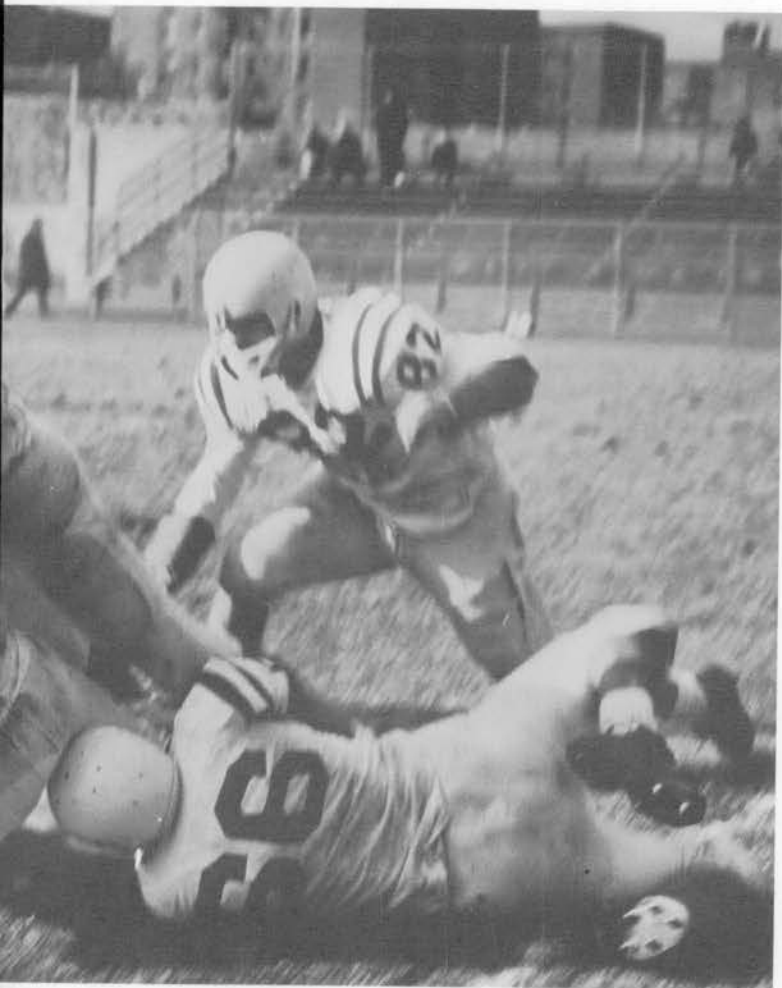

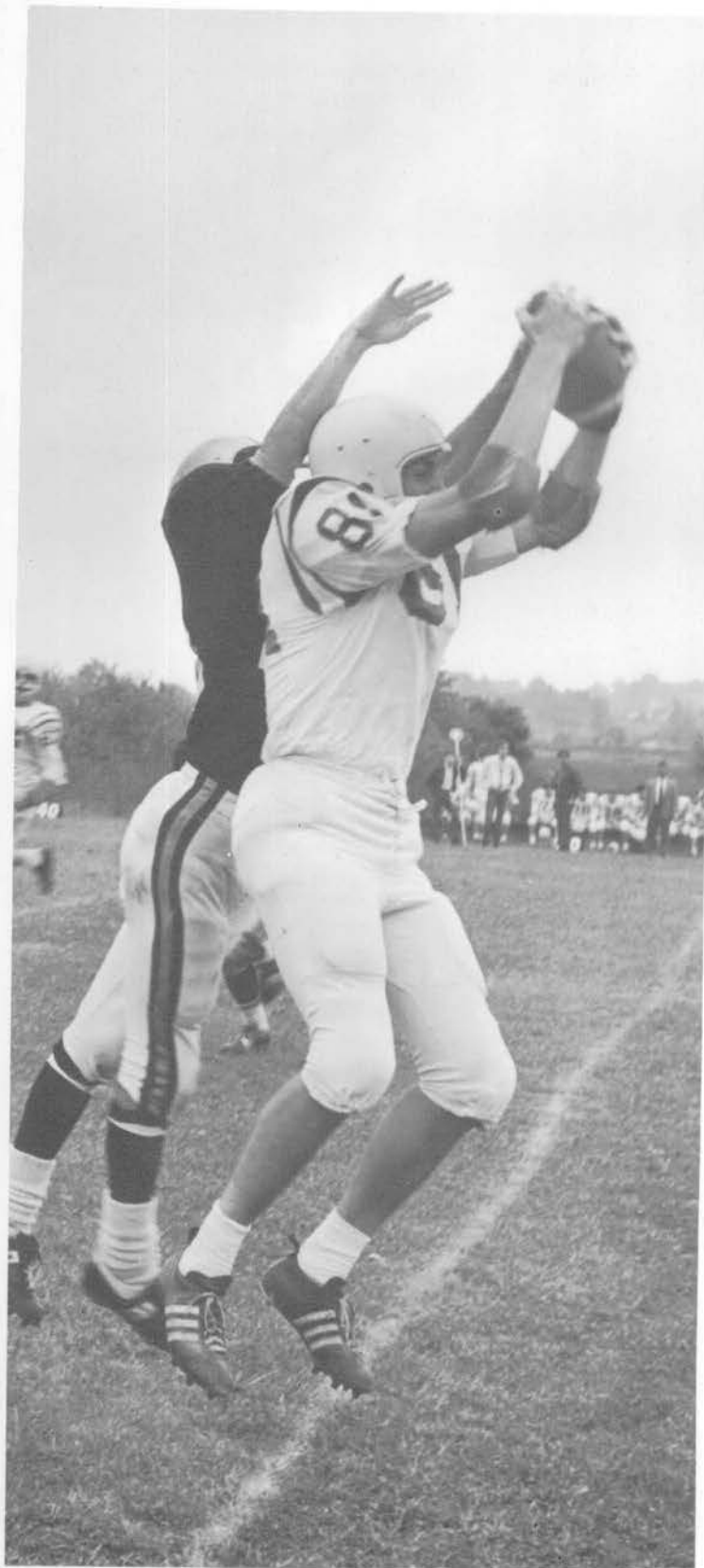

Fordham seemed noticeably smaller than we. Amidst the tremor of the quick heart beats, Coach Duffy moved about with an air of deep silence.

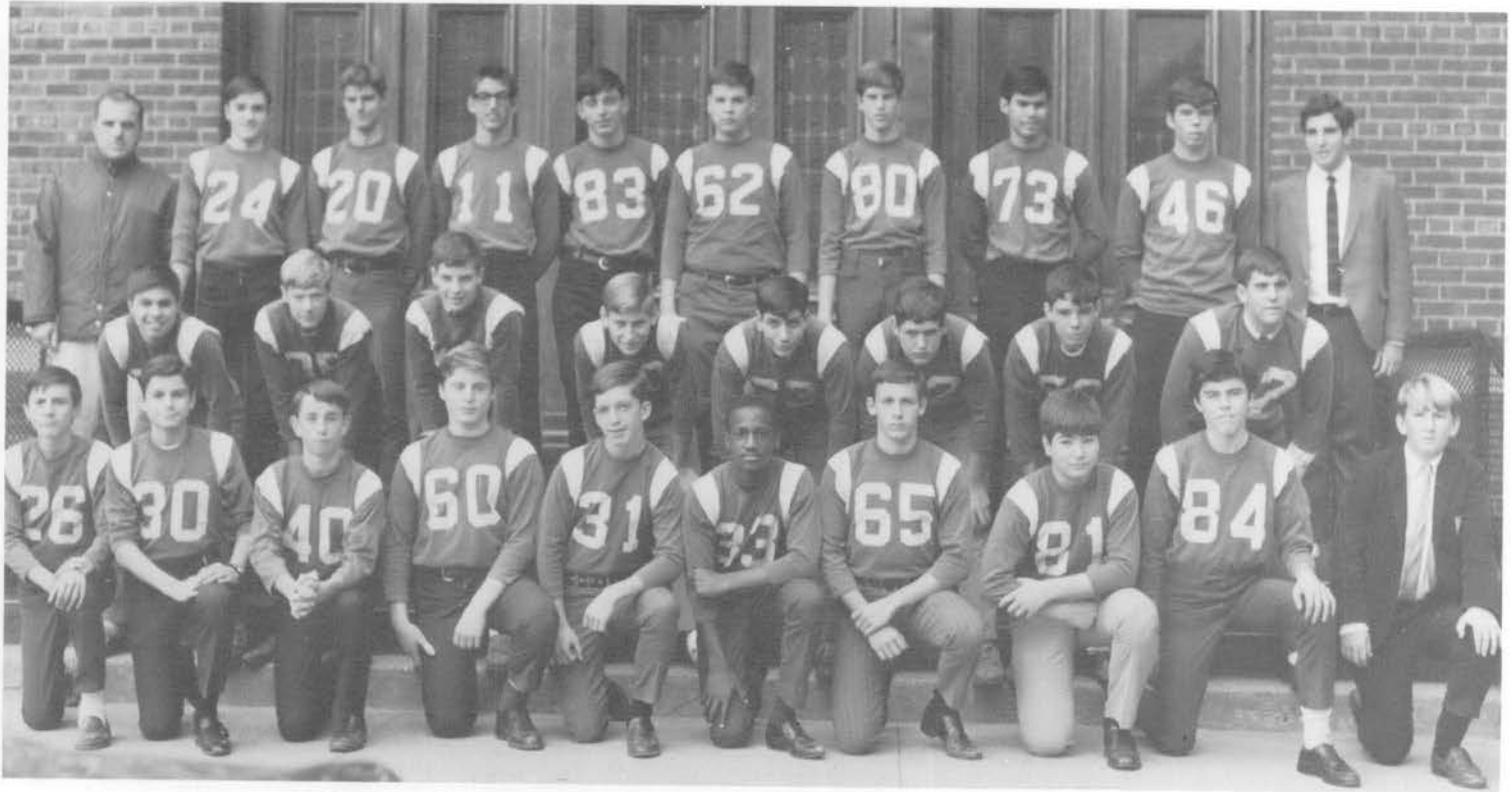

"Shut-up, write that story. Hey! Don't let that candle drip all over the galleys. Ivan, have you found those 4 pages we lost?"

