





# Blue Book's Man of the Year Mr. William Duffy

The senior class of 1965 now hopes to honor Mr. Duffy by dedicating this *BLUE BOOK* to him.














### Sing to Us, O Muse, of Man...





Also the juniors became aware of another side to the Catilinarian controversy: they read Sallust's life of Cicero's foe, and started afresh to understand Catiline, hero or despot.



## "There Is No Frigate Like a Book, To Take Us Lands Away..."










Prep students are reading more and more literature these days. Why? The carefully planned novel program for each year, semesters and summers, may be responsible. Or perhaps it's the beginner's program of poetry and fiction newly introduced into the first semester of sophomore year, before the student enters into a more historical approach to American and English literature. Or perhaps it's the Advanced Placement Program, which, year by year, runs more smoothly.

Or perhaps it's the teaching. Chaired by Mr. Charles Winans, the English Department has this year continued to question its teaching methods for both literature and composition. No English teacher will sound the same as another, but through the interchange of methods at English meetings, through the continuing suggestion of new methods, such as the team teaching endeavor in fourth year, it is the hope of all to raise the general level of reading and composition.



To Explore, To Measure, To Know the World Around Us...



With the advent of freshman Biology into the curriculum our Science Department has come upon the brink of its professed goal—a smooth-flowing four-year science program. P.S.S.C. physics is in its second year of glory, and all the omens seem favorable for the future extension and coordination of science courses at Brooklyn Prep.

This year the Math Department also has reason to pride itself in the fulfillment of a four-year advanced placement course which includes more than a year's intense study of integral and differential calculus.





### French Revolution, 1965

No more paradigms, no more French taught as Latin. Tapes and slides are the basics of Modern Language at Brooklyn Prep. Following the St. Cloud method, Father Farrand, chairman of the Modern Language Department, leads his students down the path of knowledge through picture and sound, of mastery through creative assimilation.

versatility of the forward-looking department.

French and German are already three-year courses at Prep. Future aims of Father Farrand are a Spanish course (already slated for September, 1965), and finally, a fourth year of Modern Language, giving every Prep student linguistic insurance for a spree in Paris, Bonn, or Madrid.

### Senior History Seminars Cope with the Changing World


Mr. Francis Luongo, chairman of the Social Studies Department at Prep, has this year challenged the interested senior by presenting him with a choice of second semester seminars in Theory of Communism or American Constitutional Problems.

These seminars crown the now perfected four-year Social Studies curriculum. Freshmen begin with one semester of World Geography, with a concentration on contemporary Asian and African developments. There follow three semesters of World History, lasting through sophomore year. Juniors further the program with three semesters of American History, after which the second-term senior, firmly versed in the story of his world, may choose a seminar.

To keep the Prep student alive to his past, by itself and as part of an ever-changing present—thus the role of the History teacher at Brooklyn Prep.








#### WHAT IS A TEACHER?


#### REVEREND JAMES B. McNAMARA, S.J.


The class of 1965 offers its condolences and prayers to Father McNamara's mother, and to his two brothers, both Jesuits.



The school year 1964-1965 was marked by considerable controversy over the effectiveness of Prep's traditional form of Student Government. Large meetings of the class presidents and the top echelon of the Council often ended contentiously when highly debatable issues were brought to the floor. It also became obvious that few people were actually involved in the Student Government. The structure of the Council needed to be changed to direct its business more efficiently, and at the same time, to increase the involvement of the student body.

After a careful study of other successful High School Student Councils by Father Kelly and the aspiring student leaders of the Prep, a model similar to that of the United States Government was adopted. It consists of the traditional body of class presidents and the President of the Student Council under a new name, the House of Delegates; and another smaller body called the Student Senate, whose membership encompasses the four officers of the Student Council, two additional senior members, the officers of Sophomore and Junior year, and an alternating Freshman Class president. The Student Senate was created primarily to function as a small, efficient body in which the committees and the major problems facing the Student Government could be handled.

Anticipating the amount of work required to initiate such an ambitious plan, the present four senior officers began their work in the first few days of July. Then, as well as throughout the rest of the summer, it was decided that Steve Treadway would handle the Freshmen Orientation, Freshman Night, Sophomore Night, and the Election Committees; Ed Frey would direct the tremendous amount of work involved in Dance and Prom Committees, Bill Mattison would head the Rallies and Assemblies Committee, while Greg Milmoe would oversee all of these activities and arrange the boat ride in addition to managing all the Student Council Meetings.

Operating under the new structure with weekly meetings of the Student Senate, and bi-monthly meetings of the House of Delegates, the council brought about some remarkable renovations: a change in the cafeteria food service, exemptions for seniors, membership in the National Honor Society, and the renewal of the annual boat ride. In retrospect, it appears that the election of the individual year officers, as well as the revamping of the system itself, has helped to solidify the spirit of each year and has aided them in organizing and directing their own affairs. H a n u

This year a new activity came to the Prep, one vitally involved with the social problems of today's world. The activity was the Higher Achievement Program, a follow up of a summer tutoring program for Negro and Puerto Rican boys of other schools.

