



1966-1967 at Prep was a HAPPENING.
















## Dedication






Reverend Arthur G. Kehoe, S. J. Rector and President



To involve the total community of Brooklyn Prep. Thus the theme of Father Arthur Kehoe's first year as Rector and President of Brooklyn Preparatory. Replacing Father John J. Morrisson in August 1966, Father Kehoe comes to his position professionally trained. As Father Minister of St. Peter's College since 1963, he cared for the financial and personal needs of that community. As a professor of Chemistry at St. Peter's, and before that Canisius and Boston College, he has been at the heart of academic life. In addition, Father Kehoe, a native of Bay Ridge, is himself a Brooklyn Prep graduate, most familiar therefore with the problems that face a Brooklyn Prep School in an age of change. His first advance on these problems has been to call for a "total community," a union of all those interested in the life and discipline at Prep, in order to preserve and better that life.




Reverend Donald V. O'Brien, S.J. Vice-President and Minister


This year Father Donald O'Brien finishes his second year as Vice President of Brooklyn Prep and Minister to the Jesuit Community. As Vice President, he serves on the Board of Trustees, participating in the decisions which make the school. As Minister, he holds himself responsible for the physical plant of both school and residence, and for the health, food, transportation, finances, and personal needs of the community. Father O'Brien himself has personal experience in high school work, having served as Prefect of Discipline at Loyola School. Immediately previous to his arrival at Prep, he worked at Manresa House of Retreats on Staten Island.

#### REVEREND FRANCIS J. HAMILL, S.J. Assistant Headmaster and Prefect of Discipline

Perhaps one of the most uninviting, but absolutely necessary jobs in any Jesuit school is the position of Prefect of Discipline. The Prefect is the one who is responsible for keeping discipline and daily order in a Jesuit school. It is simple enough to say, "He keeps order," but we often do not realize that, with close to 1000 students to keep in check, the job is by no means easy. This year, Brooklyn Prep had a new Prefect of Discipline. Father Francis Hamill, S.J., came from Gonzaga Retreat House to succeed Father Stephen Meany, S.J. Besides being Prefect and, thus, commander of "Jug," that ancient Jesuit punitive institution where one practices his penmanship for a while, Father is also the Assistant Headmaster of Brooklyn Prep. He is the one to whom the burdensome responsibilities of running the school fall during the headmaster's absence. It would seem that to fill these two positions, one would have to be omnipresent. Father Hamill is, and without him this institution would fall far from its academic goals.

Father William McCusker, S.J., is one of the most respected men around Prep, and rightfully so. As head of the Guidance Department for the last three years, he daily dedicated himself to the students of Brooklyn Prep, tending to their spiritual, material, and emotional well-being. He spends countless hours advising the seniors in the important matter of college choice and in all matters pertaining to college examinations. He handles the retreats for the juniors and seniors and is always available in his office for consultation by anyone who seeks it. Father McCusker, even though he is burdened with so much other work, has felt compelled to do something for the first time at Prep which has never before been attempted. Because of the importance of the adolescent problems Father McCusker thought it necessary to conduct night time "Jogues discussions" with the Brooklyn Prep parents, in an attempt to understand our problems. Besides this, he directs the days of recollection, helps moderate the Christian Action Corps, and presides over the National Honor Society. Truly, Father McCusker, S.J., is an essential member of the Brooklyn Prep administration.





REVEREND FREDERICK W. ENGEL, S.J. Director of Alumni




### "See the Lady": Mrs. McPhillips Finishes 20th Year.







Fr. John Farrand, S.J., said head of the Modern Language maquis at Prep, offers the hand that turns the Department on. He teaches junior and senior French.



# September 1963. No more staying in the neighborhood, no more nuns (sometimes we wished them back), no more free afternoons, no more "boys." "Men of Brooklyn Prep," they called us. We would have four long years to grow into that. Our first trial as new-born men came in trying to understand the deaths of three who were close to us: Jay Loughlin, an upperclassman, Father Ricardo Fernandez, S.J., the Director of Development at Prep, and John F. Kennedy, who like us was just starting out. We tasted mortality for the first time.



