



School seals, like coats-of-arms and other heraldic devices, may seem very much out of date to the modern student. In an age when simple designs—initials like G.E., G.M., I.B.M., R.C.A.; symbols like the Olympic Games' interlocking circles, the World's Fair's Unisphere, the eye of CBS-TV—can quickly identify an organization, a complicated seal requiring an inspection of many parts may seem to be too much trouble to bother with. Why shouldn't the school initials, as seen on the varsity letters worn by our athletes, be enough for Brooklyn Prep? Why bother with a seal whose lettering is in Latin, whose central figure is no longer fashionable, whose two shields are completely unintelligible to the ordinary viewer?

The answer lies in the nature of our school seal. It is, of course, intended to identify a particular school, just as the "GE" on a 60-watt bulb identifies an enormous corporation, but its purpose is more than simple identification. The seal not only gives those who see it the name of a school, but it also can tell them something about the school. The seal will tell the understanding person the goal of Brooklyn Prep, the ways we reach that goal, the men charged with making it all possible.

Brooklyn Prep's seal, somewhat redesigned this year by a professional artist, is made up of many parts. The name of the school appears in Latin, now with the more accurate spelling of the Latin adjective for "Brooklyn." Then there is the date of the school's founding, 1908. Dominating the design is the symbol of wisdom, the goal of Prep, represented by the goddess Minerva. The school motto, "Sanitas, Scientia, Sanctitas," breaks down the goal into three parts, and shows us the way to wisdom. Finally, two Spanish coats-of-arms, dating back more than five centuries and representing the noble family of Loyola, stand for St. Ignatius Loyola and the religious order he founded, the Society of Jesus. The seal thus proclaims this to be a Jesuit school, part of a worldwide and centuries-old system of education.

The school seal is our symbol and sign, and so is this yearbook, for both stand for the reality of Brooklyn Prep. The 1964 Blue Book will try to interpret the meaning of the seal through some of its parts. We hope to see in word and picture how the ideals expressed in our official emblem are made concrete in the everyday life and activity of Brooklyn Prep.

Mathematics

The mathematics department is under the capable direction of Father O'Connor and Mr. Quinn. The former's exceptional knowledge of mathematics and the latter's outstanding experience make them not only excellent heads but also the backbone of the department. They see to it that each student receives the proper mathematics course to complement his ability. Mr. Quinn instructs the advanced classes of sophomore and junior years in intermediate math. Father O'Connor teaches algebra to freshmen, geometry to advanced placement juniors, and fourth year math to honor students.

Prep also has four other mathematics teachers on its staff, each teaching a different category of mathematics and each an expert in his respective field. Mr. Doolan and Mr. Berreen share the freshman course. Mr. Doolan is a veteran at teaching algebra to the Prep freshmen, while Mr. Berreen is a competent newcomer to the staff. Mr. Lawrence is in charge of teaching geometry to second year, and Mr. Whitty teaches intermediate math to most of the juniors.

Three years ago the math department underwent a challenging change. A unique' mathematics system was set up for advance placement students. The student as a freshman takes elementary and intermediate algebra. In sophomore year he concludes intermediate math and delves into fourth year math in order to give the student a chance to finish all types of algebra without interruption by geometry. Geometry predominates in third year, while the fourth year student is taught calculus and matrix.

Social Studies

To meet the high scholastic competence demanded of college applicants, the social studies department expanded and improved the four year social studies course. Brooklyn Prep's social studies faculty believes that it is their duty to prepare their students for college experience, and, specifically, the manner in which social studies courses are delivered in the majority of colleges.

Under the presumption that history itself is a chain of cause and reaction which may be traced and analyzed, and not merely many single scattered events, Mr. Luongo, department chairman, has accented the idea of consciously exercising students' minds in the interpretation of historical events, rather than replacing thought with memory devices. Of course, the absolute necessity of knowledge of the facts is not overlooked, since it is only from facts that one can go on to analyze.

In recent years, the social studies outline and curriculum also have undergone some significant renovations. Only in the past year has the department instituted a new, more advanced course with the decision to teach a three-semester course of world history instead of the former two-semester program. A social studies orientation program with world geography is taught in the first semester of freshman year, while the new course runs from the second half of freshman year through all sophomore year. American history will fill the next three semesters. The second half of senior year will be given to an economics program which should prove to be much more satisfying than the freshman course of previous years. Prep students will thus experience a more complete and accurate knowledge of social studies.