Last summer, pilot centers for this new program were set up in four high schools by the Jesuit Interracial Council of New York. Twenty-six grammar and high school students came to Brooklyn Prep five days a week for six weeks. It was stressed that an important part of the program was the contact with the student tutors, so ten Brooklyn Prep students aided the five Jesuits actively participating in the program. Recreation periods and weekly excursions afforded time whereby mutual understanding and friendship could develop.

When the six week program was ended and the fall semester began at Prep, the same boys came on Saturday mornings, had classes, and were tutored by twenty Prep students for the Co-operative and College Board Entrance Examinations.


Since then, Father Francis McNamara, S.J., director of the program, has developed and broadened it. Six Prepmen taught at St. Peter Claver Grammar School in the Bedford Stuyvesant area on Thursday afternoons and, at the same time some one hundred Negro and Puerto Rican boys came to Prep on Wednesday and Thursday afternoons. The students were tutored in English, mathematics and in general in whatever fields they needed help.

When Father McNamara issued the call for tutors for this program, he received an encouraging response of over 150 volunteers from the Sophomore, Junior and Senior classes. This response demonstrated the general willingness of all Prepmen to participate in a social apostolate for the good of the community. Thus, this new activity which is so beneficial to all participants and so progressive in furthering the cause of real democracy has become one of the biggest activities in the school.


Barritt and typists Tom Gibbons and John Carberry.



The high school newspaper is, in a sense, the most limited publication on the high school level. The strict news-editorials-sports form held the Blue Jug in mediocrity for a good many years. The limitation of news to school activities and social functions made the Blue Jug more of a record book than a newspaper before 1963.

This past year the Blue Jug once more made a radical formal change, its second in the past two years. The scope of reporting was advanced beyond the boring level of factual recording of school activities and covered the rapid and pertinent changes taking place in Crown Heights and the nation.




# Blue Jug Enters Second Year of Change







This year the junior and senior Sodalities were combined under one moderator, Father Guth, S.J. Under his guidance the Sodalists undertook a tutoring program in addition to their traditional canned food drive for needy families.



### Want Action

When the Jesuit Sodalities of Our Lady were first established each meeting would find the moderator giving spiritual instruction to the sodalists for the purpose of their own sanctification and for the sanctification of others. But today's sodalists are not attracted by this aspect of the Sodality. The sodalists at the Prep this year wanted to give visible help to others. Although their help was limited by their ages and their funds, the sodalists made this their main aim this year.

Divisions of the Sodality included the Sophomore Sodality under the direction of Mr. Denny, S.J. and a union of the Third and Fourth Year Sodalities under the coguidance of Fr. Musselman, S.J. and Fr. Guth, S.J. This combination was made in order to form a stronger group from two relatively smaller ones. Edward Madara was elected prefect.

The sodalists then began giving their material aid. Since charity begins in the home, they dedicated their help to their fellow students first. One of the services the sodalists performed was their tutoring of Freshmen who needed help in certain subjects.

Interested in the racial problem, the sodalists visited a home in the Bedford-Stuyvesant section of Brooklyn at Christmas time. Asked by that mother, living alone with her seven children, for some presents for her children, the sodalists collected about \$50.00 and used it to buy a Christmas tree and gifts for that destitute family. When Father McNamara, S.J. announced that a plan also involving the racial question, which was introduced into many other schools, would also be introduced at Prep, the Sodality immediately offered to help. This plan will include the tutoring of about 100 Negro boys in Catholic High Schools.

Therefore it is evident that the influence of the Sodality on the students at Prep will continue to diminish unless a new plan of action is initiated that will draw more students to the Sodality. Only in this way can the Sodality become as strong in number and spirit as it was twenty years ago when it was the most powerful activity in the school.

Under the direction of Mr. James Donnelly, S.J., the orators of Brooklyn Prep this year participated in all four divisions of the field, extempore, original, oratorical interpretation, and dramatic interpretation. The rewards of the program, though not startling, were significant. Tom Demarest qualified for the national finals in extempore, after placing second in the Brooklyn Diocesan Championships held at Xaverian on March 27th; Joe Troisi and Tom Hakala qualified as representatives from the Brooklyn District to the State finals in Albany. In original oratory Ed Madara placed second in the CWV Brooklyn Contest. In oratorical interpretation Dan Hanson

came in first at the J.V. Contest held at St. Agnes, College Point in October.

The oratory team is rich in sophomore and freshman talent, and so looks forward to the future. Three freshmen in oratorical interpretation, Derenoncourt, Ralph Troisi, and Jones placed second at the McClancy tournament. Other underclassmen with promise are Abularrage, Mazloom, Dealy, and Kramer.

The oratory and debate season is long; so are the hours of preparation and of travel to the tournaments. The trophies pictured on the next pages symbolize this effort and the attainment of the effort. The Debating Society, under the guidance of Mr. Robert Fleischacker, brought home to Prep a winning season. This organization which was founded in 1921 is composed of over ten thousand high school chapters spread throughout the country. The chapter here at Prep is named in honor of John Carroll and is under the direction of Father William McCusker, S.J.