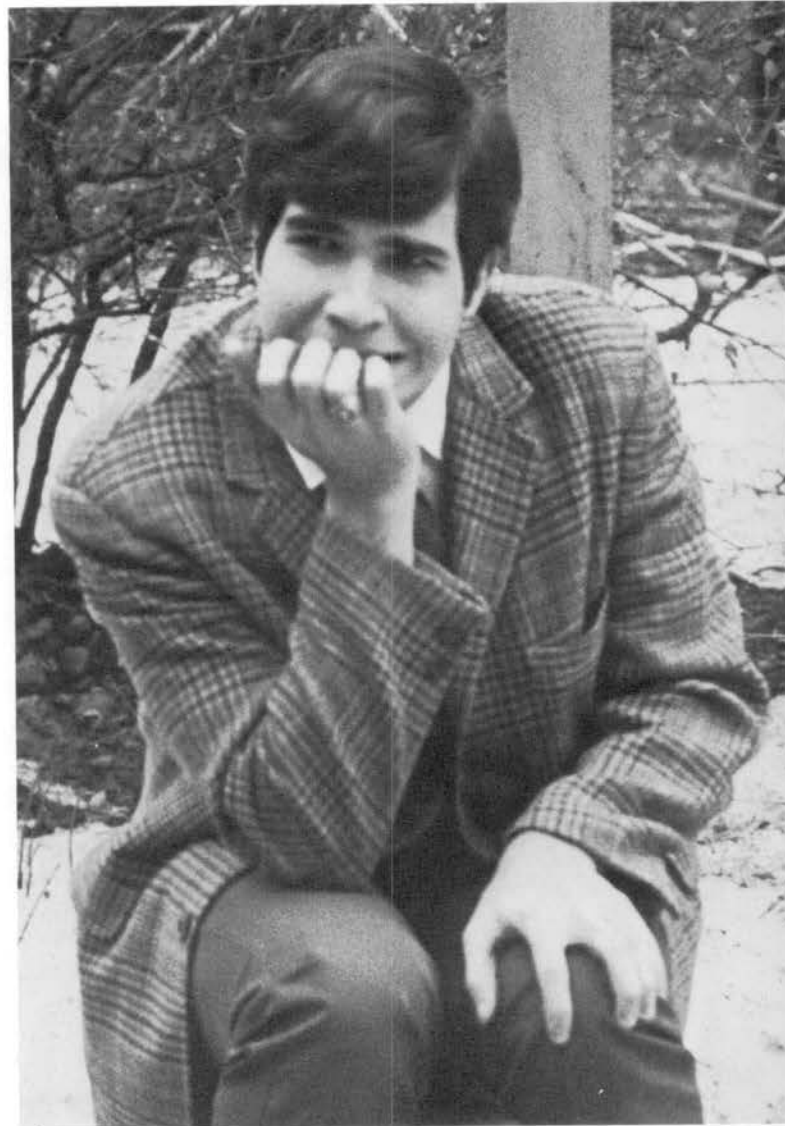

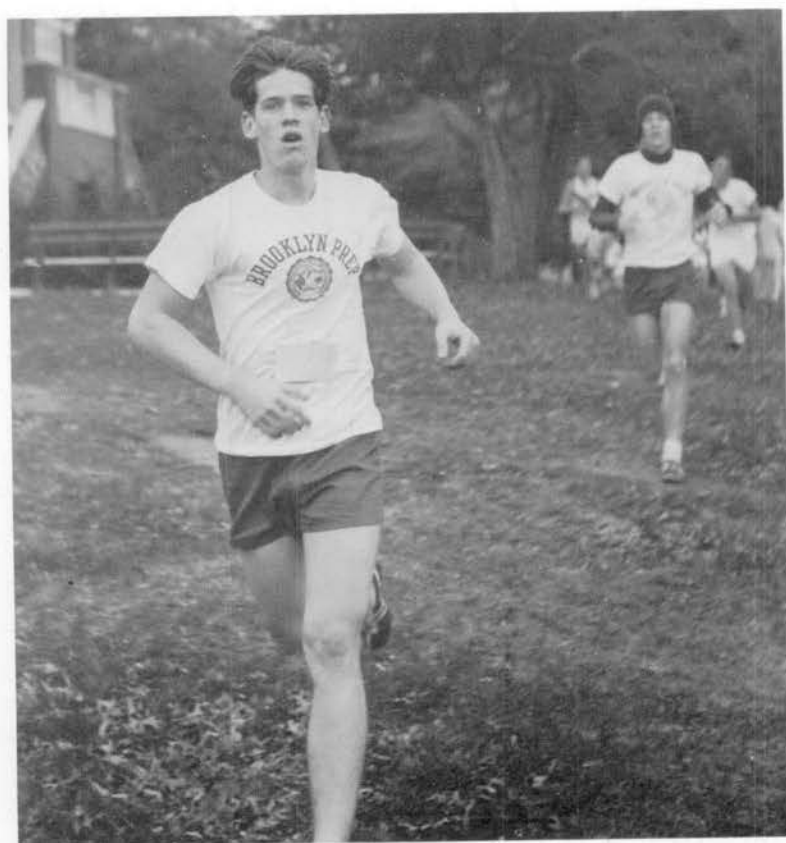
Cross Country

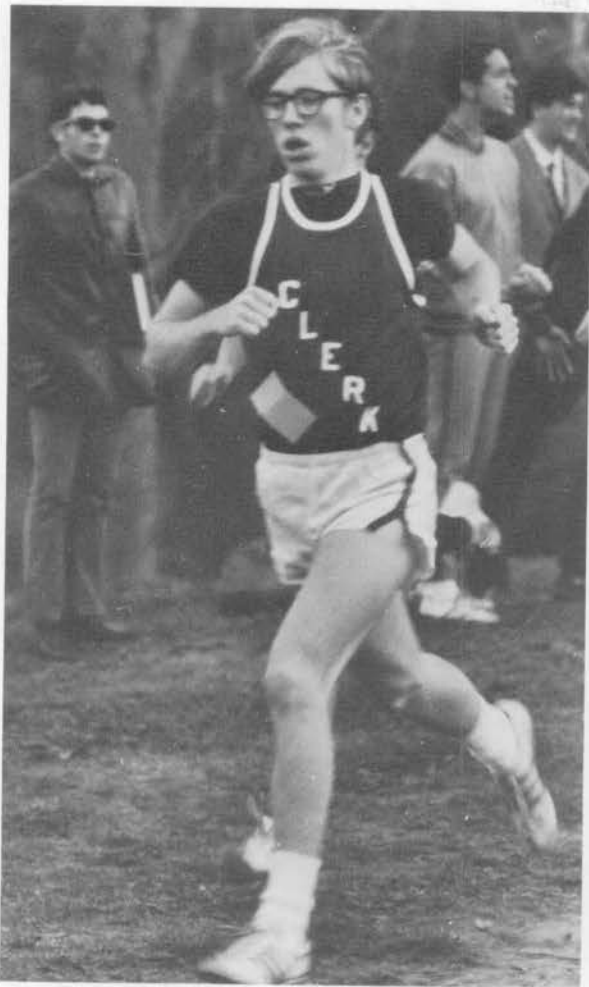

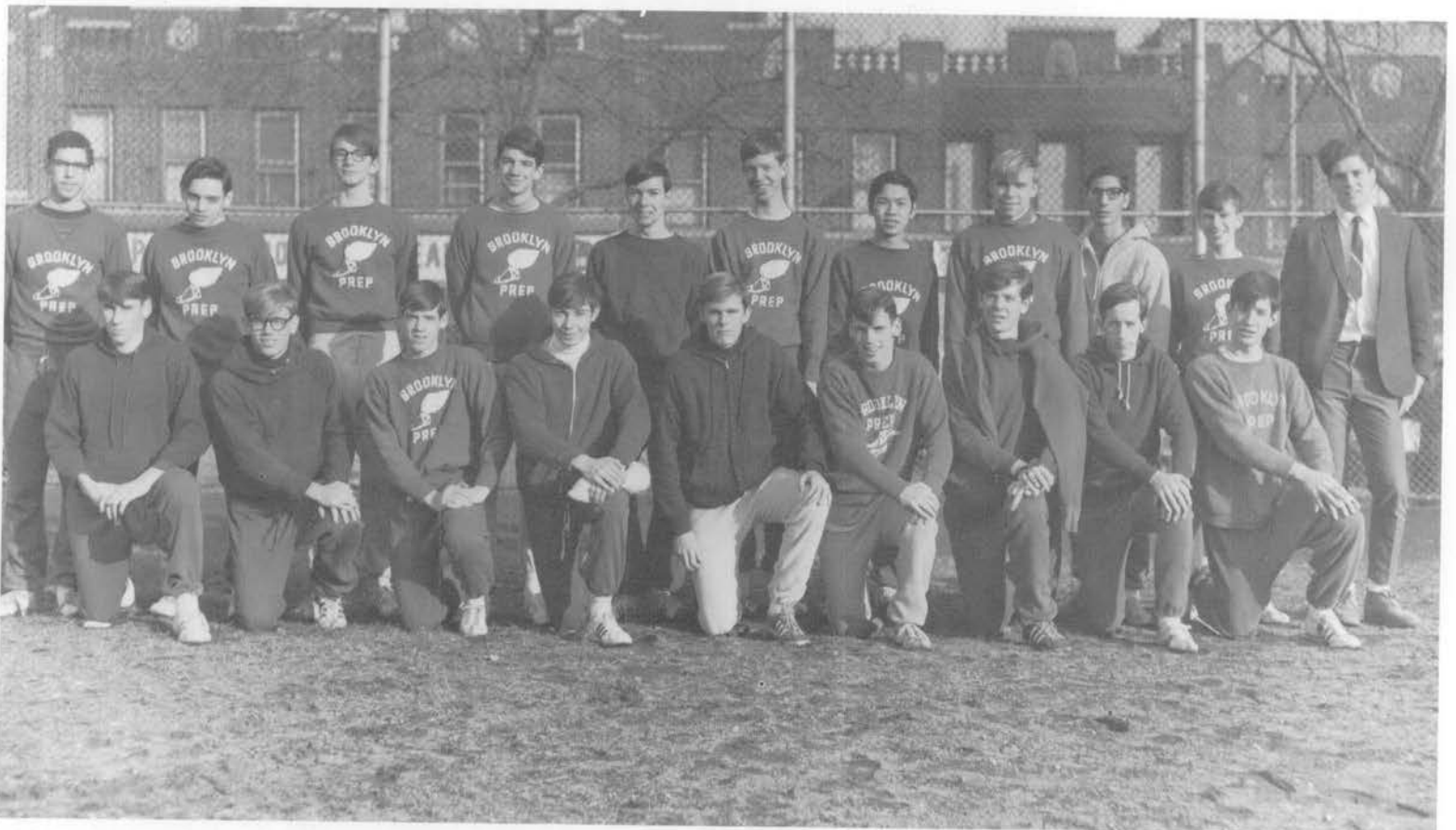

"O.K. Put up the music; fade to camera three."