In recent years the major goal of the modern language program has been to teach the student a conversational language as it is spoken by the native countrymen. Different methods have been tried with varying results. The Audio-Lingual method (ALM) used by the seniors has given way to the St. Cloud method in third year. In the French section a series of filmstrips and corresponding tape recordings has replaced the use of textbooks in the initial stages of learning. The new method, combining eye and ear repetition and imitation, gradually develops in the student the understanding behind communication in another language. Much more energetic activity—and patience—is demanded of both teacher and student.

A course based on the same principles has been introduced to the German students by Father Joyce. Here, however, the early and continued use of a textbook is also required. The success of this method was shown this year when the modern language teachers from the other Jesuit schools enthusiastically responded to an explanation of the method by Father Farrand and a demonstration by some of his students.

Other changes and improvements are also being planned. The sign of the darkened classroom will soon overtake all of sophomore year, enabling Prep students to study a modern language of three years. Ways to have smaller classes with more individual attention are being studied, as well as the possibilities of sending some students to France or Austria for a summer of language mastery. Finally, Spanish will soon be added to the department never satisfied with the minimum.

Science, in the modern sense of the word, suggests progress. This connotation aptly applies to the Science Department of Brooklyn Prep. With the innovation of the Physical Science Study Curriculum in the physics classes and the Chemistry Educational Curriculum in the chemistry section, the science department has taken on a new, progressive look.

The new physics course abandons such time-honored tasks as memorizing the mechanics of a steam engine. The time saved is devoted to experiments to teach students how to discover scientific truths on their own. The vitality of the course comes mainly from the use of the laboratory and lab methods as a true source of learning experience.

The students learn to investigate physical phenomena rather than just verify known conclusions, and most of the experiments are so presented and timed as to pave the way for studying the text.

The chemistry section of the science department has also been improved with the Chemistry Educational Material Course. In the new chemistry course, beginning students may be asked to observe a candle and write down as many observations about it as they can. Most students come up with 10 to 12, such as the candle's emission of light and heat and the melting of wax. Then their efforts are compared with a chemist's list of 53 items. The idea is to jolt the students into an appreciation of the amount of information that can come from painstaking observation. Formerly, the students were merely told that the candle has 53 different scientific observations. Now they will develop the habits of careful scientific observation.

Finding Greek in the curriculum of a Jesuit school should not be a surprise, for the Greek language displays all the educational values of Latin and some more of its own. It is a more mature and discriminating language than Latin. Its greater number of inflected forms allows Greek to express subtle nuances of thought and mood impossible in Latin. This fact, plus the richness of its vocabulary, demands and instills in the student a more highly developed sense of language. For this reason, training in Greek belongs to the level of distinction in the humanistic aims of Jesuit education.

Greek, of its very nature, is not for everyone. Freshmen who have shown superior ability, especially in language aptitude, are invited to participate in the Greek program the following year. Their introduction to the language of Homer, Plato, Sophocles, and Aristotle is given by Mr. Nebot, beginning with an intensive study of Attic Greek grammar and vocabulary. When they are ready, the Greek students read Xenophon's Anabasis. This reading continues into the first semester of junior year under the direction of Mr. Murphy, S.J. When Xenophon is completed. the students launch right into a whole new world, that of Homeric Greek with its own special word forms and vocabulary. After a brief look at the Iliad, the work of the last three semesters, reading Homer's other great epic, the Odyssey, begins. Fr. Oppido, S.J., is the fourth-year guide for this heroic adventure, which gives the Greek students a valid insight into the beginnings of Western civilization.

For all of us, our years at Prep have been surrounded by athletics. In P.T. class we have taken our basic steps towards physical fitness through the various tests required by the school. During first and second year the emphasis is placed on development of coordination, physical condition, and a knowledge of the fundamentals of sports. Third year concentrates on tests of endurance and stamina, while fourth year training consists of a good deal of running, the performance of the principal fitness tests, and the organization of advanced games and drills. As Mr. Duffy has said, "Our goal here at Brooklyn Prep is the development of the well-rounded individual. Consequently, by the time a student has reached his senior year, we expect him to become a well-rounded individual. Therefore, we allow individuals to lead a class. To form this well-rounded boy we stress attitude, posture, behavior, and conduct throughout the four years."

