In short raligion, bused on owned dortnine and a lively liturgy should help the student see and respond to "the bloodstained face of todays world.







Most importantly though we try to correlate the past with the present in a sincere attempt to understand the homo sapiens and his too often neglected peer, the animal vationale.






Eagle Victory in Fiftieth Classic




It was not the type of day for any sort of outdoor activity. The sky was flooded with leaden grey clouds, and the wind blasted the hills that dominated Van Cortland Park.

Runners, representing different schools from the Metropolitan area, waited in small groups for any last minute encouragement. All had finished the necessary warm up sprints.



The race was finished and the losers remembered only snatches of what they had gone through. For the winner it didn't matter.





We are all familiar with the class-room situation and when we try to make a television presentation, we must realize that the differencees can present an obstacle. Television is primarily a visual medium, and therefore, we must convert as much as possible, our verbal ideas into visual one if we wish to communicate effectively through the medium of television. through the medium of television.

This is done fundamentally through images. Images are used primarily to convey meaning in a clear, con-crete way. The more senses an image appeals to, the more experiential it is or the more meaning it conveys.

For instance if I see the word BROOK, it conveys meaning but it

ticular scene to demonstrate the manfestation of character through setting and action as well as through dialogue. Here we have a scene from Act II of Samuel Beckett's Waiting For Godot. V.O.

"Can we go now? . . . We're waiting for Godot."
NARRATOR: These are the basic resources we have at our disposal in the field of television. All of them pre-sent an image. Some are static; some are dynamic; but all are visual. We must use them in the scripting of a television lesson or else we will fail to make full use of the medium as it is meant to be used.






Brooklyn Prep Band

Then about the same time that the cast puts down its scripts, the crew takes up its tools and construction begins. 



Varsity Basketball

The school was for it, "psyched." Talk went around the classes about kids actually going to see an away game. A bus was rented and an enthusiastic bunch of supporters piled on.




Junior Varsity Basketball











Andros







Varsity Swimming


French IV