But day by day we also tasted discipline and unity in our freshman year. The list grew as the season changed and the Freshman Swimming Team had a 7-0 record: Frank Jones, Richie Bell, John Needham, and diver Ed Mallen swam to take the CHSAA championship, extending the

BP Frosh winning streak to twenty-two meets. Richie Bell was the first to make the world outside of Prep take notice. With a 31.9 he shaved three-tenths of a second off the city record for fifty yard backstroke. On the basketball court, Father O'Connor's Eaglets also proved the year: Frank Wolfer, Fran DePeter, Ed Gaffney, and the rest led us to a 10-5 record.

Audiences large and small saw and heard other freshmen make the grade. Ed DaParma and Frank Murphy in Debate and Oratory hinted at future trophies. Freshmen filled out the Prep Band when it played in May at the World's Fair. The belles of the Spring Musical, Pirates of Penzance, Bob Weigl, Mike Carlucci, and Vic Kahwaty, played the daughters of Major-General Stanley; and among the court retainers and footmen of the Winter Play, Hamlet, could be found a few of the nascent Oliviers of our group. Eager to gain points in English, the frosh also sat on the other side of the lights.

Freshman Sodality began with a large turnout, only to falter as the weather got warmer again and we turned towards summer. Had we furthered the tradition? Were we Prep men? Yes, we said. But we knew there were three long years to go.









# Men of Brooklyn Prep

When school began in sophomore year, the Class of '67 had a new regret. No more surfing. But skateboards were some consolation as we realized the accessibility of the cafeteria corridor. Then wipe out! The new Prefect, Father Stephen Meany, S.J., with a new system of demerits, moved in. Even jug had been revised, though this could not mar Father Meany's popularity.

Busy with Caesar, a Modern Language, and Greek or Physical Science, we still found time to elect our first year-wide officers: Tom Murphy as President, Ed Viola as Vice President, and Ed Mallen as Secretary. Sometimes we felt they hadn't much to lead. Marks were low and so were the scores of our teams. Stripped of its stars, who moved up to crutch the limping Varsity, JV Football had a 2-4 record. Also in the spring, sophomore Frank Wolfer was a starting pitcher on the Varsity, while Ernie Vaughn, Bill Kelly, and Gerry Jones led a successful JV.



Perhaps most importantly of all, in the spring the Higher Achievement Program drew scores of sophomores as tutors in its program for the underprivileged. As we gave of time and talent in charity, Prepmen we were becoming.





In Senior year, a student is barraged with a series of aptitude and achievement tests. Whether these are just a method of determining superior students or not is debatable, but they do decide, to a certain extent, the college placement of most high school graduates. The test cycle really began in spring of Junior year when this year's seniors took the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test. The next major test was the rigorous New York State Regents Scholarship Exam (pictured below) given in October. Over 70 seniors received alternate or Regents scholarships. Next and most important were the College Boards in December, and, after that, the January Achievement Tests. In these, as in all their examinations, the Class of '67 proved a credit to the Prep.

Junior year was one long happening. The opposite sex signing up for *scientia*, *sanitas*, and *sanctitas* as cheerleaders for football games and actresses in *Richard II*. A power failure, which turned Prep into a one-night boarding school, leaving forty students sleeping in the gym and rising at five to play basketball. An extended Christmas recess as mayor and union conspired to stall subways and school until mid-January. An ankle injury to the hitherto impregnable Mr. Duffy, as physical fitness hit an all time low and the chlorine bill went up in the pool. The victory over St. John's, the only one that the class of '67 would see in its four year stay.

For this victory juniors Tom Corridan, Tom Sweeney, Bob Berger, Pat Griffin, and Charlie Balistreri had worked hard, all the way from the new, early September Football Camp in East Hampton. Working just as hard, other junior athletes led other teams to win. The Prep saw the best Cross-Country team in its history break every record and win the Brooklyn-Queens-Long Island Championship with the lead of Mark Longo, Jay Robinson, and Tom Murphy. The fantastic mermen, Ed Mallen, Frank Jones, John Needham, Richie Bell, and Rod McGrath continued to spark the Varsity to wins in Dual and League Meets, taking a first in the Private Schools Division. Outside, once the weather changed, the unheralded

Tennis Team also put Prep in the papers, led by juniors Joe McCabe, John Rush, Tom Delaney, Frank Frayer, and Dennis Dugen.