A major facility of the school as well as a major part of the athletic curriculum is the pool. Not only swimming as a sport, but also swimming as a talent has been increased. Before we had the pool, not more than 50% of the students were swimmers. However, at present over 90% can perform the water drills. Water polo games and instructions in the different strokes of swimming are the basic activities of the weekly swimming periods. Another facet of the pool's value was described thus by Mr. Beck, "More good swimmers are coming to Prep to become excellent athletes. The proximity of the practice site has made progress easier and individual development more complete." Prep athletes have derived much satisfaction as well as accomplishment from the athletic facilities in Prep's new wing.

Other Subjects

Traditionally, the Jesuits have tried to achieve their educational aims by developing in their schools a carefully-planned, well-rounded course of studies. Brooklyn Prep offers such a program. In addition to its regular curriculum of the classical and modern foreign languages, math and science, English, history, and religion, the school gives to all of its students the benefits of many useful minor subjects, subjects which are necessary to complete their education.

It is customary at Prep that the freshmen are given the greatest number of these minor subjects. All freshmen are required to take health. In the classes which they have twice a week, they are taught, either by Mr. Perry or Mr. Duffy, the main systems and functions of the body. They learn about the proper care which the body needs, the various diseases and ailments which a person can contract, and the cures and treatments of these diseases. They also discuss first aid and safety measures which may prove very helpful in later life.

In addition to health, the freshmen take a six-month course in Library Science. During the weekly periods, Mr. O'Neill tries to introduce the new students to the proper use of the library. He brings them into the library and teaches them to become familiar with the Dewey Decimal System, the card catalog, and the other facets of library science. For all students who are going to college this subject is very useful because it will aid them in research. If

we are familiar with the library and if we know how to use it, this research will become much easier.


All freshmen also meet Mr. McCarthy once a week for a class in Music Appreciation. This period can be amusing as Mr. McCarthy tries to explain to 35 puzzled faces what Beethoven is attempting to communicate in his Seventh Symphony or where to place the proper notes on the scale. The aim always is that the students may thus acquire a knowledge and taste for good music, and a greater enjoyment of it.

Speech, a subject which all Brooklyn Prep students take for at least three years, begins in freshman year. Mr. O'Connell employs such techniques as the taping and playback of students' voices. The aim of the speech course is to teach proper speech and to correct speech defects. Since in later life one's manner of speaking is very important, the training here can make the difference between success and failure.

Finally, all in second year study Art Appreciation. This subject, which Mr. Winans and Mr. Sullivan teach, is aimed at developing the student's appreciation and enjoyment of art. By showing films, filmstrips, and slides of famous works, the teachers have a basis for discussing the various techniques used by the great masters of painting, sculpture and architecture. Library research, drawing assignments, and field trips to museums and art galleries all help to get the student personally involved in this important part of their humanistic education.




A freshman learns the tools of reference work from Mr. O'Neill.





Ride

The traditional function of the Student Council is to provide a co-operative link between the administration and the student body. Thus, an ideal Council would operate in some middle ground between total student government and total administration control. This year's session of the Student Council seems to have struck a workable balance between these two

Perhaps the most notable of the Council's achievements was the securing of the boat ride. Kevin Lanigan handled all the details of the trip.

One of the Council's innovations this year has been providing shields for non-athletic activities. The purpose of these shields is to give to men on activities outside athletics the same recognition that athletes achieve through the varsity letter system.

At the first meeting of the Council this year, President Marty Cahill outlined a new plan of procedure which called for more scheduled meetings and a committee to investigate and carry out Council proposals. Two of the committees deserve special mention. The Dance Committee, under Vin Sheehan and Sal Ciccolella, arranged all Prep's dances and record hops. The committee proposed a new idea for Prep, the highly successful Junior Ring Dance. The Prom Committee, headed by Jack Rafferty, planned all the details of the Senior Prom. It was Jack's careful handling of this matter that insured the success of the Prom.

