER

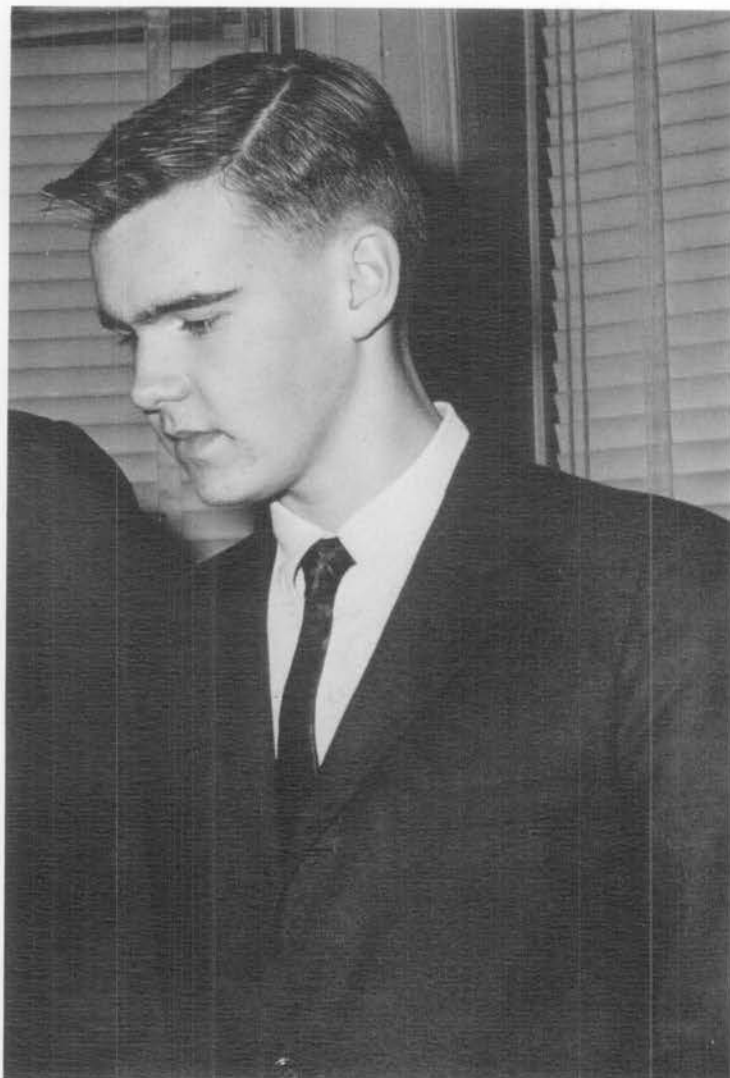

SEVEN MEN PUBLISH *THE BOOK*

The 1966 *Blue Book* owes its publication, in the main, to the combined efforts of seven students: seniors Tom Barritt, Quinton VanWynen, and John Garside, juniors Tom Shanks and Frank Murphy, and sophomores Kevin Vail and Tom Madison. The work began last July with the scheduling of senior pictures to be taken the first week of school. So successful were the early efforts of the staff that the entire senior and underclass sections went to the printer December 10th. The underclass section especially challenged the staff: its informals and copy required more picture scheduling and copy writing than the usual efforts of most yearbooks to present the majority of their students. I would single out the informality of the underclass section, the consistency of the layouts, the planned white space, Jeff Bilotta's photography for 'A School in Brooklyn', the seasonal format, and the positioning of captions. Mr. Donnelly, S.J., is responsible for our financial security. All in all, a vintage year."