The Brooklyn Prep Magazine was re-christened this year. Andros, the new publication, published Dylanesque lyrics and somber short stories in its new format. Helping to publish, but with ideas of their own, juniors Bill Carter, Mike Schum, and Frank McGrath waited to take over for the last issue. More of the new look and re-christening infected the Sodality, newlynamed the Christian Action Core. Juniors joined in social and ecumenical work, finding time in a weekend for tutoring in Bedford-Stuyvesant, services at Union Temple, and Sunday Mass at the NYU Chapel. The class of '67 was making the scene off Carroll Street.

A Junior Ring Dance and Student Council Elections made final the three years of waiting. The class of '67 had its symbol, the ring, and its power, four officers who promised much in their May speeches to the underclassmen. Some of the promises had been made the year vefore, but readiness was all now. The last event of junior year before exams seemed symbolic: though it rained all the way up on the boatride, the sun suddenly shone as we stepped off the pier at Rye Beach. A good omen for the class of '67, soon to lead.

News we had in September in the shape of a ten minute homeroom. After some shapelessness, it turned into a time for TV. The new BP-ETV broadcasted daily news of the country, world, and Prep itself. In athletics, a year of ups and downs. In Varsity Football a 3-4 record, not much of a yearbook headline, but hiding some high points all will remember, like Dick Cummings' seventy yard run against Fordham, like a victory over undefeated Seton Hall, like the spirit before the St. John's game, to which two hundred students marched, singing the new Fight Song.

Varsity Basketball, though just missing the play-offs played a double revenge against St. John's with Staff Hilaire and rookie Charlie Hegarty leading the way. We saw a stunning 67-47 victory over St. Francis Prep, undefeated until the game, and two victories in the Christmas Jesuit Tournament. In Track, Mark Longo continued to break records, but the team strength was spotty enough to miss the Triple Crown mark of last year. And in Varsity Swimming Prep took St. Francis first, then lost to them in the always heated rivalry. Except for this, Ed Mallen, Frank Jones, John Needham, Richie Bell, and Bob Corno led the team to victories over every other school during the season dual meets.

And so we learned that to be a Prep man was not only to be on top but also to understand that the effort and the becoming was also a trophy. What had happened in four long years? A lot of learning. A lot of friends. A lot of talking, growing, tests, football games, Blue Jugs, and record hops. A lot of the IRT and Nostrand Bus and Long Island Railroad. A lot of travelling in many ways. "Men of Brooklyn Prep," they had called us. Yes, we said. We were that. It had taken four short years.














UNDERCLASS happenings happen in crowds with spirit. Not yet the solo performance.







# Freshman Happening: Freshman Day



## The Sophomore Happening: His First Elections



As a sophomore, however, the student is much more influential. His opinion is transmitted both through his class president and sophomore senators. Early each fall, individual classes elect their class officers. Presidents, Vice Presidents, Secretaries, and Athletic Managers are chosen on separate ballots by a majority vote. Whereas the latter three are concerned primarily with class matters, each president represents his class in a division of the student council known as the House of Delegates. Another far more powerful division of student government is the Senate. This consists of a group of thirteen students whose job it is to propose bills and amendments which are then sent to the House of Delegates for approval. Once again, either by running for the Senate or by actively campaigning for a fellow student, the sophomore earns a place for himself. After four days of spirited campaigning, each sophomore makes his choice, and the three candidates polling the highest number of votes become the Soph Senators.