The National Honor Society is devoted to the recognition and the encouragement of the four qualities education strives to develop: Character, Scholarship, Leadership, and Service. These qualities are found in every member of the Society and it is the duty of each member, not only to maintain these ideals, but also to

promote them as best he can throughout the student body. The members of each chapter, qualified Juniors and Seniors, devote themselves to the administration of a variety of worthwhile projects ranging from freshman orientation programs to volunteer work in hospitals. Here at Prep we will undoubtedly see an increase in such activities come September, as the John Carroll Chapter enters its first full year.

No honor or responsibility excels that represented by the National Honor Society since it represents the fundamental objectives for which schools are instituted. Other honors are only partial in the sense that they recognize some specialized ability, skill, or talent, but this Society looks upon education as a total product measured by the four dimensions of life.



In 1965 dynamic reforms have been developed in every aspect of Prep life. Improvements in curriculum, changes in administration policy, and remodelling of the student government are perhaps the most striking features of the new Prep. In the wake of this new order, a once unnoticed activity has been revitalized under the leadership and guidance of a true genius. The activity—"The Brooklyn Prep Concert Band"; the genius—Mr. Robert McCarthy, S.J.

Progress has been the keynote of the Prep musician: no longer is he concerned with perennial football marches or redundant Rodgers and Hammerstein. Instead he places emphasis on originality, drawing fresh ideas from Bach to modern jazz. Only recently has he realized that the Band is not only a source of personal enjoyment, but also an outlet for cultural and artistic creativity. This new concept of what a musician should be has been emphasized by Mr. McCarthy and supported by Messers Roberts and Dini. The words of soloist Frank Sirianni sum up the attitude Mr. McCarthy has fostered in the Prep

Band: "Mr. McCarthy's love of music and unrelenting enthusiasm for the Band have enkindled in us all the dedication necessary to create, what I believe to be, the best band Prep has yet to produce."

One of the most salient features of the Band is its diverse instrumentation. The addition of such instruments as alto, bass, and E-flat clarinets, a soprano saxophone, oboe, bassoon, flute, and string bass has broadened the potentiality of "the Concert Band". In addition, a highly successful dance band, under the guidance of Mr. McCarthy, has sprung forth from the Band regulars.

As evidence of these and other successes, one needs only to examine the busy schedule of our musicians. Because of its impressive performance, in concert, last season at the World's Fair, the Prep Band has been booked for a return engagement in May. As we went to press, Mr. McCarthy and his musicians were putting the finishing touches on what will prove to be one of the highlights of Prep's social calendar—"The Annual Band Concert."

assemblies have added a bright, new flair to the musical side of Prep. Besides their appearances before the student body, the hard working troupe has traveled to hospitals spreading cheer among


the sick of mind and body.





The student body greatly appreciates the efforts of the Dance Committee to bolster social life at Prep, and is looking forward to next year.










#### IS IT ALWAYS A FIRST DOWN?

In the next game Don Bosco overpowered the Prep team by the score of 33-13. However, these two games featured some outstanding players: Mike O'Hara, Joe Russo, Mike Voldstad and Joe Atanasio. Both Voldstad and Atanasio highlighted the Don Bosco game with touchdown runs of 80 and 65 yards respectively.

The Eagles then took on the Cadets of Xavier in the first Catholic Football Conference game of the season. They were again outclassed as the Cadets scored their first points in winning the game 33-0. 


A tense Eagle bench looks on as their teammates clash with St. John's.








Dick Cummings scampers around end for a large gain from Fordham.




Dick Cummings gets set to throw the bomb.

# Frosh Shatter Poly in Last Game






High scorer Ed Petrazzolo adds two more points to put Prep in front.






Gerry McDermott drives through the opposition for an easy two points.







Gary Uhl, a strong, consistent player throughout the season, looks for a deuce.




Pete McGrath, under pressure, pops one from in close.






Gene Carty, next year's Co-Captain with Pete McGrath, banks one in under the boards.


## Jay Vee Almost to the Playoffs





## Prep Runners Strongest in Recent School History











Denis Drake and Dave Sheehan get off to a good start for a gruelling 200 yard race.


On December 12 of last year the Tankmen journeyed to the Blue Knight Relays at St. Mary's in Connecticut and placed third in a strong field of seven schools. The regular season began with a dual meet against Holy Cross in which the Eagles rolled to an easy win: 78-17. Prep then faced a young Bishop Reilly team and again Coach Doolan's swimmers stroked to victory, winning 76-12. 

Captain Charlie Stone, All-American Candidate, waits the gun to start another important race.






In the Catholic Nationals at Villanova, Prep, with 85 points, placed ninth out of forty-one competing schools. The stars of the meet were Burke, Lee, Stone and Beck, who placed fifth

In defeating Rice and St. Francis, the Eagle Swimmers captured the Catholic Dual Meet Championship. Individual winners in these victories included Tom Beck, Walter Lee, Jim Carey, Rich Bell and Frank Jones.

The final test for the Eagles came in the CHSAA Individuals. 
