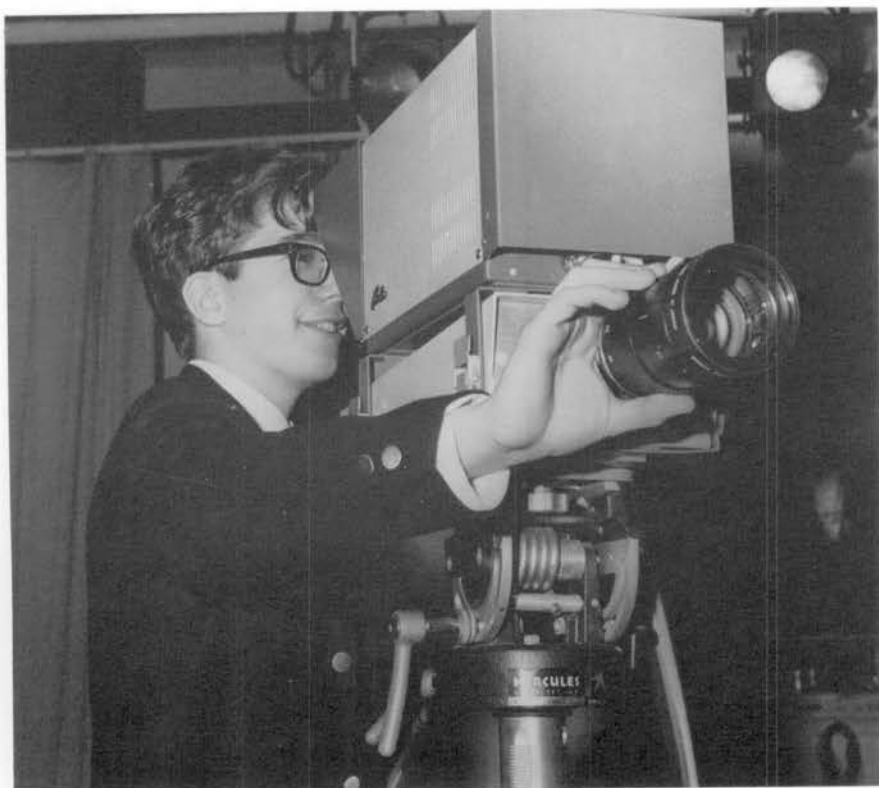
"Livio, this split screen—it comes right after the second piece of music, right?"