The most significant and far-reaching activities of the Council may be the consideration of serious proposals to change the structure of the Student Council itself. The plan envisions a much smaller group composed of different numbers from each year. If adopted, the new system would hopefully allow a more efficient handling of the complex business of student govern-

ment.

To sum up, a review of the Council's record for 1963-1964 reveals an impressive list of accomplishments and changes not limited merely to the social side of Prep, but one extending even to the basic format of the Council itself.

Excellent performances were given by the entire cast, especially the principal players: Hamlet, Nicholas Coti, '64; Claudius, Louis Marett, '64; Polonius, Michael Scimeca, '64; Ophelia, Frank Rykowski, '64; Laertes, Steven Whitson, '64; Gertrude, Frank Lamberta, '64; and Horatio, Lawrence Harrington, '64.

This year the Prep Dramatics Society was indeed fortunate to be allowed to use the excellent seating and acoustical facilities of the Monsignor Ross Auditorium of Bishop McDonnell Memorial High School. The generosity of the administration of Bishop McDonnell High School and the patience and hospitality of its students were greatly appreciated by the entire student body of the Prep.

This Spring the Brooklyn Prep Dramatics Society again competed in and won the annual Hofstra University Shakespeare Festival in which the Prep Players have won both the production and acting awards every year since the festival's inception in 1962—an example of the stature reached by the Brooklyn Prep Dramatics Society.






The past year was one of rebuilding for the Debating Society. The usual long list of victories in major tournaments was missing, yet the season was not without its bright spots and genuine accomplishments.



In their first issue the editors of the Blue Jug set down the goals of Prep's newspaper for 1964: "We want to make the Blue Jug a student newspaper for the student. By doing so, we wish to advance, ultimately, an atmosphere of comradeship and pride of belonging to that intangible something called school spirit—which makes Brooklyn Prep far more, and much better, than just a school . . ." In implementing these goals, the editors made many changes in the style, format, and content of the Blue Jug. The first and most striking of these changes appeared when the first issue came out sporting a new and distinctive banner. The "Men of the Month" column appeared in the second issue to supplement the traditional "Spotlight."

At the first staff meeting of the year, Editor-in-Chief Marty Cahill outlined the basic stylistic changes for all staff writers. He emphasized the need for light, readable




Poetry Editor John Stevenson outlines his literary plans to staff members George Lindsay, Lou Garavento, and Johnny Bertolini.







'63 Eagles

After a poor '62 season (2 wins, 6 losses), people wondered if Prep could make that long, hard leap back to the stature of a winning team in just one year. The Eagles answered that question in their first game of the season by sending a speedy St. Agnes team to a 19-6 defeat. The defensive line was especially effective, causing the Stag quarterback to hurry his passes, one of which was intercepted by defensive halfback Joe Pulito. He spotted the goal line 60 yards away and didn't stop until he had sprinted across untouched. A long drive downfield, highlighted by the jarring running of fullback Bob Schiebel, was climaxed when Brian Curtis dashed through a gaping hole made by the left side of the line for a T.D. from 12 yards out. Then St. Agnes was practically handed a touchdown when one of Prep's defensive safety men interfered with a Stag receiver on the Eagles' one-yard line, and St. Agnes took the ball that last yard themselves to make the score read 12-6 in Prep's favor. Later, the Eagles scored again when they gave fullback Bob Schiebel the perfect combination—a football and a hole to run through—and, true to form, he streaked down the last 15 yards for the score. Halfbacks Tim Fenlon and Dave Shanks both excelled, averaging over

6 yards per carry during the game. Above all, the only possible word for the play of the Eagle linemen was "tremendous."

Prep then met Don Bosco High School in Ramsey, New Jersey. After Terry Wolfe carried the ball over for a quick six points for the opposition, Bob Schiebel returned to climax a drive by diving over from the oneyard line. Don Bosco tallied again and the half-time score was 12-7. Early in the second half, Brooklyn drove down to the Bosco 28-yard line after nice runs by Curtis and Shanks, but then bogged down and had to relinquish the ball. After quickly recovering a Bosco fumble, Prep slumped again and the Jersey team took over, scoring quickly on a 60-yard pass-play. Don Bosco's quarterback Kosma later passed for another T.D. Then Prep put together a 30-yard run by Shanks and a 47-yard Kelley-to-Fenlon pass for the score. Prep recovered a Bosco fumble and Kelley threw again, this time to Curtis, and Prep was moving again, but unfortunately, so was the clock. The final score found Don Bosco in command of a 25-14 lead. Among the outstanding players for Prep were tackle Tony Manz, who recovered a fumble, and quarterback Ray Siwiec, who gained 90 yards by passing and running.