# Finding Himself, the Junior Looks Forward




Throughout the spring of 1966 the Prep students listened in awe to the noise and rumble resounding through the basement corridors. Work continued through the summer; and the fall found the newly constructed Brooklyn Prep Educational Television in action. So under the direction of Mr. Edward Bartley and Messrs. Hoag and Mallery, S.J., B.P.-T.V. launched itself as a pilot project for educational television on the east coast. Prep was picked by the New York Province of the Society of Jesus to experiment with educational television on the secondary level. If B.P.-T.V. is a success, educational television in this form will eventually spread to all the Jesuit high schools and colleges in the east. Success, however, is of little question. After only four months of operation the ETV crew already had over 60 items on tape-40 of which were taped from commercial television, films, and other sources; and the remainder of which were done completely by the television crew themselves. With requests from the faculty pouring in from all departments, mid-year found 26 shows planned for the second semester. These shows were done completely by the crew and covered: religion, guidance, English, history, modern languages, classics, math, and health. A three






year plan has been mapped out for Prep's ETV. The first year was used to get the students and teachers acquainted with the new system. The T.V. crew concentrated on continuity rather than an extensive use of the medium. The shows were criticized as to technique and effectiveness by both directors and crew. Different shows were taped-some good, some not so good-all to improve the medium. Next year it is hoped that a more experienced crew will be able to expand their tape library to a point where they would have blocks of shows each consisting of several closely related tapes. By the third and final year of experimentation it is predicted that a whole course, such as Latin I or English II, may be made into a series by amassing the tapes made the first two years. Educational Television's first year at the Prep far surpassed original expectation. The crew learned fast, the students acquainted themselves with the medium; and more things than were planned were actually put on tape. In addition B.P.-T.V. proved itself useful as another link to student activities. Skits conducted by the scholastics, which excited school spirit for the St. John's game, and excerpts from this Winter's Shakespearean play, Macbeth, were shown early in the year during the newly adopted (continued on p. 109)









homeroom period. Later, this expanded into a regular eight minute homeroom show in which world local news was broadcast throughout the school. B.P.-T.V. was also used to the advantage of Prep's audio-visual modern language department. Under the direction of Fathers Beck and Farrand, S.J., mid-year exams in French and German were given over B.P.-T.V. and in the second semester industrious French students found French movies being shown during the last 20 minutes of the lunch period. B.P.-T.V. has also fared well outside the Prep. It was used throughout the year to accommodate the Brooklyn-Queens Council of English Teachers. They flocked to Prep to witness debates and discussions by such men as Rev. William O'Malley, S.J., Rev. Charles Repole, O.F.M. Cap., and Rev. Daniel Berrigan, S.J. These discussions were usually live, unrehearsed interviews concerning today's world of Christian education. As in all Prep activities, the students on the ETV crew have almost made their directors obsolete. The ETV crew is perhaps the most independent body of students at the Prep. They do everything from graphing to directing and camera work without personal help from the directors.

### Eagles Fail to Get



The '66 Eagles finished the season with a 3-4 record, but they really were beaten just once-and even in that game, against Msgr. Farrell, the Prep wasn't out of it until late in the fourth quarter. Their own mistakes, however, were fatal against Xavier, Fordham, and St. John's. Many observers regarded this year's team as a push-over, They knew that Prep had a big, tough line headed by Captain Bob Berger, Tom Sweeney, and Pat Griffin. But there were some glaring holes in the backfield and defense left by last year's seniors. Head Coach Eugene Perry, and his assistants Al Milian and Mr. James Donnelly, S.J., found very sound replacements to fill them. The flashy running of Dick Cummings made the fans forget Kevin Serrapede. Gene Vascotto and Greg Cottone led the defensive backfield which was never beaten by an opposing receiver. Ray Battistoni grabbed 17 passes for 218 yards, a new Prep record. Tom Greene and John LaMattina rounded out the sure-handed receiving corps. Charley Russo, Bobby Rovegno, and Lenny Hypolite, all Juniors, also made their presence felt in the Prep backfield, brightening the future prospects of the Eagles. John Browne, Chuck Balistreri, and Junior Pete Perniciaro bolstered the defensive line which held Fordham to a minus five yards rushing. But the most pleasing surprise of all was the development of Tom Corridan into one of the best quarterbacks in the city and one of the greatest in Prep's history. Tom completed 38 of 76 passes for 640 yards and four touchdowns. In addition, he carried the