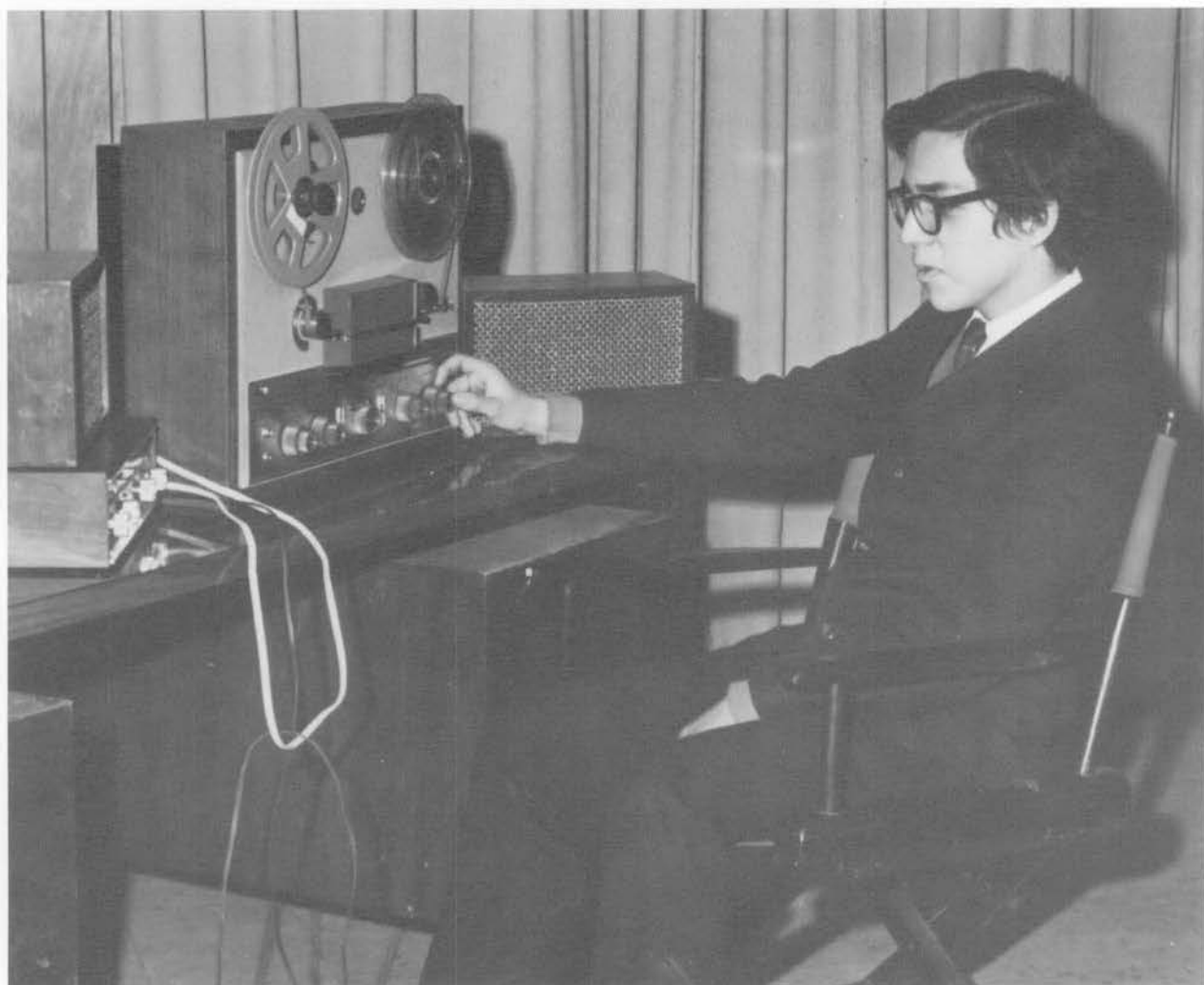

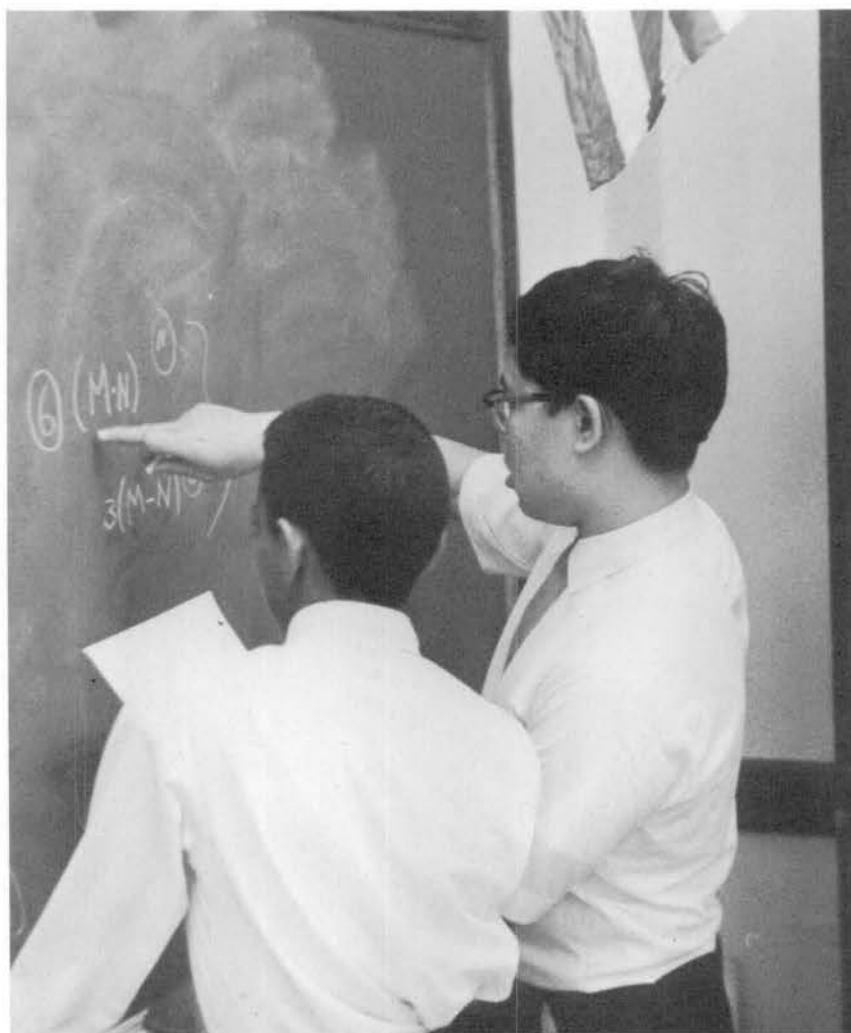


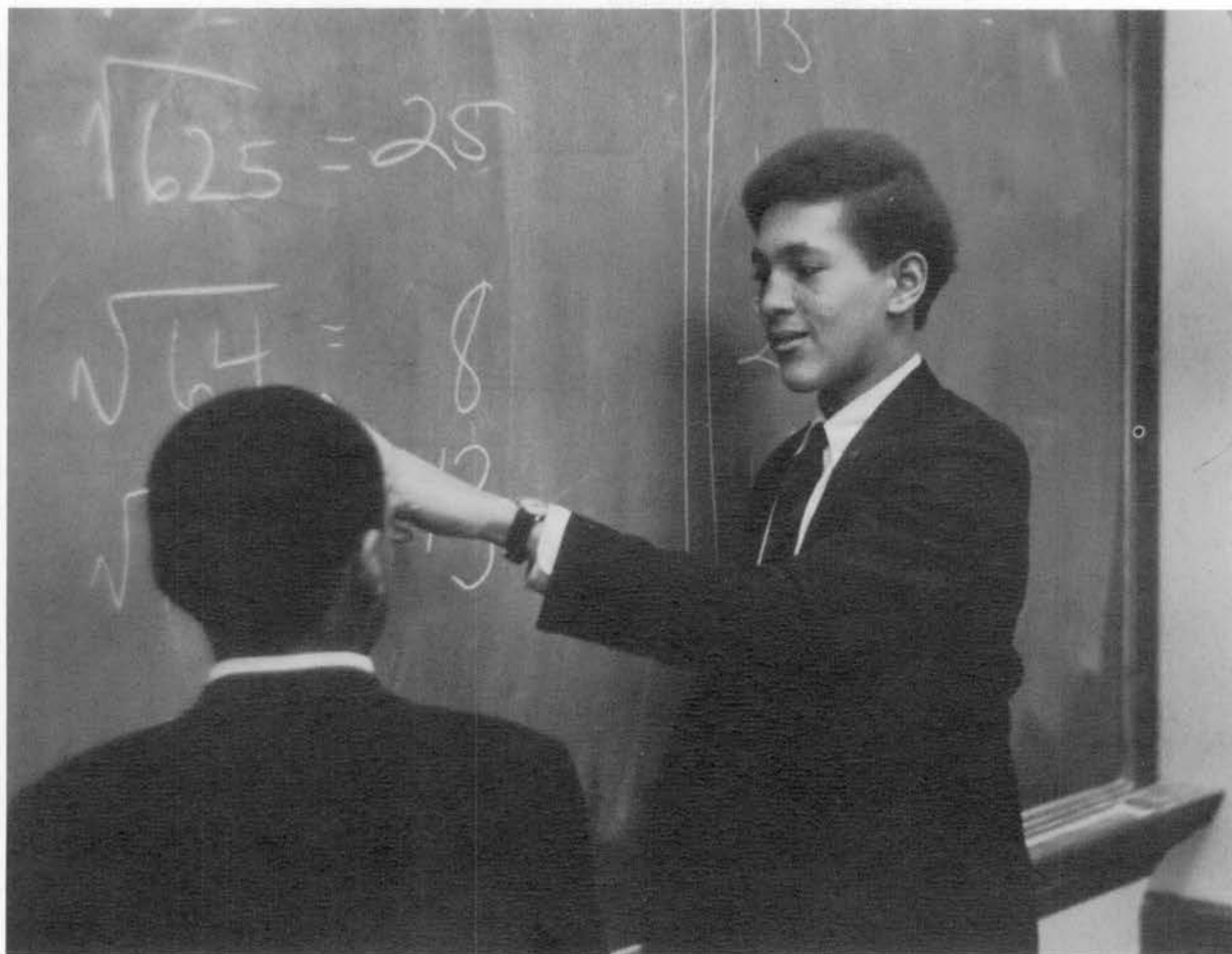
Higher Achievement Program

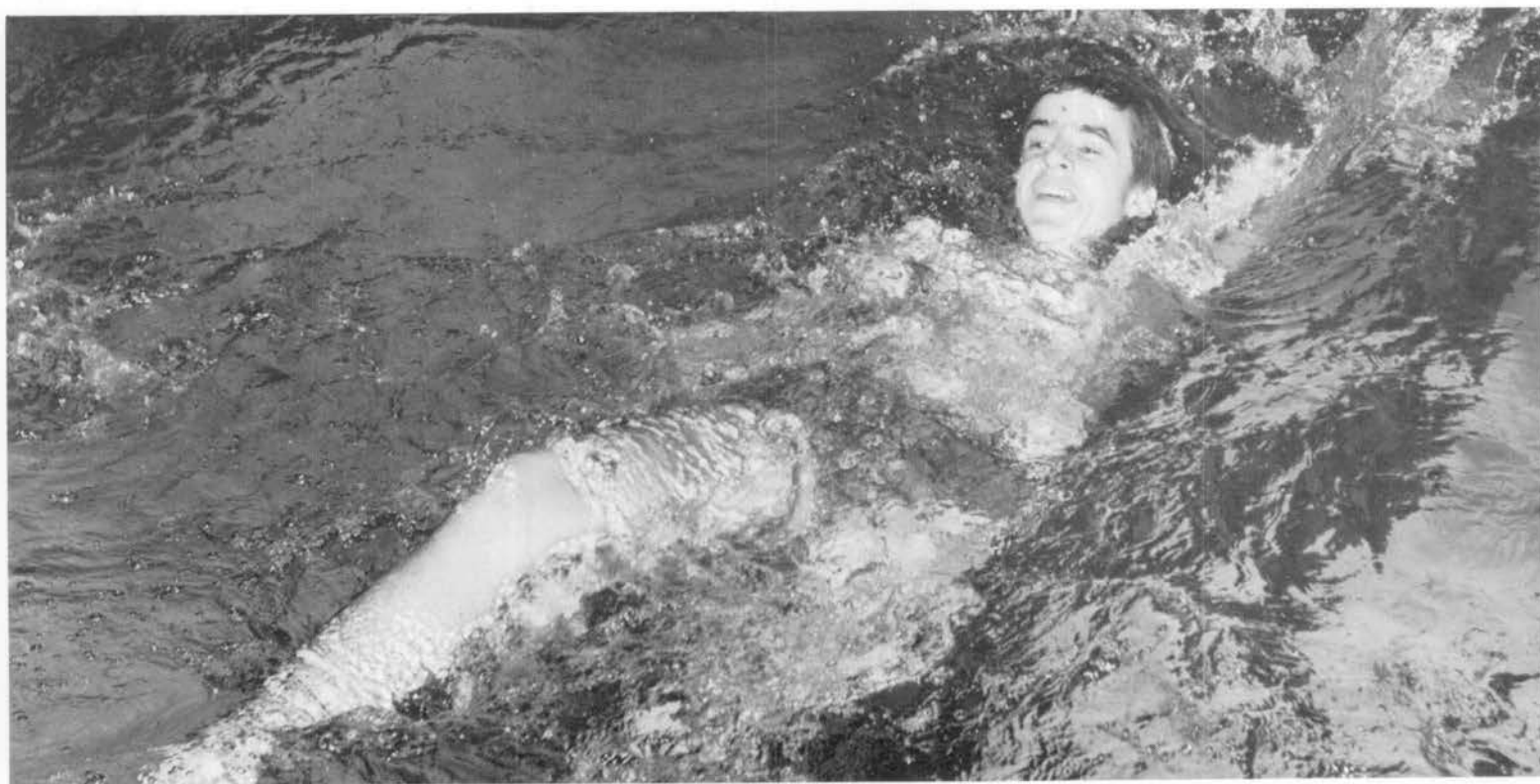


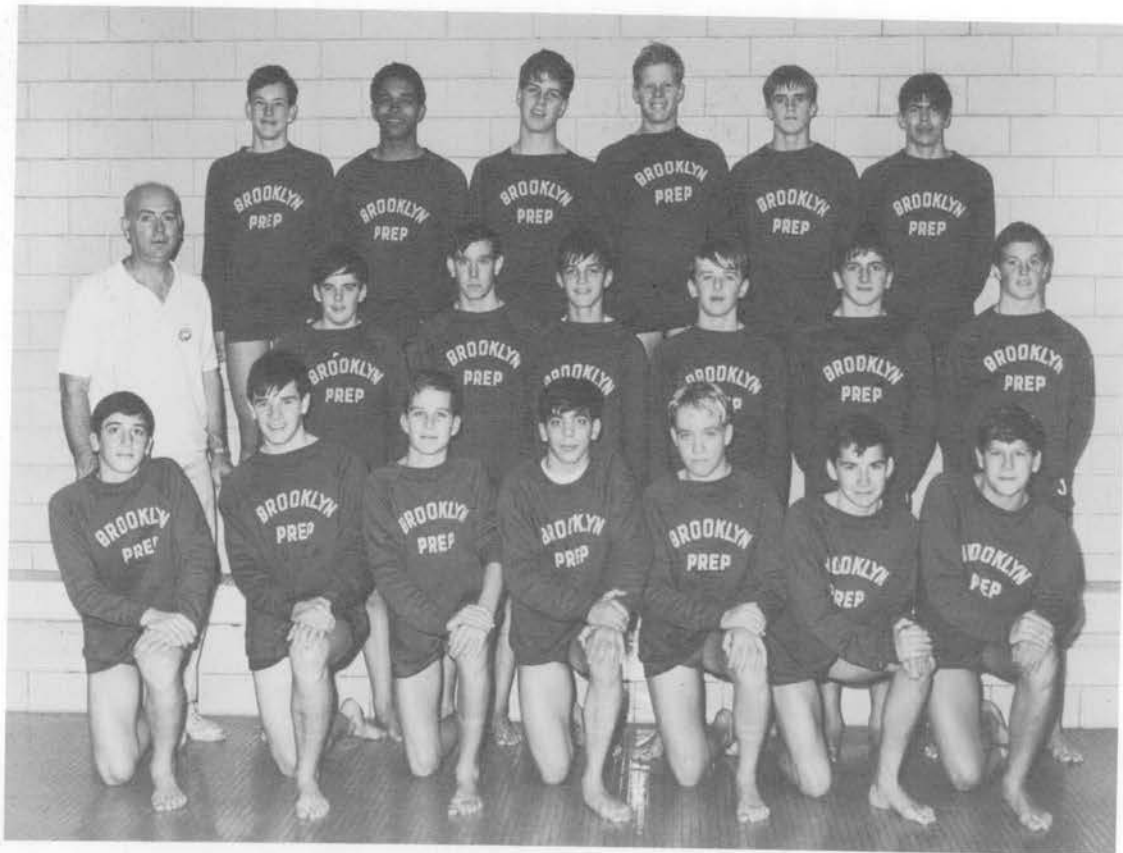
Freshman Swim to C.H.S.A.A. Championship

