




### REVEREND JOHN J. HOOPER, S.J.


### REVEREND FRANCIS X. BROCK, S.J.



With this brief sketch of our class newspaper in action, we leave you till next year.






We have numbered among us many proficient athletes, eager debaters and writers, as well as rising dramatists.



"Gee—I-only-got-98" Stefano has been trying to get that 99.







This seems to close the book on 2A-4. We're looking forward to seeing you next year, and until then, so long!



To record the activities of this class, limited as we are in space, would be a hopeless task—so we leave you here with this rough sketch of our classmates during a typical day at Prep.







We have given you some brief views of ourselves and our work and recreation. Until our next meeting, then, we part with a sincere, "Good luck, and God bless you!"



When our happy days at Prep have come to a close we hope the present class 1A-3 will be remembered with the pride and distinction of which we shall try to make ourselves worthy.





With a full realization, therefore, of the value of this informal training as an integral part in the formation of the active Catholic American citizen, the Senior class is pleased to present a review of Prep's




## Senior Sodality

The house lights were dimmed as the dramatic moment arrived and the curtain rose on the first scene of the play. The high, idealistic character of Cyrano, with its courage, independence, ready wit and bravado, was built up from the beginning. Deeply in love with his beautiful cousin, Roxanne, he hesitated to tell her of his love only through a feeling of inferiority brought on by the realization of how very grotesque was his nose.

Then, just when he had gained the courage to tell her all, she confided to him her own great love for a gentleman named Christian. While trying to make up his mind whether or not he should offer competition, Cyrano meets his opponent. Christian turns out to be very shy and particularly poor at expressing to Roxanne the love he really feels toward her. Thereupon Cyrano, throwing his own cause to the winds, comes to Christian's aid, coaching him, writing letters for him, and even speaking for him when he can.

To complicate matters, a third lover, the Comte de Guiche, appears. While he offers little but comedy in courting when seen in contrast with Cyrano, he is still a competitor, and, since he is Christian's military commander, he causes considerable trouble. To escape him, Christian and Roxanne are secretly wed late one night, whilst Cyrano, with a long and wearisome tale of having just made a trip to the moon, keeps the unsuspecting Comte de Guiche waiting. When they come forth, the Comte can do nothing but give in and admit defeat, so that it looks as though all will go well. But a moment later he comes out with startling news: the reason for his coming to Roxanne at such a late hour was because he and his company—including Christian—have been ordered out to fight immediately. In parting, Cyrano promises Roxanne that he will protect Christian, and see to it that he writes often.

So wonderful are the letters Cyrano writes to Roxanne for Christian (to post which he risks his life many times over) that she runs the gauntlet of enemy guards to come and visit him at the siege of Arras. She is only with him a few brief moments when the battle begins anew, and all rush

Right: Cyrano tells LeBret (Jack Reilly) the hopelessness of their position at the front,






forth to fight. In the struggle, Christian is mortally wounded, and dies in Roxanne's arms.

Feeling that no one can ever love her again as Christian had, Roxanne enters the Convent. Once every week thereafter Cyrano loyally listens to her reminiscences of the noble character of the loved one. In the last—and magnificent—scene, Cyrano is late for his weekly visit for the first time in twenty years. Wounded by his enemies, he struggles to the convent garden simply because he knows how much it means to Roxanne. He manages to hide his injury from her; but it is impossible for him to read the old letters which now for the first time she shows him. To her amazement, he recites them from memory, and it is only then, as he is dying, that she discovers his love for her.

The acting throughout was very well done, as all adults present will testify. Too much credit can not be given to Bill Blatty for his almost professional rendition of Cyrano. Eugene Tully, Vice-President, and John Brennan, Secretary. At the same time a debating league was formed by the Jesuit High Schools of the metropolitan area. Places on Campion's league teams were open to all Seniors and Juniors, and were won in competition. The teams having been selected, debates were immediately engaged with St. Peter's, Fordham Prep, and Loyola on the question of the United States and a reconstituted League of Nations. During the first half of the year the Varsity Debate teams also met St. John's, Mt. St. Michael, and De La Salle.