ball 85 times for 490 yards and six touchdowns. Altogether, Tom scored 48 points-half the team's total. Tough breaks characterized Prep's season but spectacular moments were plentiful. Prep's opening 26-0 win over Ferris was one of the finest all-round efforts by a Prep team in years. The last five minutes of the John F. Kennedy game, in which the Prep scored twice to pull out a 20-7 victory, were the most exciting of the year. The fabulous goal-line stands against Xavier and Seton Hall (which saved the game in the closing minutes) proved the toughness of the Eagles. But without the breaks, a team can only be mediocre. Missing very important extra points help to explain our losses to Xavier and St. John's. The winning Xavier touchdown came on a fourth down play with the Kadet player being hit on the one yard line and falling into the end-zone for the score. Prep's bid to tie the score in the first half against Farrell was foiled when Tom Corridan's long run was called back for clipping. On the opening series of plays against St. John's, the Eagles marched to the Redmen's 20, but a Corridan pass was intercepted in the end-zone. A change in any one of these and other circumstances could easily have changed that game's outcome. Yet, overall, the '66 Eagles were an exciting ball team. Coach Perry's offense was able, and did, score from anywhere on the field. True, they did lose four games, but three were by a total of nine points. In spirit and effort, this team was a success.









# Public Relations Emphasizes Prep





### Frosh Sport 9-2 Record









# MacBeth Audience Sees Psychedelic Scots

One fiercely debated and highly controversial topic prominent in our contemporary world is the use of the drug LSD, with its weird and mysterious psychedelic effects. The fascination with and interest in this subject is tremendously widespread. And so, in an effort to revive a waning student interest in Shakespeare's works, the Brooklyn Prep Players presented Macheth with a psychedelic flavor. Through the imagination and dedication of Mr. Charles Winans and Mr. George Mahoney, S.J., the sixteenth century fused with the twentieth to create a unique effect. The best efforts of the Dramatic Society, Shakespeare, and Timothy Leary combined to form this, the most magnificent of Prep's Shakespearean productions. A three-quarter stage, designed and constructed by Steve Whitson, and extending from the stage-proper, provided the taste of Elizabethan England. Carefully selected electronic music was integrated into various sections of the play. It boomed forth as the witches danced around a bubbling cauldron. At the same time, machines spewed an eerie, slowly-creeping mist which gently flowed across the stage. Two of the more imaginative special effects this year were the witches' costumes and make-up. Their hands and faces were coated with green, phosphorescent make-up which glowed from beneath their gossamer, black-gauze costumes. The rest of the male actors wore black pants and velours. Complex lighting patterns also contributed to the psychedelic touch.

Under the expert leadership of Coach Walter Doolan, the team captured first place in the Brooklyn-Queens League, second place in the Dual Meet Championships, and the Private Schools Championship along with other prizes. The team itself was strong in all events. Ed Mallen proved himself one of the top divers in the East, his duels with Don Columbo of St. Francis gaining almost as much fame as the Lincoln-Douglas debates. Bob Corno joined Mallen to give the Eagles a tough diving combo. Senior John Needham and Freshman Artie Lee were strong in the backstroke. 
#### Andros Continues to Revise








## Mr. Lawn's Eagles near Playoffs


When you finish the year with a 12-9 record (9-7 in league competition) with a team which was expected to finish far below .500, you'd expect a jubilant coach and team. Yet, far from jubilant, Coach John Lawn and his "Cinderella" ball club were rather disappointed. For they rose from 7th place all the way to 2nd only to have fate slap them from a playoff berth. There were no set starters from last year's squad, and only Ed Gaffney, Fran DePeter, and Stafford Hilaire had Varsity experience. But these three men came through like polished veterans, with Hilaire scoring 229 points and averaging 12 rebounds a game, and DePeter pumping in 172 points coupled with an eight-rebound average. Coach Lawn also had some aces up his sleeve. One of them was Prep's "super-soph," Kenny Charles, who led the team with 263 points, an 11 point average. Then there was Charlie Hegarty, who hustled his way into the starting lineup after failing to make the Frosh, J.V., and Varsity in his first three years. Charlie was third in scoring with 173 points. Junior Danny McHale who scored 169 points gave Prep a solid sixth man. Add to this a consistent bench headed by Bob Atanasio, Tony Engberg, John Alleva, and Ray Battistoni, and "Cinderella" was ready for the ball. The team started slowly; but, things got going in the Jesuit Tournament. As usual, Prep was expected to finish about seventh in a nine-team field. However, Coach Lawn showed the non-believers how they play the game in Brooklyn. Prep opened with a big upset over McQuaid from Rochester. The next night they pulled another upset, this time over the little Rams