Eager to return to the winning column, Prep then joined battle with New Dorp High School, a well-established football power from Staten Island. After a hard-fought, well-played first half, the Prep led by a 7-6 score. New Dorp bounced back in the second half, showing the slower Eagles their heels. Just as in the Don Bosco game, Prep was hurt by poor pass-defense, as the normally ground-minded Centrals took to the air. When the game ended, New Dorp led their disappointed rivals, 19-7.

Sporting a soggy 1-2 record, Prep was picked to be massacred by an undefeated Fordham team. The Eagles knew two things: that this was their first C.F.C. game and that the injured Bob Schiebel would miss the game. Prep beat Fordham, 18-6. Junior Joe Pulito, substituting at fullback, scored two touchdowns for Prep and won the trophy for being the game's outstanding player. Prep's other touchdown was scored by Tom Hession, who drove across from three yards out after Tim Fenlon's spectacular catch of a 40-yard pass from Siwiec. Prep defense was especially strong, led by Tom Harmon, Jeff Lynch, Tony Crimi, and Tony Manz. The better part of the Eagles' yardage came via the air, with Siwiec and Kelley passing successfully eight times to combined forces of Mike Heaney, Timmy Fenlon, Jack McGowan, and Bob Fedoryszyn. Tom Hession, also a quick-handed defensive halfback, stopped the little Rams in their tracks twice with his key interceptions.

The next game saw the now confident Eagle team facing a speedy Seton Hall team. Seton Hall promptly scored to lead the surprised but unshaken Prep team. Then the Prep offense started to move and the situa-


tion was completely reversed. Ray Siwiec ran and threw for 96 yards, and had a 50-yard T.D. on an interception called back due to a penalty. End Charlie Scheer added 50 yards of his own by grabbing two Eagle passes. Tim Fenlon climaxed a drive highlighted by his own 30-yard scamper. Schiebel scored early in the second half by gaining 22 of his 79 yards on one play, right up the middle and into paydirt for the T.D. The hard blocking, "gang" tackling Eagle line, after completely subduing the opposition, opened up a gaping hole for Curtis as he scored from the 8-yard line for the final T.D., making it Prep 22, Seton Hall 6.

The next game was against Xavier at Randalls Island, and the Eagles, led by the passing of Bob Kelley and the running of the game's most valuable player, Bob Schiebel, went on to a resounding victory. The line play, led by such formidable players as Rich Mount, Neil Corry, Jeff Lynch, Tony Manz, Jack McGowan, Charlie Scheer, and Tom Harmon, was superb. Schiebel kept the game hopping with 165 yards gained, and halfback Tim Fenlon was unstoppable as he ran for 53 yards and caught passes for another 110 yards. Tackle Tom Harmon surprised everyone by hauling in two aerials for substantial gains, and the final gun sounded with Tom Hession holding the pigskin in the Xavier end-zone after catching a crossover pass from Kelley, making the final score: Prep 24, Xavier 0.

The traditional contest between the Eagles of Brooklyn Prep and the Redmen of St. John's Prep proved to be very well-fought to the very last seconds. Early in the game, St. John's picked off an Eagle aerial and then drove 25 yards for the touchdown. After sophomore Pete McCall ran back the following kickoff






Strong






Charlie Kasper displays all-star form as he throws a luckless McQuaid defender off balance.




Paul Walsh hustles for the ball against McQuaid.







Frosh Rebound



Harriers Win CHSAA






Two Mile Relay


Sets National Record








With Mike Voldstad bringing in the baton, Walt O'Brien gets ready to increase Prep's lead against Xaverian in a winter's outdoor meet.




Junior Rich Loehfelm runs in the 440, out-distancing all other teams in the race.

Dennis Drake and Bob Burke await the gun at the start of the 400-yd. freestyle.