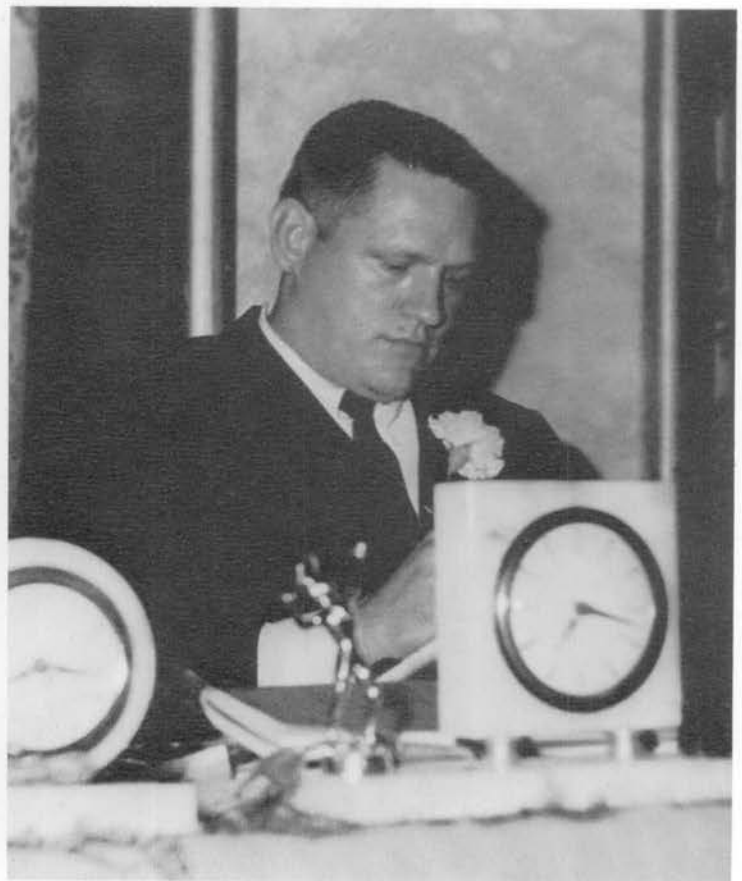
Yes, he must be part of a package deal. Hmmm, same menu, too.

The Dramatics Society also performed the Spring production of another satire, *The Boy Friend*.

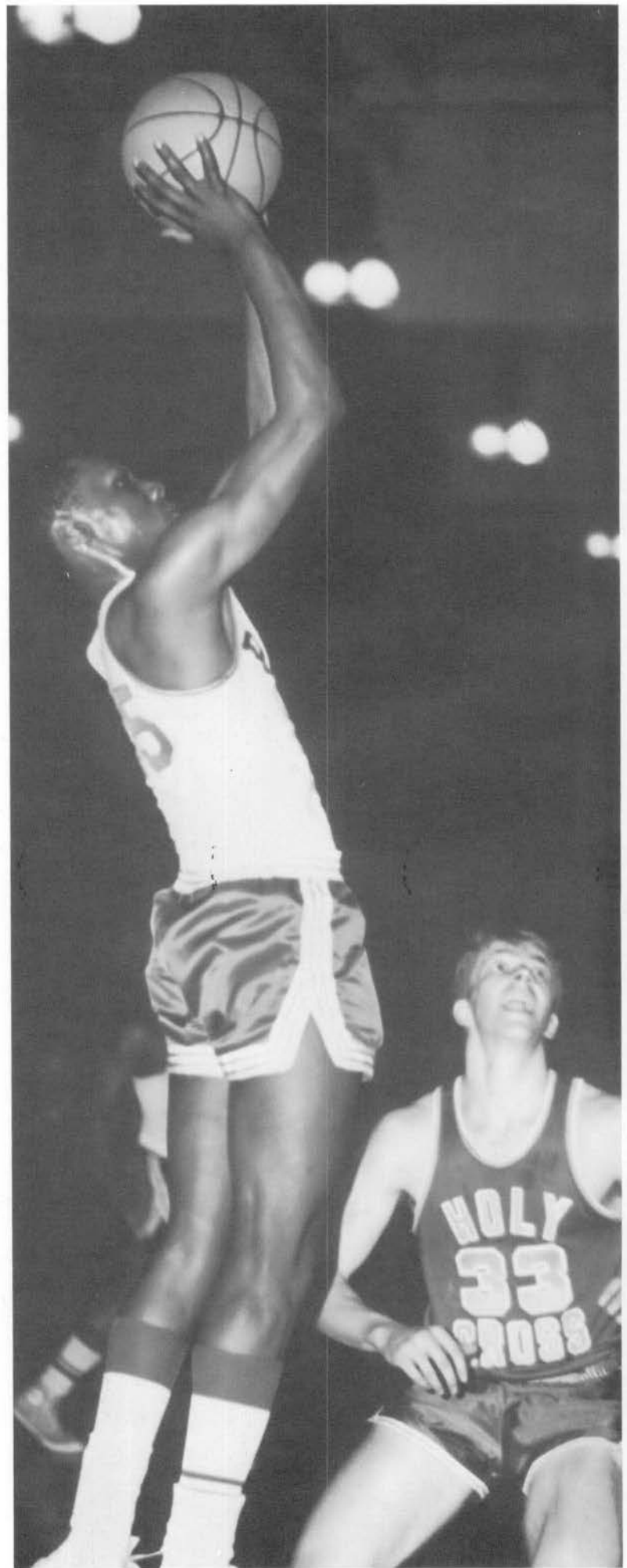


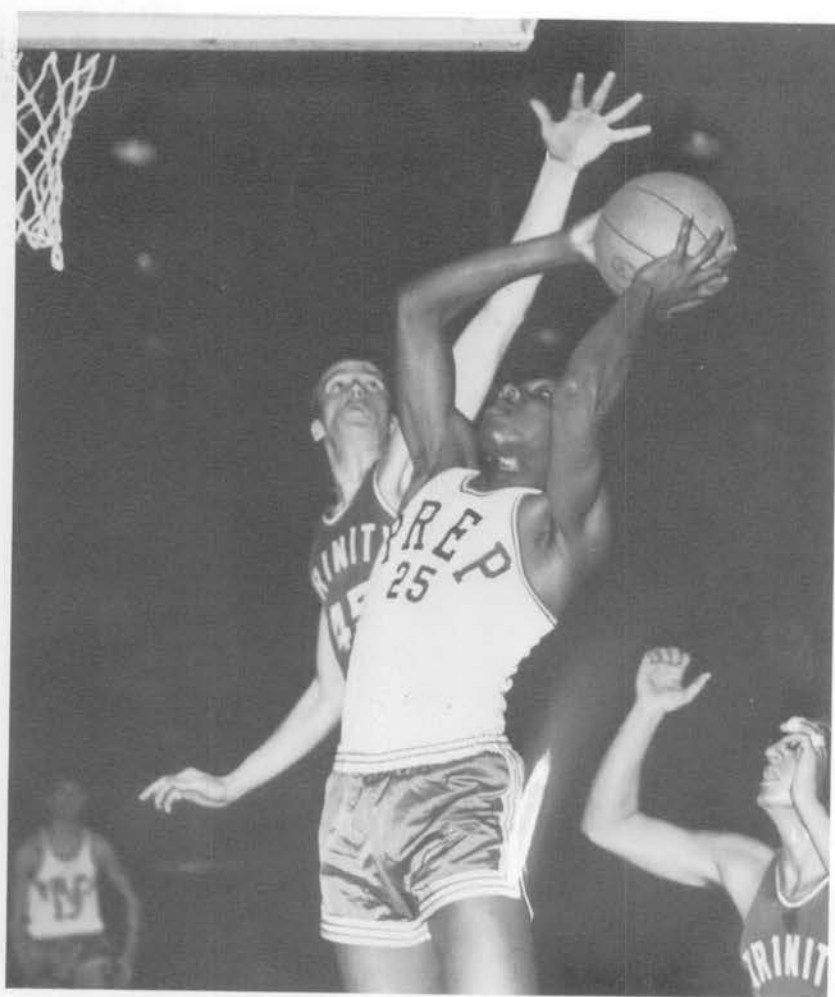
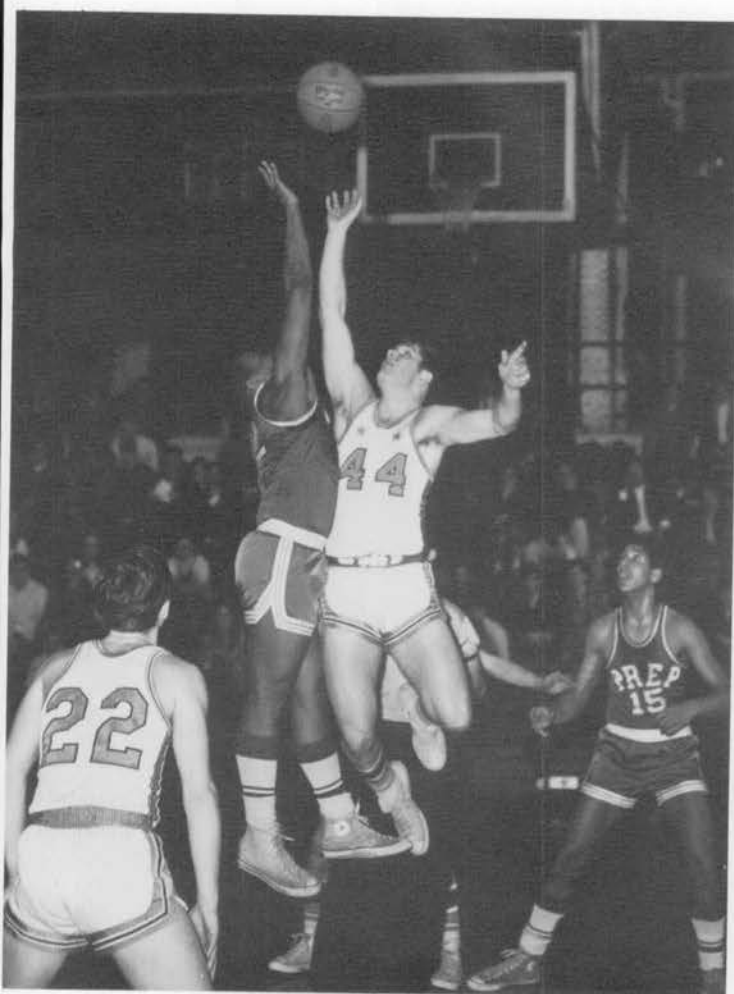
Charles Highlights Outstanding Varsity Season