In the meantime the Discussion group got underway, and at weekly meetings talks on a variety of topics were given by the members, followed by "open forum" discussions.

For the American Legion Oratorical Contest in January, Richard Murray was chosen to represent the school. He spoke on the Constitution, placing second in the county finals.

For the Lecture Guild four speakers were chosen, Richard Murray, Eugene Tully, Richard Finucane, and James Corbett. They lectured on "The Catholic Church and the League of Nations," making the question more pertinent by bringing in youth's view of the post-war world. In February Gregory Halpin and Richard McCarthy replaced Eugene Tully and Richard Finucane, lost by graduation. Edward Kelly was also named to alternate with James Corbett as Chairman of the group.

With the Mock Trial came a temporary cessation in the formal debates. Once that was over, however, Campion again got underway, debating St. Barnabas, De La Salle, Regis, Chaminade, and Xavier. It has been a hard and active season for the members; but the benefits gained from it have far outweighed the labors.

On Friday, March 31, 1944, in Prep's auditorium, Prep's debating societies presented their Fourth Annual Mock Trial, the case of Gerald Chapman. After each side had worked separately for a month with no knowledge of the proposed proceeding of the other side, the defense and the prosecution were ready to prove the innocence or guilt of the defendant,

Chapman was a famous criminal who was accused by the state of Connecticut of the fatal shooting of Patrolman James Skelly, during an attempt to rob a New Britain Department Store in 1925.

With Judge Michael Walsh presiding before a capacity audience, Assistant District Attorney Reinhart Gideon (Ed La Due) positively stated Chapman's (Joe Marcheso's) guilt in his opening address. Then, the state produced a long line of unit witnesses who declared that Chapman was present in the department store on the date of the shooting, and concluded its case with the testimony of Walter Sheean (George Dagher), Chapman's accomplice in the crime.

When the defense opened its case, defense attorney Nathan O. Freedman (Bill Blatty) attacked the veracity of the prosecution, and stated that the defense would prove an entirely different story. Witnesses were called who testified that Chapman was not at the scene of the crime, and Chapman himself denied ever having been at New Britain. After District Attorney Alcorn's (Dick Murray's) summation for the prosecution, and Counsel Groehl's (Greg Halpin) summation for the defense, both of which were marked with merciless verbal

barrages and alternate demands for a "guilty" and a "not guilty" verdict, the jury retired. It returned some minutes later with a verdict of "Guilty."

The awards of a gold and a silver medal went to Bill Blatty and Dick Murray, respectively, while Marcheso received the medal for the best witness.

The only thing typical about this picture is the fact that it is nearing six o'clock on a Saturday afternoon. It was rarely that we could work in such an orderly way as here pictured.

Let it not seem egotistical, but rather appropriate that we of the Staff of this book assign ourselves some space in its pages. Let us modestly say that we represent an important activity, as well as an unexpectedly tedious one. We have for our reward that sensation of joyful pride which arises from seeing one's own literary efforts in print, and contained in a lasting publication. If we may wax sentimental for a moment, let us predict that when the bearded patriarchs, whom we once recognized as our classmates, pore over these vellowed pages in future years, then will they extend to us their vote of gratitude for leaving them this treasured memento of their school days. At present, we must labor patiently with the knowledge that the day just described will surely and finally come.

The arduous task of editing the history of our activities was assigned to the staff last September. We chose our theme first, fixing on one that was twofold in purpose—the proper function that Church and State enjoy in the life of the staunch citizen, and Prep's method of preparing its sons for faithful service to both, not only now in their hour of greatest need, but also for

the task of leadership in the post-war period. The cover was then designed to fit this idea, showing as it does that Church and State are both intended by God to aid men in doing His will.