Varsity Wins City Crown

A young Brooklyn Prep varsity swimming squad, after being defeated in its first meet this season, rebounded to fight its way to three championships at the season's close. For a team having just four seniors, Prep did remarkably well, receiving strong support from swimmers of all four years.


In the first dual meet of the season the Eagle mermen bowed to Loughlin by a single point which could have gone just as easily for the luckless Prep team. With spirit characteristic of a championship team, the Brooklyn Prep swimmers came back to annihilate Holy Cross and Trinity in their next two encounters. Prep then met and defeated its only public school opponent, the strong squad from Madison High School. After routing the inexperienced Nazareth swimmers, the Eagles came to their final dual meet of the regular season with St. Francis. Despite a tremendous Eagle effort, the meet ended with St. Francis three points ahead. With the regular season over, Prep met its previous victorious opponents from Loughlin for second place in the Brooklyn-Queens division. Prep glided by Loughlin and put themselves into contention for the Catholic High Schools Dual Meet Championship. In the swim-offs for the title, Prep found itself matched against a speedy team of Rice from Manhattan. The Eagles took this close one with a tremendous performance by nearly every swimmer. The final meet for the championship saw the Eagles and the Terriers of St. Francis competing once again, only this time the story was somewhat different. The Eagles took six of the ten first places and ran the score up to 21-4 in the opening moments of the contest after the 200 yard medley relay team of Carney, Treadway, Stone and Bell finished first with a fine time of 1:54.2; as did Bob Burke and Rich McAteer with very quick times in the 200 yard freestyle and the 50 yard

freestyle respectively. McAteer repeated in the 100 free as did Burke in the 400 free. John Doherty looked very strong as he outchurned the opposition in the 100 yard backstroke. The meet ended with Prep the Catholic Dual Meet champs by a score of 54-41.

The next post-season contest was the CHSAA Senior Individual Championships held at the quick and record producing Prep pool. The Eagles really put on a display, led by their sophomore wonder Bob Burke whose 1:57.0 clocking bettered the 200 free record by 2 seconds, and whose 4:09.6 time in the 400 free smashed the standing record by an incredible 7.4 seconds. The medley relay team of Steve Treadway, Charlie Stone, and co-captains Doherty and McAteer came across in 1:51.6, cracking the old mark by .9 of a second. Doherty's trial time of 1:02.1 was .5 second better than the 100 backstroke record. Prep's total was 47.5 points, enough to add the CHSAA Individual Championship to their laurels.

In the final meet of the season, the Association of Private Schools Championship, Prep once more placed second to none. Prep finished with 49 points, 4 better than second place McBurney. Thus a team great for its talent and spirit finished a truly fabulous season.

The team owed much of its success to the fine leader-ship and experience of Coach Doolan. It relied on men like Dennis Drake who showed great improvement as a result of exemplary effort. The Squad could not have gone so far without the constantly excellent diving of frosh Ed Mallen, and the swimming of his classmates Ed Jones and Rich Bell. Outstanding sophomores must include Bob Sharkey, Tom Beck, and Bob Burns, and the junior contingent of Charlie Stone, Denny Drake, Steve Treadway, Jim Carey and Tom Sherry was consistently successful.

Thus the swimming at Prep in '64 produced City champs on both the freshman and varsity levels. This fact alone is tribute to the great Prep swimmers of '64.










The early season hitting honors belonged chiefly to Tim Fenlon. When not shagging flies in the field,

looked strong at the plate.






petitors.



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
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In Memoriam



JOSEPH LOUGHLIN, III

For ten weeks Jay Loughlin had been suffering intense pain. Those who saw him know that he never questioned why he had to suffer, but that he accepted and offered it to God as part of Christ's passion. During all this time one thought especially bothered Jay, the thought that, if he did not get well soon, he might have to drop out of the class he had been with since the beginning of freshman year. During these weeks his classmates in 2G had been studying the new religion course. The climax of that course, they found, was to be the events of the Church's Easter Vigil, when the liturgy recalls the victory of the crucified Christ over death. That night the Paschal Candle would be lit, symbolizing Christ, the Light of the World, overcoming the powers of darkness.

The day when these events were to happen had just begun when Jay was called by Christ to share in His victory. We regret the departure of our friend and fellow student, but we also rejoice, knowing that he now has the everlasting joy of Easter.

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