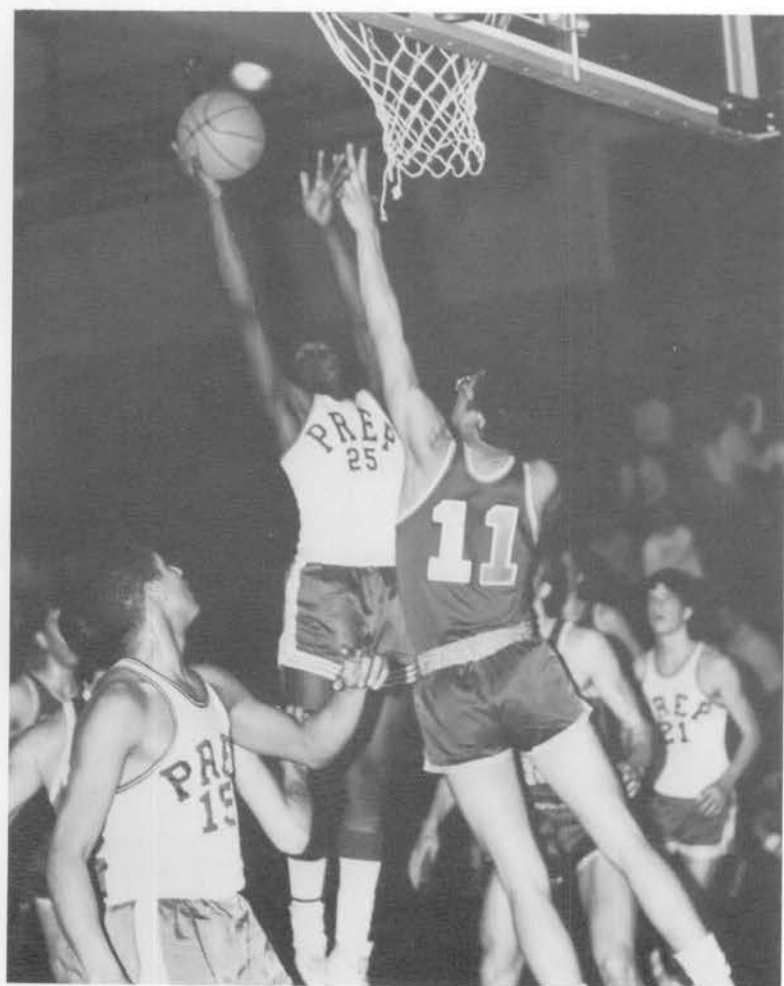


A Special Combination

Junior Varsity Basketball

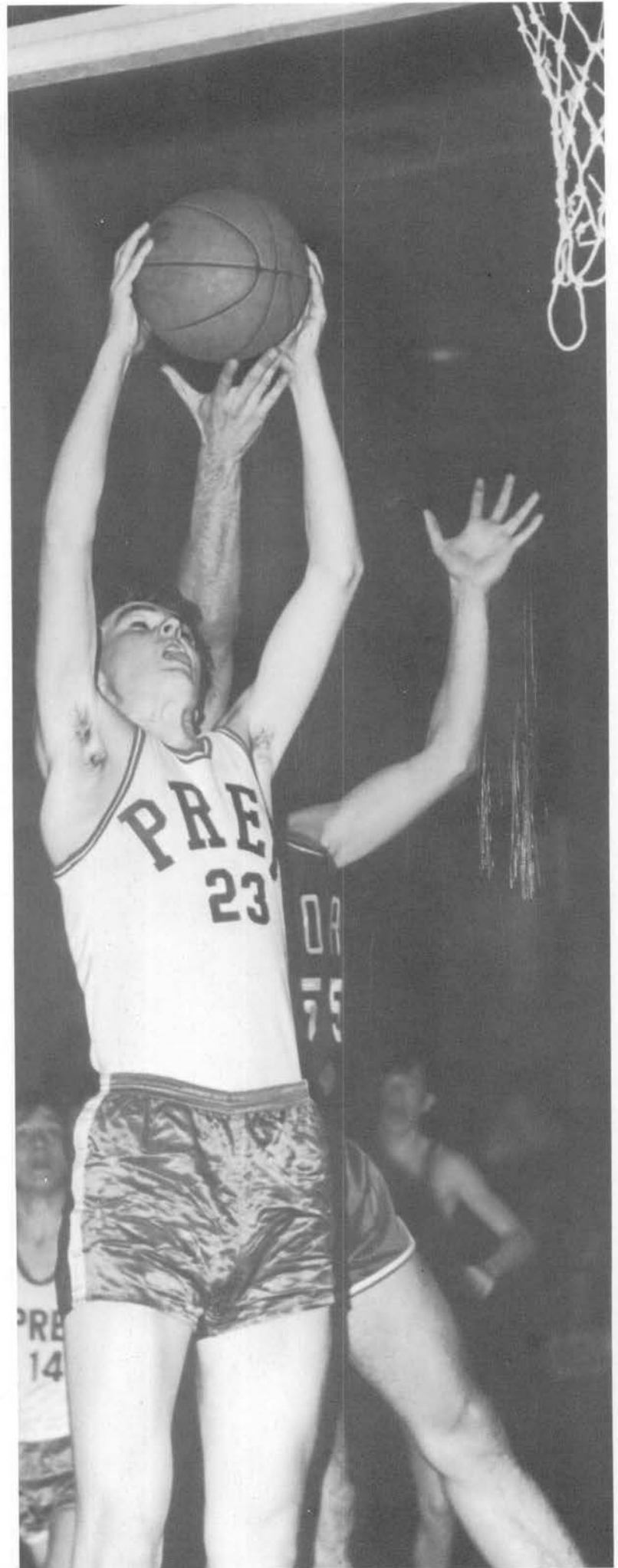

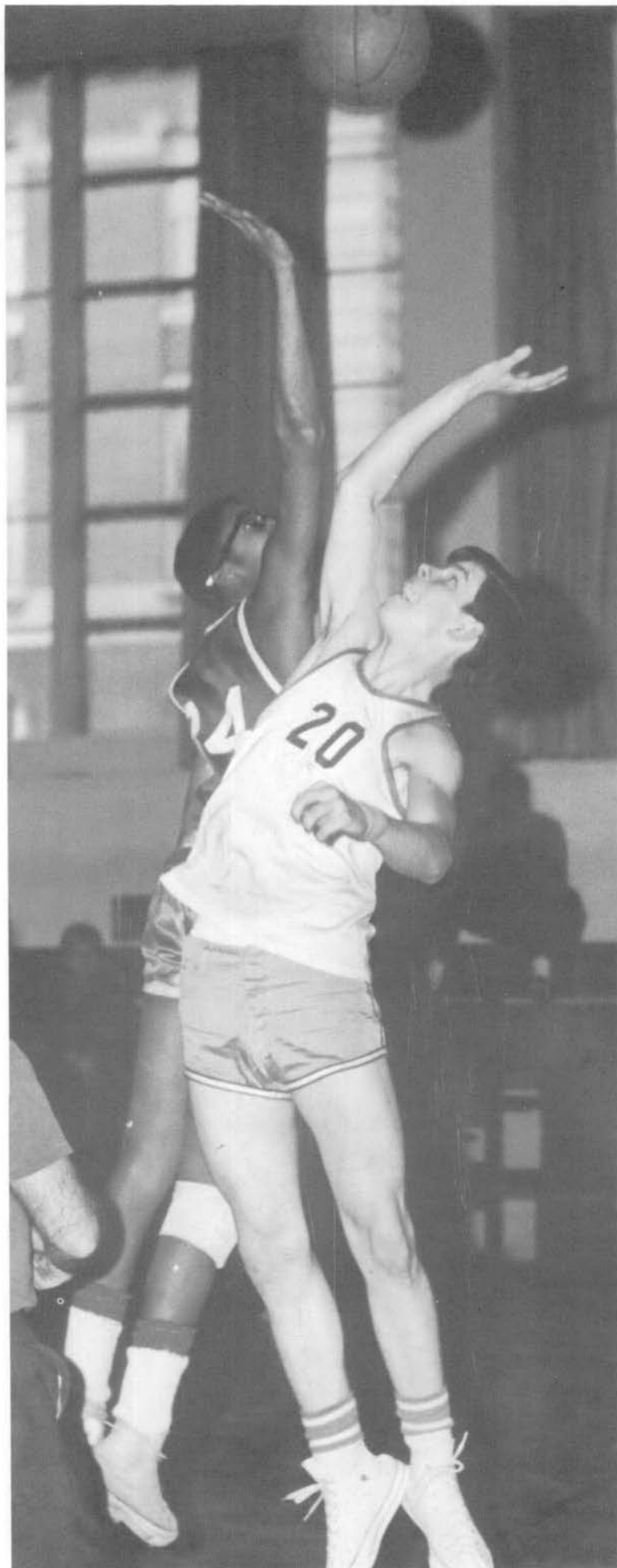


Freshman Basketball

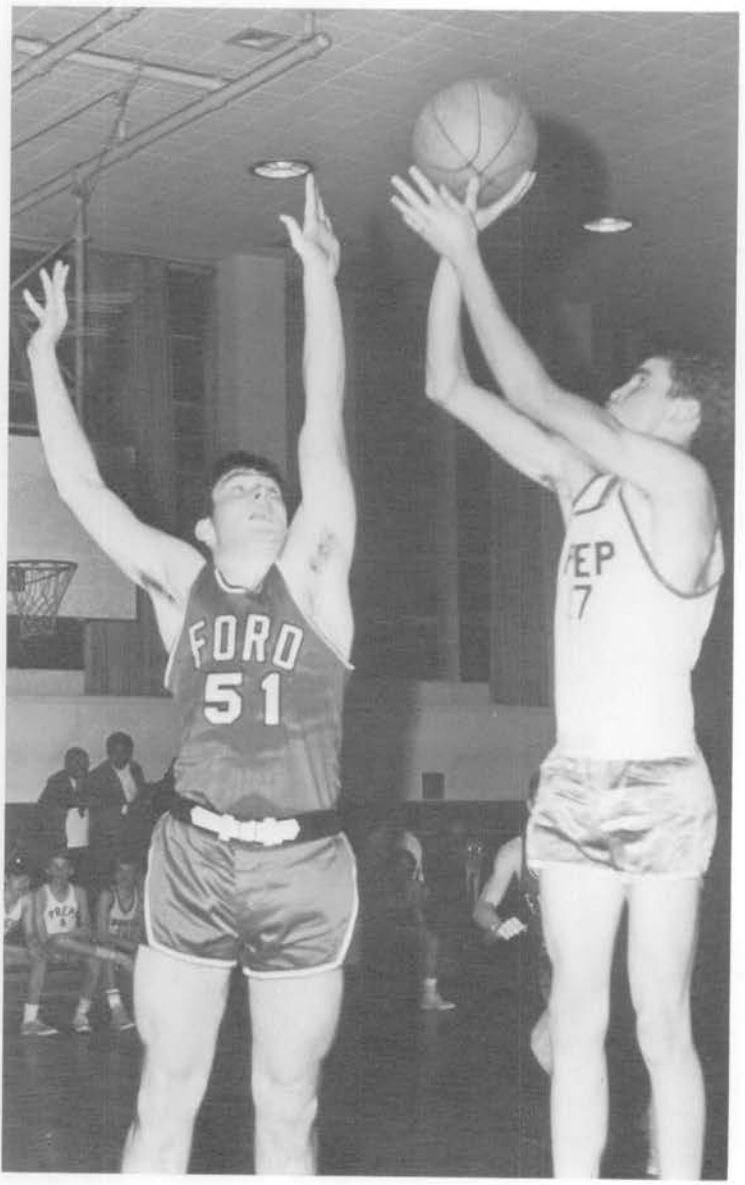

Christian Action Core

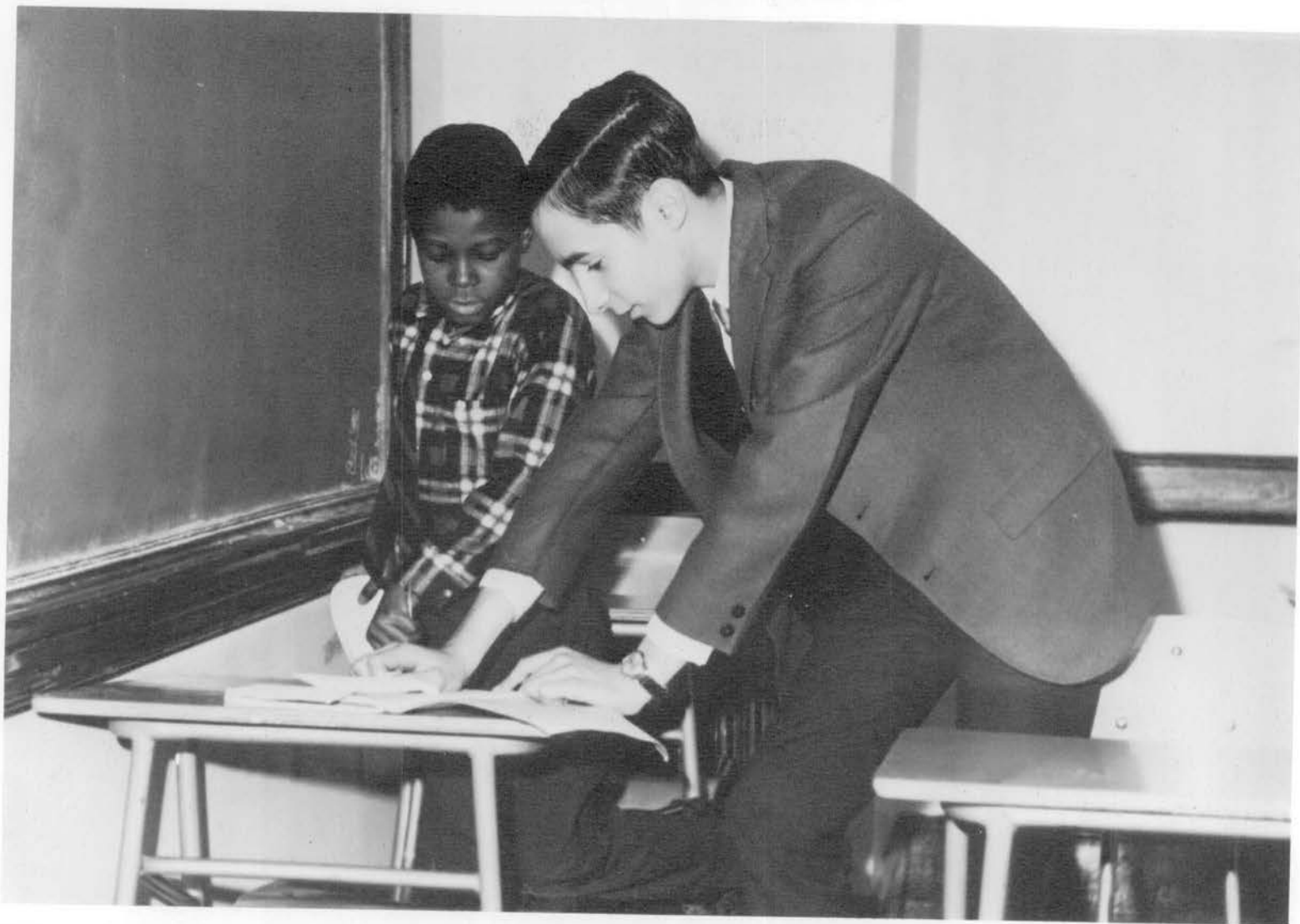

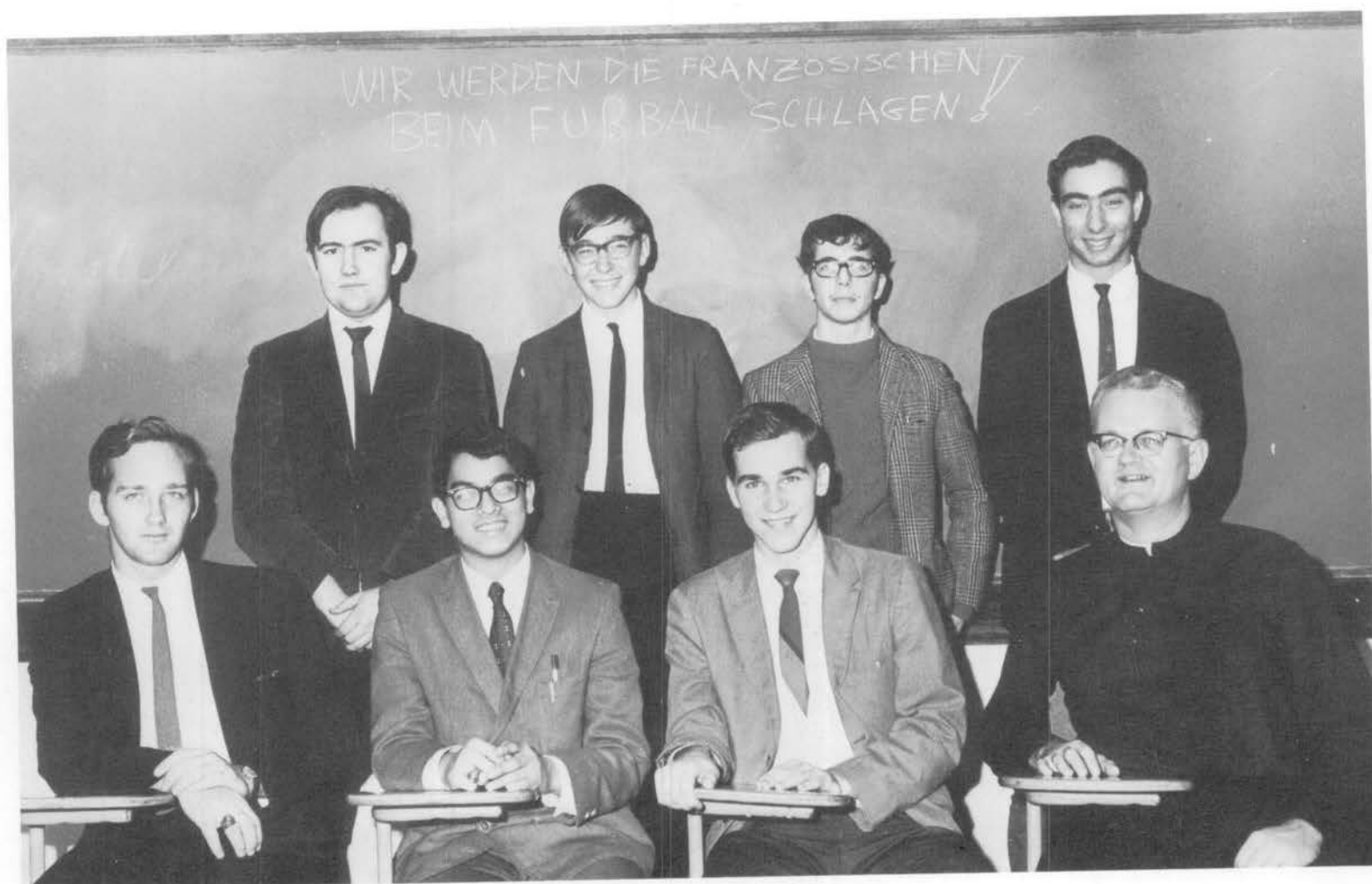

German Club

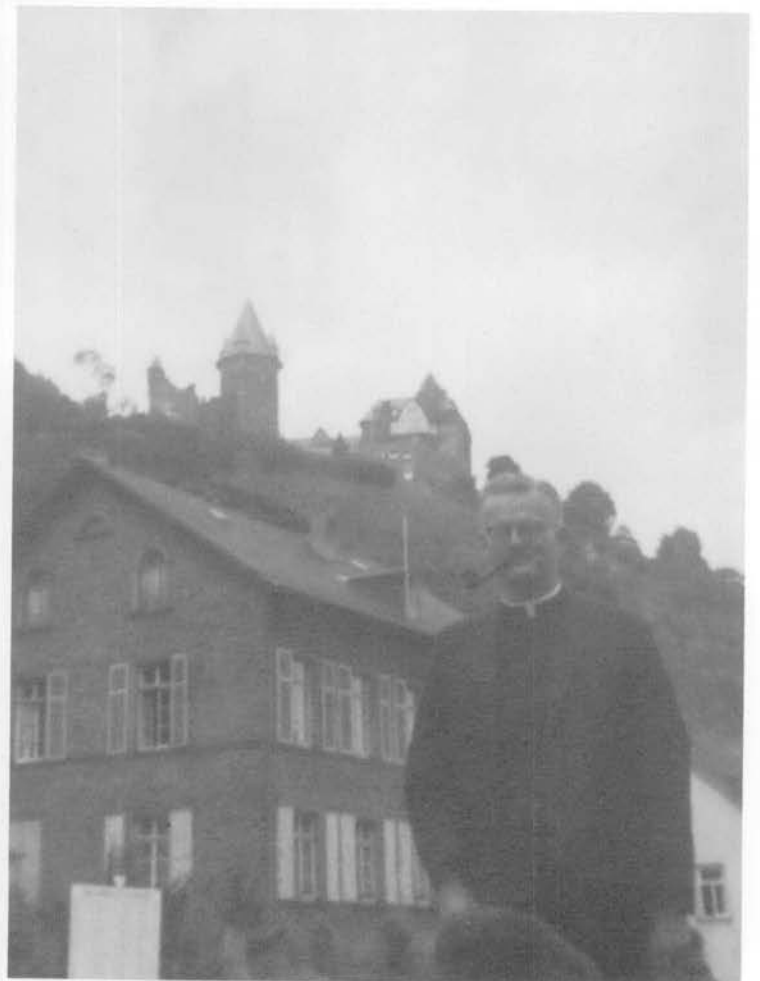

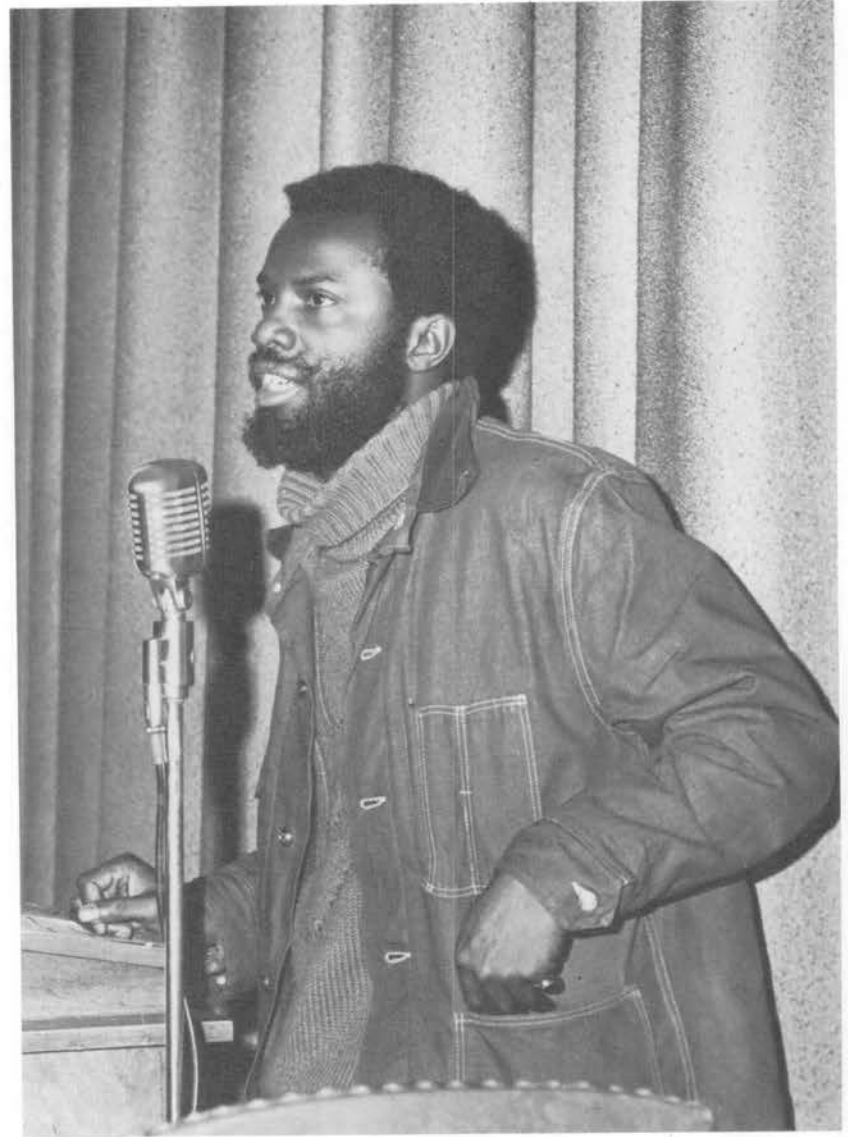


Human Rights