We approached our venture with assurance, confident that this volume would be a memento to all Prepsters of yesterday, today, and tomorrow. If it serves that purpose for them, our aim in all our work has been attained.

Since he exemplifies to the highest degree our idea of the ideal of the Catholic Citizen, we respectfully dedicated our Blue Book to our Holy Father, His Holiness Pope Pius XII. If we can imitate him in our relations with God and with men—which is but the practical application of the function the Church and the State should enjoy in the life of the staunch citizen—then we will be the Catholic citizens Prep is trying to make of us.

The divider pages, introducing the various parts of the book, gave us many a headache. We have attempted by them to show the divers phases of our training, and, in some way, to connect each phase with the practical duties we shall later assume as active citizens.

The practical difficulties incidental to the compilation and completion of an effort of this kind are considerable, for obvious reasons. After the general outline had been decided upon, and divider pages arranged, the seemingly endless task of assembling the data and details of its presentation was begun. Upon due consideration (a euphemism, of course, for hours of discussion and argumentation!) the photographs and written matter were agreed on. What had been, in the language of the printer, a "dummy" began to take form before our eves. Printer's proofs came to us in vellow and white, the former to be cut up and made to fit in the space allotted each article, the latter to be reread and corrected. Then the engraver's proofs began arriving, and these too had to be cut up and carefully arranged. The helpful and friendly consultations with the printer and engraver lifted us over apparently insurmountable obstacles.

The pressure of war emergencies caused us to restrict the number of pictures. For those we have used we are deeply in debt to Mr. Wood, S.J., and the official photographers for the hours they spent laboring "behind the birdies" and in the darkroom.

For the rest, things followed through quite well: with the cooperation of various students engaged in divers activities, the articles were composed and edited. For that cooperation we are sincerely grateful, and we trust that by our efforts to give them a memorable Blue Book we have been able to repay them at least in part. The Chronicle, a novel institution ("brainstorm," if you will!) is the idea and work of our Associate Editor. He tells us it is the best part of the book, and after reading through it we are at least seriously tempted to agree with him.

Our sincere gratitude goes to Mr. Ambrose, S.J., our most capable counsellor, whose guidance was never lacking when problems presented themselves—that is to say, since last September.

We, the editors, trust that when you receive this Blue Book it will satisfy your scrutiny. We have tried hard to make it what we thought you wanted it to be, and if we have succeeded in doing that our efforts will have received their full reward.



This is much more typical of our afternoons. It proved a trying process at times, but only when everyone chipped in his own ideas were we able to work out anything novel for this '44 Blue Book.



## Football




Outstanding for Prep in defeat were Dick McCarthy, elected field-captain before the contest, and George Paterno, elusive scit-back.

Right: Bob McCoy gets his leg pulled-but it's no joke this time.









#### FORDHAM PREP 7 PREP 0




Next came the Catholic Championships and the team did commendable work finishing fifth out of all the Catholic schools in the City. McAllister again led the team, finishing eighth.



Prep had the misfortune to open the season with what was perhaps the


Above: Jack Kelly goes up—we hope it went in, Jack.

Left: Ed Kelly and Frank Mahoney fighting for Prep under the boards.



But things picked up the next week when Prep came from way behind to score 32 points in the second half and nip Fordham Prep 43-42. However, back at Loughlin, during the Christmas vacation, the squad dropped one by a 28-24 count. Next came Chaminade, and another defeat. The Flyers were big and tough, and although we fought all the way, they walked off the floor 6 points to the good-not a huge margin at that. The team was in a rut, and could not get out of it. St. Augustine's came over to our gym and pushed us further into the rut with a 34-30 beating. By this time the situation was really desperate. Later the Michaelmen beat us 37-27, after we had started out fast, and looked the favorites. Xavier beat us in the same manner. Here we led up until the last minute, in which brief space the Cadets snatched victory from our hands on a field goal and two fouls, winning 36-33. # Swimming