from Fordham Prep. Trying for a third upset in three nights, the Eagles took the court against St. Peter's of Jersey City. Prep played them even during the first half, and at the half they entered the locker room down one. However, the wear and tear of the three night tourney had its effect, and St. Peter's won the game and the tournament. The tournament, though, seemed to give the Eagles the confidence they needed; for, ten days later, they made believers out of the CHSAA. First, they literally shocked St. Augustine, upsetting them by a 19 point margin. St. John's and Nazareth also proved to be no match for the new Eagles. Then came the greatest game of the year. The high-riding Terriers from St. Francis came to the Prep gym in first place, sporting an 11-0 record. The Eagles didn't seem impressed. They scored the opening basket and were never headed. Charles, DePeter, and Gaffney couldn't miss the basket, and Hegarty's ball handling, plus Hilaire's rebounding, drove the Terriers crazy. When it was over, the Eagles, to the delight of a packed gym, had won by twenty, 62-42. St. Francis was stunned. The Eagles easily handled Xaverian and Trinity. Overall, they won six in a row and, for the month of January, Prep was the best team in the league. With three games left, an eagle victory would mean a playoff berth. But, then, the clock struck midnight for the Eagles. Fran DePeter's injured right thigh kept him on the bench the rest of the year. Fran's back-up man, Bob Atanasio, was held to limited service because of an injured knee, and only desire kept Staff Hilaire playing with severe stomach cramps. These losses were too much for the Eagles to bear as they lost three tough games to Loughlin, St. Augustine, and Bishop Ford. Yet, to the student body, this team was an overwhelming success. Their desire, courage, and sheer hustle showed everyone that a basketball team doesn't have to be big to win. Although they finished losing, their pride made them big winners.














#### Academic Elite: Prep's Brahman Establishment







## Oratory and Debate Score Dramatic Victories






#### Small Band-New Sound







# Trackmen Take Wins In Stride

The Outdoor Track Season opened up with an outstanding effort by Mark Longo, Brooklyn Prep's "Athlete of the Year," in the Jesuit Inter-Scholastic Meet. Mark also ran away with first place in the Brooklyn Meet; the rest of Prep's "Fabulous Foursome," Tom Murphy, Ed McBride, and Rod Murray also proved tough competition. Prep finished third at Fordham University behind the efforts of the same foursome, with Longo breaking the school record in the CHSAA three-mile event with a fantastic time of 13:25. Not satisfied with this accomplishment, however, he broke his own record in the Private Schools Meet with a 13:2 time. The Indoor Season got off to a slow start but gradually picked up speed, led by Captain Mark Longo who kept up his winning pace by taking first in the major meets. The Novice team of Lenny Hypolite, Rich Walters, Ken Grossberger, and Tom Greene took fifth place and shattered the school record with a 1:39.1. The entire team turned in victorious performances: Pete Monck in the 40 yard Sprint, Mike Callahan, Joe McCabe, and Joe Navarro in the 280; Ken Grossberger's first place in the 440, with Larry Murphy and Mike Mercurio placing second and third respectively; and Longo's new record of 2:02.8 in the 880 yard run. John Cenamo copped second and Tom Geraghty third in the mile run. With performances like this, and the future development of Hypolite, Mercurio, Callahan, Walters, and Grossberger, Coach Lawrence's harriers will again be tough competition next season.