In early fall, Mr. John O'Connor met with the five seniors of the Christian Leadership conference. The conclusion they reached was that there was need for a school activity dealing with Human Rights. With this idea in mind the Human Rights Workshop began. Through such methods as guest lecturers, audio-visual equipment, open discussions, the workshop offered a wide spectrum of opinions. As stated by Mr. John O'Connor, its moderator, "the organization's purpose is not to find pat answers but rather to exchange ideas." As its basic source the workshop used the REPORT OF THE NATIONAL ADVISORY COMMISSION ON CIVIL DISORDERS. An outstanding accomplishment of the Human Rights Workshop was the Human Rights Week, during which a series of lectures were given by four speakers connected with several citywide civil rights organizations. The workshop also sent two Juniors as representatives of Prep to the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

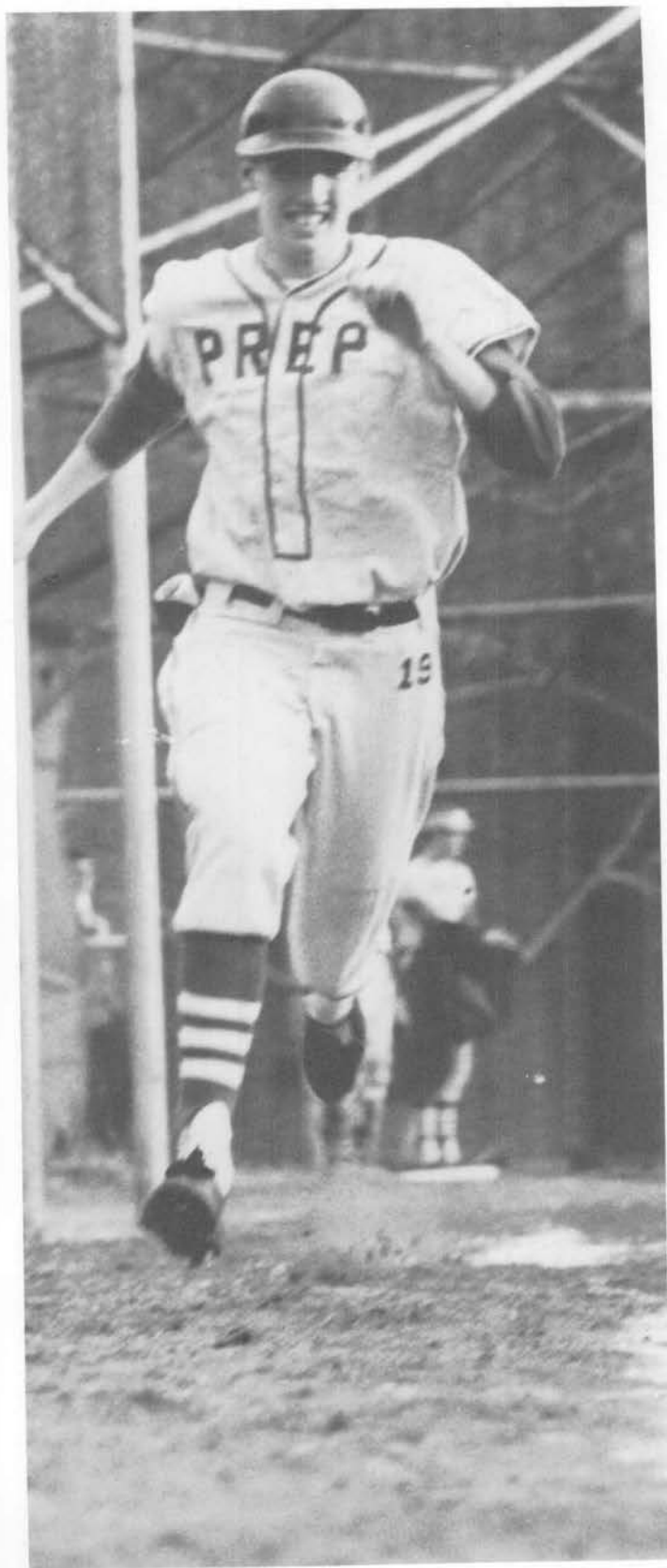

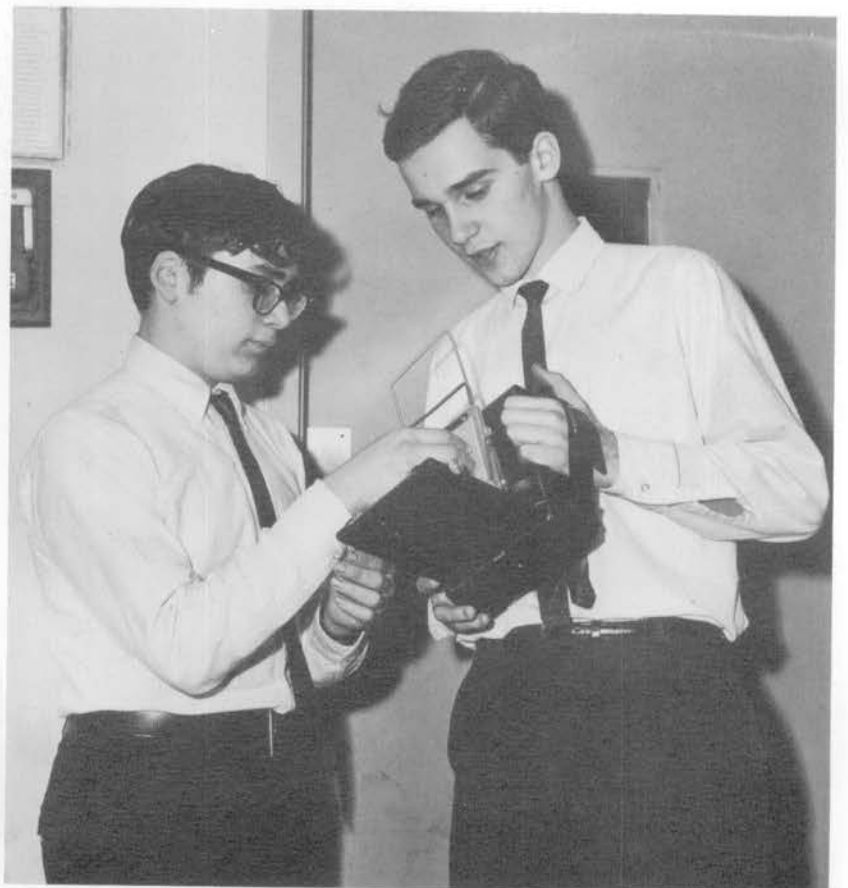
Photography Club
